Dear Mr. Hetherington:

Thank you for your complimentary letter.

With a job like this, you have to have a philosophy of what you are trying to do. Mine has been that if you can capture a significant moment in this building with the participants oblivious of your being in the room, then you have a moment of history and that's important.

In order to do this, I use all Nikon equipment -- 9 bodies to be exact and every lens from the 20mm to the 500mm. I avoid flash asmuch as possible and use Tri-X at asa 1200 developed in Acufin. Even then, in some parts of the White House I find myself shooting wide open at a fifteenth of a second. However, because the Boss likes color, I keep three bodies filled with Kodacolor-X which we push to asa 160 by extending the first development.

Hope this will be of some help.

THE LEADERSHIP QUALITIES OF OUR COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF

I find it quite difficult to define Leadership, although all of my life I have known it well. It has been a part of my character, a way of life, and a part of the atmosphere around me over a wide spectrum of roles in both military and civilian life. My observations and experience with Leadership have spanned many activities as a citizen of this wonderful country of ours.

The desirable effects of Leadership are more definable than the multifaceted subject itself. I have come to know the mantle effect of good Leadership to mean such things as living and working in harmony with others, a sense of pride and belonging, an enthusiastic approach to meaningful work and duty; a deep faith in myself, my fellow-man, and in my country. Anything less than this summation is not optimum Leadership.

These are factors of a good life. They are fusions of Leadership influences by parents, siblings, relatives, clergy, friends, superiors and subordinates, along with the personal investment of one's own physical and emotional self -- his body and his soul!

Leadership change, or evolution, is vital with progress and changing times. In the military, changes are often too late to prevent injury to both body and spirit. The massive casualties on the battlefields of World War I due to the inadequate leadership of blind obedience when the world of technology had moved to a new era is but one example. That it must change with the needs and tempo of the times is a vividly apparent fact in the social orders of the world today.

With these thoughts, I turn to the themeof my presentation. I know that each of you, as well as I, feel it an honor and a privilege to serve President Lyndon B. Johnson as our Commander-in-Chief. I am particularly grateful to serve this President at this time and at this place. In this service, I have nurtured my patriotic American soul from his Leadership. Here are just a few of his qualities:

COURAGE

I, for purposes of illustration, view social structure as a fluid medium. In it there are ebbs, flows, and currents. There are also contaminants. During our lifetime the international and domestic social fluids have become saturated with certain contaminants. They have not been removed or purified through years and decades but merely kept in solution. Aided by advances of modern man such as education, travel, affluence and communications, the contaminants of communism, poverty, civil non-rights, disease, and problems of aging have begun to crystallize out of solution.

You and I know full well the courage our Commander-in-Chief has shown in dealing with these problems. His moral strength in withstanding these difficulties has been of indescribable magnitude. In the Heritage and Traditions of great American courage, he has been a true giant. To me his courage has been a great inspiration. At times it appears the opposition is so great that his courage alone secures the destiny of our land.

ABILITY

A fundamental of Leadership is ability. One day many volumes will be written about our Commander-in-Chief's ability. President Truman has carefully documented the scope of the Presidency and why it exceeded the possible abilities of one man. Since that time, the problems have grown by accretion in numbers and complexity. We may be seeing for the last time a President with the sum and total ability to meet the challenges of which President Truman speaks. The world (friend and foe alike) and all Americans know and accept President Johnson's ability -- a fundamental of leadership.

ADAPTABILITY

The rapid changes of today in science, religion, education, social attitudes, and life patterns make Leadership Adaptability a critical necessity.

More so than at any time in our history is the need for parting from the secure traditional to the insecure unknown future critically acute. Vision,

anticipation, and adaptability are Leadership commodities which are precious indeed. We stand, at this time, as a great country, with even greater potential, as a living monument of proof that we have in abundance that great quality of Leadership, Adaptability. The main source of supply, as we all know, is our President.

DEDICATION

Admiration, respect, and enthusiasm are the Leadership profits I gain from the Dedication of our Commander-in-Chief. As a citizen it has given me a sense of security in realizing the great depth of Dedication to our country and its principles that our President has shown.

CAPACITY FOR WORK

Our Commander-in-Chief is without question the "maximum effort" President of this great land. You and I have been caught up in his work schedule and know first hand that he applies the maximum force for the greatest length of time for completion of a mission. Complete disregard for his own person, day and night, seven days a week, month after month, year in and year out, have etched in the minds of everyone that great American Leadership Quality - Capacity for Work and love of same.

STANDARDS OF EXCELLENCE

You in the Signal Corps know the non-existent tolerance for error and the requirement for perfect performance as well as anyone.

To demand, expect, and get excellence in all areas is a Leadership characteristic that few men possess. We in the military look to our leaders for these standards which in time of conflict mean the difference between victory and defeat -- and, often, life and death. Our Commander-in-Chief has set, demanded, and obtained perfection from all of us. It has been most gratifying for me to be a part of the Nation's Armed Forces during this great era of quest for excellence which has accelerated and been sustained by our Commander-in-Chief. This is a leadership quality which has brought tangible benefits to America. I pray that we may keep it!

COMPASSION

I have often thought that the great Christian virtue of Compassion for fellow man was finally realized as part of the American dream and it marked us with a stamp of greatness and was our Leadership contribution to civilized man.

To all who know him personally, and to most who know him as their President, our Commander-in-Chief is a symbol of this great quality. His compassion for people of all ages, races, religions, and countries is already a legend. I know him already as "the great Human-itarian President" with more compassion than a large segment of my own Profession.

The great anguish and pain suffered by the President for all of us, our comrades in arms, and the people of areas in armed conflict, is a price for his compassion to all of the people of the free worllwho live now and for generations yet unborn. Yes, our Commander-in-Chief has shown the world that his feet are made of clay, too, and that the great American Leadership virtue of compassion for fellow man is his and our greatest asset.

Time is limited, so I will close. The list of Leadership qualities is an open-ended set. Moral Leadership and Guardian of Justice are but two qualities which we will be unable to cover. I take each day these qualities and energies of our President and both consciously and subconsciously commit them to my own cause. I hope you will do the same.

I might add that we in the Military have responded well to the Leadership qualities of our Commander-in-Chief. For the most part, we have been doing our duties and living the life in his pattern and with few exceptions are not asking what our President can do for us but rather "what can we do for our President?"



I learned about you and the reputation you enjoy in carrying out your great responsibility as the President's photographer in an article written by Correspondent Nakao which appeared in the evening edition of the Mainichi Shimbun of May 30th. I hope that you will forgive me, a perfect stranger, for writing to you for assistance.

I read that you, as one of those professionals who are inclined to be busily involved in world affairs, have a strong sense of values where history is concerned and I have the most profound respect for you.

Among the things in which I am involved at present is what is called the "Permanent, Immutable Photograph." I plan to obtain a patent on this but I am not making it public as yet.

It involves the copying of photographs onto 18-8 stainless sheet plates (black and white). They will not rust, will resist water and fire, and of course they will not become wrinkled. Really prominent persons are to appear on these sheets as individuals and to be specific, because of what you have had to say, I am writing these few words to you in the hope that, through your help, I shall be able to make copies of the photograph of the talks between President Johnson and Premier Kosygin (since these are historically very important talks) on the "Permanent, Immutable Photograph" and send each of them a copy.

I realize that you are very busy but I would like to have your consideration in this matter. I wonder if you would be good enough to send me a copy of the photograph of these talks (black and white will be just fine).

When I have completed the processing, I will send it back to you.

Incidentally, this is not a cheap, weak, flimsy item such as the type which is copied onto porcelain, ordinary steel plates or aluminum. A 5 X 7 costs about 5,000 yen. I feel that the best size is the 8 X 10. I am not asking for any payment this time. I don't know how long history will continue to be made from now on but the "Permanent, Immutable Photograph" will endure without the slightest change in color or other type of change even when history does come to an end or there is great destruction.

This process is under patent number 44531 and its applicant (holder) is making various contributions in the industrial field in Japan. Among the awards conferred recently - especially in connection with this process of "method of hard, black chrome plating" - I received a decoration from the Emperor.

I sincerely hope that you will do what you can for me.


