THE ROYAL THAI REGIMENT, THE QUEEN'S COBRAS, HAS ENGAGED A VETERAN VIET CONT UNIT AND DECISIVELY DEFEATED IT. I HAVE JUST RETURNED FROM THE FIELD, WHERE I WAS BRIEFED BY YOUR OFFICERS IN COMMAND, TALKED TO SOME OF YOUR TROOPS, AND SURVEYED THE BATTLEFIELD. LAST NIGHT THE ENEMY ATTACKED IN BATTALION STRENGTH THE 1ST COMPANY OF YOUR REGIMENT, USING MORTARS, IANTI-TANK ROCKETS, SACHEL CHARGES, HEAVY AND LIGHT MACHINE GUNS, AND SMALL ARMS. 52 ENEMY WERE KILLED BY YOUR INFANTRYMEN, AND THERE IS EVIDENCE THAT MANY OTHERS WERE KILLED BY MORTAR FIRE, ARTILLERY, AND ARMED HELICOPTERS. ALSO, A NUMBER OF WEAPONS AND A SIZEABLE QUANTITY OF AMMUNITION AND EQUIPMENT WERE CAPTURED. YOUR LOSSES WERE SIX KILLED, THREE BY A SINGLE MORTAR SHELL, AND SIX WOUNDED, MOSTLY BY MORTAR FRAGMENTS. YOUR TROOPS DISPLAYED AN AGGRESSIVE COMBAT SPIRIT, MANNED THEIR WEAPONS IN A HIGHLY PROFESSIONAL MANNER, AND SEVERELY DEFEATED A DETERMINED ENEMY ATTACK. MORALE IS EXTREMELY HIGH, FROM GENERAL YOSE DOWN TO THE YOUNGEST PRIVATE. I AM CONFIDENT THAT THIS EXCELLECT PERFORMANCE BY YOUR TROOPS WILL BE A MATTER OF SATISFACTION AND PRIDE TO YOU. CONGRATULATIONS.

I told him I had full faith in his personal integrity, but it was the most irresponsible piece of journalism I had seen in my years in Washington.

SUBJECT: The President's conversation with Prime Minister Thanom
in Australia

The President stressed the importance of the earliest possible deployment to Vietnam of additional Thai forces. Prime Minister Thanom agreed, but pointed out that the training of the forces could not begin until the necessary equipment was in hand. Thanom undertook to guarantee deployment in Vietnam of the forces in a maximum of 90 days from the receipt in Thailand of necessary equipment. The President promised that the equipment would be provided at the earliest possible moment.

I would appreciate having from you a status report on where we are in providing the human and material resources needed for the training of the Thai expeditionary force. I would be particularly interested in anything which we will have difficulty in providing in time to meet the accelerated schedule implicit in the President's conversation with Prime Minister Thanom.

TEXT OF STATEMENT

'Their Objective Remained'

Holt Memorial Talks

CANBERRA, Australia—
The text of the joint statement issued by President Johnson and South Vietnamese President Thieu:

President Nguyen Van Thieu of the Republic of Vietnam and President Lyndon B. Johnson of the United States held an informal working dinner this evening, both being present in Canberra for the memorial service for the late Prime Minister Harold Holt.

There was a full exchange of views on all aspects of South Vietnam's struggle to defend its freedom from external force.

The military situation was reviewed and found to show good progress.

Progress was also noted in the work of pacification and of economic reconstruction with the intention that this could be speeded up in the coming months.

President Johnson congratulated President Thieu on the completion of a constitution, the holding of successful national elections and the installation of a constitutional government.

Thieu Outlined Plans

It was recognized that many problems remained to be overcome, and President Thieu outlined the plans of his government to deal with these problems, along the lines of his inaugural speech and the later program presented to the people of South Vietnam by Prime Minister Loc.

Both presidents agreed that their objective remained an honorable and secure peace in accordance with the basic statement of the South Vietnamese position contained in the Manila communique of October 1966 and

supported by the other participants.

They regretted that there was no sign that North Vietnam was prepared to take any of the many avenues to peace that had been opened.

They agreed that in these circumstances there was no alternative to continuing appropriate military actions.

President Thieu once again explained his government's policy of reconciliation enunciated at Honolulu in February 1966.

In the light of the elections which have subsequently taken place, he noted that the government of Vietnam is now prepared to grant full rights of citizenship to those now fighting against the government who are prepared to accept constitutional processes and to live at peace under the constitutionally elected government.

The NLF Issue

President Thieu likewise reaffirmed a willingness to discuss relevant matters with any individuals now associated with the so-called National Liberation Front, while making clear that his government could not regard the Front as an independent organization in any sense. He noted that it was not useful to attempt constructive discussions with any elements in South Vietnam committed to violent methods to obtain their political ends.

Noting press comment on President Johnson's five points as stated in his television broadcast Dec. 19, President Thieu affirmed that they were fully consistent with a policy on which the government of Vietnam and the government of the United States have long agreed.

President Johnson stated the

intent of the United States to continue its support for this policy of national reconciliation.

One-Man, One-Vote

Both presidents agreed that the basic principle involved was the right of the South Vietnamese people to determine their own future through democratic and constitutional processes noted in the principle of one-man one-vote.

They further agreed that the removal of external interference and the acceptance of this principle by all the citizens of South Vietnam were fundamental elements in any enduring and honorable peace in South Vietnam. They agreed that these elements were totally consistent with the spirit and essential terms of the Geneva agreements of 1954 and the Geneva agreements of 1962 respecting Laos.

JOHNSON TRIBUTE TO HOLT PRAISED BY SYDNEY PAPER

By a Star Staff Writer

CANBERRA, Australia — The Sydney Daily Mirror, an afternoon tabloid newspaper, paid tribute this afternoon to President Johnson for his tribute to Harold Holt on his arrival in Canberra.

"In the time of bereavement," the Mirror said editorially, "very often a friend can express things better than the immediate relatives."

It went on to quote some of Johnson's remarks about Holt and concluded: "We

FOREIGN MEDIA REACTION TO
PRESIDENT JOHNSON'S TRIP TO AUSTRALIA

As President Johnson completed his mission to Australia and took off for Southeast Asia, Australian media expressed appreciation for his "great and splendid gesture" in flying so far to honor the late Prime Minister.

Heavy news and editorial treatment also stressed the President's "deep sympathy and concern" for Mrs. Holt. All papers carried big picture spreads, showing the President with the Holt family, Lady Delacombe, McEwen, Wilson, and leaders of allied countries in Asia.

SYDNEY: The Daily Telegraph said: "The Prime Minister of Great Britain and the President of the U.S., both of them beset at home with most urgent problems, made the great and splendid gesture of flying across the world to pay their last respects to Mr. Holt."

CANBERRA: The Australian said: "With nine softly-spoken words yesterday, President Johnson openly showed his deep sympathy and personal concern for Mrs. **Zara** Holt: 'Take good care of my dear friend in there', he earnestly told Lady Delacombe...before leaving Government House to fly out of Australia."

The paper carried a story on the President's meeting with Prince Charles, saying they met privately in an upstairs room of Government House, talked for about fifteen minutes, and "seemed to get along fine."

Other stories featured the President's brief meeting with his close friend Dame Mabel Brookes, his visit with the Holt family, his missing Lady Bird's birthday, and the police seizure of guns from weekend kangaroo hunters before his arrival at Port Darwin.

MELBOURNE: The Sun carried a story about Christopher Holt with the headline "My Pal the President." The paper said that President Johnson "showed signs of emotion after the memorial service. He stood on the Cathedral steps wiping tears from his eyes."

SEOUL: Today's press continued to give major prominence to talks in Melbourne involving the leaders of seven Viet-Nam war allies. Papers emphasized that the leaders reconfirmed their determination to continue the war until an honorable peace is achieved, and reaffirmed their cooperation in building Asian prosperity.

Top headlines in the afternoon papers announced President Johnson's visit to Thailand, and President Park's return to Korea.

NEW DELHI: Several newspapers front-paged stories and photos of the memorial service for Mr. Holt. The Times of India carried a three-column, page-one picture of President Johnson and other leaders attending the service, while the Statesman and the Express had the same Associated Press photo on an inside page.

RAWALPINDI: The Pakistani press gave considerable prominence to McEwen's reassurance of Australia's continued support for U.S. policy in Viet-Nam.

ROME: Papers yesterday were filled with speculation on whether President Johnson would see the Pope on Christmas Eve.

Communist Unita said: "Every indication is that Johnson is coming in order to try to break out of the circle of isolation that surrounds him. He is a world symbol of the 'dirty war' and of its horrors and escalation... Johnson will have plenty of opportunity here in Rome to see how detested he and his war are."

LONDON: The British press today gave top prominence to President Johnson's trip and the possibility of his meeting the Pope at the Vatican to discuss peace prospects.

MOSCOW: Press and radio condemned the gathering of allied leaders in Australia "to fan the flames of war in Southeast Asia." Moscow Radio declared: "The world public is also alarmed by the fact that the Pentagon is hatching plans to transfer military operations to the territory of states bordering Viet-Nam, particularly Cambodia and Laos."

PEKING: The New China News Agency carried a lengthy attack on President Johnson's trip to Australia. It said: "Johnson's latest trip to Australia was to explain to the South Viet-Nameese puppet chieftain and the gang of Washington's vassals in the Viet-Nam war the increased U.S. efforts to step up its aggression, and to ask them to render greater service."

The commentary emphasized that the U.S. was "preparing public opinion for the American expansion of the war and the invasion of Cambodia and Laos."

PROSPECTS OF PEACE TALKS

Indian and Mexican commentators variously judged the chances for talks with the Viet Cong. An Indian paper saw "a glimmer of hope" in the Johnson-Thieu joint statement and in "the National Liberation Front's new interest in the U.N."

A Mexican editor said the President's peace plan was "an advance in the search for a solution to the conflict."

Meanwhile, the NLF today addressed "a message to the American people on the occasion of Christmas and New Year", offering its thanks "for having struggled this year continuously and vigorously to demand that the U.S. Government put an end to its war of aggression in Viet-Nam, stop the bombing of the DRV, withdraw U.S. troops from South Viet-Nam, and respect the Viet-Nameese people's right to self-determination."

"A GLIMMER OF HOPE"

Indian papers wondered whether talks with the Viet Cong were feasible. The independent Times of India of Bombay and New Delhi said:

"The present rulers of South Viet-Nam may find themselves in a precarious position if the impression spreads that the U.S. has decided to come to terms with the National Liberation Front. But it looks as if President Johnson has decided to take the risk and push the Sai gon government towards accommodation with the NLF.

"He could not have been guided solely or even primarily by domestic political considerations, though these cannot be far away from his mind in an election year. He has also been able to overcome the first hostile reaction of the South Viet-Nam government and to persuade President Thieu, in direct talks in Canberra, of the correctness of his stand.

"But it is an open question whether President Thieu can carry his other colleagues like Air Marshal Ky with him and open a dialogue with top NLF leaders.... President Johnson's present move, President Thieu's willingness to fall in line and the NLF's new interest in the U.N. offer a glimmer of hope."

CONTACTS DURING CHRISTMAS TRUCE?

The influential Indian Express of Bombay reported that "there are definite indications that some kind of informal contacts between the Viet Cong and the South Viet-Nameese government may be established during the truce, but observers doubt that there will be substantial results because of Chinese Communist obstruction and President Thieu's refusal to recognize the NLF."

Independent Vishwamitra feared that escalation would result. It asserted that "the pressure of public opinion in the U.S. has prompted the President to suggest a new formula.... The American people have begun to realize that there can be no military solution in Viet-Nam.... The NLF is ready for peace negotiations with the U.S., but it is not ready for any talks with the South Viet-Nameese government. Thus the situation is very uncertain. Whether or not the NLF does agree to talk to the Saigon government, President Johnson will get publicity to the effect that the Communists do not want negotiations. With this excuse he may also escalate the war in Viet-Nam."

The right-center Nav Bharat Times of New Delhi said U.S. homefront opposition to the war "has given the Viet Cong and North Viet-Nam hope that the U.S. may withdraw. It is clear that if the U.S. and its allies aim at a military victory, they must be prepared to face Communist China as they did in Korea. But U.S. public opinion is veering away from such major war involvement."

Yesterday's Pakistan Times of Lahore termed President Johnson's "peace proposal.... a hopeful sign."

Today's Times of London ran a year-end editorial which described the Viet-Nam war as "not merely a local conflict but a major tragedy for the world. It is not just devastating Viet-Nam itself; it is corrupting American society, destroying her moral position in the world, severely hampering the necessary development of East-West relations in Europe, and increasing the risk of a major clash with China."

"A FIRST STEP TOWARD NEGOTIATIONS"

Mexico City's independent Ovaciones hoped for an extended Christmas truce. It observed that "apparently President Johnson has ceded some rigid positions.... and accepts talks between the South Vietnamese government and the Viet Cong as a first step toward the negotiating table."

Moderately conservative Excelsior of Mexico City termed the President's proposal "an advance in the search for a solution to the conflict" and called on "the socialist countries to exert pressure on Hanoi and the Viet Cong to accept a dialogue."

Recommended U.S. Position

Ambassador Oehlert will have just talked to President Ayub on this matter. It now appears likely, subject to your decision, that we will be in a position soon to approve a sale of 100 (one hundred) U.S. controlled tanks from Italy or Belgium.

4. Viet-Nam

Anticipated Pakistan Position

President Ayub is not likely to take any initiative on this subject but he may inquire about progress there. Ayub has not criticized the U.S. position and he has recently ~~taken the position~~ ^{that} the GOP should not criticize positions of the Great Powers on international issues. This

has resulted in a much less adverse press on Viet-Nam. President Ayub along with an impressive group of high-level Pakistan officials attended a recent briefing by U.S. officers from Viet-Nam.

5. Wheat Purchase

We received word December 22 that in response to Ambassador Oehlert's efforts of a few months ago, the GOP is prepared to purchase 100,000 tons of wheat commercially from the US under CCC terms. You may wish to express your gratification at this development to Ayub.

Talking Paper - Prime Minister Harold Wilson

The President last saw Prime Minister Wilson in Washington in June, 1967. There are current efforts to find a mutually convenient date in February when Prime Minister Wilson can again come to Washington for talks with the President.

1. Viet-Nam

Prime Minister Wilson will be interested in an assessment of the prospects for the Viet-Nam issue being brought into the Security Council. He will probably tell you that he hopes to explore this issue thoroughly on his visit to Moscow in January. You may wish to express your appreciation for the Prime Minister's support for our position in Viet-Nam.

2. Devaluation of Sterling

The UK's 14.3 percent devaluation, together with a new package of measures to reduce Government spending and restrict domestic consumption, provides it with an opportunity to achieve a substantial and permanent improvement in its balance of payments. Whether Britain can take advantage of this opportunity remains to be seen. Much will depend on the Government's ability to take the

politically unpopular but necessary steps to cut Government spending and hold price and wage increases within reasonable bounds; the benefits of the devaluation could be frittered away by undue wage and price hikes. The devaluation is already affecting the domestic political scene and defense policy. The reputation of the Labour Government has been further tarnished, but a General Election does not appear imminent. There are increased pressures for further reductions in defense spending; these could lead to more cutbacks in Britain's overseas defense commitments and possibly to a reduction in military purchases from the U.S.

3. Middle East

The President may wish to say that we were pleased the UK resolution was approved in the Security Council and that the locus of negotiations has now shifted to the Middle East. Prime Minister Wilson may note that the UK's resumption of diplomatic relations with the UAR on December 12 may enhance the prospect of HMG's having some influence on Nasser.

4. UK-EEC

At his November 27 press conference, General de Gaulle said that Britain could not enter the European Communities until its economic and monetary situation had undergone a profound transformation. As an alternative, he offered Britain some form of association arrangement. The British want full membership, not association, and have made this clear. They are asking the Six for a clear answer on whether negotiations can begin. At the December 18 session of the December 18-19 meeting of the EC Council, the Five remained united and insistent on opening negotiations without delay, but no change appeared in the negative position of France. The prospects for December 19 are uncertain.

Since 1963, the U.S. and the UK, have embargoed the sale of arms to South Africa in compliance with a UN Security Council resolution which condemned South Africa's repressive racial policies. These policies have worsened with South Africa's illegal tampering with the territorial integrity of the international Territory of South West Africa, the dispatch of South African police units into Southern Rhodesia, and by increasingly repressive racial measures within the Republic itself.

Strict British observance of the UN embargo did not begin until the formation of the Labor Government. Economic pressures have led to controversy within the Cabinet in the past few days over whether the British should not return to a less restrictive policy. Although financial pressures for a relaxation of the embargo will continue, the press reported today that Prime Minister Wilson has announced that Britain will maintain its ban.

You may wish to express the hope that our two Governments can continue to keep in touch on this problem.

6. Bilateral Issues

There are no major bilateral issues pending between the United Kingdom and the United States which would warrant your attention on this occasion.

(who has visited Australia). I think it highly likely that the Tunku would go and that this would mean that hee would probably go. There is just the chance that Souvenne would go, having recently visited Australia. No word from Marcos, but I would bet substantially that he would go.

Possible Schedule. With this attendance, I am sure the President would wish to stay over in Australia at least through Saturday and try to have his appointments on that day rather than on the day of the service, which I assume he would wish to devote to Australian calls. Since Melbourne is a rather confused place to talk, I would think he and the others might well wish to go to Canberra Friday night -- on the basis of paying their respects to the Government -- and then talk quietly Saturday before dispersing.

As to the return trip, the President could leave Saturday night and get back to Texas Sunday for Christmas. There is the alternative of his going for Christmas somewhere else in the area, and I have asked for air times on this route.

SUBJECT: The Security Situation in Australia

1. We believe there is little risk to the President in connection with his trip to Australia. The Australian police and security agencies are well-trained and competent. They will take all possible precautions to prevent any situation which might endanger President Johnson. Of course, a solitary act by some demented individual cannot be ruled out.

2. As for political demonstrations, Australians are generally well disposed toward the US. There are groups that on occasion have made vociferous (but peaceful) anti-US demonstrations on Vietnam or other issues. The chances of even this sort of unpleasantness will be minimized, however, by the solemn circumstances of the President's visit.

1. If Prince Sihanouk comes to the Australian Memorial Service, there is no formal reason why the President and Prince Sihanouk could not exchange greetings or engage in conversation. The United States recognizes Cambodia as a State and recognizes Prince Sihanouk's Government as a Government. We do not have diplomatic relations — but this is at Prince Sihanouk's option. Prince Sihanouk himself may not desire contact or conversation but this would evolve naturally under the circumstances.

2. In any conversation, however informal, the President might wish to make the following points to Prince Sihanouk:

a) The United States desires normal and friendly relations with Cambodia and is interested in its independence, safety, neutrality and prosperity.

b) Obviously the United States is gravely concerned about the abuse of Cambodian territory by Viet Cong and North Vietnamese forces. Much information on this matter has been made available to the Cambodian Government. The United States has no interest whatever in seeing Cambodia

thrown into the unhappy conflict in Viet-Nam and Laos. It does, however, believe that strenuous measures should be taken by the Government of Cambodia and by appropriate international machinery to insure that Cambodian territory is not abused.

c) The United States is prepared to support in every way the reinforcement of the ICC to give Prince Sihanouk maximum assurance that the neutrality of Cambodia is being respected and that Cambodia remains non-involved in the present conflict.

d) With regard to the establishment of normal relations, the United States is interested in having the normal processes of diplomacy available between Cambodia and the United States. It should be recognized that the purpose of diplomatic relations is to have machinery through which all problems can be discussed, including differences between the two countries. It is not possible to condition the maintenance of international relations upon agreement on outstanding issues between the two countries.

However, we do not on our side see any reason why normal relations could not be resumed.

e) The President would be glad to arrange for discreet discussion with the Cambodian Government about any problems which exist between us. This could take the form of a special emissary visiting Phnom Penh or of talks between representatives of both countries at some mutually convenient third capital.

f) As for relations between Cambodia and its immediate neighbors, the United States sees no reason why these relationships cannot be developed in a more normal fashion and is prepared to use its influence to contribute to that result. We are inclined to believe that discreet bilateral contacts between Cambodia and its immediate neighbors could produce useful results.

g) One of the benefits of a more normal relationship would be the opportunity for discreet exchanges of views rather than a public airing of differences which can only increase misunderstanding on both sides.



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


