

- 2. RITCHIE TALKED WITH ROMAN ON FRIDAY OF LAST WEEK AND WARNED HIM THAT GOC COULD NOT APPROVE EXPORT OF URANIUM OXIDE WITHOUT APPROPRIATE SAFEGUARDS. IN REPLY ROMAN ASSURED HIM THAT "MATTER OF SAFEGUARDS" WOULD BE DEALT WITH SATISFACTORILY AND THAT IN ABOUT TWO OR THREE WEEKS HE WOULD HAVE ADEFINITE PROPOSAL TO PUT BEFORE GOC.
- 3. ALTHOUGH ROMAN WAS VAGUE REGARDING ANY DETAILS OF AGREEMENT, RITCHIE WAS CONVINCED THAT THE PROPOSED ULTIMATE DESTINATION OF THE URANIUM OXIDE WAS FRANCE EITHER VIA EURATOM OR DIRECTLY.

4. RITCHIE MENTIONED THAT THE CANADIAN SCIENTIFIC ATTACHE IN WASHINGTON HAD ALREADY BEEN INFORMED OF ROMAN'S EFFORT. HE WENT ON TO SAY THAT WE COULD BE ASSURED THAT GOC WOULD CONSULT WITH US BEFORE IT REACHED A DECISION ON ANY SPECIFIC PROPOSAL PUT TO IT BY ROMAN. HE EMPHASIZED, HOWEVER, THAT HE COULD NOT GUARANTEE THAT THIS WOULD BE DONE BEFORE ROMAN HAD SIGNED SOME FORM OF AN AGREEMENT SINCE, OF COURSE, GOC HAD NO MEANS OF TELLING HIM HE COULD NOT NEGOTIATE AN AGREEMENT, EVEN THOUGH IT WOULD NECESSARILY BE SUBJECT TO APPROVAL BY GOC.

5. RITCHIE SPECULATED THAT ROMAN MIGHT BE TRYING TO BUILD UP THE MAXIMUM PRESSURE FOR GOC APPROVAL. IN THIS CONNECTION HE MENTIONED THREE ELEMENTS THAT COULD MAKE IT DIFFICULT FOR GOC TO REJECT AN AGREEMENT ALONG THE LINES ROMAN APPARENTLY HAS IN MIND. IN THE FIRST PLACE, IT WOULD BE A MAJOR SALES CONTRACT FOR A CANADIAN COMPANY. IN THE SECOND PLACE, IT WOULD BE DIRECTLY BENEFICIAL TO THE PM'S OWN CONSTITUENCY. IN THE THIRD PLACE IF, AS RITCHIE ASSUMES TO BE THE CASE, FRANCE IS TO BE THE ULTIMATE RECIPIENT OF THE URANIUM OXIDE, IT WOULD RAISE A NUMBER OF OBVIOUS DOMESTIC POLITICAL DIFFICULTIES IF THE GOVERNMENT WERE TO REJECT IT.

OTTAVA (AP)-FRANCE IS SHOPPING IN CANADA FOR URANIUM FOR ITS NUCLEAR PROGRAM AND IS STAKING CLAIMS IN THIS COUNTRY IN THE HOPE OF DEVELOPING ITS OWN CANADIAN-BASED URANIUM HINES.

INFORMED GOVERNMENT SOURCES SAID THE FRENCH ATONIC ENERGY COMMISSION VOULD BE THE RECIPIENT OF THE GULK OF 100 MILLION POUNDS OF URANIUM OXIDE WHICH DENISON MINES LTD. EXPECTS TO SELL TO EUROPEAN CUSTOMERS IN THE NEXT 25 YEARS.

SUCH A SALE WOULD BE BETVEEN DENISON AND THE EUROPEAN ATONIC ENERGY COMMUNITY (EURATOM) HADE UP OF FRANCE, BELGIUM, WEST GERMANY, ITALY, LUXEMBOURG AND THE NETHERLANDS. EURATOM WOULD HANDLE THE NECHANICS OF THE SALE, BUT MOST OF THE URANIUM WOULD BE EARHARKED FOR FRANCE WHICH PLANS TO UNDERTAKE AN EXTENSIVE NUCLEAR POWER PROGRAM OVER THE NEXT FIVE YEARS.

"FRENCH SEEK URANIUM HERE, STAKE SASKATCHEWAN CLAIMS.

FRANCE IS SHOPPING IN CANADA FOR HUGE QUANTITIES OF URANIUM FOR ITS NUCLEAR POWER PROGRAM AND IS STAKING CLAIMS IN THIS COUNTRY IN HOPE OF DEVELOPING ITS OWN CANADIAN-BASED URANIUM MINES. INFORMED GOVERNMENT SOURCES SAID FRENCH ATOMIC ENERGY COMMISSION WOULD BE THE RECIPIENT OF BULK OF 100,000,000 POUNDS OF URANIUM OSIDE WHICH DENISON MINES LTD. EXPECTS SELL TO EUROPEAN

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EURATOM WOULD HANDLE THE MECHANICS OF SALE, BUT MOST OF URANIUM WOULD BE EARMARKED FOR FRANCE WHICH PLANS UNDERTAKE AN EXTENSIVE NUCLEAR POWER PROGRAM OVER NEXT FIVE YEARS.

STEPHEN B. ROMAN, PRESIDENT OF DENISON, SAID IN TORONTO FRIDAY THE COMPANY IS "WELL ADVANCED" IN NEGOTIATIONS FOR SUCH SALE TO EURATOM. HE SAID PRICE WOULD EXCEED \$4.38 A POUND, WHICH WOULD BE MORE THAN \$438,000,000 OVER THE 25 YEARS.

"OTTAWA SOURCES SAID, HOWEVER THE TALKS HAVE BEEN MAINLY BETWEEN DENISON AND REPRESENTATIVES OF FRENCH ATOMIC ENERGY COMMISSION, INCLUDING JACQUES MABILE, HEAD OF COMMISSION'S PROCUREMENT AND PRODUCTION AGENCY.

THESE SOURCES SAID 'THE MAJOR POINTS IN CONTRACT HAVE BEEN AGREED ON'. MR. ROMAN SAID IN TORONTO THAT ALL DETAILS OF CONTRACT WITH EURATOM SHOULD BE WORKED OUT WITHIN SIX TO EIGHT WEEKS.

AFTER CONTRACT HAS BEEN SIGNED, DENISON MUST APPLY TO ATOMIC ENERGY CONTROL BOARD FOR PERMIT TO SHIP THE URANIUM. ONE DUTY OF THIS BOARD IS TO ENSURE THE METAL IS USED ONLY FOR PEACEFUL PURPOSES. DENISON HAS NOT YET APPLIED FOR A PERMIT.

IT WAS ALSO LEARNED HERE THAT FRANCE HAS HAD TALKS WITH RIO ALGOM MINES LTD., ANOTHER CANADIAN URANIUM PRODUCER. HOWEVER, SOURCES SAID THESE 'HAVE NOT BEEN AS FRUITFUL AS THOSE BETWEEN DENISON AND THE FRENCH'.

MEANWHILE, WILLIAM M. GILCHRIST, PRESIDENT OF CROWN-OWNED ELDORADO MINING AND REFINING LTD., DISCLOSED THAT THE FRENCH MOKTA MINING CO. HAS STAKED 100 URANIUM CLAIMS IN NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN.

THE CLAIMS ARE ADJACENT TO URANIUM PROPERTIES OF ELDORADO, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AGENCY WHICH MINES, BUYS AND SELLS URANIUM.

"WHILE CLAIMS WERE STAKED BY MOKTA, IT IS UNDERSTOOD HERE THAT FINANCING OF EXPLORATION IS THROUGH THE FRENCH ATOMIC ENERGY COMMISSION".

PROGRESS OF DISCUSSIONS RESPECTING SALE TO FRANCE

On the orders of the day:

[Translation]

Mr. Réal Caouette (Villeneuve): Mr. Speaker, I wish to put a question to the Acting Prime Minister, (Mr. Martin).

It seems to me that it is in the interest of the house to know what is the present standing of the negotiations with France respecting this famous Canadian uranium sale contract. Are those negotiations definitely broken off or are they still going on?

Hon. Paul Martin (Acting Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I shall ask my colleague, the Minister of Trade and Commerce, to answer that question.

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Minister of Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, discussions are proceeding between some of the Canadian uranium mines and the French Government, I am informed, on the basis of the declaration of policy made by the Canadian Government which I have reported to this House.

Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker (Leader of the Opposition): A supplementary question. Mr. Speaker. Has not the French government notified Canada that it will not accept the principle of inspection; and is it not a fact that at this very time Euratom is giving consideration to this matter so that an arrangement might possibly be made through the instrumentality of that body?

Mr. Sharp: I am sorry, Mr. Speaker, but I did not quite understand the purport of the right hon. gentleman's question. Would he mind repeating it?

Mr. Diefenbaker: What I am saying is this. Is it not a fact that every indication has been given by the Government of France that it will not accept the principle of inspection by Canada to assure that uranium sold to that country shall be used for civil purposes? Second, with a view to resolving that difficulty, is it not the case that EURATOM has entered the equation, and that through that organization it may be pessible to work out a plan which will be satisfactory to the Republic of France?

Mr. Sharp: Mr. Speaker, I cannot confirm what the right hon. gentleman has said. During the discussions with the French Government which I had in Paris we discussed

various forms of control, but did not at that time reach any agreement as to what would be a suitable method of control. The French Government did express its objection to one particular form, but no agreement has yet been reached as to which of the remaining forms might be suitable.

Mr. Diefenbaker: One further question on that. What was the specific plan of inspection to which the French Government objected?

Mr. Sharp: The French Government indicated to us that it was not prepared to accept the international Atomic energy agency.

Mr. Caouette: Mr. Speaker, a supplementary question. Could the Minister of Trade and Commerce tell us whether this control and inspection policy regarding uranium to be sold to France has been requested, suggested or dictated to the Canadian government by the American government?

Are the United States demanding this control on the sale of Canadian uranium to France?

Mr. Sharp: No, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. H. A. Olson (Medicine Hat): Mr. Speaker, I should like to put a supplementary question to the Minister of Trade and Commerce. There were C.T.V. news reports over the week end which indicated that France had rejected Canadian control but that she would accept Eurarom inspection for the purposes mentioned. I should like to know whether this has been conveyed to the Canadian Government, also whether the Canadian Government accepted the principle of Eurarom carrying out the inspection.

Mr. Sharp: Mr. Speaker, so far as I am aware we have had no such message from the French Government. However, perhaps I ought to say that the Canadian Government has not insisted upon a bilateral arrangement whereby Canadians would do the inspection. We would be prepared to consider alternative forms of control. I am not certain, of course, whether the controls under Euratom would be satisfactory, but they are certainly open for discussion.
