MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

Joe Califano and now Bill Moyers have finally worn down Secretary Rusk and others in State who wanted to fit the Vietnam job to their conception. As you know McNamara, Gaud and Raborn found no trouble whatsoever with the directive. Bill says that the attached draft is agreed with the Secretary of State, and has sent it to me to submit to you for signature. I am quite satisfied with it, as it leaves me a free hand to decide how much I should get in to actual operations as opposed to acting as a high-level expeditur. I simply see no point in deciding this issue until after I have a better feel for the real job that needs to be done.

The only items that have been sacrificed are specific authority for direct communication with Saigon (which I can manage anyway) and the clause about bringing to you any problems that cannot be resolved directly with the departments. Since I can do so in any case, I'll weep no tears over the absence of this specific injunction.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. MOYERS

Bill:

Here are my suggested changes in my directive:

Only the first (first paragraph, page 2) is critical. Essentially, I should not be charged with responsibility for "preparation" of plans and programs, but with making mighty sure that such plans and programs are prepared. As you can see, this is the difference between an operating responsibility which might be construed to require me to build a big empire and an overseer's responsibility which is that of making the appropriate agencies do the legwork right. In fact, I doubt that SecState really had in mind shifting to me the actual operating responsibility. If he did, let's fox him.

The second change (second paragraph, page 2) is less essential. I would strongly prefer amending the second sentence to indicate that "instructions" should go out through established channels. (I can then use this to argue that I am allowed my own "communication" so long as I am not giving orders.) The added last sentence is even less essential, especially if I am backed on the above point. It merely makes explicit what is left implicit. Once again I doubt that I have a real argument with Rusk, since Alex Johnson and I had long since agreed that orders would go out through State channels but no one would object if I wanted to write or talk directed with Lodge or Porter.

The White House has accepted in the attached NASM the changes proposed by the Department of State last week, with modifications at two points:

- 1. On page two, paragraph one, we have amended the proposed language in order not to accentuate the operational aspects of Mr. Komer's role.
- 2. In the second paragraph on page two, we have spelled out with very precise language the President's feeling that instructions to the U.S. Mission in Saigon should be issued through the Secretary of State.

The President is prepared to sign off on the NASM after I hear back from you.

In Dave's absence I have gone over your draft of the charter for Bob Komer's new job.

It looks good to me. I feel strongly that something of this sort should be issued.

One question occurs to me. There has just been set up under the Secretary of State the Senior Inter-departmental Group (SIG) and four regional subgroups to coordinate our overseas activities. I take it that Komer's authority is clearly intended to transcend that of the SIG insofar as Vietnam is concerned. Need mention be made of this in the memorandum or do you think it is clear?

One other minor point. I would include the Secretary of Treasury as an addressee. Vietnam and the balance of payments have collided before now and they may well do so again.

I was not able to discuss the Komer charter with Rud Poats before 12 o'clock because he was testifying on the Hill. I have now been over it with him.

He tells me that a good deal of time was spent at the Warrenton meeting on discussing this same general question with respect to Bill Porter's job in Vietnam. One of the most difficult problems was to make sure that Porter had an adequate say of those military programs (such as military construction, for example), which bear on, and compete for resources with, reconstruction activities.

After thinking it over I have made a couple of changes on page 2 to try to strengthen the memorandum in this respect. Attached is a copy of my suggestions.

I have charged him to assure that prompt and effective action is taken by all U.S. agencies to devise and carry out Vietnam civil programs, sometime all aspects of non-military activities in Vietnam including the mobilization of U.S. military resources in support of such programs. He will also assure that the Rural Construction/

Pacification Program and the programs for combat force employment and military operations are properly coordinated.

Another of his functions will be to ensure full and timely support of the U.S. Mission in Saigon on matters within his purview. The U.S. Ambassador and Deputy Ambassador to Vietnam may communicate directly with the Special Assistant as required.

In carrying out these duties, I want him to act in close and constant liaison with the heads of appropriate departments and agencies, and
