NATIONAL SECURITY ACTION MEMORANDUM NO. 350

TO: The Secretary of State The Secretary of the Treasury The Administrator of the Agency for International Development The Director, Bureau of the Budget The Chairman, Council of Economic Advisers

The President wishes to receive coordinated advice and recommendations concerning the proper use of (1) program loans, and (2) loans to finance "local costs" in our foreign assistance programs.

The report should evaluate the economic and political merits of both kinds of loans in terms of:

- -- major U. S. assistance objectives, by categories of aided countries;
- -- the costs and consequences for other U. S. interests, particularly the balance of payments.

It should propose criteria which could be used to establish a presumption as to the appropriate mix of program and project assistance in particular country situations. It should also provide guidelines for the use of local cost financing.

It is requested that you nominate a representative for a sub-Cabinet level working group which will be responsible for carrying out this study. The Bureau of the Budget has accepted responsibility for the chairmanship of the working group.

The White House staff member responsible will be Mr. Francis Bator.

It is hoped that the report can be received at the White House by July 15.

SUBJECT: Attached NSAM



Subject: Report in response to NSAM No. 350

NSAM No. 350 asks for recommendations concerning the proper use of program loans and so-called "local costs" loans in our foreign assistance program. It also requests a statement of criteria for judging the appropriate mix of program and project assistance in a particular country.

The attached report concludes that the country program is the proper basis for evaluating alternative aid "mixes", since it affords the most convenient means of relating both budgetary and balance of payments costs to explicit U.S. objectives.

Because individual country programs must be tailored to the particular circumstances of a recipient country, the report concludes that the problem is not one of establishing simple criteria or "rules of thumb" for evaluating alternative aid "mixes"; rather, it is one of establishing procedures which ensure that balance of payments costs are given full weight in the formation and implementation of the assistance program.

A third major conclusion of the report is that there is no inherent reason why different forms of aid should have different impacts on the U.S. balance of payments.

Finally, a procedure is recommended for evaluating alternative AID program "mixes" and tying procedures within the overall budgetary process.

The Department of State, the Council of Economic Advisers and the Agency for International Development concur with the Bureau of the Budget in this report. The Treasury dissents from the major conclusions and recommendations of the report. In the Treasury view, dollar project loans are less costly to the U.S. balance of payments than any other form of aid. Therefore, "rule of thumb" limitations should be imposed on program loans and local cost project loans.

The review process proposed in NSAM No. 350 will begin on a partial basis with this year's budget.
