SUBJECT: Hainan Territorial Waters Rescue Operation

1. Facts

The Seventh Fleet would like to launch its rescue chopper from the Kearsage at 0400 its time (3-3/4 hours from now). It would take 45 minutes to get to the scene. They hope to complete the operation before dawn (0615 their time). Despite night operations, the Coral Sea would mount a protective fighter CAP against MIG's. Nitze is awaiting a final assessment from the Commander of the 7th Fleet before coming to the Cabinet meeting to answer this question: What are the chances of success?

- 2. Sect. Rusk. He does not believe the operation should be undertaken:
 - -- the risks to the helicopter crew are too great;
 - -- the man is in territorial waters: we would not attempt rescue if he were on Hainan or the China mainland.
- 3. Sect. McNamara. The rescue attempt should not be made.
- 4. Gen. Wheeler. The risks of an air engagement are high against a sizable force. Nevertheless, his gut feeling is the rescue should be attempted; although much depends on whether the 7th Fleet Commander believes the chances of successful rescue are good, in the light of weather and other factors determining whether the man can be found.
- 5. Mr. Clifford. Rescue the man. It is a mission of mercy. He feels Hainan is in a somewhat different status -- in fact, if not in law -- than the Chinese mainland.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

Subj: ALH SAR Efforts

- 1. At 141113R the NDDC contacted the CINCPACFIN D.O. and queried him regarding latest info on the AlH SAR effort. The Duty Officer stated that KEARSARGE helos would be available for the SAR effort at 150400M.
- 2. At 14112OR CAPT MCCAUTEY, CINCPACTIF OPS officer celled the MDDC to report that KEARSARGE had been named On-Scene Commander and was proceeding to a position at 18-00N lll-00E to arrive there at 150530H. CORAL SEA is proceeding to a position approximately 30 HM south of KEARSARGE and to be in that position by 150400H in order to provide MIG Cap, RESCAP and tanker services.

- 3. At the direction of CAPT KING, the NDDC posed the following two questions for CAPT MCCAULEY to pass to COMSEVERINFIN and request an immediate reply:
- a. What is VADM BRINGLE's personal assessment of the chances of success of the SAR effort?
- b. If we do not succeed in darkness, does COMSEVENTHFIA plan to continue operations in daylight?
- 4. In relation to para 3 above, CAPT MCCAULTY stated he would pass the questions to COMSEVENTHEIT by voice and message. CAPT MCCAULTY also stated that he had received a mag from VADM BRHIOLE prior to the MDDC call indicating that COMSEVENTEIT thinks he can get the pilot in the water and he was going about this in a most deliberate manner and will not take any precipitous actions. Judgements would be made when on the scene. No judgement has been made as yet as to what to do during daylight hours.
- 5. At 191150R CAPT DONALDSON (OP-33) received the following info from CAPT MCCAULEY: The CORAL SNA MIG CAP and RESCAP will be held a minimum of 25 miles off shore and would not be used unless restate forces were attacked. Further that all personnel involved in the SAR effort have been cautioned not to take any provocative actions.

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

I have from the Navy a further report which clarifies the language in my previous memorandum. This from Admiral Bringle:

"Consider chances of recovery good during hours of darkness if pilot located by SAR forces. No beeper at present. Now plan to discontinue search at daylight unless rescue of pilot is imminent."

(The Navy's best estimate is that lack of beeper is due to fact that no receiving capability exists at the scene at this moment.)

Two unarmed U. S. Navy Al propeller-drives aircraft on a ferry flight from in the Philippines to the aircraft carrier USS CORAL SEA in the Gulf of Tonkin experienced navigational difficulties and inadvertently strayed into air space approximately 5 miles off the east coast of Harman Island. One of the planes, an AlH was shot down by Chinese Communist MIG aircraft. The second, an EA1F, departed the area and recovered at Danang. Its pilot reports he last saw the other plane in a vertical dive and smoking. He also reports seeing a good parachute. The encounter with the MIG aircraft took place at 9:46 p.m. EST February 13.
