> PROPOSED TRIP TO FAR EAST RE:

On Tuesday, Liz Carpenter, Howard Burris and myself met for an exploratory conference with three State officers: Ed Martin, China Affairs specialist designated by the Secretary to help plan and to accompany the mission; Mr. Ericson, deputy of Far East Affairs; and Roy Little of Secretary Crockett's office, present in Crockett's absence from Washington.

All were exceptionally cooperative and understanding.

It was clearly understood that no messages are to go to the field until itinerary is agreed upon and none are to be sent without clearance by the Vice-President. Only one message has gone out: Secretary Rusk, personally, sent word to Saigon that the Vice-President might attend Diem's inauguration April 29. No staff messages have gone out.

I.

Scope of the Trip:

Rusk, Bowles, and Deputy Under-Secretary Johnson met as we were meeting to decide a recommended itinerary. Their decision, we were advised, includes four stops: Manila, Taipei (Formosa), Saigon, and Bangkok.

Purpose of the Trip:

Objectives to be accomplished at the respective stops:

Formosa: Increasingly "urgent" messages from our Ambassador report Chiang is disturbed that no VIP has been sent to see him. This intermifies Chiang's fears of a change in US policy. US intends no change.
US does want Chiang's assent to tactical flexibility
at UN. State believes only Vice-President, speaking for President, can lay groundwork for such agreement.

Saigon: President has made South Viet-Nam our first concern in Southeast Asia. US means to continue its support of Diem. Feels it is urgent that Diem get closer to his people, more responsive to their needs. Important that, in face-to-face talks, Diem learn what US expects of his Administration at the start now of a new term. Also, it is important to US position in Southeast Asia -- and to SEATO -- that US evidence its interest and support for South Viet-nam.

Bangkok: Important that if a mission goes into area one of the other Southeast Asia countries be visited. Thailand is especially important: deeply affected by Laos and in need of reassurance US interest in Thai is not going to wane.

Manila: No problems exist. This is a strong point for US and should not be by-possed on a visit of this sort.

Exclusions from the Trip:

Korea: A visit to Seoul was first suggested when Bowles found it necessary to cancel a visit he had planned. He was going for a conference on matters in which he is personally interested. However, any visit to Seoul absolutely would require a visit to Tokyo. Intelligence estimates discourage planning a Tokyo visit — therefore, the trip to Korea seems impossible. (This is State's estimate, based on reports received only yesterday from Japan — a further consideration of this aspect will be in order.)

Endia: Bowles had planned to visit Nehru. No visit to India is included in the State-recommended routing, chiefly because of time. It should be noted that, at Bangkok, the return distance to Washington is roughly equal in flying time either way: vis India and Europe or via the Pacific route.

Australia: A visit would be wholesome, State agrees, but would considerably lengthen any trip to the area. (Note: Australia is the only Commonwealth nation to support us on the Red China issue at the UN.)

Note: these is no fixed sequence to the itinerary. Any order of call on these capitals is acceptable. The overnight stops in Hawaii are desired for crew rest but the schedule may be altered freely.

Note: from experience, Saturday departures and Friday returns greatly reduce domestic news impact. Leaving early Friday accomodates news and television coverage. Also, holds week-end news attention. Returns should be timed early in day -- but later than 7:30 am; the preferable time to return: 10-12:30 am, on weekdays.

Possible Activities Abroad

No recommendations have been sought from our Embassies.

State experts in Washington believe, however, that the countries concerned would probably propose activities like:

Formosa: formal calls on President and Vice-President, formal dinner by President and Mrs. Chiang, luncheon with Vice President-Premier Chen, a reception hosted by our Ambassador -- plus visits to installations and factories near Taipei. Chiang might ask Vice-President to his Sun-Moon Lake lodge for overnight discussions. Down-island plane inspection trips or cross-island automobile trips might be proposed. State thinks any such acceptable, except a visit to Quemoy.

Seigon: address National Assembly, courtesy call on Vice-President Nguyen Ngoc Tho, meet American community, dinner at Presidential Palace, auto trip on US-financed highway to inspect air base and US-Vietnamese private venture textile plant, airtrip to a rural "regroupment" area (Agroville), lunch with a Province chief, a dinner hosted by US Ambassador.*

"US Ambassador will be Mr. Nolting who was Finletter's Deputy when we were in Paris, with whom I spent two hours there. Good man. Now being briefed in Washington. Will arrive in Saigon three days before Vice-President.

Manilla: might meet with Senate and House Foreign Relations Committee members, visit University's Asian Studies Department which is training Asia students on East-West concept, visit Asian Labor Center where ICA is training Asian labor leaders, visit rural farming projects, visit American cemetery on Manila outskirts. There is intensive pre-election, pre-convention skirmishing for Presidential nominations which will influence protocol of activities in Manila, although presenting no problem.

Bangkok: Visit with King and Queen, and Prime Minister, required. Also call on Secretary-General of SEATO and of ECAFE and attend special SEATO Council Representatives meeting. Visit SEATO projects and selected US aid projects, such as Friendship Highway.

Note: The East is protocol minded. Will want to honor Vice-President with dinner and this should be reciprocated by US. However, under schedule pressure, visits can be made as short as desired -- provided sufficient notice is available.

Security Situations

The only visit where demonstrations, etc., seem possible, though not probable, is Saigon. It is an infiltrated country. Outside Saigon trips should be carefully weighed and planned. Advance security inspections of all sites and arrangements are most definitely to be recommended. Secret Service on the site in advance is, in my judgment, essential — always.

Planning Details

The assumption of the State Department has been that the Vice-President and Mrs. Johnson would stay at the Ambassador's residence. We advised them not to separate the Vice-President from essential staff in accommodations if possible — and not to rule out accommodating the party in hotels, instead.

We also advised State to be certain that at all meetings admission of appropriate aides be assured so that Vice-President is not -- as in Africa -- left alone.

There was no discussion of press accompanying trip.

Bureau of Far Eastern affairs had been advised by AFL-CIO that they had been invited to send someone along as observer. It was understood Vice-President had made the invitation. We had no information or comment on that.

There was no discussion on matter of other persons, such as Senator or Congressman, accompanying the trip.

State has made no commitment on sending any "experts" or other personnel. Choices will be left to the Vice-President. Mr. Little did personally recommend that Mr. Crockett accompany the trip again to assure coordination and cooperation with the personnel at all posts. There was discussion but no decision about State providing baggage-aides, other such personnel if desired.

At some early stage, the Secret Service should be invited into discussions about arrangements.

Vice President's Schedule for Manila

The Vice President would be expected to call on President Carlos P. Garcia, Vice President Diosdado Macapagal, Senate President Eulogio Rodriguez, and Foreign Minister Felixberto M. Serrano. The Philippine domestic political situation is especially delicate at this time. Vice President Macapagal has already been nominated as Presidential candidate on the Liberal Party ticket. President Garcia and Senate President Rodriguez are both candidates for the nomination of the Nacionalista Party. Thus, you have a certain rivalry among all three and care would have to be taken not to permit the Vice President to be used by any of the contenders for their own narrow political purposes. This, however, is a matter which I am sure the Vice President would be able to handle with consummate skill. It is probably not necessary to add that the U.S. policy is to remain completely aloof from Philippine internal politics.

In addition to the four officials mentioned above, it might be desirable to have the Vice President attend a tea or some similar function given by the combined Senate and House Foreign Relations Committee where there would be an opportunity to get Congressional views on U.S.-American relations.

I understand that Vice President Johnson is interested in East=West exchange and was very interested in the Hawaiin Center for this purpose. The University of the Philippines has a special Department of Asian Studies at which they have students from a number of Asian countries which might be worked into the schedule. ICA some years ago established a very successful Asian Labor Center which has been attended by a number of labor leaders from other Asian countries. addition, the Philippine military have helped train military officers from Southeast Asian countries. More details on this type of activity could be worked out through the Embassy. Also, the Embassy would be able to arrange for the Vice President to visit an agricultural project in the vicinity of Manila.

Social and Ceremonial Activities. The Vice President would presumably wish to place a wreath on the monument to Philippine hero Jose Rizal. He might also wish to visit the large and, I understand, very beautiful American cemetery on the outskirts of Manila.

It is likely, particularly because of the election in November, that President Garcia would want to give a dinner for the Vice President. In the event the Vice President stayed two evenings, it would be appropriate for Ambassador Hickerson to have a dinner.

MEMORANDUM

- 1. One of the outstanding conclusions drawn from the trip through Asia is the tremendous importance of city administration. The Asian governments face many tremendous problems. And one of the most pressing is efficient administration at the local level.
- 2. Every American entering an Asian country can receive from the Embassy a long list of "dos and don'ts." The "don'ts" are the most important. They include:
 - a.) Don't drink the water unless it is boiled or bottled and imported.
 - b.) Don't eat certain types of foods except under highly special circumstances.
 - c.) Don't walk the streets in certain sections at night.
 - d.) Don't brush your teeth with water from the tap.
 - e.) Wash your hands at every opportunity.
- 3. Most of these situations arise out of the fact that the problems of city government have outgrown the capacity of local administrations. One of the most dramatic examples is the influx of people into Karachi following the partition of India. In a matter of weeks Karachi went from a city of about 800,000 to more than 2 1/2 million. This taxed the water purification facilities; the police facilities; the public health services to a point where they have not yet recovered from the strain.
- 4. One of the greatest services that could be performed by local officials in our country is to find ways and means of sharing with the local officials in Asia the knowledge that America has gained from facing similar problems. Certain types of machinery already exist, such as the "sister cities" which are set up through the People to People Program. For example, Washington, D. C. is now a sister city of Bangkok, Thailand. Sacramento, California is a sister city of Manila in the Philippines. The "sister city" systems cover 36 countries of the free world and many more communities want to come in under the program.

5. Even more can and should be done, however. It would certainly be helpful if the Conference of Mayors would examine the facilities available and find ways of strengthening the programs through which they can share their knowledge with the local administrators in other nations who so badly need their help and advice.

ITINERARY FOR PROPOSED TRIP

The itinerary of the trip should carefully fit both the purpose and the "image" of the mission: i.e., it should be a personal inspection for the President and should be a purposeful, fast-moving, protocol-aside type mission.

The trip, of necessity, must include Hawaii, Manila, Saigon (South Vietnam), and Bangkok (Thailand). Additional points involve these considerations:

Formosa: Chiang is, for many in the US, the "Adenauer of Asia." Omission of a visit would be infuriating to him and, in turn, his admirers -- notably in Congress. Unnecessary injury and suspicion would be invited for the Administration by such omission. The necessity of the visit is domestic politics in US, especially now.

Cambodia: Involvement of US prestige here is dubious in wisdom and necessity. This is not a strong point. Cambodia has some of the makings of another Laos. If possible, exclude this visit.

New Delhi-Pakistan: One visit necessitates two visits. In both instances, however, there is some willingness to fight -- this should be honored by such a visit. Also, Indian assent is desirable before commitment of US arms against Asiatics. This visit is desirable.

Australia-New Zealand: Again, two visits would be required. Might be useful to remind US of similarity of Communist aggression and Japanese pattern in 1942. Not absolutely necessary.

Return by Europe: Undesirable, regardless of stops.

Could go to Rome, Bonn, maybe London, not Paris. Or to
Geneva, to bring Dean home. But proper order would
suggest the Vice-President reporting to President on
Southeast Asia and President only contacting Europeans.

As gesture of encouragement and reassurance to those US allies in Asia most directly threatened by communist encroachment Vice President Johnson has agreed to make brief trip to Far East Saigon with stops Manila Bangkok/and Taipei. Concept of trip is to dramatize US support for governments concerned and give political leaders this sensitive area opportunity exchange views with top-level representative of new US administration. Vice President would not repeat not desire conduct negotiations on specific issues or give other than general indications of US support.

Essential that VP return Washington prior to President Kennedy's departure for Ottawa May 16. Trip must be compressed into period May 8 to 16. Suggested itinerary based on use MATS 707 aircraft as follows:

Ambassadors are requested to inform Department &SAP whether host governments are willing receive Vice Presidential visit and whether dates indicated are acceptable. Approach should indicate that tight schedule regrettably permits little or no variation in timing.

Vice President requests that information re proposed trip be held in strict confidence until entire schedule has been confirmed, whereupon arrangements for simultaneous releases Washington and posts to be visited will be made. Embassy staff should be informed on need-to-know basis only.

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If visit acceptable, Embasy and host government may begin preliminary planning, bearing in mind following considerations:

- Vist is conditioned on firm assurance that Vice
 President will not be subject of demonstrations or offensive acts.
- 2. Vice President desires formalities be confined to absolute minimum.
- 3. Vice President desiresopportunity at each post for personal contact with population on informal basis, in conjunction where possible with visit installation to which US aid program or other influence has contributed.
- 4. Maximum strings In making housing arrangements, ensure that minimum of six members VP's entourage will be billeted in immediate vicinity under same roof.

Action Posts should cable suggested schedules for visit as soon as feasible. Posts should also cable ASAP suggested arrival and departure remarks and any other statements by VP as may be required during visit. No repeat no plans should be confirmed to host government until approved by Vice President.

Mrs. Johnson will accompany. Edwin W. Martin, Director
Office Chinese Affairs, will be senior representative Bureau of Far
Eastern Affaits. Further instructions and details regarding size and
composition

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composition of party will be cabled when available.

FOR SAIGONL If trip materializes Ambassador Nolting would proceed Saigon to present credentials several days in advance VP's arrival.

FOR CINCPAC POLAD: Vice President would hope preside at **EXEC** ceremony connected with East-West Center, for which he sponsored legislation. Arrangements would be made through Vice President's own channels.

Thailand's importance to the U.S. position in Southeast Asia has been increased immeasurably by the crisis in Laos. Without close Thai cooperation any U.S. diplomatic or military efforts in Laos would be much more difficult, if not virtually impossible. Conversely, Thailand seestime national security immediately threatened by a crisis the course of which is being determined by the U.S., rather than Laos, or Thailand. U.S. actions in this situation will have a direct and vital bearing on Thailand's security. Consequently, the Thai are closely scrutinising all U.S. actions and all indications of U.S.

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INTENTIONS. In particular, they are seeking assurances of continued, firm U. S. support for Shailand; should their confidence in the U.S. be shaken, they undoubtedly will consider accommodation to the power of Communist China.

In recognition of these factors, both President Eisenhower and President Kennedy have taken steps to reassure Thai Prime Minister Sarit privately. A major <u>public</u> gesture of U.S. interest in Thailand would thus be a highly useful, if not essential, contribution to Thai confidence in the United States and, thereby, to the U.S. position in Southeast Asia.

If the Vice President were to visit nearby Viet-Nam without also visiting Thailand, The Thai might well interpret it as an indication of waning U.S. interest in Thailand with the serious consequences mentioned above.

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
