# Scope and content note:

The series includes material related to all of the standing and special Senate committees on which Lyndon Johnson served while in the Senate, as well as Johnson's subcommittee assignments.

The files related to Lyndon Johnson's service on the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, 1949-1954, include material pertaining to the inland waterways bill in 1949, President Truman's nomination of Leland Olds for a third five year term as Chairman of the Federal Power Commission, amendments to the Natural Gas Act of 1938, an investigation into domestic land and water transportation in 1950 and 1951, hearings on export controls and policies, and subsidy payments to airlines for handling U. S. mail.

The files related to Johnson's service on the Armed Services Committee, 1949-1960, as well as his Armed Services Committee subcommittee assignments, include material pertaining to defense, defense mobilization, defense appropriations, and civil defense; pay, housing, and benefits for military personnel; missile production facilities; disarmament; Air Force projects in Texas; ammunition shortages in Korea; nominations considered by the Armed Services Committee; universal military training; naval petroleum reserves; the tin smelter in Texas City, Texas; the production of synthetic rubber in the United States; and the hearings held following President Truman's removal of General Douglas MacArthur as the commander of the United Nations forces in Korea, 1951.

The subseries includes extensive material relating to the Armed Services Preparedness Investigating Subcommittees chaired by Johnson between 1950 and 1960. The subcommittees investigated a number of situations related to military preparedness, government contracts, and possible corruption and misuse of government money. The topics covered include



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investigations of the companies, Commerce International China, Inc. and Morgantown Ordinance Works; an investigation of the construction of Moroccan Air Bases; an investigation at Carswell Air Force Base in Texas; investigations into government stockpiling, the sale of surplus computers, the price of food in Hawaii, universal military training, and government construction overseas; and the particularly well-publicized hearings on the United States missile and satellite program which followed the successful launch of the Sputnik I satellite by the Soviet Union in October 1957.

As a result of the Armed Services Preparedness Subcommittee hearings on the U. S. missile and satellite program, the Senate established the Special Committee on Space and Astronautics in 1958, with Lyndon Johnson as its Chairman. Later the same year, the Senate established the standing committee, the Committee on Aeronautical and Space Sciences, again with Johnson as its Chair. The files relating to these two committees include material on the organization of the committees, articles on the space program, briefing materials on the space program, and Johnson's speeches pertaining to space, particularly a speech he made before the United Nations Committee One on November 17, 1958. Johnson served on the Committee on Finance in 1955, but the files contain only a clipping dealing with his appointment to the committee. He served on the Committee on Appropriations from 1956 through 1958, and the files related to his service cover the national budget and budget estimates; appropriations, including military appropriations; and mutual security and the International Cooperation Administration's technical assistance program.

## About the committees:

The work of Congressional committees comprises an important part of the legislative process. Congressional committees may be described by type or by function. The four types are: (1) standing or permanent committees that continue from one Congress to the next; (2) joint committees that are composed of members from both the Senate and the House; (3) special or temporary committees (also called select committees); and (4) subcommittees. Committee



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classifications by function include: (1) legislative committees; (2) fiscal committees which handle revenue and appropriation bills; (3) supervisory committees whose concern is supervising the administration of laws; (4) investigative committees; (5) political committees which distribute the power of the political parties; (6) housekeeping committees that oversee the internal housekeeping duties of Congress; and (7) ceremonial committees.

The standing committees in operation during Mr. Johnson's Senate career were set up according to the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946. Senator Johnson was a member of the following standing committees:

- Committee on Aeronautical and Space Sciences, Chairman, 1958-1960 [see page 21]
- Committee on Appropriations, 1956-1958 [see page 4]
- Committee on Armed Services, 1949-1960 [see page 5]
- Committee on Finance, 1955 [see page 18]
- Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, 1949-1954 [see page 18]

In addition to his regular committee assignments, Johnson was a member of the Texas Congressional delegation and served as its Chairman in 1951. Mr. Johnson was also appointed a member of Congressional delegation to the Second NATO Parliamentarians' Conference held in Paris on November 19-23, 1956.

Papers relating to some committee and subcommittee assignments are in the Texas office files. Papers relating to other assignments are filed in the desk files maintained by some members of the committee staffs assigned to Mr. Johnson. A few committee and subcommittee papers that were unfiled and that have been assembled to create series are called "fragments."



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# **Committees/Subseries**

# **Appropriations:**

#### PAPERS RELATING TO THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

The Committee on Appropriations is concerned with appropriations of the revenue for the support of the government. Mr. Johnson was a member of the Committee on Appropriations in the 84th Congress, 2nd Session; the 85th Congress; and the 86th Congress. In all three Congresses he was Chairman of the Subcommittee on State, Justice, Judiciary, and Related Agencies.

# PAPERS RELATING TO THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS, 1957-59. Box 359.

The file contains memoranda, notices of meetings, correspondence, statements, budget estimates, budget summaries of past expenditures, and handwritten notes on legislative appropriations. While most of the material pertains to the budget as a whole, specific topics described elsewhere, such as mutual security and legislate appropriations, are mentioned. Many papers relate to the Subcommittee on State, Justice, the Judiciary, and related agencies. Also included are hearings before the Senate Appropriations Committee on the Urgent Deficiency Appropriation bill, 1957; the House Subcommittee hearings on State, Justice, the Judiciary, and Related Agencies appropriations for 1958; hearings before the Appropriations Committee on the second supplemental appropriation bill, 1957; and House Subcommittee hearings on legislative branch appropriations for 1958.

# PAPERS RELATING TO MUTUAL SECURITY, 1955-56. Box 359.

Most of these papers concern the International Cooperation Administration's technical assistance program. The file includes two Business Economics Publications, prepared by the ICA on post-World War II foreign aid grants and loans, an unidentified statement on the ICA and technical assistance programs, questions on the Aswan Dam, a refutation to questions raised by the House Committee on Appropriations report on the U. S. contribution to the United Nations technical assistance program, and a comparison of post and pre-war agricultural production in selected countries. Most of the items are undated and contain no mention of their origin or author.

PAPERS RELATING TO LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1958, 1957. Box 360.



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The papers include a summary of Senate operations, a subcommittee print, work sheets, House and Senate subcommittee reports, budget estimates, and a handwritten summary of legislative appropriations cuts.

# PAPERS RELATING TO DEFENSE APPROPRIATIONS, 1960. Box 360.

The papers consist of original and mimeograph copies of correspondence with the Secretary of Defense Thomas E. Gates. Mimeograph copies of memoranda from the Secretary of Defense to the Secretary of the Army, and lists of appropriations and spending. Some of the letters are addressed to Senator Johnson as the Chairman of the Armed Services Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee. The file concerns the military's utilization of funds appropriated in excess of those called for in the President's budget request.

# PAPERS RELATING TO U.S. INFORMATION AGENCY HEARINGS AND APPROPRIATIONS, 1956-58. Boxes 360-61.

In 1956, the Senate Appropriations Committee authorized a subcommittee to investigate the activities of the USIA and to report to the full committee before the appropriations for fiscal year 1958 were considered. Senator Johnson chaired the Subcommittee on State, Justice, the Judiciary and related agencies which conducted the investigations.

The file includes original and mimeograph copies of correspondence with USIA Director Arthur Lawson dealing with the distribution of USIA expenses and correspondence with other members of the USIA concerned about cuts in the USIA budget. There is also correspondence from people interested in the investigations, people who testified before the subcommittee, and people urging Johnson to vote against further reduction in the USIA budget.

Besides the correspondence, the papers include memoranda, photocopies and summaries of testimony, a USIA publication and letter transmittal, summaries of magazine and newspapers subscriptions purchased by the agency, a schedule of free-lance writing services purchased by the USIA and its letter of transmittal, material on USIA activities in Mexico, and a list of Texas selling articles to the USIA.

#### **Armed Services:**

## NOMINATIONS CONSIDERED BY THE COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES



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The papers include working papers, research notes, memoranda and copies of hearings. Most of the material concerns the nomination of Charles E. Wilson to be Secretary of Defense and the nominations of Harold E. Talbott to be Secretary of the Air Force. The "Nominations" folder includes memoranda on the nomination for Air Vice Chief of Staff in 1950. The hearings include those on Wilson and Talbort and the nominee designates Roger M. Kyes to be Deputy Secretary of Defense; Robert T. Stevens to be Secretary of the Army, and Robert B. Anderson to be Secretary of the Navy. See also the 1953 General File, "Armed Services Committee - Nominations."

#### PAPERS RELATING TO THE COMMITTEES ON ARMED SERVICES AND FOREIGN RELATIONS

As a member of the Committee on Armed Services, Senator Johnson took part in joint hearings and meetings of the Committees on Armed Services and Foreign Relations. Papers in these collections include materials concerning various joint meetings and papers relating to the Committee on Foreign Relations.

Correspondence, memoranda, and work papers relating to the Joint Committee Hearings on MacArthur and Far Eastern Policy in 1951 are found in boxes 341 through 344. In January 1955, the committees held joint hearings on the Formosa Resolution; for correspondence and a memorandum relating to the Indo-China situation in 1954 see the 1954 Case and Project Files. The "Notices of Meetings" in box 341 contains a notice of a joint meeting on the Formosa Resolution. Papers relating to the joint hearings on the 1957 Middle East Resolution and other subjects relating to the Committee on Foreign Relations are in the folders "notices of Meetings," "Dulles, John Foster," and "Foreign Relations" in box 341.

## PAPERS RELATING TO THE MACARTHUR HEARINGS, 1951. Box 341-44.

When President Truman relieved General MacArthur of his command in the Korean War in April 1951, the nation reacted with a great outpouring of emotion for General MacArthur and cries of impeachment for the President and Secretary of State. Republican members of Congress demanded an investigation into the Administration's Far Eastern policy. As a result, the Senate Committees on Armed Services and on Foreign Relations held joint hearings, May 3 - June 27, 1951, "to conduct an inquiry into the military situation in the Far East and the facts surrounding the relief of the General of the Army Douglas MacArthur.



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The folders titled "MacArthur Hearings" and "Full Committee Business for Far Eastern Policy Hearings" contain Mr. Johnson's handwritten notes, drafts of questions to be asked of witnesses, analysis of testimony, statements, memoranda, and other work papers. The fragments in the folder with the green "MacArthur Hearing" label were removed from the Interoffice Memoranda in the Office Files in boxes 863-864. These folders are followed by a copy of the Joint Statement issued by the Committees, June 28, 1951. Annotated copies of the Committee hearings, which should follow the work papers, are filed in the last box of the papers relating to the MacArthur Hearings, box 344, because of their size. (Volume two of the hearings is missing.)

Following the folders of work papers are a folder of telegrams and two alphabetic series of telegrams and public opinion correspondence dealing with MacArthur's removal, the hearings, and Far Eastern Policy, and correspondence and telegrams demanding the impeachment of President and, in some cases, Secretary of State Dean Acheson. The correspondence on MacArthur's removal bears the file designations "Leg. - Macarthur," "MacArthur," "MacArthur's Removal," and "MacArthur Hearings." The mail demanding impeachment appears to have been answered by form letter or gone unanswered. For similar correspondence, see the 1950-52 Legislative Files, "Acheson" in box 223, "Foreign Policy" in boxes 229-230, and "Impeachment of President" in box 231.

## **COMMITTEES ON ARMED SERVICES AND APPROPRIATIONS**

Senate rules provide that three members of the Armed Services Committee shall be ex-officio members of the Appropriations Committee when the defense appropriations bills are under consideration. Mr. Johnson was designated by Senator Russell, Chairman of the Armed Services Committee to be an ex-officio member of the Appropriations Committee in the 84th Congress.

# **COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES SUBCOMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS**

Aside from letters of appointment and notices of meetings, there are no papers on 81st Congress subcommittee assignments unless Mr. Johnson was the subcommittee chairman or the subcommittee considered a bill sponsored by him. His most important 81st Congress subcommittee was the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee, which handled a number of investigations and handled his work relating to the subcommittee on the Universal Military Training bill, S. 4062, and work relating to subcommittee assignments on the stockpiling



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program and on military housing. The papers of the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee are described separately.

On February 3, 1949, Mr. Johnson was appointed Chairman of the subcommittee on S. 277, a bill to prevent disclosure of information about cryptographic systems. The subcommittee held hearings and Mr. Johnson's report (Senate Report No. 111) was issued March 11, 1949. The bill was enacted into law on May 13, 1950. Papers relating to the subcommittee are found in box 345 and are described below.

Mr. Johnson was chairman of a subcommittee relating to S. 1267, a bill to provide for the construction of transsonic and supersonic wind tunnel facilities. Hearings were held on May 11, 1949, and Mr. Johnson submitted his report on June 2, 1949 (Senate Report No. 443). The bill was enacted into law as the Unitary Wind Tunnel Act of 1949. Correspondence, work papers, a diagram, and a copy of the hearings are filed under the title "Wind Tunnel" in the Legislative Files, box 218.

On July 1, 1949, Mr. Johnson was appointed to chair a subcommittee on S. 1945. This bill related to retirement benefits to certain Army enlisted men who had received battlefield promotions and was of interest to a Johnson constituent, Orville D. Perkins. Mr. Johnson submitted a report and rewrote the bill as S. 2559. It became law on April 17, 1950. For correspondence, memoranda, work papers, copies of the bills, a committee print of a report on S. 1945, and Senate Report No. 1084 on S. 2559, see the title "Orville D. Perkins" in box 219. For a copy of House Report No. 1786, see the title "S. 2559" in box 295 of the Files Relating to Senator Johnson's Legislation.

Lyndon Johnson was appointed Chairman, and only member, of a subcommittee on S. 780, a bill for the relief of Commander Edward White Rawlins, U. S. Navy. He submitted a report dated June 23, 1949, recommending Navy Board review of officers passed over in promotion. The bill was rewritten and passed the Senate, but it failed to pass the House. Other bills for relief of Commander Rawlins were introduced in later Congresses. Mr. Johnson's papers relating to this subcommittee have not been found.

Two of Mr. Johnson's subcommittee assignments related to extensions of the Rubber Act of 1948, which had authorized a synthetic rubber program in the United States. He was appointed



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chairman on January 30, 1950, of the subcommittee on H. R. 7579. The subcommittee held hearings on June 5-8, and issued a report on June 12. A two year extension to the Rubber Act was enacted into law on June 24, 1950. Mr. Johnson was appointed chairman of a subcommittee on H. R. 6787 on April 23, 1952. Another two year extension to the Rubber Act was enacted into law on June 23, 1952. Correspondence and press releases pertaining to the activities of both subcommittees and copies of Report No. 1786 on H.R. 7579 may be found in the folder "Rubber" in the Legislative Files in box 237. (Papers relating to a 1953 bill to provide for the disposal of government owned rubber producing facilities are in the folder "Synthetic Rubber Plants, S. 2047" in box 248.)

On March 2, 1950, Senator Johnson was appointed to the subcommittee to study Standby Legislation. The only item found relating to the subcommittee is the letter of appointment found in box 345.

On June 19, 1950, Mr. Johnson was appointed Chairman of a subcommittee on S. 3666, a bill that he had introduced for a five year extension of the operation of a tin smelter at Texas City. The tin smelter, a subsidiary of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, had been authorized to operate until June 30, 1951 by an earlier statute. The bill was enacted into law on August 21, 1950. For a copy of S. 3666 and related correspondence, see the titles "Tin" and "Texas City Tin Smelter" in box 242. See also the sixth report to the Preparedness Subcommittee. For later material dealing with the Texas City Tin Smelter see "Papers Relating to Preparedness Subcommittee No. 5 and the Joint Subcommittee of the Committees on Armed Services and Banking and Currency in box 354.

Two of Mr. Johnson's subcommittee assignments dealt with Naval Petroleum Reserves. He was appointed as a member of a subcommittee to consider matters pertaining to the Naval Petroleum Reserves on March 8, 1951. The letter of appointment and a memorandum may be found in the folder "Petroleum" in box 234. He was also a member of an 83rd Congress subcommittee on the Naval Petroleum Reserves. These papers are in box 345. In the 85th Congress, Senator Johnson served as a member of the subcommittee on the Central Intelligence Agency. The subcommittee was established to hold meetings and briefings to examine policies and programs being carried out or planned by the authority of Section 102 of the National Security Act of 1947 as amended and the Central Intelligence Act of 1949. A notice of a briefing is the only item which has been found relating to the subcommittee. It is in box 345.



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No papers have been found relating to Mr. Johnson's 81st Congress subcommittee assignments relating to H. R. 4767, a bill clarifying the status of certain Army and Air Force Officers recalled to active duty for hospitalization; H. R. 7058, a bill amending Military Academy and Naval Academy laws to make certain practices uniform between the two Academies; S. 3520, a bill known as the Abaca Production Act of 1950; S. 718, relating to restoration to the active list of officers, those retired because of lack of funds; or S. 719 or S. 1698, both proposing amendments to the Army and Air Force Vitalization and Retirement Act of 1948. No papers have been found relating to Mr. Johnson's 82nd Congress subcommittee assignment on S. 1484, the Armed Services Procurement Act, Supplies for Small Business. For papers relating to 81st Congress subcommittee assignments on S. 4062, the Universal Military Training bill, as well as the subcommittee assignments to investigate the stockpiling program and military, see the papers relating to the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittees which are described separately. For additional correspondence on the Universal Military Training bill, see the Legislative Files boxes 243-244. For other papers relating to subcommittee assignments in the 82nd and subsequent Congresses, see the "Papers Relating to the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittees.

PAPERS RELATING TO THE ARMED SEVICES SUBCOMMITTEE ON NAVAL PETROLEUM RESERVES, 1953-54. Box 345.

The collection is fragmentary and consists of correspondence with Leverett Saltsonstall, chairman of the Armed Services Committee, some correspondence with others, several notices of meetings, memoranda, and contracts concerning the purchase of crude oil. The correspondence deals with contracts, particularly with Sunland Refining Corporation, Century Oil Company, and Honolulu Oil Corporation, publication of data from Navy exploration programs, and oil production from Naval Petroleum Reserves. Some of the items were originally filed in the Case and Project, Legislative, and General Files. The papers have been brought together in two folders. See also the folder "Petroleum" in box 234.

# PAPERS RELATING TO THE ARMED SERVICES PREPAREDNESS INVESTIGATING SUBCOMMITTEES

Mr. Johnson was appointed Chairman of the Senate Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee which was organized on July 17, 1950, shortly after the outbreak of hostilities in Korea. The



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Subcommittee was created under Senate Resolution 93 to make a continuing study of "all policies, programs, activities, operations, facilities, requirements, and practices" of the Defense Department and other agencies. This Subcommittee was continued as the Preparedness Subcommittee under Senate Resolution 375 of December 21, 1950, and as the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee under Senate Resolution 18 and 263 of the 82nd Congress and Senate Resolution 50 of the 83rd Congress. It submitted to the full committee and "Annual" report of activities on March 20, 1952, and 44 printed reports on investigations from September 5, 1950, until February 19, 1953.

One of Mr. Johnson's 81st Congress subcommittee assignments related to S. 4062, a bill to provide a universal military training program based on recommendations of the 1947 Compton Commission. Hearings were held on S. 4062 on August 22 and 23, 1950, shortly after the Korean conflict opened. As the time was near for ending the session of Congress, the President requested that action be suspended on the bull until the opening of the 82nd Congress. Whereupon the Armed Services Committee instructed its Preparedness Subcommittee to study further the subject of universal military training. The bill was rewritten and introduced in the 82nd Congress as S. 1. Hearings were held; a report was issued; and the bill was enacted into law on June 19, 1951. In addition to the papers described below, see the Preparedness Subcommittee 1952 "annual" report, page 13. See also the 1950-52 Legislative Files for the titles "Draft Act" in box 228 and "UMT" in boxes 243-44.

The Subcommittee issued reports dealing with several of Mr. Johnson's 81st Congress subcommittee assignments. Investigations of substandard military housing at military stations are described in the Subcommittee's 28th and 30th reports and on Page 11 of its 1952 "annual" report. Investigations on the stockpiling program are described on pages 14-17 of the 1952 "annual" report. Studies of the tin industry are described in the sixth and 41st reports and on page 16 of the 1952 "annual" report. Studies of the synthetic rubber industry are described in the first, second, and 29th reports and on pages 14-15 of the 1952 "annual" report. After February 1953, the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee ceased to exist as a standing subcommittee.

In the 83rd Congress special preparedness subcommittees were set up to handle specific problems. Mr. Johnson was chairman of Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee No. 5, set up on March 12, 1954, to study the Texas City tin smelter.



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He was chairman of the 84th Congress Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee set up in March 1955 pursuant to Senate Resolution 72 extended pursuant to Senate Resolution 215. The Subcommittee was continued in the 85th Congress and in the 86th Congress. The subcommittee gathered information on and investigated matters relating to the "common defense' and issued a number of reports.

Because of the launching of the first and second earth satellites (sputniks) by the Russians on October 4 and November 3, 1957, the Subcommittee began hearings on November 27, 1957, to investigate the United States satellite and missile situation. As a result the Special Committee on Space and Aeronautics was up on February 6, 1958.

PAPERS RELATING TO THE ORGANIZATION OF THE PREPAREDNESS INVESTIGATING SUBCOMMITTEE, 1950. Box 345.

Papers concerning the organization of the Subcommittee include a transcript of the report of proceedings of the full Committee, July 17, 1950, in which Mr. Johnson proposed the organization of a watchdog subcommittee; press releases; memoranda; statements; and correspondence. Included are copies of Congressional Record tear sheets dated April 1, 1946, and copies of a letter from Lyndon Johnson to the President, April 5, 1948, relating to investigations.

Also included are four folders of letters, primarily from constituents, congratulating Mr. Johnson on his appointment as Chairman together with enclosures and copies of Mr. Johnson's replies. Letters concerning the subcommittee activities and suggested investigations are mixed with the congratulatory mail. The letters bear several different file designations such as "preparedness-general," "watchdog-general," and "preparedness-congrats."

PAPERS RELATING TO THE ACTIVITIES OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE, 1950-53.Boxes 346-47. The papers include reports, the Committee Prospectus for 1951, correspondence, memoranda, statements, notes on staff meetings, and press releases. The material concerns the history of the Subcommittee, the continuance of the Subcommittee beyond February 1953, Subcommittee investigations, personnel, publicity, and interoffice procedures. The folders pertaining to specific Subcommittee investigations are filed following these papers.



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WORK PAPERS AND CORRESPONDECE RELATING TO PREPAREDNESS SUBCOMMITTEE INVESTIGATIONS, 1950-53. Boxes 347-51.

The files include work papers and correspondence pertaining to a number of investigations, including some which did not result in published reports, and correspondence pertaining to possible subjects for investigation. The bulk of the material concerns an investigation of the Allison Division of General Motors, an investigation of Commerce International China, Inc., and Universal Military Training legislation.

The work papers relating to the investigation of the Allison Division of General Motors include correspondence, memoranda, photostatic copies of transcripts of interviews by Victor Peterson, Washington representative of the Indianapolis Times, with Alliance Division employees and former employees, a photostatic copy of a summary of the interviews, and blueprints of a machine shop.

In late 1950, the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee undertook an investigation of certain activities of Commerce International China, Inc. that were alleged to have involved Air Force personnel. Because an extensive investigation appeared necessary, the Subcommittee requested the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Department of the Air Force to continue the Investigation. When the investigative report submitted by the Air Force failed to sustain the alleged corruption, the Subcommittee recommended that the case be closed. The papers include six folders of correspondence of the Subcommittee Chairman and Counsel with Air Force and FBI officials, officers of the Chinese Air Force, and members of the press; interoffice memoranda; statements; releases; newspaper clippings; and copies of investigation exhibits. Following these are two binders containing the Air Force report of investigation. These papers were accumulated by Gerald W. Siegel.

The work papers relating to Universal Military Training legislation consist of printed copies of S. 1; Senate Report No. 117 and House Report No. 217 relating to S. 1; "Report of the President's Advisory Commission on Universal Training" (The Compton Report); Defense Department issuances; carbon copies of subcommittee reports, memoranda, and hearings; copies of Parts V, VI, and VII of a Defense Department "Continuing Study of Press Comment on Congressional Hearings on Universal Military Service and Training;" and a few press releases. See the Preparedness Subcommittee 1952 "annual" report, page 13. See also the 1950-52 Legislative Files, "Draft Act" in box 228 and "UMT" in boxes 243-44.



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The files also include material on sale of surplus computers, an investigation at Carswell Air Force Base, the price of food in Hawaii, the rubber investigations, the investigation of construction of Moroccan Air Bases, Morgantown Ordinance Works, the Subcommittee's Fortieth Report, the tin industry, stockpiling, and government construction overseas.

RELEASES AND REPORTS OF THE PREAPREDNESS INVESTIGATING SUBCOMMITTEE, 1950-53. Boxes 352-53.

The file includes a set of 1951 press releases issued by the Subcommittee and senate documents and committee prints of the Subcommittee's investigative reports, numbers 1 through 40, and the Subcommittee's "annual" report of March 20, 1952. In addition there are unbound copies of a few of the reports and a corrected copy of the eighth report.

# OFFICE FILES OF GERALD W. SIEGEL, 1950-53. Box 353.

Mr. Siegel was an assistant to Donald C. Cook, who served concurrently as Counsel to the Subcommittee and Vice Chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission. (Mr. Cook resigned as Counsel on March 25, 1952, when he became SEC Chairman.) The office files consist of carbon copies of memoranda relating to conferences, committee procedure, preparation of reports, and other committee matters; correspondence with Defense Department officials and officials of firms doing business with the government; press releases; edited drafts of reports; and work papers.

A few papers relating to Mr. Siegel's SEC assignments, a few personal letters, and a few documents date 1948-49 were filed with these papers. They have been moved to the "Office Files of Gerald W. Siegel Relating to the Securities and Exchange Commission."

CORRESPONDENCE AND NEWSPAPER CLIPPINGS RELATING TO PREAPREDNESS SUBCOMMITTEE PUBLICITY, 1950-53. Box 354.

The first two folders contain correspondence, clippings enclosed with letters, and a few unmounted clippings concerning the Subcommittee. A folder labeled "Drew Pearson" follows these and includes correspondence, memoranda, statements, and newspaper clippings relating to Subcommittee activities and to charges by columnist Drew Pearson that Senator Johnson had suppressed information obtained in Subcommittee investigations. Another eight folders contain mounted clippings pertaining to Subcommittee activities and investigations.

PAPERS RELATING TO PREPAREDNESS SUBCOMMITTEE NUMBER 5 AND TO THE JOINT SUBCOMMITTEE OF THE COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES AND ON BANKING AND CURRENCY, 1954-57. Box 354.

Mr. Johnson was appointed a member of Preparedness Subcommittee No. 5 on March 12, 1954. This subcommittee was one of a series of subcommittees concerned with the continued operation of the Texas City tin smelter, a subsidiary of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC).

Mr. Johnson had been appointed Chairman on June 19, 1950, of an earlier subcommittee known as the Subcommittee on S. 3666. He had introduced S. 3666, a bill for a five year extension of the authority to operate the Texas City tin smelter. The bill was enacted into law. For a copy of S. 3666 and related correspondence, see the tiles "Tin" and "Texas City Tin Smelter" in box 242. See also the sixth report and forty-first reports of the Preparedness Subcommittee, 1951-52.

The 1950 law authorized the operation of the tin smelter to June 30, 1956, but in the meantime, plans were under way to liquidate the RFC on June 30, 1954. Mr. Johnson introduced Senate Concurrent Resolution 79 to continue the operation of the Texas City tin smelter to June 30, 1955; to transfer it from the RFC to an appropriate agency; and to investigate the desirability of a permanent tin smelting industry in the United States. Such an investigation had been authorized by an earlier act. Mr. Johnson introduced another resolution, Senate Resolution 254, on May 27, 1954, to authorize the Senate Committees on Armed Services and on Banking and Currency acting jointly to conduct an investigation of the tin smelting industry n the United States. The Senate approved the resolution on June 1.

Mr. Johnson became a member of the joint subcommittee of the Committees on Armed Services and on Banking and Currency. In April 1955, Senate Concurrent Resolution 26 was introduced to authorize operation of the smelter until June 30, 1956, and to request further study of the best method of continuing operation of the tin smelter by lease or transfer of ownership to private industry. The resolution was approved. P.L. 608 approved on June 22, 1956, authorized the sale of the Texas City tin smelter. The sale of the tin smelter to Wah Chang Corporation was closed on February 15, 1957.



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The papers in this series consist of correspondence; copies of Mr. Johnson's statements, releases, and remarks on the floor of the Senate; memoranda, and newspaper clippings. Most of the material was filed originally in the Case and Project Files. See also Files of Gerald Siegel, "Texas City," box 400; and Files of George Reedy, "Tin Smelter (Texas City)," box 417.

PAPERS RELATING TO THE PREPARDENSS INVESTIGATING SUBCOMMITTEE IN THE 84TH CONGRESS, 1955-56. Box 354-55.

The papers were compiled by a Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee that was set up in March 1955 under Senate Resolution 72. Mr. Johnson was Chairman of the Subcommittee. It continued to operate in the 84th Congress, 2nd Session under Senate Resolution 203, and it was extended periodically in subsequent Congresses.

The papers include a "report on the Function and Organization of the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee," 1955; "Memorandum Describing Activities of Staff of Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee to June 27, 1955;" a staff report on a briefing by General LeMay on Strategic Air Command operations and a related memo, 1955; copies of a press release on the "Demon" F3H fighter plane, 1956; and material pertaining to an investigation into deaths at Parris Island, South Carolina, 1956.

For a copy of Senate Resolution 72, the letter of appointment, a statement of expenditures, a list of subjects under investigation, drafts and printed copies of reports of accomplishments, correspondence, memoranda, and releases, see the title "Preparedness Subcommittee" in the 1955 General Files.

PAPERS RELATING TO THE PREPAREDNESS INVESTIGATING SUBCOMMITTEE IN THE 85TH CONGRESS, 1957-58. Boxes 355-57

The Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee was continued in the 85th Congress, 1st Session under Senate Resolution 48 and in the 2nd Session under Senate Resolution 212. Because of the launching of the first and second earth satellites (Sputnik I and II) by the Russians on October 4 and November 3, 1957, the Subcommittee began hearings on November 27, 1957, to investigate the United States satellite and missile situation. Although the papers accumulated here deal primarily with the missile inquiry, a few concern other Subcommittee matters and investigations.



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The first three folders are labeled Preparedness Subcommittee and deal with a variety of Subcommittee concerns, including the missile inquiry. Most of the file appears to be a chronological file of outgoing Subcommittee correspondence. Following these is a file on Subcommittee staff and applicants.

The remainder of the material relates to the Subcommittee hearing on the missile and satellite program and include correspondence, statements, memoranda, and minutes of the meeting of the Subcommittee on November 22, 1957. The last forty-seven folders contain clippings relating to the Russian Sputniks and the state of the United States missile program. There are no folders for Alabama, Arizona, Hawaii, or Delaware.

FRAGMENTS RELATING TO THE PREPAREDNESS INVESTIGATING SUBCOMMITTEE IN THE 86TH CONGRESS, 1959-60. Box 357.

The fragments are in one folder and include a press release and report dealing with the selection and promotion of reserve officers to general and flag ranks, September 9, 1959; a report on an investigation of overtime payments, Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, Florida, August 31, 1960; and a compilation of excerpts from speeches by Lyndon B. Johnson concerning national preparedness, 1939-59.

## **Atomic Energy:**

# FRAGMENTS RELATING TO THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON ATOMIC ENERGY, 1950-54. Box 361.

As a Congressman, Mr. Johnson was appointed to the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy on July 31, 1947, but left when elected to the Senate. In the Senate, he was appointed to the Committee July 5, 1952 to succeed Senator Tom Connally of Texas who resigned. Senator Johnson remained on the Committee until his resignation in 1953 due to the press of other duties. Senator Pastore was named to replace him on June 3, 1953.

These papers include correspondence relating to the Committee and the Atomic Energy Commission; press releases and periodical digests from the AEC; publications from an engineering firm and a nuclear instruments company; a Saturday Evening Post article by Stewart Alsop and Dr. Ralph Lapp titled, "The Inside Story of Our First Hydrogen Bomb," October 25, 1952; Weekly Information Bulletins from the Joint Committee; and a press release concerning the Senator's resignation from the Committee. A 1950 statement favoring



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confirmation of Sumner Pike for another term on the AEC and a statement made on the floor of the Senate, August 13, 1954, concerning revision of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 are also included here.

#### Finance:

# NEWSPAPER CLIPPING CONCERNING APPOINTMENT TO FINANCE COMMITTEE, January 21, 1955, Box 359.

The Committee on Finance is concerned with revenue measures generally, the bonded debt, the deposit of public moneys, customs, reciprocal trade agreements, tariffs, social security, veterans' measures, and life insurance issued by the government on account of service in the armed forces. Mr. Johnson was a member of the Committee in the 84th Congress, 1st Session. For papers relating to his appointment, see the work papers of the Steering Committee meeting relating to Senate committee assignments, January 1955, in box 364. For constituent mail on bills referred to the Committee on Finance, see the 1955 Legislative Files in boxes 259-65. The clipping is from the Pittsburg, Texas, Gazette and refers to Lyndon Johnson's appointment to the Committee on Finance.

## **Interstate and Foreign Commerce:**

# PAPERS RELATING TO THE COMMITTEE ON INTERSTATE AND FOREIGN COMMERCE

The Committee is concerned with commerce generally; with the regulation of railroads, common carriers by water, and other forms of transportation; with communications, civil aeronautics, power, navigation, and waterways; and with the Coast Guard, the Merchant Marine, and the Weather Bureau. Mr. Johnson was a member of the Committee in the 81st, 82nd, and 83rd Congresses.

In addition to the papers described immediately below, see the following titles: Legislative Files, 1950-52, "Federal Power Program," "Fcc," and "Fishing Vessels" in box 229; "Interstate Commerce Act" and "Interstate Oil Compact" in box 231; "NARBA Treaty (North American Regional Broadcast Agreement)" in box 233; "Oil Depletion" in boxes 233-34; and "Television" in box 240. # CORRESPONDENCE RELATING TO THE COMMITTEE ON INTERSTATE AND FOREIGN COMMERCE

Most of the fragments of correspondence bear the file designation "Leg. Interstate and Foreign Commerce" and apparently were once filed with the "Legislative Files" arranged by committee names. Most of the correspondence is with constituents and concerns legislation and other matters considered by the Committee. The folder "Leg. Airmail Subsidy" contains material concerning the airline industry investigation conducted by the full Committee which proposed separate payments to airlines for the transportation of mail from subsidy payments.

The items in the folders "S. 509, Duck Stamp Enforcement" and "Air Transport to Alaska" were originally filed in interoffice memoranda in boxes 863-864. 1 inch.

# INTERSTATE AND FOREIGN COMMERCE COMMITTEE SUBCOMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS

In the 81st Congress, Johnson served as the Chairman of the Subcommittee on the Leland Olds nomination, dealing with the reappointment of Leland Olds to the Federal Power Commission. Most correspondence dealing with the subcommittee is filed under "Olds, Leland" in the Appointment Files, 1949-53. Committee correspondence and other pertinent material is described below.

Three of Mr. Johnson's subcommittee assignments in the 81st Congress related to natural gas bills. He was Chairman of the subcommittee on S. 1498 and a member of the subcommittees on S. 2746 and S. 1831. Papers concerning S. 1498 are described below, papers relating to S. 2746 are in the Files Relating to Senator Johnson's Legislation, box 295, and no papers have been found relating to S. 1831.

Two Johnson subcommittee assignments in the 81st Congress dealt with inland waterways bills: S. 211, to amend the Inland Waterways Corporation Act of 1924, and S. 400, relating to



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proposed improvements to inland waterways. Fragments dealing S. 211 are described below; no papers have been found concerning S. 400. Two 1949 "Legislative Files" titles, "Federal Barge Lines" and Inland Waterways," which probably dealt with S. 211, have not been found.

Senator Johnson served on the Domestic Land and Water Transportation Subcommittee which was investigative in nature. The Subcommittee was established in the 81st Congress and continued to operate in the 82nd Congress. Fragments are described below.

The reorganization of the Missouri Pacific Railroad was the subject of S. Res. 241 in the 81st Congress, S. Res. 229 in the 82nd Congress, and S. 978 in the 83rd Congress. Mr. Johnson was appointed to the subcommittee on S. Res. 241, which he had co-sponsored. Mr. Johnson was also appointed as a member of the subcommittee on S. Res. 229, a resolution to investigate the proposed reorganization. Mr. Johnson offered an amendment to S. 978, a bill to facilitate the termination of railroad reorganization proceedings under section 77 of the Bankruptcy Act. Material concerning Johnson's amendment to S. 978 is filed in the Files Relating to Senator Johnson's Legislation, box 298. Correspondence about S. Res. 241 and reorganization of the Missouri Pacific is filed in the fragments of correspondence described below.

No papers have been found for other Johnson subcommittee assignments on the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee.

Mr. Johnson was a member of the Commission from 1957 through 1959. The Commission was authorized by an act of August 3, 1956.

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The file includes notices, agenda, and minutes of meetings of the Senate Office Building Commission; a copy of Senate Resolution 495, 85th Congress, 1st Session, authorizing the acquisition of land; a plat of Square 725, the site acquired for the Building; reports of the Architect of the Capitol and copies of reports to him; and related correspondence.

# **Senate Reception Room:**

# PAPERS RELATING TO THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE SENATE RECEPTION ROOM, 1955-58. Box 361.

The Special Committee was set up to select the names of five outstanding former Senators whose portraits were to be placed in the Senate Reception Room. The Committee was created by Senate Resolution 145, 84th Congress, 1st Session, which was introduced for Mr. Johnson on August 2, 1955. Mr. Johnson became the Chairman of the Committee. The idea for the Committee came to Senator Johnson when he was reading American history while recovering from his heart attack on July 2, 1955.

Senator Kennedy was appointed Chairman of the Committee in April 1956.

The papers include a copy of Senate Resolution 145, newspaper clippings, correspondence, and a press release. These concern the origin of the Committee, procedures for selecting the Senators to be honored, the final selections, appointment of Senator Kennedy as Chairman, and the book "The Famous Five" by Holmes Alexander.

## **Space and astronautics:**

## PAPERS RELATING TO THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SPACE AND ASTRONAUTICS

As a result of the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee hearings held after the Sputnik launchings in October and November 1957, The Special Committee was authorized on February



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6, 1958, by Senate Resolution 256. Mr. Johnson became the Chairman. The Committee held hearings in May to consider legislation to establish a federal agency on space exploration.

FRAGMENTS RELATING TO THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SPACE AND ASTRONAUTICS, 1958. Box 357.

The fragments include a copy of S. Res. 256, minutes from the organizational meeting, applications for staff positions with the Committee, two Committee "Legislative Calendars, a carbon copy of the Committee report on S. 3609, notes, and statements. The fragments also include a committee print of a "Staff Report on Hearings before the Select Committee on Astronautics and Space Exploration on H. R. 11881" and a committee print from the Special Committee on Space and Astronautics titled "Compilation of Materials on Space and Astronautics, No. 2."

KITS PREPARED FOR MEMBERS OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SPACE AND ASTRONAUTICS, 1958. Boxes 357-358.

The collection includes seven kits prepared for the staff and members of the Committee and a folder of extra materials for the kits. The kits contain copies of S. 3096, the space research bill; Senator Johnson's opening statement at the hearings, May 6, 1958' other peoples' statements before the Committee; issuances of the Air Force and the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, 1955 and 1958; lists of witnesses and their biographies; organization charts for the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics; memoranda and notes made by the members; and a photocopy of a letter from Under Secretary Macintyre, May 12, 1958. Not all the kits are complete.

#### PAPERS RELATING TO THE COMMITTEE ON AERONAUTICAL AND SPACE SCIENCES

The standing committee was created on July 24, 1958, by Senate Resolution 327, and Senator Johnson became its Chairman. The Committee's function was to consider all proposed legislation, messages, petitions, memoranda, and other matters relating to aeronautical and space activities not associated with developments of weapons systems or military operations. See also the title "Space" in the Subject Files, 1958-60, and the title "Space Committee" in Gerald Siegel's Files.



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FRAGMENTS RELATING TO THE COMMITTEE ON AERONAUTICAL AND SPACE SCIENCES, 1958-60. Boxes 358-59.

Included in the series are a copy of S. Res. 327, memoranda, statements on the "deterrent or missile gap," a news release and letter of transmittal on NASA's use of Army space resources, a report on launch facilities, and article by Senator Johnson in the August 1958 issue of <u>American Engineer</u>, a July 1959 issue of <u>Interavia</u>, and a folder of clippings.

Memoranda concern the missile and space program, amendments to the Space Act, and presidential actions in the field of space. Memos, statements, and releases are filed together chronologically in one folder and are followed by S. Res. 327, the magazines, the report on launch facilities, and the clippings. The clippings were not mounted; many had never been clipped from the page. Articles concern Mr. Johnson's November 11 speech before the International Symposium of Physics and Medicine of Atmosphere and Space, and his speech November 17 before the United Nations General Assembly's Political Committee. The clippings are chronologically arranged and frequently duplicated.

# UNITED NATIONS SPEECH, November 17, 1958, Box 359.

On November 17, 1958, Senator Johnson spoke before the United Nations Committee One, suggesting international cooperation in the exploration of outer space. The U. S. delegation to the United Nations and the U. S. State Department issued press releases, and multiple copies of both releases are filed in two folders. The file also contains a file memo from Herbert Oldenberg indicating that other material on the speech was sent to Mrs. Territo, January 30, 1967.

"SPACE NOTEBOOK," ca. October 1959. 1 inch. Box 359.

Dealing with Senator Johnson's view of the missile and space gap, the notebook contains clippings, statements and releases by Mr. Johnson, a summary of Johnson space legislation, a list of Soviet space achievements, and information on the U.S. space program. The items are organized by subject and were removed from their black binder.
