To placate the landlords, however, the Minister of Agriculture, Hugo Trivelli, has declared "the Government will be inflexible in disqualifying from agrarian reform benefits all those who promote or participate in the violent or forced occupation of lands."

The first two fundos taken over by the peasants are in a large green valley outside Melipilla, about 50 miles from Santiago. The peasants at one farm, armed with hoes, pitchforks, knives and a few guns, barricaded the entrance and decorated it with two Chilean flags and a banner.

Government officials, while criticizing the take-over, were quick to point out that the fundos had already been expropriated by the agrarian reform agency, though legal obstacles still stood in the way.

The expropriation had been justified on several grounds. The owner failed to meet minimum-wage and social-security obligations. Furthermore, huge sections of the 20,000-acre farm were not under cultivation.

The peasants at the farm seem extremely proud of what they have accomplished, though somewhat dismayed at the national attention.





While in Washington for a meeting of the Advisory Committee to the Selective Service for the Selection of Physicians, Dentists and Allied Medical Specialists, I had the pleasure of visiting with the President and examining him along with Dr. Burkley. We feel the President to be recuperating in a very satisfactory manner. It is now six weeks since the date of the operation and he has been out of the hospital for a month. Ordinarily patients following a major operation such as the President has had do not return to full physical activity for at least six weeks following the time they leave the hospital and it is approximately three months before they are back to their full physical capabilities. We suggested that the President continue to follow a graduated exercise program trying to obtain adequate rest and limit his activities until the first of the year. His physical examination at this time was satisfactory in every way. There remains some sensitivity in the scar area which is to be expected at this time following an operation.

REPORT TO THE PRESIDENT AND THE CABINET ON RECENT ECONOMIC PERFORMANCE FROM THE COUNCIL OF ECONOMIC ADVISERS

The economy continued to advance in October on a broad front, according to the most recent reports on economic activity.

Both industrial production and shipments of durable manufactured goods reversed their September declines and rose in October. With businessmen still working down excessive stocks of steel, manufacturing output has not yet quite returned to the peak levels of this summer, but it is headed in that direction.

Retail sales advanced nearly \$200 million to a new high in October, according to preliminary estimates. The initial reception of 1966 automobiles has been enthusiastic, and this quarter is expected to set an all-time record for automobile production. Weekly reports on November retail sales show further strength throughout the consumer area. Higher social insurance benefits and lower excise taxes are the latest contributions of fiscal policy to the continued vigor of consumer spending. Over the past two years, retail sales have risen 16%, with every major category of retailing up at least 12%. No corresponding peacetime period has ever recorded such large and sustained advances in the living standards of American families.

More than 200,000 workers were added to nonfarm payrolls in October with particularly strong advances in trade, services, and State and local government. Unemployment moved down another notch to 4.3%, the lowest since August 1957, and a significant improvement from the 5.2% rate of last October.

The one important sluggish area of activity is residential construction, which showed little change on balance in October. Permits for future homebuilding rose, but housing starts declined and the dollar volume of housing activity contracted slightly further.

In the third quarter of this year, our gross national product had a particularly good rise of \$11-1/2 billion, and corporate profits showed further increase. In view of the run-off in steel, we cannot expect as large a GNP advance in the current quarter. But the gain should not be far from the \$10 billion quarterly average of the past two years. The expansion remains well-balanced and well-paced and should enter 1966 on a strong note.

President Johnson today announced the recess appointment of William Gorham as Assistant Secretary (for Program Coordination) of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Mr. Gorham is presently serving as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense (Manpower).

The position to which he is being appointed in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare is one of three assistant secretaryships newly authorized for the Department by the 89th Congress.

Mr. Gorham, 34, attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1949-50 and graduated from Stanford University with a B.A. degree in 1952. He entered the Graduate School of Economics at Stanford in July 1952. In November of 1953 he joined the research staff of the RAND Corporation.

In November 1962, Mr. Gorham was appointed Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense (Manpower) for Special Studies and Requirements.

In announcing Mr. Gorham's appointment, President Johnson said:

"The legislative successes of the Eighty-Ninth Congress have placed a heavy responsibility on the Executive Branch of government. Good management is now the top priority concern of my administration.

"That is why I asked Secretary Gardner and other Department heads to take full advantage of the latest techniques in program planning and evaluation. And that is why I am appointing, on Secretary Gardner's recommendation, William Gorham to the new position of Assistant Secretary for Program Coordination in the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

"Mr. Gorham has exhibited unusual qualifications in this area. He is a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and studies at the Graduate School of Economics at Stanford. He has served more recently as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower. Secretary McNamara tells me that he has been one of his ablest assistants. I believe this appointment will further strengthen Secretary Gardner's capacity to coordinate the wide range of programs for which his Department is responsible."

WITH JACK VALENTI

FRIDAY

MR. VALENTI: Mr. Moyers and Joe Laitin are in Washington now, as you know, working on some of the press arrangements for the Erhard visit. I expect Bill to be back on Sunday.

Hal has put out the press release on the appointment of William Gorham as Assistant Secretary for Program Coordination, Department of Health, Education and Welfare. He will be primarily concerned with the planning, programming and budgeting apparatus that was announced some months ago at the Cabinet meeting by the President and Budget Director, Charles Schultze.

The President spent some time on the plane going over some staff memoranda as well as certain ideas and suggestions that had to do with the State of the Union message. He didn't quite finish up. He signed some things, but his desk is still not clear, so he intends to finish up at the ranch today some of this work.

He will stay close to the ranch today, riding by car on the ranch property. Only the staff was with him in the cabin of the plane. He seemed to be in very good spirits. I asked him if he was experiencing any discomfort, and he told me he did have some pain every now and then, particularly if he sat for long stretches, or if he made abrupt movements.

Q. Where was this pain?

MR. VALENTI: Around the scar area, Jack.

You also have a memorandum by Dr. James Cain. He is the President's long-time physician and was the chief of the medical team here for the operation. I think it is self explanatory. He examined the President yesterday evening and reported on that examination.

Q. Was Dr. Cain and Dr. Burkley there?

MR. VALENTI: Drs. Cain and Burkley together.

At the Cabinet meeting today, all members of the Cabinet were there except Secretary Rusk who, as you know, is in Brazil. Secretary Fowler was not there. He was out of the city, but Under Secretary Ball sat in for Mr. Rusk and Under Secretary Joe Barr sat in for Secretary Fowler. The Vice President was there. Ambassador Goldberg had intended to be present, as he is at all Cabinet meetings, but he has been having some discomfort with some ear trouble and remained in New York.

Others present at the meeting were Gardner Ackley, Mr. Moyers, Mr. Califano, and myself.

That is all that I have.

- Q. Mr. Valenti, New Haven, Connecticut asks whether the President will have a representative at the Wallace funeral tomorrow?
 - MR. VALENTI: I have nothing on that at all, Karl.
- Q. Jack, do you have anything on the President's visit to San Antonio on Sunday?

MR. VALENTI: If the President is feeling up to it, he does plan to be in San Antonio on Sunday. Mr. Pachios and others of the Press Office will have further details on that for you.

- Q. What is that?
- Q. For what purpose?
- Q. Jack, what is the occasion?

MR. VALENTI: He is going over, as I understand it, to an affair that is being put on for Congressman Henry Conzalez of San Antonio. I have no further details on it. Tomorrow morning you will have whatever details we have, and by that time I would hope we would have definite indications of the President's schedule.

- Q. Is the dinner in honor of the Congressman?
- MR. VALENTI: It is not a dinner.
- Q. Vaguely, what kind of an affair is this? What time?
- MR. VALENTI: I think it is in the afternoon, but I will say no more on that until I get more details.
- Q. You say Bill Moyers is back in Washington making arrangements for the Erhard visit. Does that mean the site has been established?
- MR. VALENTI: There is no site established for the Erhard visit at this time.
 - Q. How can he be making arrangements --
 - MR. VALENTI: He is making press arrangements.
- Q. Mr. Valenti, Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman said at a new conference two days ago that he is going to the FAO Conference in Rome. He anticipated that meeting would produce a mandate for international action to combat world nutrition and starvation. There is some reason to believe the President intended to make an announcement today on what contributions we are prepared to make toward that end. Do you know why they were cancelled?
- MR. VALENTI: To my knowledge, the President has not seen any program on food and has made no evaluation on any such program. I doknow that he had ordered staff studies on a good many different areas -- education, health, food, and the list goes on. I know nothing of any cancellation of any kind, Phil.
- Q. Jack, this memo by the two doctors says the President continues to follow a graduated exercise program. Is that a formal program in which he is doing a certain type of exercise every day, a little more of each kind every day?
- MR. VALENTI: The President is doing more walking then he has. For example, yesterday after sitting at his desk for about four hours, he felt some of this pain, and by walking briskly, he finds it is comforting to him. The doctors feel that this is something that he ought to continue doing. By graduated exercise, I am assuming they mean this kind of exercise.

- Q. Where did he walk, Jack?
- MI. VALENTI: Around the White House grounds.
- Q. When will Mrs. Johnson join the President, do you know?
- MR. VALENTI: I have no knowledge of that.
- Q. She did not come down today?
- MR. VALENTI: Mrs. Johnson was not on the plane.
- Q. Jack, does the President have any reaction to the Annaconda Copper decision to cancel its rescinded price increase in copper?
- MR. VALENTI: The President is always delighted when he sees exhibitions of statesmanship and responsibility on the part of American industry. I think that might well describe his feelings at this time.
 - Q. Jack, is this the first time you have ever briefed the press?
 - MR. VALENTI: Yes,
- Q. Jack, what is the President's plans for tomorrow? Any guidance on that?
- MR. VALENTI: I have no definite knowledge of any specific plans, Jack. He will work at his desk again. There are a number of papers that he told me he wanted to read and ponder over. He will be doing some of that, and no doubt he will be keeping in touch by phone with those members of the government with whom contact tomorrow is indicated.
 - Q. What time will you brief tomorrow?
 - MR. VALENTI: 10:00 AM.
 - Q. You will have two briefings tomorrow, Jack?
 - MR. VALENTI: One briefing tomorrow -- 10:00 AM.
- Q. Jack, does the President plan now to attend the AFL-CIO convention in San Francisco?
 - MR. VALENTI: I have no knowledge of any plans at this time.
- Q. Jack, you were at the Cabinet meeting. Did the question of food and our policies come up at the meeting?
 - MR. VALENTI: No.
- Q. Do you know whether the President had a separate meeting with Secretary Freeman?
- MR. VALENTI: I do not believe the President had any separate meetings with Secretary Freeman.
 - Q. Are we going to stay here until after New Years?
 - MR. VALENTI: We have no plans beyond the next few days.
 - Q. Mr. Valenti, will you be staying at the hotel or the ranch?
- MR. VALENTI: I will be dividing my time between the hotel and the ranch.

Q. For these routine queries, Hal will be available?

MR. VALENTI: Yes.

Q. Could you tell us what happened to the announcement that was supposed to be today?

MR. VALENTI: What announcement?

Q. Well, reporters were given guidance that they could expect a statement around 10 o'clock today.

MR. VALENTI: I think if you recall, Mr. Moyers' words, he said, "if there are any announcements, I will have them for you in the morning."
