Wednesday, January 19th was full of activity, and hopefully some achievement. In the morning there were those necessary things of fitting clothes with Lucinda, who is such a dear, and then my \dll/volatile friend Jean Louis, and then back for the big event of the day, the beautification meeting at 2:30.

First there was a picture of the committee at the foot of the stairs where we always take pictures of state visitors -- a good Man Junior representation, Stu Udall, Katie Louchheim, Ned Owens, Libby

Rowe, Walter Tobeiver , Bill Walton, Walter Washington, the indispensable Nash Castro, and our three press members Rudolph and a

It was a day of reports. General Duke, engineer commissioner for the District Highway Department, reported on the joint efforts of the District, Maryland and Virginia, to improve the highway approaches to the Capitol. Maryland will and scape two major approaches, and Virginia has tribee projects. The District highway department will have five new areas, including doleful New York Avenue, and in addition ten permanent entrance signs. And the National Park Service, that greatest reservoir of help, has four projects at major entrances, and in addition new blooms all along the lovely George Washington Parkway from the National Airport past the 14th Street Bridge. All

The Bill Walton reported on a pilot project that is being set up to make an existing parking lot look good with planting and screening. Also on a project to design city streets signs with better taste. Stu Udall told us about some legislation that is under way to establish a

visitor's center in Washington, and at last my friend Walter Washington brought us up to date on the school situation. Nine schools have been completed with 51 more on the "must" list. He gets right down to people in his reports, and injects more enthusiasm. He makes me want to go to work more than any one of them. 1 Last. Nash Castro announced the donations that have come in since we last met. The Washington Post and Kay Graham \$\frac{1}{2}\$15,000. \$12,000 from the American Association of Nurserymen. \$10,000 from the Martin Foundation. And Katie and Walter Louchheim something over \$5,000, and I am very proud to say \$5,000 from Houston, Texas, from Olga Wise (?) Weiss (?). \$2500.00 from the National Geographic Society. And others ranging to \$1.21 from the elementary school children of Nevada / Calif. Stu had already announced a great gift from the Mellons of \$409,000 for Lafeyette Park which went direct to the Ntional Park Service. Then I invited everybody in for tea and more talk. It turned out to be cocktails. I thanked Kay for her contribution, Polly for making green thumb a reality, asked poor beleagured Walter Tobacket to please start cleaning up the magnolias on the median strip on Connecticutt Avenue, and applauded Mr. Ritten of the Virginia Highway Department, and Mr. Atkins of the Maryland Highway Department for their swift and good action. Talked with Bill Walton about diriving along New York Avenue

And then everyone was gone about five-thirty, and there were hours to dictate and read and work. Finally, about ten-fifteen I went over to Lyndon's office to see if I could bring him and his work home along with whoever was there. He was in his small office with Harry McPherson and Joe Califano. They were talking about legislation, in the message to Congress about the four year term for Congressmen. It was nearly eleven when I got them home.
