The press pool included Al Spivak, Philip Potter, Bill Costello and Frank Cormier. Then the President retired again to the stateroom and since some members of Congress were there, he went into his stateroom w/ McGeorge Bundy, Jack Valenti, Dick Goodwin and William Brubeck to go over the drill for the day and read his speech cards and make changes.

MST	10:05			<i>Great</i> The President's Jet arrived at Malmstrom AFB, Grand Falls, Montana. He was greeted at the foot of the plane steps by a welcoming committee, consisting of Governor Babcock (Jim) of Montana; Gov. Albert D. Rosellini of Washington; Governor Mark Hatfield of Oregon; Governor Grant Sawyer of Nevada; and Brig. General Lightner who is the commanding officer of Malmstrom AFB.	
				The Honor Guard was brought to arms, and as the President saluted, the band played four ruffles and flourishes and Hail to the Chief.	
				The President received the Key to the City from the Mayor of Great Falls, Marion Erdmann and Mrs. Erdmann.	
				The President then went to the platform and was introduced to the President by Mayor Erdmann. Delivered REMARKS, with the Governors, members of Congress and local dignitaries on the platform. After the President's brief remarks, Senator Mike Mansfield introduces the Governors and members of Congress and those on the platform to the crowd.	
	10:30a			Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson of Canada's Jetstar arrived. The President stood alone at the foot of the steps to welcome the Prime Minister as he deplaned. The Canadian National Anthem was played, followed by the Star Spangled Banner as both men stood at attention under blue skies and cool temperature. The NORAD Band played. Then the Prime Minister and the President received honors and reviewed the bi-country honor guard. The President escorted the Prime Minister to the speaker's platform, and introduced him to the dignitaries waiting there. The people on the platform were seated, and the President approached the speaker's podium. The crowd cheered. He began his WELCOMING REMARKS, welcoming Prime Minister Pearson. Approximately 10,000 people were gathered to hear him. The Prime Minister then responded. At the conclusion of the remarks the Prime Minister and the President departed the platform, and went along the fence and shook hands of some of the crowd. Then they went into the base operations office for a brief visit and coffee. The President and Prime Minister visited w/ Senator Mansfield. And they placed a telephone call to a friend of Senator Mansfield -- the President talked on the call also.

11:19	<del>11:12</del>			To Vancouver, B. C. aboard the Prime Minister's Jetstar Aircraft (rest of party flew in AF#1) Accompanied by McGeorge Bundy and Ambassador of Canada, Charles S. Ritchie, Rufus Youngblood, Mr. Gordon McNab, Canadian expert on water resources, served as a guide during the two-hour dogleg course to Vancouver. 1:04				Arrived Vancouver International Airport on the RCAF side. The President was greeted by the <del>Prime</del> Premier of British Columbia, Mr. W. A. C. Bennett. <del>Prime Minister and the</del> Premier and the President walked to the Guard of Honor reviewing Stand. The President mounted it, and stood alone to receive a 21-gun salute to the President. The Royal Canadian Engineers Band played the Star Spangled Banner. The President, Prime Minister Pearson, and Premier Bennett walked to the Speaker's Lectern. The Premier made introductory remarks. Prime Minister Pearson welcomed the President, and the President then responded with prepared REMARKS. In the middle of the President's remarks, a very heavy rain began to fall, but the President finished his remarks, and then donned raincoat -- and walked past the squadron of colorfully garbed Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Vancouver Pipers to his car. <i>Spokane, Washington</i>	
1:25				Motorcade to the Peace Arch. The President rode with Prime Minister Pearson <del>and</del> but after traveling a short distance, the President stopped the motorcade and requested that Senators Mansfield, Aiken and Fulbright join him in his car.	
2:10				The motorcade arrived at the Peace Arch. The President and party waited in the limousine until the VIPs made their way to their seats, and then he and the Prime Minister and the Premier mounted the podium. While the Star Spangled Banner was played, the children in the crowd chanted, "We Want Johnson!" The U. S. Army Band played the national anthem, and then the Canadian Navy Band played "O Canada."	
				Premier Bennett welcomed the President with his remarks, and he presented to the President a wooden totem-pole like carved "Thunderbird." Governor Rosellini of Washington was the introduced and make proper remarks.

				A Canadian representative read a telegram addressed to the Prime Minister of Canada from Ottawa regarding exchange of instruments of ratification of the Columbia River Treaty. The telegram was signed by the leader of the Canadian delegation, Paul Martin. Following the reading, the Premier of British Columbia and the Prime Minister signed the agreement at a table set up near the podium while the President watched from his chair.	
				Secretary Udall stepped to the microphone and made announcement of Secretary Rusk informing him of the exchange of instruments of ratification of the Columbia River Treaty. The President stepped to the lectern and made a short statement promulgating the treaty. Then he signed the Treaty (Note: Secy Udall promised to furnish two pens for President's library)	
				At this point the rain -- which <del>has</del> had stopped on the arrival, began heavily. The Prime Minister spoke briefly and then introduced the President who <del>was</del> prepared	REMA RKS.
				He completed at 2:41 - and then walked with the Prime Minister <del>and</del> to a waiting limousine shaking hands with the crowds along the way. The President delivered his remarks in a pouring rain.	
	2:46			Motorcade departed the Peace Arch. In the President's limousine were Prime Minister Pearson, , Sen. Mansfield, Aiken and Fulbright.	
	3:30			Arrive Vancouver Airport. Because of the heavy rain, the President went immediately aboard AF#1 with his Canadian visitors, and received a totem pole statuette from Mayor William Rathie of Vancouver and Mr. Reeve Anderson of Richmond. The presentation was made in the stateroom. After the presentation, he visited briefly with the Prime Minister and Premier until 3:50, at which time he <del>had</del> bade them goodbye, and went into his bedroom w/ Jack Valenti.
