Ceremonies were suspended briefly while the President took his seat beside Mrs. Johnson. Mrs. Johnson delivered the dedication speech for the Sam Rayburn Statue. Then the President was introduced by Cong. Wright Patman. He acknowledged the introduction, but made no remarks. On the completion of the ceremony, he departed the xxxxixxxx building stopping to shake hands and kiss a baby on the way out. He invited May Craig and Fay Wells (Storer Broadcasitng Company) to ride with him back to the White House and also, George Reedy. Prior to departing the Capitol area, the President had his car drive him once around the Capitol for a look at the building and grounds. (The Washington Post reported the fellow that he looked at his inaugural site.)
