					The Ambassador was waiting in the Treaty Room when the President arrived with Mr. Palmer Hoyt, Publisher of the Denver Post. The press had not arrived in the Oval Room so the President said, "Well, let's just go see the Ambassador right now," and went into the Treaty Room, sat down and chatted for some ten minutes with the Ambassador, Assistant Secretary for African Affairs-Joseph Palmer- and Mr. Palmer Hoyt.	
					The President asked about the Ambassador's wife and his eight children.	
					The Ambassador expressed a desire to visit many sections of this country stressing the need to learn about agricultural development. The President asked if we were preparing for tours of this kind and I said we were. The President mentioned Cape Kennedy and other industrial sites. Symington said we were also hoping to acquaint the Diplomatic Corps with rural life, the sawd small towns as well as the farms, the genesis as it were of our civic and political life.	
					The President approved and said if rural life was of interest his Ranch might be a good place to visit. He said the Ambassador could be flown to Austin and taken by sklx helicopter to the Ranch. He said he would certainly look into that possibility.	
					The President and Mr. Hoyt then exchanged remarks concerning U.S. Opposition to his policy in Viet Nam and found themselves in agreement concerning Walter Lippman who Wx Hoyt said he had fired twice, observing on one occasion that he was "too erudite to understand himself." The President stressed the fact that some elements in this country seem to think the solution to the Vietnam struggle was to undermine the people's confidence in him. Mr. Hoyt mentioned that Senator Fulbright had made a speech of this kind after which Mr. Hoyt told him he had made no converts and the Senator appeared to be a lonely man. The Ambassador did not seem to follow the conversation closely. Symington:mjdr:mf
