					CONCERNING ENTRY on Page 2 - 9:04a	
					Bill Moyers press briefing #534-A indicates "The President expressed admiration for the way they have been conducted their discussions. He said that he was certain the men speaking for labor want the best for the working man and the men speaking for management want the best for the companies. He said that they had not indulged in personalities, that they had been gentlemen, and he thought that this was appreciated by all concerned. He pointed out to them that there are, of course, people whose eagerness for a settlement rises in proportion to the number of days that the strike continues. He said this includes stockholders, the wives of workers, Congressmen, Senators, and even Presidents. And that he understands that everyone has his own suggestions for settling this, his own suggestions, the newspapers, Congressmen, outsiders, but that he felt that you men around this table can find a solution equitable to both parties better than anyone else." He said that collective bargaining is the free, democratic way of solving differences that exist like we have this morning, that there is a 'better way than legislating the breaking of a strike or seizure or Presidential fiat.' He said that he believes that they can get an agreement that is good for the 'country without anyone winning a great victory or anyone suffering a great defeat.' He asked them to engage in a 'little introspection by asking -- What can I do to protect the people I represent -- but still find an area of agreement'. He said that he hoped they would do it soon; that he did not want to set deadlines, issue ultimatums, deal in threats; that that is not the way to do this. He expressed the hope that they would settle it through effective collective bargaining, because he said that is the way most people wish it. "I hope you will find a point of movement," he said. And he invited them to continue their collective bargaining in the Executive Office Building and that he would appreciate their giving him any progress reports that they have as time goes on. After the President finished, Mr. Siemiller, representing the unions, and Mr. Curtin, representing the airlines, said that they appreciated the manner in which the President had asked them to come here, they appreciated his interest and his views, and that they would both be--this is a direct quote from one of them -- 'very happy to do as he suggested and to meet in the Executive Office Building to see what they could do to find a further narrowing of their differences.' "

					Bill Moyers press briefing #536-A indicated that "as the President began the Joint Sessions he said that he was glad the Prime Minister had come. He personally felt that the purpose of the trip would be to strengthen our ties, if that is possible, and by that he meant that our ties are of such a firm sinew that there wasn't too much room for improvement; that it would continue to strengthen our relationship that the kind of joint understanding the meeting of minds on common problems which occur at a meeting like this would permit both the Prime Minister and the President to 'exercise the leadership that times require and our constituents demand.' "
