MEMORANDUM TO

MARVIN WATSON

Iowa Governor Harold Hughes telephoned me at noon today concerning the forthcoming meeting between the President and a group of Democratic Governors. He said he was calling me because he knew you and the President were at the ranch.

The Governor said that he has discussed the possible meeting with 8 or 10 Democratic Governors and they would request that the meeting be held sometime during the week of January 23. The Governor would very much like to settle on the meeting date as quickly as possible so as to decrease the number of speculative news articles which will be written. He says that he has full authority to agree on any date.

The Governor also has authority to pick the Governors who would meet with the President. On this score he wishes to do that which might be best for the President. His present thinking is that a committee of perhaps 5 Governors would be adequate. He feels that the larger the group, the less meaningful a meeting might be. He says that he will carefully select the Governors so as to omit those who are "hot heads" and whose presence would not be helpful. He says that he is open to suggestions regarding the number and makeup of this committee.

The Governor mentioned several specifics which he wishes to bring up with the President. A primary point to be raised is the suggestion that in the consideration of any reorganization of the Democratic National Committee that 3 Governors be invited to meet on an ex officio basis with the national committee or its executive committee so that these Governors might participate in the decision making process. Through this committee of 3, the Governors are asking for an opportunity to voice their opinions on any reorganization of the National Committee. Other specifics mentioned by Governor Hughes are his desire to rename the Democratic Governors "Caucus" and to regularize their meetings on a quarterly basis.

The Governor again repeated his unhappiness that all of this had to occur. He said that if he had known the subject of the meeting in West Virginia, he would not have called the caucus. He also says that he believes that all of this might eventually prove to be useful. He says that it has tended to clear the air and that also it may give the President an opportunity to do those things which he has been wanting to do for sometime. The Governor continues to repeat his feeling that he has "never felt worse" about being in the middle of anything; that he has a deep affection for the President; and that he is very sorry that he has been part of something which might have hurt the President. The Governor says that he has "gone through the torture of the damned" about this whole matter.

The Governor concluded by saying that he fundamentally wishes to do what is best for the President. He says that he would like to continue to operate as a voice for moderation amongst various of the Governor, and do what he can to be of help to the President.
