There appeared to be much confusion in the room what with the hostesses milling around introducing themselves and trying to get the people to move on out of the room, members of the press corps standing around watching the proceedings, and the official delegations exchanging pleasantries.

					The U. S. pavilion was designed by R. Buckminster Fuller.	
					The President walked a distance of approximatel 75ft. w/ Leonard Marks and Stanley Tupper, passing between a US Navy and Marine Corps Honor Guard. The President proceeded to the interior of the Pavilion and mounted a small platform	
	12:00	12:04p			REMARKS by the President about the gift the US was giving to Canada on the occasion of the EXPO--	
					Following the President's remarks, two US Marines opening opened the case (to the right of the speakers platform) in which the gift "THE GREAT RING OF CANADA" was displayed. The "Great Ring of Canada" symbolized the Nation and the individual components that comprise it. Held in a setting of rhodium-plated steel, a great ring of cut and engraved crystal plaques is surmounted by a smaller ring of crystal and a finial of faceted crystal spheres. The piece stands 40 inches high--28 inches in diameter. From a circular steel base, twelve slender steel arms branch out to hold the ring of 12 large, emerald-cut crystal plaques. The plaques are engraved with the armorial bearings and flowers of the 10 Provinces and 2 Territories of Canada. Above the great ring the 12 arms converge. The smaller ring of clear crystal encircles them-- on this ring are 4 crystal plaques, 2 engraved w/ the Arms of Canada and 2 w/ a natural maple leaf. The ring is engraved in each quadrant w/ the motto of Canada "A mari usque ad mare". Rising above the second ring, the arms hold the finial --a circle of 12 faceted spheres symbolizing the Provinces and Territories, from whose center emerges a larger, many-faceted sphere symbolizing the Nation they together form. Inscribed around the rim of the steel base is the dedication: "For the people of Canada on the centenary of Canada's nationhood from the people of the United States of America." The Great Ring was made by Steuben Glass.

	12:35p				Hon. Walt Rostow Chopper off the ground - en route Harrington Lake The President immediately asked for a glass of milk -- none was available so he settled for a diet Dr. Pepper. He offered each of his guests in the front section of the helo (Martin, Rostow, Butterworth, Ritchie) Dr. Peppers and they joined him. While sipping a diet drink, the President read the preparing memos concerning talking points for his mtg w/ PM Pearson. 					A large group of photographers had gathered to await the arrival of the helicopter -- most of them Canadian -- but George Christian and his writing pool and photographic pool had also preceded the President and some familiar White House press faces were evident.	
	1:25p				Wheels down at Lake Harrington -- The Prime Minister was waiting for the helicopter door to be lowered and he was on tap to greet the President as he alighted. The two men shook hands as old friends and then walked the hundred yards to the house. This arrival, of course, was covered by the press. Still a very colorful scene -- a lovely and beautiful lake, rolling hills (upon one of which the helicopter landed and upon same hill the House stood)... tall, tall trees, and colorfully garbed Royal Canadian Mounted Police standing alertly. The press, with their cameras and discarded film cartons seemed almost a blight on the restful scene -- as did the mobile news truck set up to broadcast reports back to a radio station in Ottawa. In the house, Mrs. Pearson greeted and welcomed the President -- but then retired to another room In the house, the President visited briefly with the Prime Minister -- the President's party joined him in the living room of the house and the Prime Minister had an aide and his press secretary, and there was just the sort of casual milling about while deciding to go out and pose for photographers before lunch.

The President followed the Prime Minister up the steps of the chopper. Aboard the chopper were the same passengers as accompanied the President to the Lake, along w/ PM Pearson. The Prime Minister sat across from the President in the seat usually occupied by Mrs. Johnson.	
	3:50p				The helicopter departed Lake Harrington en route Uplands Airport, Ottawa. The entire flight, the President talked w/ Pearson. Much of their conversation was quiet -- with the President leaning toward him, w/ the President's hand resting on the PM's knee for support -- but other of the conversation could be heard--even in the back compartment of the helo. At one point where the chopper was over a hilly, grassy, and tree-filled area, the President asked the PM what went on in the countryside below, and the P ^m replied that there were probably some good deer below for hunting, but that ^m in the winter it was great ski country. As the helicopter arrived over the Ottawa main city area, the Prime Minister was heard to be a tour guide -- pointing out buildings of interest to the President -- "there is the Department of Health," -- and later, "there is the Department of Agriculture."
