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FOREIGN POLICY ADVISORS

The President: Dean, we are very proud of you up there today (testifying before the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee on Vietnam and Foreign Aid).

Secretary Rusk: As you all know, I testify again tomorrow at 9:30 a.m. I do not want to be caught off guard up there tomorrow by anything which you may be discussing here today. Should I leave or stay?

The President: You have had a rough day. Why don't you go on and get rested for tomorrow. You and Clark can get together later to go over what we have discussed.

(The President and the group then reviewed at length the recommendations and answers to questions which are attached).

The President: I see that Westmoreland prefers Alternative Two. (The President then read: "I prefer the second alternative. By providing seven additional maneuver battalions as compared to three in the first alternative, it maximizes my combat firepower..." -- from General Westmoreland's cable to General Wheeler 11 March 1968).

This would be roughly 30,000 men?

General Wheeler: Yes, sir.

The President: Was Westmoreland limited in this?

General Wheeler: Yes, we told him this was all that we had the capability of providing in this time period. I recommend that we send him these men as soon as we can. Of course, it will be necessary to call up the reserves to do this.

The President: Can we relate this 30,000 to a specific request from General Westmoreland?

General Wheeler: The first increment he asked for out of the 206,000 SERVICE SEWAS 90,000. But as I said this is all we can provide in this period.

But this does not relate to a specific request from him.

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Secretary Clifford: In this cable, he says that the second alternative is better than the first.

There then was a general discussion of force levels. General Wheeler said that if the President approves the recommendations the total troop level would be brought up to 578,000 including Program 5 (525,000) completion, the elements of the 82nd airborne and Marine RLT already sent, along with the new troops.

The President: I do not want to be having a seminar on strategy back here while our house is on fire. I want to get Westmoreland what he needs to get him through this emergency period. Let's get those civilian contractors working wherever possible and get some strong, tough strawbosses running things out there.

(About a twenty minute discussion followed on the specifics of the attachments.)



MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

Subject: Deployment of the Three Tactical Fighter Squadrons (Program 5) to Southeast Asia (U)

- 1. (S) CINCPAC and COMUSMACV have requested three additional Tactical Air squadrons contained in Program 5 be deployed to South Vietnam, as soon as revetments could be made available, to support the recently deployed ground augmentation forces. On 29 February, the Joint Chiefs of Staff recommended deployment of three squadrons when revetments became available. CINCPAC states revetments are now available for one additional TFS each at Chu Lai, Phan Rang, and Phu Cat.
- 2. (S) The three squadrons, two Air Force and one USMC, can be provided for immediate deployment to SVN. One USMC A-4 squadron would be deployed from Iwakuni, Japan to Chu Lai. The following alternatives are available in order to provide the two Air Force squadrons:

Alternative One:

Two CONUS Air Force recalled ANG F-100C (18 UE) squadrons, one each to Phu Cat and Phan Rang. These two squadrons are available for immediate deployment.


Alternative Two:

Two CONUS Air Force regular F-100D squadrons, one each to Phu Cat and Phan Rang. This alternative would require the incorporation of ANG pilots and equipment into the CONUS training base which would delay movement of the two F-100D squadrons to SVN approximately 30 days.

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GROUP - 4

Downgraded at 3 year intervals; declassified after 12 years



Alternative Three:

One ANG F-100C and one training base F-100D squadron. Deployment of one F-100D unit would also have a significant impact on the CONUS training base, similar to that as stated under Alternative Two, as would the 30-day movement delay.

- 3. (S) Recommend approval of Alternative One for the two Air Force squadrons. Alternative One will provide the recalled ANG units with an operational mission in the current SVN effort and have minimum impact on the established CONUS training base. In this connection, the two ANG active duty squadrons are fully combat capable and ready for immediate deployment.
- 4. (S) Recommend that the one USMC A-4 squadron in Iwakuni, Japan and the two ANG squadrons be deployed to SVN immediately.

a. Korean Forces

The Government of the Republic of Korea agreed to send an additional "light division" of 6 battalions to South Vietnam, if we would equip and support these forces and provide additional assistance which, by improving the counter-infiltration capabilities of ROK forces in Korea, would make it politically feasible for the Government to send these additional troops. The total increase of ROK troops in Vietnam would be 6,000. The total "light division" strength of 11,000 would be obtained by switching to a combat role 5,000 Korean Army spaces currently assigned to logistics activity. This logistics work would be taken over by 5,000 additional Korean civilians.

Our total commitment for these additional troops involves non-recurring costs of \$54.7 million and annual costs of \$77 million. The major item in the non-recurring costs is a counter-infiltration package of \$32.3 million, much of which has already been delivered. The rest, and all the other items, including 2 destroyers and 12 helicopters, are now on schedule. One destroyer will be delivered by April 30 and the other by December 31. Delivery of the 12 helicopters will begin in the fall of 1968. The equipment for the "light division" has been shipped and is being held in Okinawa pending deployment. This deployment of the Korean "light division" was scheduled to commence on March 1st, but has been delayed because of the current Korean situation. Ambassador Porter believes that these forces can still be obtained and, in fact, the ROK Prime Minister is now talking of the possibility of sending an additional 2 regular divisions (about 36,000 men). This proposal has not yet been explored.

Entirely apart from the assistance agreed to in connection with the additional troop deployment, we have undertaken to commit during Fiscal Year 1968 an additional \$100 million in military assistance, because of North Korean aggressive actions. Details on the equipment involved both for the troop package and for the \$100 million supplement are attachment A.

In short, we have done everything up to this time that we have agreed to do and will make our future deliveries on time. The delay is due entirely to the South Koreans.

b. Thailand Forces

We have agreed to underwrite the costs involved in the deployment to Vietnam of a Thai "light division" of 10,000 as well as to provide certain other military assistance. The total costs involved for Fiscal Year 1968 are \$58.85 million and, for Fiscal Year 1969, \$120.81 million. These costs are in addition to the previously agreed military assistance of \$60 million annually.

We have completed delivery of virtually all of the equipment requisitioned for the first increment of the Thai "light division." Equipment deliveries have been running 10 days to 2 months ahead of schedule. The training facilities will be completed by the target date of April 15th. Training of the first increment of 5,000 men is now in process and the training schedule will not be delayed by either equipment or facilities. The first dispatch of Thai troops is scheduled for July of this year and the remaining troops will be sent by January 1969. General Westmoreland and the Commander of US Forces, Thailand have determined that the present state of the training of the Thai forces prevents acceleration of this deployment schedule. This conclusion was confirmed by the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Details of our support are attached. (Attachment B)

We are on or ahead of schedule and will remain so.

c. Additional South Vietnamese Forces

We have no specific commitment to furnish equipment or other assistance in return for additional South Vietnamese forces. Because they are fighting for their own country, no quid pro quo arrangement has been considered. General Westmoreland has, however, requested certain items of equipment and ammunition supplies to permit mobilization of additional South Vietnamese forces and to improve the effectiveness of existing units. For example, 108,710 M-16 rifles and nine other items were requested on November 21, 1967 for delivery by September 30, 1968. Since the Tet offensive, an additional 268,000 M-16 rifles have been requested for Regional Force/Popular Force units. Half of the regular ARVN maneuver battalions are now equipped with M-16s and we believe it will be possible to equip the rest of their maneuver battalions by the end of August. By the end of the year, the high priority RF/PF units should be equipped with M-16s.

An additional 115,000 trained personnel are needed in order to reach the strength of 685,739 authorized for the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam by June 1, 1968. General Westmoreland believes that these can be obtained by recovering 40,000 trained personnel currently in reserve, prisoner or absent-from-duty status, and by training an additional 75,000 recruits. President Thieu has mentioned possible increases ranging from 65,000 to 125,000. General Westmoreland estimates that a total RVNAF strength of 751,739 can be reached by December 31 of this year. This would mean 66,000 recruits in addition to the 75,000 anticipated by June.

The ability to equip these additional South Vietnamese forces and to modernize existing forces will be affected by any decision to deploy additional US troops to Vietnam. Details on RVNAF modernization plans are attached. (Attachment C)

As an inducement for the dispatch of additional Korean Troops to Vietnam and to counter increased North Korean activities in the Republic of Korea, the U. S. has agreed to provide \$32 million in counterinfiltration equipment for Korean forces in Korea.

This equipment is being provided by the U. S. military services as a Vietnam "related" cost. Equipment is apportioned to ROK forces as follows:

Status

U.S. Personnel:

SecDef has approved 764 personnel for USARSUPTHAI and 22 for MACTHAI to train the Thai force. Personnel are scheduled to arrive by 31 March 1968. In the interim, TDY personnel are being provided from theater assets.

TOE Equipment:

Action has been completed on 779 of the 787 requisitions received in CONUS for the first increment of the division. Equipment required by 8 January arrived on 29 December; that required by 22 January arrived on 4 January, and that required by 19 March arrived on 13 January. Training schedule will not be delayed for want of necessary equipment.

Construction of Training Facilities: Work has begun on all necessary facilities. • Deadline date of 15 April will be met.

Funding Actions:

All funding requirements were approved by SecDef or DA, as appropriate, in January, except for certain related budgetary expenses, a memorandum on which has been submitted requesting SecDef approval. His decision is expected by 15 March.

Increase in MAP:

FY68 \$15 million add-on has been approved; item content currently being reviewed by OASD(ISA). SecDef memo should be ready for submission by 22 March. FY69 \$15 million add-on has been included in FY69 DOD budget; however, Embassy Bangkok has indicated revision will be submitted in April.

HAWK Battery:

Memorandum is being prepared requesting SecDef approval of what HAWK equipment should be provided at no cost to Thai MAP. Will be submitted by 13 March. Meanwhile, the RTG has taken virtually no action regarding preparations to receive battery. Deployment date for battery is tentatively set for 1 September.

FACT SHEET

Subject: RVNAF Modernization Status

Background: On 21 November 1967, General Westmoreland asked for certain items of equipment and ammunition supplies which he regarded as necessary to, increase rapidly the effectiveness of RVNAF. The requested "10 Items" and delivery dates to accelerate the modernization of RVNAF firepower, mobility and communications are:

M16 Rifles - 108,710 by 30 Sep 1968
M79 Grenade launchers - 4,183 by 30 June 1968
M60 Machine guns - 2,489 between June and Dec 1968
M29 Mortars (81 mm) - 824 by 31 Dec 1968
M101 Howitzers (105 mm) - 108 by 31 Dec 1968
M114 Howitzers (155 mm) - 72 by 31 Dec 1968
M606 Trucks (1/4T) - 200 by 30 June 1968
M602 Trucks (2-1/2T) - 1,702 by 30 June 1968
PRC-25 Radios - 6,000 by 30 June 1968
Ammunition Allocations - 105 mm H.E. 1,577,000
RDS/Fuses by 31 Dec 1968

In December 1967, General Westmoreland requested equipment and funds to expand the ARVN Airborne Division from eight to nine-battalions, plus necessary combat and support troops. This expansion is to provide a balanced division capable of sustained, combined operations. Equipment for this expansion includes critical M60 machine guns, M79 grenade launchers, M29 mortars, plus signal and vehicle items.

In early February during the enemy TET offensive, General Westmoreland stated that RVNAF required additional help. He recommended acceleration of issue to ARVN units of M16 rifles, M60 machine guns, M29 mortars, plus the new requirement of 234 M113 armored personnel carriers and 27 H34 helicopters.

On 28 February, General Westmoreland again stated the importance of equipping RVNAF promptly with modern weaponry - particularly the Ml6, M60, M79, M29 and the M72 light anti-tank weapons (LAW). This message also contained requirements for an additional 11,200 M79 grenade launchers and 268,000 Ml6 rifles for RF/PF units, and because of the appearance of enemy armor requested 10,000 M72 (LAW) 66 mm HEAT rockets.

Present Status: The status of the original "10 Items" of the November package is:

M29 Mortars - 25 airlifted 4 Feb; 176 shipped 8 Mar; 49 available 6 Mar; 549 deferred pending further decision on Reserve call-up. M72 LAW - 10,000 airlifted 27 Feb. M113 APC's - 29 airlifted 15 Feb 50 sealifted 26 Feb (ETA 25 Mar) 64 sealifted 25 Feb 143 (ETA 27 Mar) H34 helicopters - 14 USMC airlifted 24 Feb 12 USA airlifted 8 Mar 4 available now

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The U.S. Army in Vietnam has been authorized to allocate 105 mm artillery ammunition to RVNAF as needs demand.

There is a direct relationship between the speed with which RVNAF is modernized and the number of US units activated and/or deployed to SVN. US activations and deployments probably will not affect the status of the "10 Items" package, but may affect the provision of additional M-16 rifles and M-79 grenade launchers for RF/PF unless we add to our procurement and production capacity.
