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NOTES ON PRESIDENT'S TUESDAY LUNCHEON OCTOBER 22, 1968

Secretary Rusk: We ought to put a medal on George Christian and Bob McCloskey for the way they have handled the last few days.

The President: (Read proposed cable to Bunker and Abrams). Insert A.

I want to know what the military view is of this -- the military effects and morale.

I want to know if Abrams thinks we should stop the bombing.

How much can we tell the South Vietnamese?

Secretary Rusk: The first day -- A. Bombing. B. Meeting.

Walt Rostow: The orders will have to go out twenty-four hours before.

General Wheeler: 9:00 a.m. Saigon time Saturday.

Secretary Rusk: Yes.

General Wheeler: Should we refer to reconnaissance?

The President: Yes.

Walt Rostow: Reconnaissance will continue.

The President: When would we announce?

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By isp. NARA. Date 5-19-89

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Secretary Rusk: It would be a joint announcement between you and Thieu.

(Statement, Insert B)

9:00 p.m. Friday, 9:30 Television Statement. Thieu will go on too.

The President: When do we stop?

Secretary Rusk: Noon our time Friday.

George Christian: It will leak Friday afternoon.

Secretary Rusk: Are the fellows out of North Vietnam?

General Wheeler: They are on their way.

Secretary Clifford: The actual date of the meeting should be in the message.

<u>Walt Rostow</u>: Would Thieu approve announcing having the GVN Representative at the meeting -- Bunker should ask him.

The President: Nixon will ask me if this isn't like putting a fox in the chicken coop. (Laughter)

Secretary Clifford: It seems Thieu gains enormously to have the GVN at the Table.

The President: We do, in effect, recognize them by letting them sit down with us.

Secretary Rusk: It's about like letting Stokely Carmichael sit at Cabinet meeting.

Secretary Clifford: It still seems like greater benefit than detriment.

The President: Factually, that's correct.

Secretary Rusk: Emotionally, that's not correct.

<u>Walt Rostow</u>: The South Vietnamese are afraid of how we play them in Conference -- push them toward accepting a slippery slope -- jam into coalition government.

<u>CIA Director Helms</u>: In the local draft board in New York there is a sworn statement by Aristotle Onassis that he was born in 1900 -- making him 68-not 62 as now published.

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Secretary Rusk: Arias left the Canal Zone. We now can hold up on recognition of the government. We recommend that the USA now recognize Peru, if you approve.

The President: What does that do?

Secretary Rusk: Colonels have it in Brazil and Argentina.

The President: What if we didn't recognize Peru?

Secretary Rusk: It would complicate ourselves. But we have recognized 50 countries where coup d'etats have taken place.

Secretary Rusk: We are denied AID for Peru.

<u>CIA Director Helms</u>: Sugar quota would fall off once the Hickenlooper Amendment takes over.

Secretary Rusk: We don't get anywhere by not recognizing them. This is the 62nd Coup I've lived through since I've been Secretary of State and Dick Helms did not cause a one of them -- contrary to popular belief.

We can't impose our will over other countries. They will conduct elections in Peru.

We went two years without a coup in Latin America.

The President: Are we agreed on the language of the announcement?

Secretary Rusk: We do not want to negotiate a joint statement.

We should reserve question of timing.

The President: Do you feel the same way?

Secretary Clifford: Yes.

Walt Rostow: The GVN has gone to work soberly. We should make a checkout with Bunker.

Secretary Rusk: This is a little like Warsaw plan. If they see they can get a week out of us they will hold out.

The President: You should see Dobrynin as soonas you can. (Secretary Rusk)

The President: Let's leave it there until this is started.

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General Wheeler: We can do it for 6 or 7 days.

The President: I said we were very disturbed about introduction of nuclear weapons. I left it there. He taked 30 minutes straight.

C. PERU:

The President: Recognize him as soon as you want to.

D. PANAMA

The President: Okay on that, holding off for a while.

E. EXERCISE WITH SOUTH KOREANS

The President: Let's let Nixon and Vice President Humphrey do this.

General Wheeler: We need to do this. The main body won't move before November 14.

F. BLACK MISSION

The President: If there is any chance let him go.

Secretary Rusk: Let's hold off.

The President: Okay.

G. PEACEFUL NUCLEAR EXPLOSION

The President: Let's hold off.

H. WIVES IN SAIGON:

Secretary Rusk: We need this.

General Wheeler: No military dependents in Saigon.

The President: Let's don't do it now.

I. SPANISH BASES:

Secretary Rusk: We agreed to base agreement. General Wheeler can have talks with top Spanish Military. Perhaps we can extend agreement for seven years.
