# Inclement Weather Arrival Ceremony of His Excellency Leopold Sedar Senghor, President of the Republic of Senegal

#### Wednesday, September 28, 1966

Members of the Welcoming Committee are requested to arrive at the Southwest Gate of the White House by 11:20 a.m. They will be directed to the Diplomatic Entrance and upstairs to the foyer on the first floor. At 11:30 a.m., members of the Welcoming Committee will take their places on the North Portico. Under Secretary Ball and General Wheeler will wait at the front steps.

At 11:35 a.m., President Johnson will arrive at the steps at the North Portico to await the arrival of President Senghor.

The President of the Republic of Senegal and his party will arrive at the North Portico of the White House, by way of the Northwest Gate, at 11:40 a.m. Ambassador Symington will present President Senghor to President Johnson. Ambassador Symington will then present Under Secretary Ball and General Wheeler to President Senghor. During the greetings, other members of the party will be escorted to their places on the North Portico.

Upon completion of the greetings, President Johnson and President Senghor will take their places on the red carpet. The band will play four ruffles and flourishes, followed by the national anthems of the Republic of Senegal and the United States. At the completion of the anthems, President Johnson and President Senghor will move to the microphones, where President Johnson will welcome President Senghor to the United States. President Senghor will respond. (The remarks will be interpreted.) Following the remarks, President Johnson and President Senghor, accompanied by Under Secretary Ball and General Wneeler, will move inside where they will receive the members of the Senegalese party and the Welcoming Committee.

Upon conclusion of the greetings, President Johnson will escort President Senghor to his office in the Wnite House. Others attending the meeting will follow.

Members of President Senghor's party not attending the meeting will leave from the North Portico by automobile and proceed to Blair House.

Members of the Welcoming Committee will leave from the Diplomatic Entrance (South Portico).

It is not necessary to play the anthems at strictly social functions or at formal luncheons and dinners as frequently awkward situations and inconveniences are created. not the custom in Washington to play national anthems at State dinners. When the anthems are played, it is customary to play the anthem of the United States second.

#### Flags

When the flags of the United States and the Republic of Senegal are used, consider the area where the flags are to be placed as a stage or focal point, then place the flag of the United States on the left as viewed from the audience, and the flag of the Republic of Senegal on the right.

Protocol September 13, 1966 A serious and successful statesman, the Father of his Country, a gifted poet and essayist, President Leopold Sedar Senghor is one of the distinguished men of our time.

President Senghor was born on October 9, 1906, in the coastal town of Joal, near Dakar, one of 20 children of a Senegalese planter. Following early education in Senegal, he won a scholar-ship to the Lycée Louis le Grand in Paris, and later attended the Ecole Normale Superieure of the University of Paris where he studied literature and languages. He received the degree of agrégé de grammaire in 1935, one of the first Africans from south of the Sahara to attain that distinction. He taught in French schools until the beginning of World War II in 1940. During the Nazi occupation, he was a prisoner of war, an experience that inspired some of his finest poetry.

After the war, President Senghor began his remarkable political career. Along with Lamine Gueye, he was elected to the French Constituent Assemblies of 1945 and 1946. In 1948 he founded the Bloc Démocratique Sénégalais political party and began to develop the popular support that has kept him in the forefront of Senegalese and East African politics since that time. From 1951 to 1959 he held a seat in the French National Assembly, serving as Secretary of State for Scientific Research from 1955 to 1956 in the Edgar Faure government.

On the eve of independence, recognizing the danger of what he called the "Balkanization" of former French West Africa, President Senghor attempted to unite Senegal and the French Sudan in the Mali Federation. The Federation enjoyed only a short existence, however, and following its dissolution in August 1960, Leopold Sedar Senghor was elected President of Senegal. President Johnson, then Vice President, represented the United States at the independence ceremonies in April 1961.

As a firm believer in the necessity for closer cooperation among African states, President Senghor has led Senegal into the Organization of African Unity and the Common Organization of Africa and Malagasy States. He is also a sponsor of the fournation group--Senegal, Mali, Mauritania, Guinea--now planning joint development of the Senegal River Basin.

In addition to his prestige as a statesman, President Senghor has achieved fame as a poet and essayist. To date, he has published seven books of verse, written numerous prefaces to introduce young Negro poets to the public, and translated into French selected poetry of T. S. Eliot, Langston Hughes and James Weldon Johnson, to name a few. He is also the author of numerous essays and articles including On African Socialism (New York, Praeger, 1964) and Pierre Teilhard de Chardin et la Politique Africaine (Paris, Senil, 1961). President Senghor was also the moving force behind the First World Festival of Negro Arts, held in Dakar in April 1965.

President Senghor speaks French and reads English easily, though he seldom speaks it. He is married and has three sons.

Born on February 3, 1926, at Bambey in the Diourbel district, Mr. Thiam is a member of the Wolof tribe. graduating from Dakar's Lycee Van Vollenhoven, he studied at the law faculties of the universities of Paris and Poitiers, earning a doctorate of law. While in France, he received the Laureat de la Faculte de Droit (1946), a scholarship from the city of Paris and first prize for his thesis at Poitiers. He entered politics on his return to Senegal in 1951 and was elected to the Territorial Assembly in 1952. Mr. Thiam was a member of the Grand Council of French West Africa (1957-59), and of the Mali Federal Assembly. Elected to the Legislative Assembly, he served as Minister of Finance, Economic Affairs and Planning in the federal Cabinet from August 1959 until the dissolution of the Mali Federation in August 1960. Since then, Mr. Thiam has been Minister of Foreign Affairs with the exception of one month during the 1962 political crisis when he yielded the Foreign Affairs portfolio to Andre Guillabert and received the Justice portfolio. now bears the official titles of Minister of State in Charge of Foreign Affairs and Parliamentary Liaison and Deputy President.

Mr. Thiam has led Senegal's delegations to the United Nations General Assembly since 1959. He has attended numerous conferences of the United Nation's economic bodies and economic conference of French-speaking Africa. He has been especially active at meetings of the African and Malagasy Common Organization (OCAM) and of its predecessor organizations. He went to Warsaw in September 1964 to the congress of the World Federation of Twin Cities and was re-elected its president. In November 1965, he traveled to the United States to receive an honorary doctor of laws degree from St. John's University of New York.

## HIS EXCELLENCY JEAN BAPTISTE COLLIN MINISTER OF FINANCE

A Frenchman who elected Senegalese citizenship, Jean Collin is now the Minister of Finance. He was born on September 19, 1924 in Paris. In addition to a law degree and a certificate from a school of languages, Mr. Collin completed a course at the Ecole Nationale de la France d'Outre Mer. He served in Cameroon from March 1946 to April 1947, returned briefly to work in the Ministry of Overseas France, and then went to Senegal, where he became Director of Information of Radio Dakar in 1948. In 1949-1950, he was back in Paris in the Ministry of Overseas France. Mr. Collin then returned to Cameroon as an administrator until May 1957, when he went to Senegal to serve as Cabinet Director for the President of the Governing Council of Senegal.

In subsequent years Mr. Collin served twice as Governor of the Cap Vert region, as Secretary General of the Senegalese Government and, from May 1963 to February 8, 1964, as Secretary General of the Presidency. On the latter date, he was named Minister of Finance.

Mr. Collin is married to a niece of President Senghor and has two children.

### HIS EXCELLENCY HABIB THIAM MINISTER OF PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

A member of a large and distinguished family, Habib Thiam was born on January 21, 1933, at Dakar. He attended the Lycee Van Vollenhoven and then went to France to continue his studies. He received a baccalaureate in liberal arts and philosophy from the College Jules Ferry, studied for a time at the Lycee Louis le Grand in Paris, and graduated from the Ecole Nationale de la France d'Outre-Mer in 1960. He had also received a law degree in 1959. Mr. Thiam gained valuable experience in France by working at the French Finance Ministry, the Bank of France, the French Exchange Office and the General Commissariat of the French Plan. On his return to Senegal, Mr. Thiam served in the post-independence Government as Director of Cabinet in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and, later, in the Ministry of Justice.

Since December 1962, he has directed Senegal's economic development. At that time President Senghor appointed him Secretary of State in charge of Planning and Development, and he became Minister of Planning and Development in 1963. He is married to a French woman and has children. He is no relation to Foreign Minister Doudou Thiam.

HIS EXCELLENCY OUSMANE SOCE DIOP
AMBASSADOR TO THE UNITED STATES
AND PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE TO THE UNITED NATIONS

Ousmane Soce Diop has been Senegal's only Ambassador to the United States. He presented his credentials to President Eisenhower on December 9, 1960, less than a month after his credentials were accepted at the United Nations. He is also accredited to Argentina, Brazil, Mexico, Haiti, Trinidad, Canada and Japan.

Ambassador Diop was born at Rufisque on October 30, 1911. He attended the Lycee at Dakar and the Ecole Veterinaire d'Alfort in Paris. He also studied philology at the Sorbonne. For a short time after graduation, he served as a veterinary inspector in Senegal. From 1945 to 1952, Ambassador Diop was a Senator from Senegal and was Secretary of the Council of the French Republic from 1946 until 1948. Ambassador Diop was elected to the Territorial Council at Dakar in March 1957. He became a Senegalese Progressive Union (UPS) Deputy to the Constitutive Assembly in November 1957, and was re-elected to the Legislative Assembly in March 1959. From June 1958 until April 1959, he was Minister of Planning. He was Senegal's representative to the Senate of the French Community (April 1959 – January 1961) and Deputy Secretary General of the UPS (February 1959 – July 1960).

The Ambassador has published novels, poems and short stories, usually under the pen name Ousmane Soce. He once edited the UPS newspaper, Regroupment, and in 1961 edited Bingo, an African photo magazine. He is married and has one son.

BRIGADIER GENERAL JEAN ALFRED DIALLO COMMANDER IN CHIEF AND CHIEF OF STAFF OF THE ARMED FORCES OF SENEGAL

Brigadier General Jean Alfred Diallo was born at Tivaouane on September 16, 1911. After completing his secondary studies at the Lycee Faidherbe at Saint Louis, he joined the French Army's 5th Engineer Regiment at Versailles at the age of 18. He remained with the Regiment until the beginning of World War II, then served in an engineer company until the fall of France. He participated in the Tunisian campaign and was promoted to Second Lieutenant. General Diallo took part in the campaigns in France and Germany. In 1945, he was promoted to First Lieutenant and placed in command of a quartermaster company in the army of occupation in Germany. As a Captain in 1951, he directed construction work at the Tourane Base in French Indo-China. He returned to France in 1954.

After two years, he went to Senegal as commanding officer of an engineer company at Bargny. In January 1961, he became commander of the 1st Battalion of the Engineers and Commandant of the Military Region of Cap Vert. In April 1961, he was promoted to Battalion Commander in the French Army and in June was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel by the Government of Senegal. He transferred officially to the Senegalese Army in October 1961, at which time he opted for Senegalese citizenship.

During the Cabinet crisis of December 1962 when Mamadou Dia attempted to seize control of the Government, General Diallo played a crucial role in determining the outcome of the Dia-Senghor struggle. As a result, he was made Commander in Chief and Chief of Staff of the Armed Forces of Senegal on December 17, 1962. He was promoted to Colonel in 1963 and to Brigadier General in January 1965.

General Diallo is an officer of the Legion of Honor and has been decorated by his own and other governments. He has a French wife and seven children.

Presently Senegal's Ambassador to Liberia and Sierra Leone, Andre-Jean Coulbary entered the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1961. After serving two years as Counselor of the Senegalese Embassy in London, he was named Chief of Protocol in the Foreign Ministry (with rank of Minister Plenipotentiary) and served in that capacity from January 1963 to June 1965, when he was appointed to his present position. The Government of Senegal recently decided to close its mission in Monrovia and Ambassador Coulbary's next assignment has not been announced.

The son of one of Senegal's first African doctors and a former President of the Senegalese Red Cross, Ambassador Coulbary was born on September 25, 1937, at Dakar. Having completed his primary and secondary school education at Dakar's Lycee Van Vollenhoven, young Andre-Jean Coulbary studied English at the University of Dakar. During the 1958-59 school year, he taught in Liverpool as one of the first three French Language Assistants sent to England from Dakar University. Upon returning to Dakar, and until he entered the diplomatic service in 1961, he taught English at the Lycee Blaise Diagne and, additionally during part of that time, directed the English-language news broadcasts of Radio Senegal.

During his tour at the Senegalese Embassy in London, Ambassador Coulbary visited most Western European countries. He has participated in a number of international conferences, most notably the Vienna Conference on diplomatic relations and immunities. He is fluent in English, speaks good Italian, Spanish, fair Portuguese and has studied some Russian.

Ambassador Coulbary is Roman Catholic. His wife, a Gambian, is a cousin of the wife of Prime Minister Jawara of The Gambia. They have one child.

MR. JOSEPH MATHIAM
DEPUTY, NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

Joseph Mathiam is a Deputy in the National Assembly, representing the Casamance, a region geographically isolated from Dakar and the rest of Senegal by The Gambia, and known for its sectionalism. He is Secretary of the Assembly's Committee on Finance, Economic Affairs and Planning. He is also a member of the Assembly's Committee on Legislation and Justice.

Mr. Mathiam was born at Elinkine in the Casamance in February 1933. His academic training includes secondary studies in Mali and Senegal, sociology studies at the University of Dakar and graduate training in law and economics at Paris. From 1959 until 1960, Mr. Mathiam was Director of Information in the Government of Senegal, a technical advisor in the Ministry of Development from 1960 until 1961, served on the Planning Commission during 1961 and 1962, and was elected to his current position in 1963.

Mr. Mathiam has written several articles for African and European publications. He has been editor of the magazine <a href="Tam-Tam">Tam-Tam</a> and a correspondent for Afrique Nouvelle.

## MR. CHRISTIAN VALANTIN DIRECTOR OF CABINET TO THE PRESIDENT

Christian Valantin has been Director of Cabinet to President Leopold Senghor since January 1, 1966. Since his appointment, he has traveled frequently with the President, accompanying him to Nigeria and to Cameroon in February.

Christian Valantin was born on April 13, 1929, at Saint Louis. After his secondary studies were completed at the Lycee Faidherbe at Saint Louis, Mr. Valantin went on to receive a Bachelor's Degree in secondary education in 1949, a <u>licence</u> in law in 1955 from the University of Paris, a diploma of higher studies in 1957 and, in 1959, a certificate from the Ecole Nationale de la France d'Outre-mer. His education completed, Mr. Valantin became Senghor's Chief of Cabinet while Senghor was President of the Federal Assembly of the Mali Federation (the short-lived union of Mali and Senegal which dissolved in August 1960). Mr. Valantin, in 1960, took over the direction of the Cabinet of the Minister of Planning and Development. From 1961 until 1962, he was Governor of the region of Thies, and from 1962 until 1965 was General Director of the Agricultural Marketing Office.

Mr. Valantin is married and is the father of one son.

Dear Harry:

President Senghor of Senegal recently wrote to me that he will be visiting the United States to see President Johnson. I have known Leopold Senghor for some time and regard him as a friend.

There are certain facts that I would like to relate to the member of the White House staff preparing the basic briefing for the President on President Senghor. These facts could be helpful in assuring that the visit is a satisfactory one from the standpoint of President Johnson. There are also several suggestions that I would like to make.

You may also be interested in learning that when I visited President Senghor in June 1961, he confided in me that he would like to visit the United States. It was not possible for the White House or the Department to extend any kind of invitation and we were able to set up a visit of suitable dignity for a head of state by having Fordham University hold a special convocation where President Senghor received his first LL.D. degree. The University arranged all details of the convocation and covered all expenses.

We also arranged functions here in New York City and the expenses were all underwritten by several private individuals. Since then, the several individuals have maintained close contact with President Senghor. Most recently I spoke to the Holy See about the expenses Senegal incurred for the First International Negro Art Festival and Pope Paul sent a contribution of \$5,000. We spoke to the Union of Christian Democratic Parties and expect a contribution of greater proportion to President Senghor's Festival Fund.

I would like to suggest that consideration be given to inviting to the White House luncheon for President Senghor, the several individuals who have made this assistance to President Senghor possible. They are:
