I have just received a telephone call from Barbara Sylvester, South Carolina Vice Chairman for Womens Activities, with reference to the failure of the train to stop at Yemassee, S. C., en route from Charleston to Savannah yesterday morning. This was the place Tom Chadwick told Moran there would be approximately 1,000 people from that southern edge of South Carolina gathered to see Mrs. Johnson. This involved dismissal of the schools, motorcades from adjoining towns, and as it turned out there were approximately 900 to 1,000 standing there as the train rolled through with no sign of Mrs. Johnson. I do understand that it slowed down and the Johnson girls were on the platform, but you and I know that this does not quite fill the bill. Barbara told me this afternoon that if a letter could be sent to the following people it would take a lot of the sting out of the failure of the train to stop, particularly if it were written so as to merit publication in the local gazettes:

Here is a list of contacts in Mississippi who may help "manufacture" instant people. I apologize for the skimpiness of address and telephone information, however we haven't yet been able to locate our Miss. directories or our own personal address books- they are someplace in this collection of unopened boxes. We tried about nine boxes last night and couldn't find the right one, since I had failed to itemize our book boxes. Here's the list, I hope it will be of some assistance,

Carl Wiesenbergs- Pascagoula, Miss. (on coast); former member of Miss. legislature; author of the pamphlet The Price of Defiance concerning the folly of resistance to federal court orders- definitely a liberal. [We never met him but Ed corresponded with him.]

Father Bernard Law- The Chancery, E. Amite St. Jackson Miss.
Editor of the Miss. Register, state-wide Catholic newspaper. Close personal friend of ours, Father Law is a member of the Miss. Council on Human Relations, the Jackson Inter-faith Group, has many contacts throughout the state and could call upon priests and parishes on the coastal area.

Father McGeogh- The Chancery, E. Amite St. Jackson, Miss.; administrative assistant to the Bishop of Miss. His Excell. Bishop Gerow; also close personal friend and member of the above listed organizations.

* Mrs. Gordon (Marianne) Henderson, Jackson, Miss. Pres. of Mississippians for Public Education, (a state-wide organization composed mainly of women but with male affiliates in several cities) a group formed with the avowed purpose of keeping the Miss. public schools open and integrated in a peaceful manner. The group has a chapter, perhaps even two on the coast and is composed of moderates and liberals. Membership at the time of our departure from the state, I believe was somewhere near 1000. Ed is attorney for the Hendersons, and was attorney "under-cover" for the group. Mr. Henderson is chairman of the Pol. Science Dept. at Millsaps College in Jackson.

* if unable to reach Mrs. Henderson contact Mrs. Pat Derian, Jackson, Miss. publicity chairman or Mrs. Winifred Falls in Biloxi, Miss.

Claude Ramsey- Either Gulfport, Biloxi or Pascagoula, Miss. - State Chairman of the AFL-CIO. (Sorry the address isn't more specific however presumably any of the locals in either of the three cities could supply his telephone contact. Claude is pretty much of a liberal however often sounds like a moderate, probably because a complete and open liberal would bring even greater wrath and fury upon the union than that which has already been "delivered". Would he doubt be willing to cooperate.

Mrs. Burnette Hennington- Jackson, Miss. President of the Miss. Business and Professional Womens Assoc.; a realtor and generally well-known in women's groups. The President appointed Mrs. Hennington recently to (I believe) a Water Control and Pollution Board;

Mrs. B. Hennington- a contact of ours, called us prior to the President's appointment of Mrs. Hennington and asked ^{us} to check on her for the White House. We had a tough time getting any kind of line on her politics but we did find out that she did not belong at the time to any of the militantly segregationalist groups. We heard afterwards that she was quite pleased with her appointment- the local papers gave it quite a write-up. I should think that she could probably be called upon to produce some people from the local BPWs on the coast.

Also it might be a good idea to contact Bob Moses, State Director of COFO, and of course Aaron Henry- NAACP State Chairman as well as Edwin King-c/o Tougaloo College. In addition if your advance man in Miss. has time he might call the Rectors of the Episcopal Churches in Gulfport, Biloxi and Pascagoula, some of them may be able to call on members of the congregations to turn out. Catholics, Jews and Episcopalians are about the most "forward-thinking" groups (faithwise) in the state.

Mrs. Jean Butler- Jackson, Miss. Wife of the Senior Partner of the law firm of Snow, O'Mara, Butler etc. Jean is a grand and wild liberal by Miss. standards, and old member of the Jackson community with very extensive connections in the state and a real live wire, information-wise. She is in a great many organizations and I am certain would be happy to help out.

Mayor of Gulfport - (know from Mrs. Boyer that there has contact made with mayors by letter - just thought I'd mention that he seems to be pretty moderate in his thinking and actions and may well be a Johnson supporter

Haven't listed (except C. Wiesenbergs) any of the politicians as I presume you already have them on your list. Hope the trip is most successful. If we can be of assistance in any other way let us know- (Cross burners supplied if needed)

Memorandum for Bess Abell:

Enclosed are a few odds and ends that I found in my dispatch case when I got back to Washington which I should have turned over to you on the train but forgot all about in the pleasure of being in your lovely company!

One is a letter from the Postal Union in Columbia, S. C., who were scared to do anything openly in view of the situation in the State but not scared to sign the letter. Secondly, there is a memorandum from our 22-year old Young Dem Coordinator, Kitty Watson, that I asked her to fix for me bestowing upon Mrs. Johnson membership in the South Carolina Teen Dem Clubs. I might add that they were responsible for at least 50% of the crowd you saw in both Columbia and Charleston.

In the year of 1722, Bernard de la Harpe sailed up the Arkansas River under the direction of the Duc d'Orleans, searching for a "big rock" which was supposedly pure emerald. The band of 45 weary voyagers found only a "petite roche," or a little rock of ordinary limestone.

Sick of malaria and disheartened at not finding riches and fame at this point in their voyage up the Mississippi and Arkansas Rivers, the explorers pitched their camp on a spot which now stands only a few yards from the busy, progressive city of Little Rock. The original "Little Rock", for which the city is named, can still be seen on the bank of the Arkansas River.

La Harpe remarked that here was a good place to build a city -- at the dividing point between the flatlands to the Southeast and the mountains to the Northwest. The early pioneer was right. Today over a quarter-million persons live in the Metropolitan Area.

After la Harpe's landing at "La Petite Roche", this part of the country passed back and forth several times from the French to the Spaniards. Arkansas became an American Territory in 1819. Little Rock flourished and became the territorial capital.

Today, executives of industries seeking possible sites for their plants in Little Rock are pleased to discover that the town grew up in a civic way before it began growing up industrially.

This fact has been manifested in many ways. Among them are the 250-

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odd churches that teach all faiths and denominations, thirty-five hospitals and rest homes that have approximately 5,300 beds, and excellent public and parochial schools. Also located in Little Rock are: Little Rock University; the new 18 million dollar University of Arkansas Medical Center which houses the U of A Schools of Medicine, Pharmacy and Nursing; and the University of Arkansas Graduate Institute of Technology.

Little Rock is rapidly gaining a reputation as an "Ideal Convention City." An abundance of fine, first-class hotels and motels, outstanding restaurants, numerous scenic, recreational and historic attractions, and two of the finest public facilities of their kind, the Robinson Memorial Auditorium and the Barton Coliseum, all add up to the "Ideal" distinction.

The Robinson Auditorium is located in the heart of downtown Little Rock and annually features Broadway productions, concerts, convention sessions and countless other civic and cultural attractions. Downstairs, the Exhibition Hall is used for trade shows, weekly wrestling, large banquets and numerous dances throughout the year.

The Barton Coliseum is located on U. S. Highway 67-70, Southwest of Little Rock where most of the city's motel facilities are. The Coliseum is one of the finest, most up-to-date facilities of its kind in the United States and annually plays host to the Arkansas Livestock Show, rodeos, basketball games, horse shows, circuses, ice shows, trade shows, banquets and a variety of other functions. The Coliseum is completely air-conditioned and features free parking for as many as 7,000 automobiles.

Little Rock's marvelous climate is another factor which makes it an appealing convention or vacation site. Chamber of Commerce personnel proudly

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advertise the fact that the city has a comfortable 80.6 degree average summer temperature, with an annual mean temperature of 62.4 degrees. The city gets an average rainfall of 48 inches, and the sun shines 62 percent of each year. Relative humidity averages 66 percent throughout the year.

The business section of Little Rock is 286 feet above sea level, while the residential sections are slightly higher at 600 feet.

For the visitor with a yen for the outdoor aspects of Little Rock, the scenic beauty of the city and that which is within easy driving distance, would be hard to rival anywhere. The area surrounding Little Rock has scores of small streams and lakes and the plateau section is noted for many springs. Man-made lakes of major proportions have been created by the installation of dams at Norfolk, Bull Shoals, Blue Mountain, Nimrod, Catherine, Hamilton, Ouachita, Narrows, Maumelle, and Greers Ferry.

A Chief selling factor of the Little Rock area is the proximity of majestic woodlands which cover more than half the state. Arkansas, as a whole, outranks all others in number of fishable lakes and streams and its ricelands of the Grand Prairie are famed throughout the nation as one of the country's very best duck hunting regions.

Hot Springs National Park is a one-hours' drive from downtown Little Rock over a modern, scenic super highway. The famed thermal baths, the annual 43-day season of thoroughbred racing at Oaklawn Park, (Feb. 15 - April 4, 1964) and a large variety of outstanding restaurants and clubs which feature the nation's leading entertainment attractions are but a few reasons why Hot Springs is a mecca for tourists the year round.

Little Rock has an abundance of parks within its borders. Three municipal

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parks with a total of 1,000 acres feature a municipal zoo, swimming pools, golf courses, tennis courts, bridle paths, picnic and barbecue grounds, ball parks, and children's playground facilities.

The multi-million dollar Arkansas Arts Center and a museum of Natural History are both located in MacArthur Park. The birthplace of General Douglas MacArthur houses the history museum.

The community of Little Rock is proud of its long history and has taken steps to preserve as much of the past as possible. Heading the list of historical attractions that native Little Rock citizens show visitors is the group of buildings and grounds included in Arkansas' Territorial Restoration at Third and Cumberland Streets. It was in one of these buildings that the last Territorial Legislature met in October, 1835.

In their efforts to preserve the past, Little Rock citizens have restored these buildings to all their colonial simplicity. Even the hurricane lamps and the "petticoat mirrors" in the homes have been saved. "Junior's" diminutive cradle may be seen in its accustomed place, next to a massive, canopied, four-poster bed.

Also located in the group of buildings is the home of William Woodruff, the famous Little Rock newspaperman. Many years ago, Woodruff brought a "shirttail" full of type and a Washington handpress to Little Rock and founded the Arkansas Gazette. This is the oldest paper in continuous publication west of the Mississippi River. The print shop is still preserved intact, but Little Rock's two present-day dailies have taken over the task of supplying the news to Little Rock citizens.

Second of Little Rock's "Three State Capitols" is the Old State House,

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center of almost a century of Arkansas history and acclaimed as one of the finest examples of antebellum architecture in the South. Its restoration was completed in 1951.

From this building, state government fled when Little Rock was occupied by Union Forces in September of 1863. On the grounds, Yankee soldiers were photographed on dress parade and within the walls carpetbag rule once held sway.

The interior today conveys the dignity and beauty of the colonial era. Wide, arched hallways lead to the famed "twin spiral" stairs which spiral upward to second and third floors. Two light wells, the third elevation larger than the second, throw a gentle glow from outside the halls, down winding stairways, along four foot wainscoting, and on delicate hand-turned balustrades.

Another visiting spot for the tourist to Little Rock is the city's third state capitol ... the present capitol building. The building is a replica of the nation's capitol at Washington and was completed in 1916 at a cost of \$5 million.

Adding to the charm of the structure is the forty-two acres of beautifully landscaped grounds that form a high knoll overlooking the city. Around Christmas time, when elaborate decorations are installed, the Capitol presents an inspiring sight and requests have been received from all over the country for photographs.

For the motion picture fan, Little Rock has a total of 25 theaters, seven of them drive-ins. There are also skating rinks, bowling alleys, miniature golf courses and driving ranges, night clubs, fine restaurants (including those specializing in Mexican, Italian and Chinese foods) and six country clubs are conveniently located.

Little Rock's two excellent, top-rung newspapers, the Arkansas Gazette in the morning and the Arkansas Democrat in the evening, are daily publications which enjoy a combined readership of approximately 200,000. The Memphis Commercial Appeal also maintains an office in Little Rock as do the major wire services Associated Press and United Press International.

Three top-flight television channels, representing all three major networks provide network shows, excellent local programming and way above average news and public affairs coverage of local, state and national events. Eight radio stations give Little Rock citizens more than adequate coverage from that medium.

Little Rock is served by excellent transportation facilities. Trunk line and trans-continental service is furnished by American Airlines, Braniff International Airways and Delta Airlines. Local feeder service is supplied by Trans-Texas Airways and Central Airlines. At the present time there are 35 flights daily in all directions.

Three trunk line railroads, Missouri Pacific, Rock Island and Cotton Belt, operate in and out of Little Rock daily. Fast, dependable passenger service is offered by Missouri Pacific and Rock Island over twelve directional routes. Eight bus lines offer motor coach service from Little Rock to all points. Transportation to all parts of Pulaski County - including Little Rock Air Force Base - is available at frequent intervals during the day. Modern U. S. Highways in every direction complete the transportation network which serves Little Rock and Central Arkansas.
