U.S. PROTESTS SHOOTING DOWN OF PLANE OVER EAST GERMANY

WASHINGTON, MARCH 11 - - - THE UNITED STATES MADE A "STRONG ORAL PROTEST"

TO THE SOVIET UNION TUESDAY NIGHT OVER THE SHOOTING DOWN TUESDAY OF AN AMERICAN

RB66 AIRCRAFT WHICH INADVERTENTLY CROSSED THE DEMARCATION LINE BETWEEN THE GERMAN

FEDERAL REPUBLIC AND EAST GERMANY.

STATE DEPARTMENT PRESS OFFICER RICHARD PHILLIPS SAID LATE TUESDAY THAT GEORGI M. KORNIENKO, SOVIET MINISTER COUNSELOR IN WASHINGTON, WAS CALLED IN BY THE DEPARTMENT TO RECEIVE THE PROTEST.

MR. PHILLIPS NOTED THAT THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT LATE TUESDAY SAID THERE WAS EVIDENCE THAT THE THREE CREW MEMBERS PARACHUTED FROM THE PLANE, AND THAT NOTHING MORE THAN THIS WAS KNOWN ABOUT THEIR FATE.

FOLLOWING THE SOVIET OFFICIAL'S CALL AT THE DEPARTMENT, MR. PHILLIPS READ NEWSMEN THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT:

IN THE ABSENCE OF THE SOVIET AMBASSADOR, WHO IS IN NEW YORK, MINISTER COUNSELOR GEORGI M. KORNIENKO WAS CALLED IN BY THE DEPARTMENT THIS EVENING AND AT 7:30 ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF STATE FOR EUROPEAN AFFAIRS, WILLIAM TYLER, DELIVERED A STRONG ORAL PROTEST TO HIM ON THE SHOOTING DOWN OF THE RB66 AIRCRAFT.

MR. TYLER PROTESTED THE PRECIPITOUS ACTION BY THE SOVIET MILITARY FORCES IN SHOOTING DOWN THE AMERICAN PLANE. HE ALSO EXPRESSED THEUNITED STATES GOVERNMENT'S REGRETS THAT THE PLANE BECAME LOST AND INADVERTENTLY CROSSED THE DEMARCATION LINE BETWEEN THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC AND EAST GERMANY AND HE CONVEYED THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT'S URGENT REQUEST THAT THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT INSTRUCT ITS AUTHORITIES

IN EAST GERMANY TO GIVE FULL COOPERATION TO EFFECT THE RETURN OF THE CREW AND THE WRECKAGE OF THE PLANE. (END STATEMENT)

LAST JANUARY 29, THE UNITED STATES PROTESTED TO THE SOVIET UNION IN THE "STRONGEST TERMS" THE SHOOTING DOWN OF AN UNARMED AMERICAN T-39 JET TRAINER AIRCRAFT OVER EAST GERMANY,

THE PLANE WAS LOST AND AFFORDED NO THREAT OF ANY SORT TO THE SOVIETS,"
THE STATE DEPARTMENT SAID AT THAT TIME. THREE U.S. AIR FORCE CREWMEN WERE
KILLED IN THAT INCIDENT.

ON JANUARY 30, THE STATE EPARTMENT DISPUTED A MCSCOW ALLEGATION THAT THE UNARMED JET TRAINER WAS ON AN ESPIONAGE MISSION. THE UNARMED PLANE WAS "CARRIED NO CAMERAS FOR ÆRIAL RECONNAISSANCE" AND WAS ON A TRAINING MISSION.

COOPERATION OF U.S. AND EUROPEAN CENTRAL BANKS STRENGTHENS FINANCIAL STRUCTURE

WASHINGTON, MARCH 11 - - - THE FACT THAT CENTRAL BANKS OF EUROPE AND AMERICA HAVE BEEN WORKING TOGETHER IN THE FOREIGN EXCHANGE MARKETS AND IN THE GOLD MARKET HAS IN ITSELF STRONGLY REINFORCED CONFIDENCE IN THE EXISTING INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL STRUCTURE.

THIS WAS THE MAIN POINT MADE IN A REPORT OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE, PREPARED BY CHARLES A. COOMBS, VICE PRESIDENT IN CHARGE OF THE FOREIGN DEPARTMENT OF THE NEW YORK RESERVE BANK AND PUBLISHED IN THE MARCH ISSUES OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE BULLETIN AND THE MONTHLY REVIEW OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK OF NEW YORK.

ONE EXAMPLE OF CENTRAL BANK COOPERATION IN STRENGTHENING THE INTERNATIONAL MONETARY SYSTEM IN GENERAL IS THE SYSTEM OF "SWAP" AGREEMENTS, NOW TOTALLING \$2,050 MILLION, WITH COUNTRIES OF WESTERN EUROPE. THESE AGREEMENTS PROVIDE STANDBY CREDITS AGAINST WHICH EITHER PARTY MAY DRAW IF NECESSARY TO SUPPORT THE PRICE OF ITS OWN CURRENCY ON FOREIGN EXCHANGE MARKETS.

ACCORDING TO THE REPORT, THE VERY EXISTENCE OF THIS CENTRAL BANK NETWORK WITH

ITS MUTUAL CREDIT FACILITIES "EXERTED A STRONGLY STABILIZING INFLUENCE ON THE

GOLD AND FOREIGN EXCHANGE MARKETS, WHICH REMAINED CALM IN THE FACE OF A NUMBER OF

POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DEVELOPMENTS."

THE MOST STRIKING EXAMPLE OF SUCH A DEVELOPMENT OCCURRED AT THE TIME OF THE ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT KENNEDY, WHEN THE FEDERAL RESERVE IMMEDIATELY INTERVENED IN THE NEW YORK MARKET, AND SWIFT TELEPHONE CONTACTS WERE MADE WITH THE MAJOR EUROPEAN BANKS FOR A JOINT PROGRAM OF INTERVENTION ON BOTH SIDES OF THE ATLANTIC TO FORESTALL ANY POSSIBLE SPECULATIVE DEVELOPMENTS HERE OR ABROAD.

STEPS TO BROADEN THE SWAP NETWORK SINCE AUGUST 1963 INCLUDED A \$150
MILLION SWAP ARRANGEMENT WITH THE BANK OF JAPAN, AN INCHEASE IN SWAP FACILITIES
WITH THE CENTRAL BANKS OF ITALY AND GERMANY FROM \$150 MILLION TO \$250 MILLION,
AND WITH THE SWISS NATIONAL BANK AND THE BANK FOR INTERNATIONAL SETTLEMENTS FROM
\$100 MILLION TO \$150 MILLION.

THE REPORT ALSO NAMED AS THE MOST IMPORTANT SINGLE DEVELOPMENT IN THE JULIAR STERLING RELATIONSHIP DURING THE PAST YEAR THE INCREASE IN THE SWAP LINE BETWEEN THE FEDERAL RESERVE AND THE BANK OF ENGLAND FROM \$50 MILLION TO \$500 MILLION, ANNOUNCED ON MAY 29. THE MAGNITUDE OF THIS INCREASE IN THE RECIPROCAL CREDIT ARRANGEMENTS HAS GREATLY REIFORCED MARKET CONFIDENCE IN THE STABILITY OF THE STERLING-DOLLAR PARITY," IT SAID.

THAT THE SWAPS CAN ALSO HELP OTHER COUNTRIES WAS SHOWN BY THE EPORT IN THE CASE OF ITALY. THE TREASURY AND THE FEDERAL RESERVE HAVE BEEN ACQUIRING LIRE TO BUTTRESS ITALY'S DOLLAR RESERVES. SOME OF THESE LIRE WERE USED THIS WEEK TO REPAY A DECEMBER 1962 TREASURY BORROWING FROM THE BANK OF ITALY.

THE REPORT SAID THAT THE VOLUME OF FOREIGN EXCHANGE OPERATIONS CONDUCTED FROM SEPTEMBER 1963 TO FEBRUARY 1964 BY THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK OF NEW YORK, AS AGENT FOR BOTH THE FEDERAL RESERVE AND THEU.S. TREASURY, EXPANDED STILL FURTHER.

"COMING AGAINST THE BACKGROUND OF A SHARP IMPROVEMENT IN THE U.S. BALANCE OF PAYMENTS, THIS INCREASE IN EXCHANGE OPERATIONS REFLECTED BOTH THE EBB AND FLOW OF INTERNATIONAL PAYMENTS, MARKED IN RECENT MONTHS BY SHARP SWINGS IN THE NET DOLLAR POSITION OF FOREIGN COUNTRIES, AND GREATER USE OF THE AVAILABLE FACILITIES BY FOREIGN CENTRAL BANKS," THE REPORT SAID.

ANOTHER DEVELOPMENT MENTIONED IN THE REPORT WAS THE U.S. DRAWING ON THE INTER-NATIONAL MONETARY FUND ON FEBRUARY 13. THIS DRAWING IN THE AMOUNT OF \$125 MILLION EQUIVALENT --MAINLY IN GERMAN MARKS AND FRENCH FRANCS- -WAS MADE UNDER THE \$500 MILLION STANDBY AGREEMENT WITH THE IMP ANNOUNCED BY PRESIDENT KENNEDY LAST JULY 18. WHILE THIS FIRST DRAWING UPON THE IMP BY THE U.S. WAS ESSENTIALLY OF A TECHNICAL NATURE, IT NEVERTHELESS DEMONSTRATED THAT THE RESOURCES OF THE IMP CAN BECALLED UPON BY BOTH LARGE AND SMALL COUNTRIES, NOT ONLY IN TIMES OF EMERGENCY BUT ALSO IN A MORE OR IESS ROUTINE WAY.

"THERE IS THUS EMERGING IN EVEN SHARPER FOCUS," THE FEDERAL RESERVE REPORT SAID, "A SPECTRUM OF MORE OR LESS FORMALIZED INTERNATIONAL CREDIT FACILITIES....
FURTHER DEVELOPMENT AND REFINEMENT OF SUCH MUTUAL CREDIT FACILITIES TO DEAL WITH PROBLEMS THAT MAY LIE AHEAD AFFORDS A MOST USEFUL MEANS FOR STRENGTHENING THE WORLD'S PAYMENTS SYSTEM."

THE EPORT ALSO CITED THE OFERATIONS IN THE LONDON GOLD MARKET, IN WHICH THE BANK OF ENGLAND ACTS AS OPERATING AGENT FOR A CONSORTIUM OF EIGHT CENTRAL BANKS COOPERATING TO STABILIZE THE MARKET.

THE MARKET WAS STABILIZED LAST YEAR BY PURCHASE OF MORE THAN \$600 MILLION
OF GOLD THROUGH THE BANK OF ENGLAND. THIS GOLD IS SHARED ACCORDING TO A PREVIOUSLY
AGREED FORMULA, WITH THE U.S. TAKING 50 PERCENT OF IT. THE GOLD WAS THUS ADJED
TO THE RESERVES BACKING THE VALUES OF THE CURRENCIES OF THE PARTICIPATING NATIONS.

THE GOLD POOL WAS SET UP IN 1961 MAINLY AS A MEANS TO SELL GOLD IN THE LONDON MARKET WHEN SUCH ACTION IS NEEDED TO STEM SPECULATE RISES IN GOLD PRICES.

NO SUCH OCCASION AROSE DURING 1963, HOWEVER, AS CONFIDENCE IN THE U.S. DOLLAR AND OTHER MAJOR TRADING CURRENCIES REMAINED HIGH. INSTEAD, THE POOL PURCHASED THE GOLD FROM THE MARKET AND DISTRIBUTED IT AMONG ITS MEMBERS. THE U.S. SHARE WAS OVER \$300 MILLION.

THE GOLD CAME FROM NEWLY - MINED SUPPLIES, WITH SOME ALSO FROM SOVIET SALES. THE REPORT NOTED THAT SOVIET SALES OF GOLD WERE SUBSTANTIAL IN 1963, #ESPECIALLY AFTER EARLY SEPTEMBER WHEN THE SOVIET UNION BECAME A HEAVY BUYER OF GRAIN IN THE WEST."

THE SOVIET UNION AND OTHER COMMUNIST NATIONS WERE FORCED TO WEK FOOD SUPPLIES IN NON-COMMUNIST COUNTRIES AFTER A SERIES OF SERIOUS AGRICULTURAL FAILURES.

EXCERPTS: ROWAN SPEECH BEFORE RADIO-TV BROADCASTERS

NEW YORK, MARCH 11 -- FOLLOWING ARE EXCERPTS FROM A SPEECH WHICH CARL T.

ROWAN, DIRECTOR OF THE UNITED STATES INFORMATION AGENCY, DELIVERED WEDNESDAY

BEFORE THE INTERNATIONAL RADIO AND TELEVISION SOCIETY HERE:

. . . I HAVE RECEIVED MANY LETTERS OF SYMPATHY FROM PEOPLE WHO THINK THAT
I HAVE MOVED INTO AN ESPECIALLY DIFFICULT JOB. IT IS ACHALLENGING JOB, BUT IT
IS FAR FROM IMPOSSIBLE; INDEED IT IS DIFFICULT ONLY TO EXTENT THAT WE AMERICANS
ARE UNSURE OF WHAT WE WISH TO SAY TO THE WORLD.

MY CONVERSATIONS WITH MY COLLEAGUES, WITH MEMBERS OF THE PRESS AND OF THE CONGRESS, WITH FRIENDS FROM MANY FIELDS, INDICATE THAT THERE IS AGLARING LACK OF CONSENSUS AS TO WHAT USIA IS TO DO -- AND HOW.

PART OF THE CONFUSION ARISES FROM THE FACT THAT OUR OWN SOCIETY IS COMPLEX.

THIS GREAT DIVERSITY OF VIEWPOINT THAT WE NOT ONLY TOLERATE BUT ENCOURAGE

IS STRONGLY REFLECTED WHEN SOMEONW MENTIONS OUR INFORMATIONAL PROGRAM.

NO SMALL NUMBER OF PEOPLE HAVE SAID TO ME RECENTLY THAT WE CAN WIN THE WORLD

QUICKLY IF ONLY WE EXPOSE IT TO THEIR IDEAS.

ON THE OTHER HAND, WE FIND THAT WE LACK CONSENSUS ALSO BECAUSE OF THE COMPLEX NATURE OF THIS WORLD TOWHICH WE SPEAK. WE FIND OURSELVES ATTEMPTING TO CONVINCE, TO WIN THE SUPPORT OF, NOT JUST YOUNG NATIONS INHABITED BY PEOPLES OF DIFFERENT RACIAL OR HISTORICAL BACKGROUND, NOT JUST OUR ADVERSARIES WHOSE DIFFERENCES OF POLITICAL OUTLOOK POSE A THREAT TO OUR SECURITY, BUT ALSO THOSE LONG-TIME FRIENDS WHOSE HISTORY AND CULTURE ARE PART OF OUR VERY BEING.

PERHAPS IT IS ONLY NATURAL THAT WHERE COMPLEXITY IS PILED ON COMPLEXITY,

MEN BECOME IMPATIENT TO SIMPLIFY EVERYTHING. SO IT IS THAT WE FIND SO MANY

AMERICANS TODAY WHO SEEK TO REDUCE EVERY CONFLICT TO THE SIMPLE COPS-AND ROBBERS

THEME OF EVERY WEEK'S TELEVISION DRAMA.

WHETHER THE SCENARIO BE CAMBODIA, OR CYPRUS, ZANZIBAR OR BRAZIL, THIS SIMPLIFIED THEORY OF FOREIGN POLICY IS THAT THERE IS ALWAYS AN EASILY DISTINGUISHABLE GOOD GUY AND AN EQUALLY OBVIOUS VILLIAN, EACH OF WHOM IS TO BE RESPECTIVELY EMBRACED OR DISOWNED BY ALL BUT THE OBVIOUSLY DISLOYAL.

UNFORTUNATELY -- OR PERHAPS FORTUNATELY -- OUR WORLD IS NOT AS SIMPLE AS THAT.

WE IN USIA SEE DAY AFTER DAY THAT OURS IS AWORLD OF SUBTLE AND TRICKY NUANCES. AND I FEAR THAT OUR NO. 1 PROBLEM MAY NOT BE THAT WE FACE ADVERSARIES SKILLED IN THEIR TRADE UNSCRUPULOUS IN THEIR TACTICS, BUT RATHER THE FACT THAT SO MANY OF OUR COUNTRYMEN, FOLLOWING THE "SIMPLIFIED APPROACH TO FOREIGN POLICY," PREFER TO IGNORE THE SUBTLETIES AND THE DELICATE SHADING THAT ARE PART OF THIS BUSINESS OF WINNING FRIENDS AND INFLUENCING PEO PLE. THEY WOULD URGE UPON US A CONGLOMERATION OF "HARD SELL" NOSTRUMS THAT HAVE LITTLE REAL RELATIONSHIP TO THE PROBLEMS WE FACE.

THIS BURDEN IS EXEMPLIFIED IN ITS MOST EXASPERATING FORM IN THE COMMENTS OF THOSE WHO THINK THAT USIA HAS THE SOLE AND SIMPLE MISSION OF SAYING TO THE WORLD AGAIN AND AGAIN WHAT IS GOOD AND RIGHT AND GREAT ABOUT THIS COUNTRY.

THERE ARE PEOPLE WHO BELIEVE, RIGHTLY, THAT USIA SHOULD NOT DWELL SOLELY ON OUR UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEMS, OR INSTANCES OF CORRUPTION OR INCIDENTS OF RACIAL CONFLICT, CR THE CARRYINGS-ON OF OUR GANGSTER ELEMENT.

THEY KNOW, AS DO YOU AND I, THAT IT IS SO OBVIOUS AS TO PRECLUDE DISCUSSION THAT USIA'S FUNCTION OS TO GIVE FOREIGNERS ACLOSER UNDERSTANDING AND A GREATER APPRECIATION OF THESE UNITED STATES.

THIS MEANS THAT USIA IS OBLIGATED TO EMPHASIZE SOME OF THE POSITIVE THINGS
THAT RARELY MAKE THE COMMERCIAL MEDIA THAT OPERATE ON THE OLD JOURNALISTIC CREDO
THAT "COOD NEWS IS NO NEWS."

THE TROUBLE IS THAT, CLOAKED IN THIS BASIC AND HONORABLE PURPOSE, USIA QUICKLY FALLS VICTIM TO THE SIMPLIFIERS WHO THINK USIA SHOULD GO ALL THE WAY AND FORCE THE WORLD TO LOOK AT AMERICAN THROUGH ROSE-COLORED GLASSES . . .

I HAVE PRESSED HARD TO EXPLAIN THAT THE EASIEST WAY TO DESTROY USIA, TO RENDER IT TOTALLY INEFFECTIVE, WOULD BE TO HAVE IT FEED THE WORLD NOTHING BUT SUPERLATIVES ABOUT AMERICA AND THE AMERICAN WAY OF LIFE. AND I HAVE BEEN PRESSED TO MAKE THE "SIMPLIFIERS" UNDERSTAND THAT USIA CAN AND HAS WORKED SOME MINOR MIRACLES IN THE PROPAGANDA FIELD, BUT IT CAN NEVER DO THE UNDOABLE OR HIDE THE UNHIDEABLE.

WHAT THE ADVOCATES OF THE ROSE-CO LORED-GLASSES APPROACH SEEM NOT TO UNDERSTAND
IS THE FACT THAT WHILE USIA HAS AVOICE OF AMERICA, IT IS ONLY A PART, INDEED
A SMALL PART, OF THE REAL "VOICE OF AMERICA." IN OUR ERA OF MIRACULOUSLY
RAPID COMMUNICATIONS THE WORDS OF A CONGRESSMAN ENGAGED IN BITTER FLOOR DEBATE,
A SPEECH BY AN OFFICIAL OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IN CHICAGO, OR THE PUBLIC
SPEECH OF ONE OF OUR MILITARY LEADERS MOVES TO THE FARTHEST CORNERS OF THE
GLOBE EACH YEAK, THE HALF MILLION AMERICANS WHO GO ABROAD FOR BUSINESS REASONS,
OR TO REPRESENT FOUNDATIONS AND PRICIPATE IN EDUCATIONAL AND CULTURAL EXCHANGES,
ALL ARE OUR "VOICES OF AMERICA."

AND NOT TO BE IGNORED ARE THE 50,000 FOREIGN STUDENTS WHO COME TO THIS COUNTRY EACH YEAR TO STUDY, AND THE THOUSANDS OF FOREIGN TOURISTS AND THE SCORES OF FOREIGN JOURNALISTS WHO DEVELOP THEIR OWN VERSION OF THE IMAGE OF AMERICA.

THEY, TOO, SPEAK TO THE OUTSIDE WORLD, AND GENERALLY WITH THE NATURAL CREDIBILITY FOR WHICH OUR OFFICIAL ORGANS CAN ONLY STRIVE.

SO YOU SEE "THAT IN THIS CONTEXT, USIA BECOMES BUT A SMALL PART OF THE CACOPHONY THAT IS THE REAL VOICE OF AMERICA ABROAD.

BUT IT IS FOR JUST THIS REASON THAT USIA'S ROLE IS VITAL. WE CANNOT AFFORD
TO HAVE THE VOICES OF FREEDOM ADD UP TO A BABBLE OF CONFUSION FOR FOREIGNERS.
IT IS USIA'S ROLE, THEN, TO ENSURE THAT OUT OF THIS DIALOGUE OF FREEDOM IS
EXTRACTED A MESSAGE THAT IS INTELLIGIBLE AND CREDIBLE.

FOR AS LONG AS I CAN FORESEE, OUR COUNTRY WILL BE INVOLVED IN AN ALL-OUT IDEOLOGICAL STRUCTURE. IN THIS CONTEST OF IMPRESSIONS AND MIS-IMPRESSIONS, OF DISTORTIONS BOTH DELIBERATE AND ACCIDENTAL, USIA MUST BE THE RESTORER OF FOCUS, THE PROVIDER OF THE PERSPECTIVE WITHOUT WHICH OUR POLICIES AND OUR PURPOSE CAN NEVER BE UNDERSTOOD. . .

THE MERCHANTS OF TYRANNY ARE TRYING TO TURN OUR FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION INTO A MIGHTY WEAPON AGAINST US. THEIR OBVIOUS GOAL IS TO HANG US WITH OUR OWN WORDS.

WE CANNOT SILENCE AMERICAN POLITICS OR THE AMERICAN PRESS, NOR HAVE WE ANY
DESIRE TO DO SO. BUT IT MUST BE OBVIOUS THAT USIA CANNOT FULFILL ITS MISSIONS
UNLESS IT TAKES ABOUT THE THINGS THAT FREE AMERICANS AND THE FREE AMERICAN PRESS
AFE DISCUSSING. WE KNOW THAT OUR ADVERSARIES ARE TALKING ABOUT THESE THINGS, AND
ONE OF OUR MOST URGENT TASKS IS TO ENSURE THAT THEIR DISTORTIONS ARE NOT ACCEPTED
EECAUSE WE ARE IN TIMED DEFAULT.

QUICK U.N. PEACE ACTION NEEDED ON CYPRUS, U.S. SAYS

WASHINGTON, MARCH 11 - - - THE STATE DEPARTMENT SAYS CONTINUED VIOLENCE ON CYPRUS ACCENTS THE NEED TO IMPLEMENT UNITED NATIONS PEACE PLANS.

IN THIS CONNECTION, DEPARTMENT PRESS OFFICER RICHARD I. PHILLIPS SAID WEDNESDAY:

"ALL I HAVE TO SAY IS THAT THE CONTINUATION OF THE FIGHTING EMPHASIZES
THE NECESSITY OF RAPID IMPLEMENTATION OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION.
WE ARE SUPPORTING THE SECRETARY-GENERAL AND WORKING ACTIVELY IN COOPERATION
WITH OTHER U.N. MEMBERS TO GET THE PEACE-KEEPING FORCE ESTABLISHED QUICKLY."

UNDER THE SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION, U.N. SECRETARY-GENERAL U THANT IS AUTHORIZED TO ORGANIZE A FEACE FORCE TO PATROL CYPRUS FOR THREE MONTHS AND TO SEND A MEDIATOR TO THE ISLAND.

MR. FHILLIPS SAID THE UNITED STATES HAS NOT RECEIVED A REQUEST FOR AIR FORCE TRANSPORTS TO CARRY A U.N. FORCE TO CYPRUS.

RUMORS OF GABON COUP INVOLVEMENT LAID TO 'NON-OFFICIAL' SOURCES

WASHINGTON, MARCH 11 - - - NON-OFFICIAL FRENCH SOURCES ARE REPORTED BEHIND
THE FALSE RUMORS THAT THE UNITED STATES WAS INVOLVED IN THE FEBRUARY 18-19 COUP
IN THE AFRICAN NATION OF GABON.

ASKED ABOUT THE RUMORS ALLEGING U.S. INVOLVEMENT IN THE FEBRUARY COUP WHICH BRIEFLY DEPOSED PRESIDENT MBA, STATE DEPARTMENT PRESS OFFICER RICHARD PHILLIPS SAID WEDNESDAY:

"REPORTS HAVE REACHED US THAT SUCH RUMORS HAVE BEEN WIDELY CIRCULATED

IN LIBREVILLE AND SEVERAL OTHER PLACES. I CANNOT SEE ANY POSSIBLE SAME REASON

FOR FABRICATING AND CIRCULATING SUCH FALSEHOODS.

"OUR RELATIONS WITH THE GABONESE PEOPLE HAVE BEEN ALWAYS EXCELLENT
PRECISELY BECAUSE THEY UNDERSTOOD THAT WE DID NOT HAVE ANY INTENTION OF
MEDDLING IN THEIR INTERNAL AFFAIRS."

MR. FHILLIPS SAID THAT SEVERAL DAYS AGO THE UNITED STATES INQUIRED AT THE FRENCH FOREIGN OFFICE IN PARIS ABOUT THESE REPORTS, AND WAS SATISFIED THAT FRENCH AUTHORITIES HAD NOTHING TO DO WITH THESE RUMORS.

ALTHOUGH U.S. OFFICIALS DESCRIBE THE RUMORS AS FRENCH-INSPIRED, THEY
IDENTIFY THE SOURCE ONLY AS "NON-OFFICIAL."

THE U.S. EMBASSY IN LIBREVILLE WAS DAMAGED LAST SUNDAY BY A SHOT GUN BLAST AND A SMALL EXPLOSIVE DEVICE, BUT DAMAGE TO THE BUILDING WAS NOT SERIOUS AND NO ONE WAS INJURED. THE STATE EPARTMENT SALL TUESDAY THAT TWO EUROPEANS WERE SEEN LEAVING THE SCENE AFTER THE SHOT GUN FIRE. GABONESE AUTHORITIES AS WELL AS FRENCH MILITARY AUTHORITIES ARE INVESTIGATING THEINCLIENT.

ASKED WHY FRENCH MILITARY AUTHORITIES ARE INVESTIGATING, MR. PHILLIPS RECALLED THEY WENT INTO GABON AFTER THE COUP AND ARE MAINTAINING SECURITY IN LIBREVILLE.

HE SAID "TREATY OBLIGATIONS BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENTS OF FRANCE AND GABON AND HOW THEY ARE HONORED ARE MATTERS WHICH CONCERN THOSE TWO GOVERNMENTS."

U.S. PROTESTS ATTACK ON EMBASSY IN CAMBODIA

WASHINGTON, MARCH 11 - - - THE UNITED STATES HAS STRONGLY PROTESTED
THE OUTBREAK OF VIOLENCE BY CAMBODIANS AT THE U.S. EMBASSY IN PHNOM PENH.
CAMBODIA LATER EXPRESSED ITS REGRET AND PROMISED TO PAY DAMAGES.

STATE DEPARTMENT PRESS OFFICER RICHARD I. PHILLIPS, TOLD NEWSMEN WEDNESDAY:

"WE TRONGLY OBJECT TO ACTIVITIES SUCH AS THIS WHICH INTERFERE WITH THE NORMAL RIGHTS OF LEGATION. WE HAVE TAKEN NOTE OF THE EXPRESSION OF LEGRET BY THE CAMEO_IAN GOVERNMENT, BUT ANY FURTHER COMMENT WILL HAVE TO AWAIT A FULL REVIEW OF THE FACTS WHEN THEY ARE ALL IN."

MR. PHILLIPS SAID THE REVIEW WOULD BE "VERY WIDESPREAD," INVOLVING THE FACTS SURROUNDING THE ATTACK ON THE EMBASSY EARLY WEDNESDAY.

DEPARTMENT OFFICIALS GAVE THIS BACKGROUND ON THE VIOLENCE:

A TEMONSTRATION BEGAN IN FRONT OF THE EMBASSY AT ABOUT 9 A.M. IHNOM PENH TIME.

ABOUT 20 MINUTES LATER, IT LRUPTED INTO VIOLENCE, WITH THE CROWD THROWING ROCKS

AT THE EMBASSY.

VIRTUALLY EVERY WINLOW IN THE EMBASSY AND THE NEARBY U.S. INFORMATION SERVICE LIBRARY WAS BROKEN. SEVERAL VEHICLES WERE DESTROYED.

THE CROWD BROKE THROUGH THE EMBASSY'S FRONT DOOR AND INFLICTED MASSIVE DAMAGE ON THE GROUND FLOOR. THE USIS LIBRARY WAS ALSO HEAVILY DAMAGED.

AS FAR AS IS KNOWN HERE, NO AMERICANS WERE INJUNED. U.S. PERSONNEL ATTACHED TO THE EMBASSY NUMBER 48 AND THEY HAVE 59 DEPENDENTS.

MR. PHILLIPS SALD THE U.S. PROTEST TO THE ROYAL CAMBODIAN GOVERNMENT
WAS DELIVERED BY CHARGE D'AFFAIRES HERBERT D. SPIVACK, SUBSTITUTING FOR
AMBASSADOR PHILP SPROUSE. MR. SPROUSE HAS BEEN UNDERGOING MEDICAL TREATMENT
IN THE PHILIPPINES SINCE IAST WEEK.

THE STATE DEPARTMENT PRESS OFFICER SAID THAT CAMBODIAN FOREIGN MINISTER
HUOT SAMBATH HAD - - BOTH ORALLY AND IN A WRITTEN REPLY - - "EXPRESSED
THE 'PROFOUND REGRET OF THE ROYAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE ACTS OF VIOLENCE!"
AND HAS STATED CAMBODIA'S READINESS TO PAY COMPENSATION.

SAIGON, MARCH 11 -- U.S. SECRETARY OF DEFENSE ROBERT MCNAMARA HAS
EMPHATICALLY REITERATED AMERICAN SUPPORT FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF VIET-NAM IN
ITS BATTLE AGAINST THE COMMUNIST VIET_CONG.

SECRETARY MCNAMARA REAFFIRMED U.S. SUPPORT DURING AFINAL TOUR WEDNESDAY
OF THE VIETNAMESE COUNTRYSIDE. HE FLEW TO THE ANCIENT ANNAM CAPITAL CITY OF
HUE, 50 MILES (80 KILOMETERS) FROM THE NORTH VIETNAMESE BORDER.

THE U.S. OFFICIAL SAID THAT PRESIDENT JOHNSON HAD INSTRUCTED HIM TO PROMISE THE GOVERNMENT AND PEOPLE OF THE REPUBLIC THE COMPLETE CONTINUOUS SUPPORT OF THE UNITED STATES.

"WE WILL SUPPLY NOW AND IN THE FUTURE WHATEVER ECONOMIC AID, WHATEVER MILITARY TRAINING AND MILITARY EQUIPMENT YOU NEED TO DEFEAT YOUR ENEMY, NOW AND FOREVER," MR. MCNAMARA SAID.

ON HIS TRIP TO HUE MR. MCNAMARA WAS ACCOMPANIED BY THE VIETNAMESE PRIME MINISTER, NGUYEN KHANH; U.S. AMBASSADOR HENRY CABCT LODGE; THE CHAIRMAN OF THE U.S. JOINT CHIEFS OF STAFF GENERAL MAXWELL D. TAYLOR, AND THE CHIEF U.S. MILITARY ADVISCR IN VIET-NAM, GENERAL PAUL D. HARKINS.

SECRETARY MCNAMARA RETURNED TO SAIGON LATER IN THE DAY AND BEGAN TO WORK
ON A REPORT ON THESITUATION HE WILL DELIVER TO PRESIDENT JCHNSON.
HE IS TENTATIVELY SCHEDULED TO END HIS VISIT HERE THURSDAY.





PRING MINISTER GEORGE PAPANDREAU

He is the leader of the Center Union Party (CU), a nationalist party which is the heir of the old Liberal Party. As such, the party has republican traditions and is generally considered to be less conservative than its rival, the National Radical Union (ERE). The ERE was beeded until recently by Constantine Caramanlis.

Papandreau is over 75 years old and is the foremost political figure in Greece. He has wide popular appeal, is a gifted orator, and has a reputation for honesty and patriotism. Impressively tall and white haired, though somewhat shy with strangers, Papandreau possesses an excellent flair for politics. His programs, particularly the one promising educational reform, has won him wide support and a smashing victory at the time of the last election (February 16). His party has 171 seats in the 300 seat Greek Parliament.

Papandreau was Prime Minister in 1944 and has held many important Cabinet posts. Papandreau's elder son, Andreas, who was a former American citizen, is Minister to the Prime Minister. Andreas is a well-known economist. Papandreau's Cabinet is composed of capable; experienced individuals who are also friendly toward the U.S.

Biographic Sketch on King Constantine

A good looking, poised young man of twenty-three, King Constantine has been carefully trained by his family for his position as King of Greece. Every effort has been made to develop in him the necessary abilities to carry the burdens of that office. Constantine was educated primarily at home and at the Greek Military Academy, where he showed aptitude for military studies. He has a commission in all three armed services.

In 1959 he toured military installations in the United States. He also attended a United States-sponsored course in parachute training and guerrilla warfare.

The King is an ardent sportsman. In August 1960 the ship he captained won an Olympic gold medal. The Crown Prince's feat was a source of great pride for Greece, and was warmly applauded by all segments of the population.

The young King is well-informed on current events. He keeps abreast of national and world developments by following the local newspapers closely and by reading Time megazine, the New York newspapers and U.S. News and World Report regularly.

Ring Constanting is dignified, and expects the proper respect.

He is sensitive to the moods of the people. While he believes deeply in the institution of monarchy, he realizes and sympathizes with Greece's need for social and economic progress.

FREDERIKA - THE QUEEN MOTHER

Prederika, while sometimes direct and out-spoken, is a woman possessing considerable intellect and charm. She is a member of the former German royal family, being the granddaughter of the late Kalser. She was born in Germany 47 years ago and was educated in England and Italy. She was married to the late King in 1937. The Casen has three children: Princess Sophia, 26; King Constantine, 23; and Princess Irene, 22. Princess Sophie is married to Prince Juan Carlos of Spain and has a daughter born in December 1963. King Constantine is engaged to Princess Anna Maris of Denmark.

As Queen, Frederika has been a devoted wife and mother. She has been active in promoting Greek interests and has been acutely conscious of the position of the Greek Royal Family. Frederika is lively, decisive, and witty. She is energetic in charity work and she has vigorously carried out various projects in the outlying villages. She is strongly anti-Communist and often accompanied King Paul to the front lines during the guerrilla war. She is interested in nuclear physics and its practical application in Greece.

The Queen is a born leader and has considerable influence on her family.

The king's throne of solid gold rests on a platform above a flight of steps. In the centre of the hall stands an altar. Between two columns a hanging tapestry will afford a hiding-place. The hall opens onto a balcony which overlooks the palace courtyard and the city of Sardis. The sun rises at the beginning of the act. The chorus of six youths and six maidens enters. Each wears a gold chain on the left wrist. They bring flowers and garlands and begin to decorate the hall.

SCENE I.

The chorus, Daphne, Thoe.

DAFHNE. Ephesia, bring me roses, bring me here
Plenty of narcissus ...

THOE But my name is Thoe.

DAPHNE Well; you must know that here you're called Ephesia.

My name is Daphne, but I'm called Milesia.

1st MAIDEN All of us here, both girls and boys alike,

Are called after our cities.

2nd MAIDEN We have lost

Our names

DAPHNE But we have gained a greater honour

In honouring our cities by our names.

YOUTH FROM

HALICARNASSUS. Halicarnassus is my name to you

YOUTH FROM And Lindus mine. The others you will call

LINDUS

Cnidus, Priengus, Colophon, Smyrnaeus.

YOUTH FROM.

CNIDUS Hostages all, as witness these our chains.

2nd MAIDEN They're golden, they're not really chains, but rather

Adornments.

3rd MAIDEN Yes, we wear them when we choose.

3rd MAIDEN Nobody forces us.

2nd MAIDEN And I must say

I like them. I believe they'll let us keep them A kind of dowry - when our service is over

And we leave Sardis.

YOUTH FROM See! Dawn's first arrow has lit up the summit SMYRNA

Of the Tower of the Sun! (A trumpet is heard in the distance)

YOUTH FROM CNIDUS

Comes the Grand Eunuch to the Royal Chamber!
(Trumpets)

He draws the golden curtain from the bed Of gold.

4th MAIDEN (to Thoe)

Today's a ceremonial day;

You'll see how splendid are the ceremonies

In Sardis!

Y.fr SMYRNA Now the sun has struck

The summit of the Tower of the Moon!

(Distant trumpets)

Y.fr PRIENE The King has risen! The companions

Of the Bedchamber do obeisance. Now he goes

To his bath of gold.

THOE We too in Ephesus

Have lovely ceremonies for our goddess

Artemis.

2nd MAIDEN But you do not see, the goddess

Nor speak with her; here we live with the King!

Y.fr COLOPHON Croesus is good. He cherishes his subjects.

Y.fr LINDUS He reveres the gods and cities of the Greeks.

Y.fr.SMYRNA He honours the Greeks and their philosophers.

Y.fr PRIENE And us his hostages from Grecian cities
He treats as his own children.

ALL (Laughing)

As his own

Children.

THOE

Why do you laugh and speak these words

As if they were some likes you learned at school?

Aren't they the truth?

Y.fr COLOPHON They are.

Y.fr SMYRNA Indeed they are.

Y.fr CNIDUS That's why it's boring to repeat them.

Y.fr SMYRNA It's hard

To be a hostage and not want to flee.

Y.fr LINDUS To be a prisoner powerless to flee

Y.fr CNIDUS But nobody prevents us from escaping..

Y.fr HALICARNASSUS And friends at home envy us our lot ...

Y.fr SMYRNA And some intrigue to take our place!

THOE I don't

See what you mean ...

2nd MAIDEN Don't listen. They are fools.

3rd MAIDEN They're bored because they aren't allowed to hunt
Or go to war...

4th MAIDEN and strike a hero's pose. (The girls laugh)

2nd MAIDEN I too am envied by my friends at home;
They dream of dresses, jewels and a life
Of luxury at court

4th MAIDEN Because we live

4th MAIDEN Amid the wealth and splendor of King Croesus:

Gold, purple, alabaster, and more gold.

3rd MAIDEN Sometimes I long to touch some simple thing: .

A jug of clay, a ringless hand: to walk

Upon the raindrenched earth, away from rugs

And alabaster floors ...

2nd MAIDEN Oh! what's your hurry?

We'll have our fill of Greek simplicity

And poverty when we get home again.

(All the girls, except Daphne, laugh)

THOE What does the Queen look like?

DAPHNE I've never seen her.

1st MAIDEN We never see the Queen.

2nd MAIDEN She stays within her palace.

3rd MAIDEN Beyond the gardens of the women's halls.

4th MAIDEN .. But you can see the Other One.

THOE Who's that?

2nd MAIDEN The Other One. That's how the people call her.

1st MAIDEN The name has stuck. Even Croesus calls her that.

2nd MAIDEN She's also called The Baker.

THOE Baker? Why?

Y.fr LINDUS Because she once worked in the Royal kitchens
Kneading and baking bread.

(He lowers his voice. The following dialogue is carried on sotto voce)

It's known that Croesus'

Step-mother, Halyattus' second wife ...

Y.fr COLOPHON Once gave her poison to knead into bread

Destined for Croesus, the king's legal heir,

Y.fr COLOPHON And so secure succession for her son.

Y.fr SMYRNA But the girl warned Croesus; with the poisoned bread

(In a whisper)

She slew the princes of the second bed,

Y.fr CNIDUS And so the King owes life and throne to her -

This Other One.

Y.fr HALICAR- Yes; then he did erect

NASSUS

Her golden image in Apollo's shrine

At Delphi.

Y.fr LINDUS Lovely is the Other One,

Lovely indeed, but hard

1st MAIDEN That's why the King

Now treats her like a queen within these halls.

4th MAIDEN And gives her greater power than the Queen.

Y.fr LINDUS ' The sun lights up the Temple's gilded tiles.

(Distant trumpet)

Y.fr COLOPHON The King has left the bath-hall; now his slaves

Anoint him with rare perfumes.

Y.fr LINDUS And array

Him in the linen shirt with golden fringe.

Y. fr CNIDUS And now the purple tunic.

(trumpet)

Y.fr PRIENE Now the belt

Studded with emeralds.

(Trumpet)

Y.fr HALICAR-

NASSUS And the golden robe.

(Triumphal trumpet flourish)

Y.fr SMYRNA The Heracleides' sacred diadem.

THOE I think

I've heard about that crown. In Ephesus

It was known as the Crown of Candaules.

ALL TOGETHER Don't ever mention Candaules. Don't speak
That name, nor that of Gyges either.

(Enter GYGES. He looks around, as though in admiration of the festive decoration of the hall. His glance meets that of DAPHNE. He is holding something in the fold of his robe.)

SCENE II.

The Chorus, Thoe, Daphne, Gyges.

THOE Who's that? (In a whisper)

Y.fr HALICAR- That's Gyges. NASSUS (aloud)

THOE (whispering) Gyges?

Y.fr LINDUS The first-born

Of Croesus' sons. He's deaf and dumb.

Y.fr CNIDUS And no one

Here calls him Gyges. He is "The Deaf-Mute".

On his great-grandsire, the first Gyges, who

Y.fr HALICARNASSUS (with
lowered voice)

He is the victim of Candaules' vengeance

Killed him by guile and seized from him the kingdom

Of the Sons of Heracles.

Y.fr LINDUS Candaules loved -

So madly loved that Gyges - that he wished

To share with him the treasure he most prized ...

Y.fr SMYRNA The sight of his wife naked.

Y.fr LINDUS Yes, the Queen's

Most secret charms....

Y.fr HALICAR-NASSUS Candaules hid his friend

Behind the curtains of the Royal Bed

Whence he might view the Queen undraped,

Y.fr LINDUS

But she

Spied Gyges gazing on her nakedness....

Y.fr COLOPHON Next day she summoned him to her in secret

And bade him choose; either to slay Candaules

Or die himself...

THOE

But why?

DAPHNE

How can you ask?

For a queen - or any woman - it's unholy

To be shared by two lovers.

Y.fr HALICAR-

NASSUS

Thus it happened

That Gyges slew his friend, his benefactor,

And took from him his kingdom and his queen.

Y.fr COLOPHON Then the Oracle foretold that slain Candaules

Would take his vengeance on the sons of Gyges

In the fourth generation.

Y.fr HALICAR-

NASSUS

That is why

They say that Croesus' first-born came to life

Sans speech, sans hearing....

Y.fr SMYRNA

And his second son

Atys has been proclaimed his father's heir.

(Slight pause)

Y.fr CNIDUS Croesus abhors young Gyges. He avoids

Even looking at him. He is sore afraid

Lest he should speak some day.

Y.fr HALICAR-NASSUS He's terrified

That Gyges might regain his power of speech.

Y.fr LINDUS King Croesus asked the Oracle at Delphi
How he might cure his boy.

Y.fr SMYRNA And Pytho answered:

"Seek not to hear your first-born's voice: the day

That Gyges' tongue is loosed will be a day

Of utter desolation ... "

Y.fr HALICAR-NASSUS This explains

King Croesus' anger when one speaks to Gyges;

He fears lest he be taught to test his voice.

THOE Oracles, oracles ... all I hear is oracles...

Y.fr HALICAR- But Croesus is most reverent....

NASSUS (They all laugh. A pause)

Y.fr SMYRNA Candaules

Was doomed because to his beloved friend

He showed his secret treasure. Now King Croesus

Incessantly displays his boundless wealth

To spies and enemies

Y.fr HALICAR-NASSUS He should be fearful

(The Deaf-Mute takes a dagger from the folds of his robe, and turns it around in his hand)

ALL A dagger. Where did he find it? Where did he get it?

A. knife. Where did he find the knife?

(DAPHNE rushes up and takes it. GYGES surrenders it without demur.)

DAPHNE Where did you find it Gyges? Tell us who

Gave you this dagger?

(GYGES smiles absently. He looks at DAPHNE with intense affection, then relapses into a state of indifference.)

DAPHNE

Who, I wonder, gave it

To him? Who gives him all these things?

Two days ago he came bearing a spear;

The other time an arrow, and before

A sabre. Who puts arms into his hands?....

THOE Why all this agitation? What's the matter?

What troubles you?

Y.fr HALICAR-NASSUS Some months ago a dream

Warned Croesus that an iron point would slay

Atys. Since then he's ordered all arms locked

In the armoury, and that no weapons hang

Within the palace - neither sword nor spear

Nor arrow - lest his dream should be fulfilled.

(Enter Croesus wearing his crown and royal robes. He is followed by the Other Woman, Atys, Sandanis, and Adrastus. He sits on the throne and all do obeisance. Only Gyges does not move. Croesus sees him and turns away his eyes. He notices the dagger in Daphne's hand.)

SCENE III.

The Chorus, Croesus, The Other Woman, Atys, Sandanis, Adrastus, Gyges, Daphne.

CROESUS A dagger? Where did you pick up this dagger?

DAPHNE In the portico, my Lord.

CROESUS The portico?

Exactly where?

DAPHNE By the Great Gate.

CROESUS But why

Did you not hand it forthwith to the guards?

DAPHNE I wished to show it to Your Majesty.

CROESUS Sandanis, take it, and investigate

The matter. Let this not recur.

ATYS 0 King

My father, I beseech you to rescind

Your order.

CROESUS You have arms of gold.

ATYS Such arms

Are ceremonial baubles. Arms of iron

And steel befit a man.

CROESUS All men may have

The arms you ask. Spartans and Scythians have them.

But arms of gold, - golden from hilt to point -

Such are vouchsafed only to Croesus' son.

(Slight pause)

Give me the offering, Sandanis.

(Sandanis hands him a golden vessel)

You'll see

What weapon as inheritance, I'll give you,

My Son, successor to this Royal Throne,

Not one of iron nor with sharpened point,

But one invincible.

(He takes out the Coin, lifts it on high displaying it to all present).

SANDANIS Scion of Alyattes, Croesus, King,

Saviour and Benefactor, ever heedful

Of all his peoples' welfare and the weal

Of cultured nations has established this

The common measure of exchange. It's gold;

Its form a disc which bears the noble head

SANDANIS

Of Croesus on one side, while on the other
The Lion of the Sons of Heracles.
In weight it's equal to a Phrysian stater,
In value it amounts to three and ten
Good silver coins, - the current market-price
Of a slave of first quality.

CROESUS

Of gold may seem a paltry thing. A chess-piece
Or marble, falling, haply makes more noise.
But hear it as it falls and spins and rolls.
Kingdoms it brings to birth and buries too
With that dull ring. It's small, holds little space,
A child can grasp it in its palm; a pebble
More brightly shines in sunlight on the shore;
Yet men will prize its glitter far above
Star-shine within the eye or ruby in blood
Or diamond in a tear. From end to end
With undimmed brilliance it will light the road
Along which the human herd caught in its spell

This little disc

MEN OF THE CHORUS

They will dig into mountains and tunnel through rocks;
They will desecrate tombs and profane sanctuaries;
They will tear into hearts, rend vitals, flay bodies
and souls;

Will chase it, maddened, to the gates of Hell.

They will disavow their parents, betray their country,

barter their gods

In their frenzied pursuit.

MEN OF THE CHORUS You have sown, you have borne, you have suckled Son, daughter and orphan;

You gave freedom to slave and health to the sick,

To the fugitive haven.

But pray, oh pray that never may come the terrible day

. When the choice must be theirs.

Gold will give youth to senility
And beauty to ugliness,
Wit to the witless,
To the vulgar, nobility.
Gold will remove
Wrinkles and sores,
Cover up baldness, and draw in
Paunches and jowls;
In the eyes of the aged
It will light up stars.

Gold will become the glorious rainment
Of every nakedness, every deceit;
It will turn stigma to sparkle
And guilt to a diadem.
With passion you'll yearn for
This golden sarcophagus
O fallen Sibylla! O soul of man!

Of Creation a mart.

Enter and choose! Do you seek joy?

MEN OF THE CHORUS

Fame, love, and power,

And intoxication?

Magical mirrors? Wings for a dream?

Philtres of oblivion?

Escapes, transformations?

Let no one call them

Imitations;

The quality's excellent, and in the use

You won't know the difference.

· Power and freedom, too will come

To him who shall tame

The crafty golden beast.

- Wise master, be alert!

For your slave lies in wait

To bind you with chains, -

The chains of his own

Bondage.

Gold will pour its glitter

... Into all our creations,

Into every moment, .

Into the hand of friendship, the lips of love,

Into the spearhead of hatred.

Gold is wanting? Your Luck will be a shade.

Gold commands her? She'll turn harlot.

As with all gods, gold

Will have its apostates,

Its recreants;

MEN OF THE

And those who in the open .

Spurns its idols

But secretly revere them.

- Beware. The genuine lover

Conceals his love.

Gold will roll eternally through hands and over hearts

Polished by sweat and blood, burning with every fever,

Winged as joy, heavy as pain, relentless as Doom.

It will be tyrant, slave, friend, foe, sorcerer and

miracle-worker

To the human race.

CROESUS

I marvel at these Greeks' imagination.

Show them a tiny coin and see what wealth

Of fantasy their fertile mind begets.

THE OTHER WOMAN They're chatterers.

CROESUS

Oh no, they have ideas.

SANDANIS

And wisdom, also, Sire.

CROESUS

The Greeks possess

Imagination which we lack, - imagination

Which like a necromancer to dead things

Gives life, and to dumb creatures speech.

THE OTHER WOMAN

They're poor

And envious, and pretend they scorn all wealth.

CROESUS No, they are poets.

THE OTHER WOMAN

Poets we've seen at Court, -

Greek poets, worse than traders, every one.

SANDANIS

Above all they're philosophers.

CROESUS

My friend,

I see that Solon's in your mind again. Yes, yes, ev'n though the name is never mentioned I often sense the thought behind your words. Well, Sandanis, I own that oft I muse Upon his teaching and the more I ponder On it the less it seems to fit his fame. I never asked him whom he deemed to be The happiest of men unto the end Of life, but whom he'd met in all his travels And found to be the happiest at the time Of meeting, And he mentioned in reply Two cases: one about a certain Tellos Of Athens; and the other about two Brothers in Argos, and all three unknown Beyond the frontiers of their land. No doubt For a barbarian Solon took your king. That I sought to learn from him What thought he? The ebb and flow of an inconstant Fate? Or that life's dusk oft differs from its dawn? No, he simply didn't wish me to imagine My wealth had dazzled him. These Greeks all fear Display of admiration. Admiration To them's a luxury, and to admire What's not possessed needs wealth, - a wealth so great That dwarfs the man or object you admire.

SANDANIS

Believe me, Lord, Solon would never sink
To sentiments so paltry.

CROESUS

Then he could

Have answered otherwise; he could have said:

"Among all men I've met I've never seen

A happier man than Croesus, and I pray

That he may always be blessed with good fortune,

For gods and mortals envy happy men."

Such would have been the answer of a man

Of wisdom tempered by good manners. No,

He was most boorish to his generous host

In showing his contempt for all the treasures

That Fate has showered on me. And if, perchance,

He deems me a barbarian, nonetheless

I think my bearing was more civilized

THE OTHER WOLAN Envious, no doubt, as are the poor?

ADRASTUS

Yes, envious

as all the Greeks.

CROESUS

Some day my luck may turn;
Then will the world bethink itself of Solon
And wonder at his wisdom. I prefer,
However, just one day of power and wealth
To the drab, steady pleasures so esteemed
By my Athenian guest.

Than his in that I heard and argued not.

ATYS

Father and King,

Forget not that I am your son.

CROESUS Who says

I don't remember it?

ATYS If you prefer

Splendor, my Lord, and danger over safety

And mediocrity, then why do you

Condemn your scion to them?

CROESUS Newly-weds

Should be content with the new-flowered joys

Of wedlock. Later ther 11 be time enough

For laurels.

ATYS but a bridal couch should not

Be bravery's prison or fane sepulchre.

CROESUS The son of Croesus is no Spartan nor

A Scythian to expend his sweat and blood

In winning glory.

ATYS Sire, the son of Croesus

Is a man.

CROESUS Then as a man and prince whose lot

Will be to govern peoples learn betimes

The art of duty and obedience.

SANDANIS Your Majesty, the High Priests now await

In the Great Temple for the sacrifice.

CROESUS Let us proceed to consecrate the Coin

The the great gods, protectors of our realm.

(Croesus moves to descend from the throne, but hesitates as he sees Gyges approaching the altar and taking the Coin which Sandanis was about to receive. Gyges lifts the Coin on high and makes it glitter in the sunlight. He laughs childishly at its glitter and then becomes indifferent. He lets the Coin slip from his hand. Adrastus leaps forward and picks it up.

He gives it to Sandanis who places it in its box. The Deaf-Mute picks a flower from a vase. He gazes at it with tender admiration. He smells it and kisses it. Exit Croesus, indignant. He is followed by Atys, the Other Woman, Adrastus, Sandanis and the Chorus. Gyges and Daphne remain behind.)

SCENE IV.

Gyges, Daphne, Adrastus.

(Daphne draws near to Gyges. They exchange loving looks. Re-enter Adrastus.)

ADRASTUS Leave him and come with me.

DAPHNE Please go Adrastus.

ADRASTUS I love you. Leave that misfit. Well I know

You're teasing me. Now stop that little game.

DAPHNE It's not a game.

ADRASTUS The whole Court thinks it is.

You surely can't prefer a deaf-mute fool

To a whole man.

DAPHNE To me that man is whole

Who pleases me.

ADRASTUS A man must have a voice

To issue orders and to plead with you.

DAPHNE A glance from Gyges carries more persuasion

Than all your words.

ADRASTUS Of course, he's very rich

And that's important.

DAPHNE Get out of my sight!

ADRASTUS I'm going, but some day you'll change your mind.

SCENE V.

Gyges, Daphne.

(Daphne comes up to Gyges. They kiss passionately. Gyges sits on a couch. Daphne kneels in front of him.)

DAPHNE

I love you, Gyges. There's no reason in love.

But I believe I love you for the things

Which others shun in you.

I love you because you have no voice No voice to lie with.

Men's voices are the servants of deceit.

What need has Truth of voice?

Her speech is in a glance or in a smile,

She shines forth in a tear.

Words are but hasty patchwork

To seal the rifts a glance may haply open

Disclosing awful truths.

I love you for you're beautiful and pure
In the unblemished solitude
Of your silence.

Others must labour to conquer solitude.

But you were born endowed with the close kingdom,

Silence impenetrable was its guard,

Silence protected you from gold that drips

With words like poisoned honey into flesh

And soul.

DAPHNE

But your integrity's unspoiled.

No other gems possess you but your eyes

No other metal, than the molten glory

Of golden limbs.

To you I can confide

The things that other women are ashamed

To say to their beloved, which unsaid

Weigh down on them like guilty fruit. The things

That oft-times find tempestuous expression

In strange caresses in the dark.

When you

And take possession of me silently

I feel I'm giving myself up to Night

To Night, the holy, the invincible.

Night's in your flesh that penetrates my womb

Pouring a starry essence in my veins

And filling them with lightning's astral fires.

I drink night from your eyelids, from your lips,

Those speechless lips, that guileless tongue unsullied

By words.

(She closes her eyes.)

You need no voice for me to hear;
I need no eyes to see you. Every night
My hands, my touch mould you anew. All day
Your form is clinging to my hands and limbs.
See, now, my lips can sense the pulsing vein

. 1.3

DAPHNE

Beneath your throat, that registers for them

Each night the passing of sweet time until

Insidious dawn flashes the parting knife.

Of Day.

Night binds us with its silence, day unbinds.

The once again I thread the babbling ways

Of worldly echoes. You remain entwined

In the sacred mesh of silence. And you gaze

Upon our strange contortions, bloated throats,

Inexplicable motions of our lips

And hands. The crystal wall of silence's

Enchanted bowl keeps us apart

(The Other Woman enters.)

SCENE VI.

Gyges, Daphne, The Other Woman.

THE OTHER WOMAN You're lucky, Daphne, to be with a man

Who lets you chatter to your heart's content

And doesn; t interrupt.

DAPHNE He cannot talk

You know that

THE OTHER WOMAN But you talk yourself and listen

To your own words. That's all most women ask.

DAPHNE He doesn't hear....

THE OTHER WOMAN Exactly... Most men don't.

They make speeches and want us to listen. What were you telling him?

DAPHNE

Oh, nothing.

THE OTHER WOMAN

So.

I know what you were saying; all you yearn ...

To say, - the things no one should hear.

DAPHNE

The truth.

THE OTHER WOMAN Excellent choice. Only to one that's deaf
And dumb can we afford to tell the truth.

(Exit Daphne,)

SCENE VII.

Gyges, The Other Woman.

THE OTHER WOMAN If you weren't here deceit would strangle us.

For him that knows to knead.

A deaf-mute's necessary to every Court.

You are in sooth the reeds of Midas' barber;
You are the cesspool of Truth. Truth is unclean.
She's full of the soul's foulness and decay,
Of the mind's offal and the heart's excretions,
So richly fertilized by gold. Good leaven

You stare at me;

You wonder what I say and think. Oft-times
I fancy that you know, but though you may,
You cannot tell. I like to think you know.
In you I've found the ideal accomplice, one
Who can't betray me.

Yes, I am your friend.

Don't fear me. All the others turn away

THE OTHER WOMAN From you in scorn. Your father, first, because
You are his failure; one his gold cannot
Redeem. You are the symbol of a power
More potent than his power and his wealth.
Because you are the first-born Atys fears you
And hates you. If your voice returns to you
He loses all. I notice how he looks
Intently at your mouth and throat, and thinks
That there, no doubt, may lurk your voice, for him
A deadly foe. And Croesus is afraid
Of spears and swords for Atys. Atys fears
One blade alone that's sheathed within your throat.

Gyges, I am your friend. Our bond is stronger
Than simple friendship. Hatred of your brother
Binds us, for Atys loathes me for the power
I've wrested from your mother. True, the name
Of Queen's denied me. I am called the Other,
The Baker-Woman; but the King has set
My golden image at the Delphic shrine,
And here in Sardis made me queen in fact.
For you a mother's love has turned to hate,
She looks upon you with aversion.
If Atys reigns one fate awaits us both.
No longer will he patiently survey
Your lips or wait to see whether perchance
Your throat release the voice to claim his throne.

THE OTHER WOMAN Come near me; take my hands, the hands that once

Pressed deep into the dough and now have learned

The art of kneading kingdoms. For the bold

An easy task. Just sprinkle a few grains

Of white dust - who shall know it isn't salt?
Into the dough. And in the palace swords,

And spears - who knows whence came they? - in your

hands,

Your irresponsible hands

Gods are not bought With golden offerings, and Croesus knows
That Destiny is immutable.

0 Gyges,

With what intentness do you gaze on me.

Alliance and complicity I read

In your regard. Yours is a prisoned soul,
Candaules' soul burns in you and you are

Candaules' ghost and living curse. You guess

Who leaves the swords and javelins in your path.

You know that sometime in these halls a blade

Must be discovered that is no mere toy,

Nor golden ornament

(Enter Croesus, Sandanis, Atys, and Adrastus.)

SCENE VIII.

Gyges, The Other Woman, Croesus, Sandanis, Adrastus, Atys.

CROESUS

Don't badger him.

Stop talking to him. Let him be.

THE OTHER WOLLAN

But, Sire,

I wasn't talking to him.

.1 4.00

CROESUS

All of you

Talk to him all the time, and in the end

You'll make him try his voice. You know full well

That never must his voice be heard.

So, Sandanis

I want you to receive them. Give them money
And send them back home to their villages ...

SANDANIS My Lord, three days and nights they've been awaiting.

An audience, with fasting and ablutions.

CROESUS What brought them here? What did they say to you?

SANDANIS They say they're under sacred obligation

To give their message to their King alone.

CROESUS Where are they now?

SANDANIS Out in the antechamber.

CROESUS Well, let them come.

(Sandanis goes out and returns followed by three old men in long Asiatic robes, bearing wayfarer's staves. They kneel.)

SCENE IX.

Croesus, the Other Woman, Atys, Adrastus, Sandanis, Gyges, Envoys from Mysia.

CROESUS

Arise, and let your leader speak.

e for the contract of

ENVOY

0 Sun

Of Asia, Saviour, Benefactor, King,
We're envoys from your loyal provinces
Of Mysia come to crave your aid almighty
To save us, Sire.

CROESUS

What is your trouble? Speak.

ENVOY

Two months ago a savage boar charged down

From Mount Olympus spreading desolation

Throughout our villages; no vineyard, field,

Or orchard has it spared. In hot pursuit

Our young men valiantly went forth, - in vain.

Their spears were shattered, nets were rent asunder

Under the onslaught of the maddened beast.

Four of our noblest youths have perished. Now

Our Magi prophesy that only you,

Our King, can save us.

CROESUS '

How so? By what means?

ENVOY

By sending to our land your royal huntsmen,

Skilled in the chase, your horses and trained dogs.

CROESUS

Granted. They'll leave at once.

ENVCY

But above all.

Send us, we pray, the famous spear which slew
The Erymanthian boar, for that alone,
So say the Magi, can transpierce the beast's
Thick hide.

CROESUS

You want the spear of Heracles!

But only a king may hold it in his hand.

ENVOY

Or a king's son. All Mysia hangs its hopes

On Atys, Sire.

(The three envoys kneel. Atys advances, then checks himself)

CROESUS

Impossible! My son

Is still a bridegroom. He may not so soon

CROESUS Go forth to war or hunting. Take with you

My huntsmen and as much gold as you need

To gain the services of mercenaries.

Show, Sandanis, the coins.

(Sandanis produces a purse full of gold coins.)

SANDANIS With these you can buy everything you need.

Both men and arms.

ENVOY Sire, money won't suffice

To trap a beast or circumvent the gods.

CROESUS You'll have a prince to lead the hunt; Adrastus

Of Phrygia, - of the line of Gordias

And Midas. He's an exile and my guest,

A brave man and experienced in the chase.

ENVOY My Lord, no prince not of your blood may touch

The spear of Heracles.

CROESUS I'll also give you

Adrastus and the flower of Lydia's youth, and gold.

Enough!

(The three old men cover their heads with their robes

and fall to the ground).

ENVOY We are forsaken by our King. The sun

Has set for ever over luckless Mysia.

(Atys also sinks to the ground.)

ATYS Father, I crave your grace. Do not condemn me

To the derision of your subject peoples.

CROESUS Out with him Sandanis! Take him away!

(Sandanis takes hold of Atys, leads him out of the hall

and returns. Croesus looks at Gyges)

CROESUS So you demand the spear of Heracles

Borne by a scion of my blood?

ENVOY My Lord,

If it so please your grace.

CROESUS Then, Sandanis,

Open the treasury where the spear is kept
Together with Candaules' arms. Let Gyges
My first-born wear them. See, old men, I give you

The first-born. He will lead the hunt for you.

CURTAIN

END OF ACT I.

ACT II

(The same stage setting. It is the afternoon of the same day. The Young Women of the Chorus, leaning over a balustrade look down upon the huntsmen assembling in the courtyard. The Youths of the Chorus, seated upstage, are throwing dice. They scowl and from time to time look up disapprovingly at the girls. A hubbub arises in the courtyard: the clattering of horses' hooves, the barking of dogs, the blowing of horns, and men's voices.)

SCENE I

The Youths and Maidens of the Chorus, Daphne.

Lst MAIDEN : Look at the man who's just come in. How ell

He rides his prancing horse

2nd MAIDEN And see the bit, -

All silver! He's a handsome fellow.

YOUTH fr. HALI-. Five!

CARNASSUS

1st MAIDEN His hair is like a cluster of black grapes.

Y.fr LINDUS Three and two!

1st MAIDEN And what fiery eyes he has.

He's seen me.

Y.fr. HALICAR- Four!

NASSUS

3rd MAIDEN I like the one who's wearing

1 1 5

The leopard-skin.

Y.fr. LINDUS Now eight!

4th MAIDEN He looks so fierce.

Y.fr.HALICAR- Take three and four.

3rd MAIDEN It suits a man to be

A trifle fierce.

Y.fr. LINDUS

Here's five!

4th MAIDEN

How sweet he is.

. My heart's a-flutter and my limbs a-tremble.

(The girls laugh)

Y.fr. HALICAR, A double five!

NASSUS

THOE (to 4th Maiden)

Be quiet. They might hear.

4th MAIDEN Oh, they're not listening.

Y.fr. LINDUS

Five!

Y.fr. HALICARNASSUS

And eight!

2nd MAIDEN

They're furious

With envy since as hostages they cannot

Join in the hunt.

Y.fr.LINDUS

Take five and four!

1st MAIDEN

Just look

At my young man. His horse is dancing!

Y.fr. HALICARNASSUS

Double!

ALL THE GIRLS She calls him her young man! (Laughing)

(Enter Atys, frowning.)

SCENE II.

Chorus, Atys, The Other Woman, Daphne.

ATYS

It would be fitting I should wear a chain

Like yours. Since in this palace I've become

A prisoner, a hostage.

DAPHNE

There's no love

Without subjection.

Y.fr. LINDUS

All that to our hearts

Is closest do we give to Fate in bondage.

As in your father's hands we're warranty

Of the submission of Ionia,

So have you been delivered by his love

To Fate as hostage of his happiness.

ATYS

Naught am I but one more of Croesus' goods,

This status leaves but little room for love.

(Atys, is interrupted by the entrance of the Other Woman. He turns to leave.)

THE OTHER WOMAN Atys, don't go.

ATYS

What do you want?

THE OTHER WOMAN

To tell you

In friendship, though you hold me not a friend,

That you've no reason to be so disturbed.

ATYS

I ask no sharing of my troubles.

THE OTHER WOMAN

Know

That everyone admires your discipline.

ATYS

I might perchance aspire to greater cause

For admiration.

THE OTHER WOMAN

When you have a father

As glorious as Croesus you show wisdom

In basking in his glory's afterglow.

Your words are wise indeed.

THE OTHER WOMAN

I said to Croesus

That he should value your restraint. When he

Was young as you he was not so mature.

ATYS

ATYS

What do you mean?

THE OTHER WOMAN

It is said - you must have heard it That he had problems with his father too;
Important problems, not such paltry things
As: arms and hunting junkets.

ATYS

What were they?

THE OTHER WOMAN

Already Croesus was the governor

Of Adramytus province and of Thebes.

A veritable kingdom, he was scarcely

Older than you. But this was not enough.

He wanted to be named heir to the throne.

ATYS

And so?

THE OTHER WOMAN

But don't you know? The partisans
Of Pantaleon, his half-brother, slandered
Croesus, and Alyattes thought him suspect;
So when he launched the Carian expedition
He did not give your father the command.
But Croesus levied forces secretly

ATYS

Secretly! Tell me more

THE OTHER WOMAN

Mentions the matter. He wants it forgotten.
But it does show imaginative genius....

Your father never

ATYS

Go on.

THE OTHER WOMAN

In secrecy he levied troops,

Surprised the Carians, struck them in the rear

And crowned the Lydian arms with victory.

ATYS

And Alyattes?

THE OTHER WOMAN

If he had discovered

THE OTHER WOMAN These secret military preparations

Before their aim was shown he would have deemed

Croesus a rebel. And indeed a few

Dark schemers whispered that your father's army

By secret pact was pledged to Caria,

And that when Croesus saw the Lydian troops

Of Alyattes gaining the advantage

He also struck them. Lies. Revolting lies.

ATYS And Alyattes?

THE OTHER WOMAN Allyattes saw

That Croesus' timely intervention, -

His disobedience, - had in fact assured

A brilliant victory. And Croesus thus

Won the succession.

ATYS That is how he won it.....

THE OTHER WOMAN At heart a father's pride is always roused

By his son's courage. How else could it be?

A man deserves a manly son and not

A slave. (Slight pause.)

Your problems, by comparison,

Seem laughable.

ATYS Well, tell my father so.

THE OTHER WOMAN I have. I've also told him that he's lucky

To find no imitator, in his son,

Of his own youthful rashness.

ATYS You believe this?

THE OTHER WOMAN Oh, as for that, the whole Court thinks so too.

THE OTHER WOMAN But this should not displease you, for indeed Restraint and modesty are great qualities

In one destined to rule.

Let others say these virtues are more suited

To a philosopher. I don't agree.

Oh well, - it can't be helped. Whatever you do

Or don't do you will always be the son

Of Croesus. That's enough.

(Enter Gyges in armour. The helmet has a visor. He carries a spear.)

SCENE III.

Chorus, Atys, The Other Woman, Gyges, Daphne.

CHORUS Behold! Candaules' armour and the spear

Of Heracles!

THE OTHER WOMAN That only kings may hold.

THOE How very heavy it appears to be.

THE OTHER WOMAN Hephaestus forged it for a hero's hand.

Come lift it Gyges. Show us.

(She makes signs to Gyges to lift the spear. He does so with ease.)

One would think

The arms were made to order. Plate and helmet Fit perfectly.

DAPHNE They fit his own perfection;

His silence and his looks reflect his worth

More than the boasts of others.

THOE What a shame

He should be deaf and dumb.

A GIRL IN THE CHORUS

Yes, what a shame.

THE OTHER WOMAN A shame indeed. However, doctors say

A sudden shock can loose a deaf-mute's tongue.

Who knows? Maybe in charging at the beast

(Atys gives her an intense look. The Other Woman appears to be overcome by a spell of abstraction. She points to Gyges arms and continues:)

That helmet's strange. They make that kind no more.

With visor down the face is all concealed ...

Draw it down Gyges....

(She makes signs to Gyges to draw down the visor. "He does so and his face is completely hidden. The Other Woman laughs and curtseys low to him.)

Faceless, voiceless hero,

Who are you pray? Candaules? Gyges? Hermes Or Sosias? No one will ever know.

· Nor man, nor god. But Glory can't be fooled.

Good luck, fair hero by none seen or heard.

(Slight pause. She addresses the Chorus.)

How hot it is. Come, let's go to the gardens.

The setting sun burns on this marble terrace,
Your brows are burning too, - perchance with looking

At these young warriors. But you shouldn't stare.

These are "barbarians" lovely maids of Hellas!

(She addresses the Young Men:)

You too have pricked your ears up at the beat Of hooves, the blare of trumpets, and the clash Of arms.... Let's go.

SCENE IV.

Atys, Gyges.

(Exeunt The Other Woman and the Chorus. Daphne follows reluctantly. Atys remains alone with Gyges. He looks at him and suddenly comes to a decision. He goes up to him and stretches out his hand. Gyges does not move. Atys takes the spear from him and Gyges offers no resistance. Atys toys with the spear testing his strength proudly. Then he violently seizes Gyges' breastplate and helmet and puts them on. He pulls down the visor and starts to leave. He holds back a moment, then takes Gyges' cloak and throws his own around Gyges' shoulders.)

SCENE V.

Atys, Gyges, Daphne.

(Enter Daphne, She stops as she sees Gyges stripped of his arms and Atys wearing them.)

ATYS (menacing) If you love Gyges, Daphne, have a care.

Say nothing; not a word to anyone.

And hide the boy until I've started out.

SCENE VI.

Daphne, Gyges.

DAPHNE

Oh, well I knew it. I was sure of it.

But never mind, my love. It's better so.

Let him get killed.

(She throws her arms around him and kisses him. Steps are heard approaching.)

Quick. Hide.

(Daphne conceals Gyges behind a curtain. Enter Adrastus dressed and armed as a huntsman.)

SCENE VII.

Daphne, Adrastus.

ADRASTUS

Ah, here you are.

ADRASTUS

I have been searching to take leave of you.

You were not with the others in the garden.

You seem perturbed.

DAPHNE

But not at all.

ADRASTUS

1.1

No doubt

You're troubled by the parting with your swain, - Your deaf-mute suitor.

DAPHNE

That is my affair.

ADRASTUS

And mine too, somewhat, Daphne, I'm not used

To yielding preference to an invalid.

DAPHNE

You'll have to get accustomed to it now.

ADRASTUS

Daphne, take care. I know why you behave

Thus to me. You believe that I'm alone,

A fugitive at Croesus' mercy, while

Gyges is Croesus' first-born, and perchance

Fair Lydia's golden sceptre may one day

Fall to the hands of an adventuress

Miletus-born. A wall of silence now

Stands 'twixt the throne and you, and 'tis your hope

That you alone at last will hear the voice

That will cast down that wall. But no one, no one,

Not even the king, your guardian, will permit

That voice to issue ever from mute lips.

DAPHNE

L.

You credit me with schemes you would yourself

Devise. Gyges is to find his voice

Neither the king nor Atys can prevent it.

ADRASTUS

True. But perhaps I can prevent it. That

Is something you should not forget. Indeed

ADRASTUS

It could be the only service that a poor
But honest debtor has it in his power
To offer to his wealthy and almighty
Protector

(Exit Adrastus. Daphne waits for him to disappear, then brings Gyges out of his hiding place. She kisses him passionately.)

SCENE VIII.

Daphne, Gyges.

DAPHNE

SANDANIS

Without knowing it Adrastus

Has saved you. Come with me. I shall conceal you.

How so, my Lord?

(Exeunt Daphne and Gyges. Enter Croesus and Sandanis. Croesus has doffed his crown and royal robes. He is wearing a simple purple tunic. From the courtyard is heard the din of clattering hooves, neighing horses, clanking arms, barking dogs. This noise continues to the end of Act II.)

SCENE IX.

Croesus, Sandanis.

COOPCIIC	Hannelt then left met? Duck will fall Whoule
CROESUS	Haven't they left yet? Dusk will fall. What's
	the delay?
SANDANIS	They wait for Gyges and some others. Now
	Adrastus's come. But five are missing still.
CROESUS	I wish they'ld start. This moise is enervating.
	To Atys it must be unbearable.
SANDANIS	They're late. They haven't even packed the mules.
CROESUS .	I fear, my friend, we haven't been too wise
	In handling this affair.

CROESUS I should have found a way to keep from sending

My horses and my huntsmen without Atys.

I have offended him.

SANDANIS My Lord, what else

Could you have done?

CROESUS I could have given them

Money.

SANDANIS But money they would not accept.

CROESUS It's not with words alone one offers money.

Money's like women. It must be paraded

In order to exert its charm.

SANDANIS How so?

CROESUS You could have taken them and shown them gold;

More gold than they had seen even in dreams.

Coins upon coins. Heaps of my bright new staters.

As much as they desired I would have given

Just to be left in peace. Where's Atys gone?

SANDANIS I have not seen him, Sire. He must have sought

His wife.

CROESUS These newly-weds find easy comfort.

No matter, Sandanis. I'm pleased I managed

To keep Atys at Court.

SANDANIS A wise decision.

CROESUS A king's son and the spear of Heracles

They wanted, and I humoured them. They cannot

Aver that Croesus is indifferent

To the cares of his subjects.

SANDANIS

True, my Lord.

CROESUS

However, Sandanis, the game's not clear.

The Mysian envoys were but simple dice

Upon the board. The Player rests unknown

Who tossed them to us.

SANDANIS

Sire, what Player mean you?

CROESUS

The invisible Player who once in a dream

Foretold me Atys' doom. The same, perchance,

Who sent the boar and brought these envoys here

To ask for Atys.

SANDANIS

Never to mortal eyes

Do Players such as these reveal themselves.

CROESUS

I know. They hide. They do not show their hand.

But ours they see.

SANDANIS

Your Majesty, your thoughts

And words fill me with dread.

CROESUS

Fear not. Your king
Is strong. Kingdoms and cities have I bought,
And, maybe, gods. For all is up for sale.
Delphic Apollo thirsts for gold no less
Than some wild Scythian chief.

SANDANIS

Say not such things,

Master.

CROESUS

Ungrateful, cunning are they all.

The cities that lie grovelling at my feet,

Gods sated by my gold and sacrifices,

All will betray me when their interest bids.

I'll see to it that this does not occur.

CROESUS

I'll buy them time and time again, whene'er I need to.

SANDANIS

Sire!

CROESUS

The gods well know they'll win;
They always win, for they've set a term
To our brief life. For them there is not term.
One thing, my friend, is never bought or sold:
Time.

SANDANIS

Time, and much besides.

CROESUS

For Time alone

Care I.

SANDANIS

And love?

CROESUS

Of all most vunerable.

The golden viper ferrets out a rift

Not only in false friendships, venal loves,

But in true love itself. A beauty's wealth

Inspires a special passion in her suiter

All honest though he be. And even a mother,
You'll shudder, Sandanis, - finds greater grace

In child enriched than child remaining poor.

But Time alone is incorruptible.

You cannot bribe him. Miserly he counts

Each pulse, each step we take towards the grave.

(He approaches the parapet and points towards the horizon.)

ar are are

Behold the city, Sardis in her glory,

Spread out before us. But, perchance, - who knows?
The desert sand may wipe it all away,
Expunge its very name.

(He leans over the parapet, pointing to the courtyard CAOESUS where the huntsmen are assembling.)

See those young men.

Their flashing eyes, bright teeth all set to taste Colour and shape and food; the living bronze Which makes their bodies statues warm with life, Spears poised for battle and for love. How to their presence they bend hour and space. You'ld think that they hold Moment with their horse Gripped 'twixt their swarthy thighs. But 'twill

not yield

To bit's restraint. Reflect how soon these forms, Seemingly incorruptible, will change To heavy, living sepulchres of youth Wherein successive phases of their shape Will lie entombed, like to the line of caskets Set to receive the body new-embalmed Of a young Pharaoh.

(He retires from the parapet; places his hand on Sandanis' shoulder.)

As for you and me,

Ten years or twenty still remain. Then dust And monuments. But there's one single thing That I shall leave invincible, eternal, Alive. - What is it, think you, Sandanis? Your memory, your glory,

SANDANIS

CROESUS These too die.

> No. I mean something else, that will forever Roll through the souls and hands of men. Unheeding

CROESUS

'Twill mete out joy and pain; like gods and nature Unjust; like woman, senseless and enchanting; Barren and fruitful; splendid, hard, like life.

Come, my wise friend, do you not understand?

(A pause. Croesus takes out a gold coin and with a smile shows it to Sandanis.)

This coin.

(Addressing the coin.)

But you were put to shame today!

Ah, night is falling. One more day the gods

Have taken from me. I should find some magus

To stop the flow of Time. In gold I'd weigh

The days, - good days and bad, - in gold and give

The magus his full due. But if I had such

I'd be the peer of the immortal gods....

SANDANIS To-night be calm, and thank the gods who gave you

The foresight to come to a wise decision.

CROESUS What gods? Which one, I wonder, was today

The Player who threw losing dice?

(The Other Woman and the Young Maidens of the Chorus enter.)

SCENE X.

Croesus, Sandanis, The Other Woman, Chorus Maidens.

THE OTHER WOMAN

I wager

That Player played against you, for, my Lord, You always win.

CROESUS Well, nearly. And tonight

I won against a crooked, ruthless Player.

CROESUS

I'm tired and crave a little merriment.

So let our pretty guests sing us some songs

From Hellas.

(To Sandanis)

Where is Atys? Bring me Atys.

Tell him I'm waiting for him, Sandanis.

And if his heart is heavy, tell him too

That he will have two emeralds of mine, -

A gift to deck his belt.

(Exit Sandanis)

SCENE XI.

Croesus, The Other Woman, Daphne, The Chorus Maidens.

THE OTHER WOMAN

Maids of Ionia

The King desires to hear your songs.

DAPHNE

You know them.

You've heard them many times.

THE OTHER WOMAN

But have you none

That we may not have heard?

DAPHNE

Well, there's an ode, -

One chanted in my land at festivals.

I've taught it to the girls.

THE OTHER WOMAN

Let's hear it then.

DAPHNE

Come, we'll recite it. 'Tis appropriate.

(The Maidens of the Chorus manifestly hold back, but Daphne begins chanting and the other soon join in. Daphne is very tense. She controls herself with difficulty.)

A sigh or a whisper?

A breath on your skin?

Aloneness departing

And a swarthy intruder

With lust in his heart?

You saw him! Yoursaw him!
He was lost in the night,
A fugitive shadow,
Bearing with him
The image, the imprint
Of your uncovered grace.

A fiery mould

For the casting of figures

Lustful, obedient

To the play of the mind,

To fulfil without shame

The contempt of your flesh.

You saw him and knew
You were sold in betrayal;
Bonds were loosed by that gleam
But a new link now held you.

A blade for a killing

Lest your body remain

Rent in twain and unmastered.

DAPHNE

Whoso his treasure doth display invites the robber; Should he escape the mortal bandits, let him fear

The Immortal Thieves.

(As the above choric ode proceeds in an increasingly intense distate is seen on Croesus' features. His displeasure does not go unnoticed by the Maidens of the Chorus. But whenever they hesitate, Daphne rallies them with a commanding look or gesture.)

THE OTHER WOMAN Enough. The King is tired.

CROESUS

I do not like

You're never to repeat it.

(Enter Sandanis.)

SCENE XII.

Croesus, Sandanis, The Other Woman, Daphne, The Maidens of the Chorus.

SANDANIS

Atys, my Lord,

Is nowhere to be found. No one has seen him.

He must be closeted within the women's quarters

Attending to his bride.

CROESUS

'Tis better so.

He has been spared these useless chatterings.

THE OTHER WOMAN So that was the ode you taught these maidens, Daphne.

The story of Candaules' wife. Do you

Consider that the theme was suitable

For the King's ear?

DAPHNE

It is a tale of wealth

And ostentation. It was time

For you to hear it.

1st MAIDEN

You've brought shame on us.

DAPHNE

'Twas needful for the palace ghosts to speak
Since those who live are silent. Who's alive?
Can you not see that we are all embalmed
In gold? That the whole palace is one huge
Golden sarcophagus? Gold, alabaster,
Purple magnificence and gold again.
All this keeps us apart from all that lives,
Dances and breathes, is capable of pain.
Have you forgotten our Hellenic cities
Where statues are companions of men?
The columns spring forth from the smilling earth
Like perfect trees. Our standards are not gold,

2nd MAIDEN

I'm homesick for our sea with waves like curls
Upon a boyish head.

And often-times the Mind surpasses Time,

And like a dart strikes immortality.

But light and thought, our bodies thus have wings,

3rd MAIDEN

For soughing of sea breezes through the free Cool, columned porches where our orators
Discourse to sunburnt youths who, listening, bite Deep into mellow fruit.

I'm homesick too

DAPHNE

Bite into Knowledge
Into the Future. Fruit for virile men.
Here we are lotus-eaters.

(She bursts into hysterical sobs.)

CROESUS

She's insane.

And insolent. Make the girl stop.

(The Chorus Maidens surround Daphne. Increasing noise from the courtyard. Horns and sharp commands are heard.)

SANDANIS

Gyges

Has just arrived and mounts his horse.

(More horns and commands.)

Adrastus

Has placed him at the column's head alone.

They march in fours. A splendid sight, my Lord.

CKOESUS Gyges rides well. Straight in the saddle.- Strange,

His horse is restive, as though not accustomed

To him.

SANDANIS The troop salutes you, Sire.

(Blaring of horns. Croesus salutes.)

CROESUS He's pulled

His visor's down. In all this heat. How strange.

He's a peculiar boy.

SANDANIS They!re off. God speed them.

(Croesus and Sandanis salute. The noise of the departing huntsmen diminishes. Faint echoes of horns blowing and dogs barking.)

CURTAIN

END OF ACT II

ACT III.

The same scnery. Wight has follen. During Scene IV the dawn will break. Inter Gyges dragging Daphne by the hand.

SCLNE I.

DAPHNE. GYGES.

DAPHNE

That madness, my beloved. That possessed you
To leave my chamber, our safe hiding place?
Someone may see us wandering through the palace.
I'm so afraid. Don't laugh. It's not a joke.
You surely must know that. For two whole days,
Since I've concealed you you have clearly shown
That you have understood my anguish and
hy purpose. Suddenly you drag me here.

(With a silent laugh he kisses her.)

In this your silent laugh and in your kiss

I seem to sense some word I cannot hear

Insomnia full of ghosts ...

I thought I heard

Voices. You were not talking to yourself?

DAPHNE

I wasn't talking.

THE O. A.

So many in this palace babble on
With empty words, while others hold their peace,
Their silence full of meaning. And this hour
Is like a cavern dug into the darkness,
Into the silence; secret voices surge
Echoing, which the day will drown. Such voices
Are often heard by those who cannot sleep.

DAPHNE

ilence holds no lies.

Well, my ears deceived me.

THE 0....

Oh, it can hold a lie more deep than words.

Don't you know that?

These have been tiring days
With Atys' childish sulkiness.

And now he's disappeared. He never came

To greet his father. Strange that he should hide

Thus. Have you seen him?

DAPHNE

No.

THE O.W.

Nor I.

And he should know I am his friend. So often
I saved him as a child from punishments
And scoldings. Now again he's in a temper ...
I'm truly glad that Gyges has been given
This opportunity to prove his worth

Before the people. Is not he the first-born? Handsome, of royal bearing, brave and proud. Gifted in everything except his voice. -But some day he may find it - such things happen; To ignore him altogether is not fair.

(Slight pause)

You do agree, don't you? That blush becomes you, Daphne. There is no need to be ashamed, For no cosmetic vies in comeliness With modesty and - don't be angry, child -With young love. Come now, you are not offended? I wish I had your freshness, I who send To Syria and to Egypt for my creams. I too, if I were younger, would have found Gyges enchanting. Being mute lends charm To his good looks, for on his lips you may Imagine all the words a woman longs To hear and seldom does. Don't be upset. I won't be indiscreet. So keep your secrets.

DAPHNE

I have no secrets.

THE O.W.

For in a palace nothing can be secret. We all here play a game of hide-and-seek.

DAPHNE

What do you mean?

THE O.W.

With words and subterfuges, and courtly manners; all through galleries, And even in our hearts. The soul has many

And indeed who has?

Secret recesses, - and the palace too.

DAPHNE

What are you trying to say?

THE O. W.

4 4 4 4

Just what I say.

We all attempt to hide behind cosmetics

Or masks or words; behind a smile or silence;

Behind a drapery like that over there.

(She advances towards the curtain)

Sometimes I think it would be interesting

To lift the curtains, see what they conceal.

What would we find? Dust? Cobwebs? Or maybe

The truth - naked and deadly like a syord?

Perhaps it would be wiser not to try.

(She takes a few steps back from the curtain.)

Yes, often we play games of hide-and seek

With our own selves. You said the other day

That for the Greeks the standard was not gold

But light and thought. You frown on money, - no?

For us it's not sufficient to give

True happiness.

DAPHNE

THE O.W. That thought is hardly new.

But you must know that if it's not enough

To make men happy, lack of money can

Bring great distress. It's like those fading loves

And, when we lose them, fill us with despair.

Moreover, I have noticed that your choice

Hos not been fixed upon some penniless

Young man but on the son of Croesus,

Again you speak

Nervous child! I only mean

That youth is free from loneliness. Youth's partners

Are hope and dreams; and love, it's constant mate.

For loneliness to eat into the soul

All that must be burned out.

Me wandering at an hour when other women

Awakening feel beside them in their bed

Something that is their very own, - a man,

A child, - and in the warmth of virile arms

Or freshness of a baby's breath find comfort

And sleep again content. But I, to find

Something my very own must climb up here

And from this terrace bend o'er sleeping Sardis,

My surreptitious conquest ...

Thus the hours

Of sleeplessness go by. I weave the dreams
Of memory with schemes, present with past,
And put the brake on time and think it stops.
I'm going now, - alone. Milesian friend,
I leave you, but I leave you not alone!

(Exit the Other Woman. Daphne leads Gyges out from behind the curtain).

DAPHNE. GYGES.

DAPHNE

At least not now. She offers us alliance, Alliance fraught with guile, conspiracy.

Guilt issues from that woman's every touch.

It is the curse brought on her by her crime;

Shê poisoned bread. She dared to knead dread venom

Into the sacred gifts of Mother Earth,
Life-giving wheat and water's purity.

But she must not pollute our love that flows

As crystal-clear as water from a well.

I will not let her poison love's sweet bread.

Earth, bread, and water, - they have cursed that woman And now her only food is bitter gold.

Oh, I've been thirsting for your silence, Gyges.

Like as the weary traveller in the desert

Eagerly plunges in a wayside pool,

So do I need once more to feel the cool

Flow of your quietness. And yet, 'tis strange ...

It seems so different, it seems so shallow ...

(Gyges looks at Daphne intently and smiles. He takes her in his arms and kisses her passionately. Then he draws back, holding her by the hands; and suddenly)

GYGES

Daphne, I love you!

DAPHNE

O ye gods in Heaven!

You've spoken, oh, you've spoken!

GYGES

My first words

I've treasured as my gift to you. I love you.

These are the first words uttered by these lips.

DAPHNE

Oh, my dear love!

GYGES

More than two years ago

My deafness left me. All I heard at first
Were sounds of hatred and of enmity.

Already I had sensed them long ago

Behind the wall of silence, in expressions

And hostile looks. From Atys then I learned Suspicion's glossary. The Other Woman Taught me the ways of cunning and ambition.

My father's teachings were of gold and wealth,
His harsh and only faith. And last from you,

Both from your voice and from your silences,

I learned of love and truth the blessed tongue.

DAPHNE

Oh, Gyges!

GYGES

When I had no ears but eyes,
I noticed that your lips whene'er you called me
Parted but once as sweetly as a flower:

,,Gyges!,, you said; but when the others spoke
Their lips were twisted in contemptuous hate

Addressing the poor, helpless deaf-mute fool.

DAPHNE But what prevented you from ever speaking?

Something constrained me. It was a kind of fear

As though some danger lay in speech. At first

I was held back by instinct. Later, when

I heard and understood more, I was sure

The time was not yet ripe.

DAPHNE

GYGES

And now?

GYGES

Oh, now

The world must learn that I'm no invalid.

I heard Adrastus' taunting yesterday.

No one shall say I am unworthy of you.

DAPHNE

Gyges, beware! Let Atys first return

Unharmed, - and surely he'll return unharmed, -

Because, Adrastus, should he see who took

Your horse and the great sword of Heracles,

From murderer will turn to bodyguard.

Let Atys come victorious. Then reveal

Yourself and let it be a day of joy,

Not one of mourning. Surely then the king

Will be convinced the god in error told him

Never to pray to hear your voice.

GYGES

Should I

Await the conquering Atys' safe return?
Maybe. But then suppose he rides afar

From Sardis, visor down, lest, once revealed,
The huntsmen, fearing Croesus, forcibly
Bring back the rebel prince. Suppose the dream

That Croesus dreamed was verily prophetic....

DAPHNE . So that is why you let him take the arms....

GYGES Yes, that is why. He tried to make my silence

A tomb. But if the gods so will, I'll make it

A gravestone for both Atys and Adrastus.

DAPHNE Therefore you must not yet speak openly.

Let your voice and words belong to me alone, -

At least for a few days. Make me a gift, -

A precious secret gift, - of every word.

Let me enjoy your every syllable

Like some untasted fruit.

GYGES O my sweet love!

DAPHNE The world awaits your speech to live again,

And I to learn from you the Universe.

Nothing for me exists, - bird, plant, man, god, -

Save what your lips shall name.

GYGES Daphne! The magic

Of that dear name for me encloses all

The beauty of Creation!

DAPHNE While speechless

You had drawn all into a world unsullied,
Anonymous, where everything was pure;
All virgin matter and unmemoried form.

No place therein for cunning. Outward acts

Set limits upon man. Now you must leave
The guileless multitude of visual things
To labour in the grim cosmogony
Of things unseen, - the direful potency
Of words.

GYCES

But you will help me!

DAPHNE

We may find

Perchance some word you know not still, and thus
I'll have a gift for you, or else perchance
A burden to be carried.

There are words

Like fruit: you gather them in laughter, drink them In tears. Others, accursed, like a sore Infect the tongue.

GYGES

I know them well; I learned them

From all those others. Now 'tis time that they

Should know that I possess them too.

DAPHNE

Oh, Gyges,

I fear for you! Consider your advantage, Your strength - if you continue listening
To all without suspicion from the others.
For you alone possess a treasure rare, One that all Croesus'wealth cannot purchase, The knowledge of the truth. So let the others
Reveal their nature more completely still,
And then your hour will come.

I'll seal your lips

With kisses.

(Daphne throws her arms around him. They kiss. Suddenly, down in the courtyard is heard a hubbub of voices, horses'hooves, clanging of armour, barking of dogs, and sharp commands. Daphne runs to the parapet.)

What's all this? What's happening?

Can they be back already? What's amiss?

(The noise without increases and penetrates to the palace)

The palace is awake. They're coming. Hide

Quickly. They mustn't see you.

(She conceals Gyges behind the curtain. The Young Maidens of the Chorus enter. Their apparel shows that they have been awakened from their sleep.)

SCENE IV.

DAPHNE. THE YOUNG MAIDENS OF THE CHORUS.

(As he pronounces the last words he looks at Daphne who turns away. Enter Croesus, Sandanis, the Other Woman, and the Youths of the Chorus.)

SCENE VI

CROESUS. SANDANIS. ADRASTUS. THE OTHER WOMAN. DAPHNE.
THE CHORUS.

CROESUS

What is wrong, Adrastus?

ADRASTUS

My Lord, when you received me at your court

A man pursued, a fugitive, I vowed

Before the God of Hospitality

That joy should always be my gift to you.

Let others be the messengers of grief.

CROESUS

Speak! I command you!

ADRASTUS

When, at our first stop

We whiled away the time with archery,

In practice for the hunt, and the spears rained

Upon the target, one spear lodged beneath

The helmet at the neck's base....

(He pauses, with bowed head.)

CROESUS

Gyges! - Speak!

ADRASTUS

Sire, you have spoken.

DAPHNE & THE O.W. together

Gyges!

(Enter four huntsmen bearing on a stretcher the corpse enveloped in Gyges' cloak. The dead man wears his helmet with the visor down.)

SCENE VII.

CROESUS. SANDANIS. THE OTHER WOMAN. ADRASTUS. DAPHNE. THE CHORUS. FOUR HUNTSMEN BEARING THE DEAD MAN.

ADRASTUS

In reverence

To the sanctity of royal branze, we left
His visor closed as he himself had kept it
Throughout the march. His foot caught in the stirrup
As he fell, and the frightened steed shot forth
And dragged him o'er the ground. When we came to him
We found him dead. The visor must have saved
His face from injury by rocks and thorns.
He who lived reft of voice shall not go down
To Hades reft of visage.....

(Pause.)

CROESUS

Never heard we

His voice

Like an amphora fast-sealed,

Its wine untasted, so has the sunk in death

What will you say to our ancestral shades

Gyges? If speech comes to you there, inform

Candaules that the Pythia is a liar

And Delphi's god a cheat.

(He takes a few steps towards the dead man.)

The visor closed,

But still more closed the marbled face beneath

The bronze. Like to an amphora fast-sealed
Filled with the distillations of a thousand
Long days, so has he sunk. Whither to go?
What dark gods, thirsting ever, now await him?
What banquets claim the nectar bittersweet
Distilled - as bees distill - by eyes and hearts
With life's own pollen.

Visor closed. Long since Had silence drawn its visor over him. Before death's visor locked him fast. From start To finish he remained unknown. But who Is not so? Does a voice, do words make known A man's true nature? Does one know another? Do any of us know ourselves? Our masks Shown to the world before the glass conceal Our own essential form. Or have we none? Are we a formless amalgam of vain Intentions, self-delusions vainer still? I told you, Sandanis, the Player is cunning; Blind too he surely must be. For a shaft Of bronze was destined to lay Atys low; His brother donned Candaules'helm, and lo! The unknown Archer was deceived. Why, even A Scythian would not have been so tricked! Such are the Players, Sandanis, who beat us. Time, like a spurious pawn, they hold concealed Beneath their mantle's folds. If Time and Death

Were not with them we should win the game....

(He approaches the dead man, bends down and gazes at him.)

The spear is wedged in the neck's root, - as though
To still for ever voice not ever heard, To nail for ever silence in his throat.

A second mouth, 'twould seem, gapes in the wound,
Rent wide in bitter, silent exclamation...

He 's near us in this hall; we stretch our hand
And touch him, yet he has already gone

Elsewhere beyond both Time and Circumstance;
He bides there where the panting Hours stop short,
Those unrelenting hounds of the gods'hunt....

(He moves back and places his hand on Sandanis'shoulder. Then he speaks to Sandanis in lowered tones:)

Friend Sandanis, make a sarcophagus

Of gold for him and fill it full of staters.

Let Charon know that henceforth he may not

For many years demand a passenger

From Croesus.

Now let us consider, too,

What further offerings I must send to Delphi

And to the other temples. Sandanis,

I have a strange presentiment, as though

The golden chains wherewith I bound the powers

Of darkness have been loosed. See that my craftsmen

Fashion new images and jars of gold.

They say the rich

Are hard towards the poor; but nothing equals

The poor man's harshness towards the rich. The gods

Themselves are like the poor, - without compassion,

And deem whate'er you give them not enough.

So far, my friend, I've won. And Heaven's arrows

Have missed their mark, even as the venal darts

Of mercenaries sold to the enemy.

(With hesitating steps he approaches the corpse.)

I never spoke to him....

And now, wrapped in the great, the final silence

He will not hear me....

Oh, my son, forgive me!

Forgive me, Gyges!

(Gyges emerges from behind the curtain. General consternation. Gyges seems to be about to speak.)

SCENE VIII.

CROESUS. SANDANIS. ADRASTUS. THE OTHER WOMAN. DAPHNE. THE CHORUS. FOUR HUNTSMEN. GYGES.

DAPHNE

(Shrilly)

Do not speak.

(Daphne rushes towards Gyges. Impetuously she presses her hand to his mouth, and then, to conceal her movement, she kisses him wildly. In the consternation caused by the appearance of Gyges the purpose of her action passes unnoticed.)

CROESUS Gyges. 'Tis Gyges... But then who's the other?

Where's Atys? Bring me Atys! Have him come

Immediately!

(Nobody moves.)

Where's Atys? Atys! Call him!

Bring him at once!

(He steps forward to the corpse. Hesitates. Turns and sees Gyges. Bends over the body. Takes a sudden decision and quickly raises the visor. He steps back in horror.)

It's Atys! It is Atys!

(Adrastus with a raucous cry covers his head with his cloak and sinks to Croesus' feet. While Croesus remains crouched over Atys' body and Adrastus is prostrate before the King, the Chorus gather at either end of the proscenium and chant in low tones:)

CHORUS

- It was Atys.

Atys.

Atys.

-The down-drawn visor covered the lifeless visage, -the visage of Atys slain.
-It covered the withered happiness of Croesus, -happiness gone for ever.

-Oh, visors must never be lifted; for oft-times, oft-times they conceal

-A corpse; the remains of a joy we assumed to be living.

-And a joy that is dead is the bitterest of pains

-The pain that is most alive.

CHORUS

-Shattered the image of absolute, boundless felicity.

-Rocked to their very foundations the towers of pride.

-Of a sudden, gold, alabaster are naught; are vain and illusory.

-The redoutable palace is naught but a spurious counterfeit -

Flimsy as theatre-trappings about to be taken asunder.

-Atys is the first victim, -victim of the mighty encounter.

-The first of the vanquished in the mighty defeat.

-The defeat of human felicity.....

-Lo! With such acts of injustice the gods appear to be just.

-With such blind strokes Destiny appears incorruptible,

To the disinherited granting the exquisite luxury,

The voluptuous consolation

Of making him pity the fortunate.

THE WHOLE CHORUS

Ill-fated Croesus, O most unhappy Croesus!

-The richer is the living body of felicity

The fatter fertilizers it gives forth in death—
To nourish our misery.



(The Prince is proud of his ani-mals, some of which he has trapped himself on expeditions abroad, but he is more proud of his aquarium, which is one of the best of its kind in the world. There are fish that took like coral and fish that look like stones; fish that are square, round, triangular; fish with wings and tish with mouths like tweezers; car-dinal fish which look like over-fat

goldfish, and big, flot spade fish. In addition to being a naturalist and big-game hunter, Prince Rainier is an all-round sportsman. He plays tennis and golf, rides, boxes, likes fast cars, and does underwater fish-

in the words of a personal fri-end, "He is very much a man's man. He tikes nothing better than a quiet drink in the company of male fri-ends talking sport, particularly un-derwater research, for which he made his own equipment."

Prince Rainier was educated at first in England at Summer Fields School, St. Leonards-on-Sea, Sussex, and Stowe School in Buckinghamshire. He was a sturdy lad, a good athlete, popular with fellow-pupils and teachers. His sports master at Summer Fields recalls that Rainier became the school's champion boxer at his weight. The quarrel flored up when Prince Reinier blacked the sale to France of neventy-four thousand shares in the company that controls Monte Carlo television. The ruling angered M. Petletier, who was responsible to France under treaty arrangements, M. Pelletier, who was responsible to France under treaty arrangements, though he acted as Moraco's Prime Minister. As thousands of Athenians yesterday queued outside the Cathedral, patiently waiting for their turn to enter and orcss themselves in front of the body of the late King, foreign royalty and other high dignitaries from all over the world were arriving in Athens to join the Greek people in paying the last tributes at the funeral procession this morning.

The funeral service will start in I Althens Cathedral at 10 o'alack this morning. It will be officiated by

The funeral contege will proceed by way of Evangelistrics and Brmou streets, Constitution Square, George I Street and Queen So-phias Avenue to the intersection with Vasileos Constantinou Avenue (Athens Hilton).

The procession will be led by detachment of policemen headed by the chief of the Athens Police. Next will come a representative contin-gent of the Greek Sdouts Corps, a military band, contingents of the Army, Naval, Air Force and Gen-carmerie Cadet schools, a company of the Rayal Cretan Guard, court officials, clergymen and the Archbishop.

The gun-corriage corrying the King's aoffin will be drawn by sail-one of the Royal Greek Navy and flanked by a company of Royal Evzone guards in pairs on each

N.A.S.A. to negotiate with TWA for space center contract

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced that it will negotiate with Trans
World Airlines for a contract to provide base support services at the John F. Kennedy space center at Merritt Island, Florida.

A single contract will be awarded to TWA for an initial period of one year with certain renewal provisions expected for each of the following two years. Value of the contract for the first year is expected to exceed 7 million dollars. TWA elected from 20 firms which submitted proposals.

the contract are general mainten-ance and utilities operations, supply operations, fire protection

prevention, security and medical.

Asked about the Doxiades report, Prime Minister Papandreou said yes-terday that he has not yet received the report, but added that the government will not remain indiffe to the matter.



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



ATHENS, March 12 — Hundreds of thousands of Greeks paid tribute to King Paul today as his body was borne to the grave.

The sun shone brightly and a brisk breeze from the sea whipped the blue-and-white Greek flags hanging at half-miaff.

Athenians pressed against confining steel cables along the mile-and-a-hair procession route, shouting at everyone who blocked their view.

There was little in common with the Athens of old, except perhaps the Athenians themselves, who had come to the feneral of a leader who was also a native of the city.







House Rejects Move to Kill **Own Pay Raise**

\$10,000 Clause Stays in Bill on Vote of 125 to 37

By JOSEPH YOUNG

The House this afternoon rejected a move to eliminate the \$10,000 - a year Congressional pay raise from the Government salary bill.

The lopsided vote of 125 to 37 gave fresh encouragement to Government pay raise sponsors that the key congressional salary raise provision could be kept in the bill.

It was reported, however, that other amendments would be offered to trim the proposed \$10,000 congressional pay increase to \$7,500.

Brought Into Line

Earlier this afternoon the House adopted an amendment to cut \$123 million from the Government pay bill. This would reduce the cost from \$668 million to \$445 million and bring it into line with President Johnson's pay budget requests to Congress.

The amendment, sponsored by

The amendment, sponsored by Chairman Murray of the House Civil Service Committee, would not reduce the amount of pay raises for Government classified and postal employes that had been approved by his committee.

Rather, it struck out fringe benefits in the bill which would have given added within-step pay raises to postal workers and would have authorized a five-day week for postmasters.







At the conclusion of the service, Constantine, Frederika and other members of the royal family knelt and kissed the coffin.

White skirted blue-jacketed royal Ezvone guards lifted the coffin, carried it out of the cathedral and placed it on a gun carriage drawn by Greek sailors.

The King's crown, his field marshal's baton and his sword were placed atop the coffin. The national anthem was played at a death march tempo and the slow booming of a 21-gun salute echoed across the city,

Walking in a large group after the royal family were official representatives includ-ing seven kings or former kings, three queens, more than two dozen princes and princesses and such notables as Truman and West German President Heinrich Luebke.
