TEXT OF REMARKS AT THE AMERICAN COMMUNITY SCHOOL IN HALANDRI
BY MISS LYMDA BIRD JOHNSON, DAUGHTER OF THE PRESIDENT OF U.S.A.

It is always difficult for me to speak to people my age because I'm not a great speaker and I suspect people my age realize this more than older people do. But I really want to thank you for letting us come out here and I must admit one of the principal reasons is that I hoped they would let you out of class.

I remember when we used to invite everybody we could to visit us in school in Washington because if you could get someone to come they might let us out for an assembly or something like that and you know how that would endear the visitor to us.

As I look around I see a lot of people, a lot of faces that could very well be in Johnson City or Washington, either one. I notice a geometry book over there that I had, and I certainly hope you don't have as much trouble with that subject as I did.

But as the Ambassador said, you are all representatives of our country and you are all ambassadors in your own way. And I am about your age and my father thought he could trust me to come over here and act as his ambassador. And I'm sure all of your parents are using you as their ambassadors too. Because, we young people are going to be having a part in our government, someday either by voting or being elected officially and now, of course, as we are, we represent the United States every day in our regular lives.

What people abroad see of the United States is what you show them. Many of the people of Greece may never get to the United States and all they may ever know of our country is what they will learn through the Americans they will meet here. And they say: "You are an American" and therefore that proud tag you wear you must also be worthy of. I know sometimes when I want to do something they say "Oh, you shouldn't do that, people won't understand." And sometimes I do it anyway, just as I'm sure you do too.

But as I said, I don't have any lecture and I just want to ask you all to join me in trying to let everybody see the good American and not what some people call the Ugly American. I talked to some people today and I asked: "Do you really think most people you meet think we are Ugly Americans?" And they answered me: "No, not after they meet us and know us."

But sometimes people don't have the chance to meet the average fine, interesting people that live in America. They just see a very few people and that colors their opinions. Of course we want to color their opinions the other way and show the people of other countries what fine, loving people we are. And that we are interested in their problems too.

I'm sure all of you here are learning about Greece. I must admit I envy you living in Greece. My academic interest is in history, particularly ancient history. I'm jealous of you that I can't stay here longer than five days, and I hope that you all understand and respect the advantage you are having and also the part you are playing in our foreign policy. Because all the foreign aid in the world can't win the friends that young people can. And I think many people find it much easier to understand young people than some older people because we are going to be the leaders some day and we do have that responsibility.

And I'm just glad it's such a pretty day and that we can all be here together. And I hope I got a chance to meet some of you. Thank you.

TURKISH SHIP KOKKINA, SAYS

NICOSIA, Dispatches, Sept. 14. — President Makarios today agreed to allow a Turkish ship to dock at Famagusta port with supplies of food and clothing for Turkish Cypriots in the coastal village of Kokkina, north-west Cyprus, a United Nations spokesman said here.

The agreement followed discussions this morning and this evening between President Makarios, Senor Galo Plaza, special representative in Cyprus of the U.N. Secretary-General U Thant, and General K.S. Thimayya, the UN force commander.

Yesterday the United Nations airlifted two tons of food and fuel to the Turkish Cypriots in Kokkina.

U.N. MEET

Meanwhile, in New York, it

was officially announced that the Security Council will meet on Wednesday to consider the renewal of the mandate of the United Nations peace force in Cyprus, due to expire on September 26.

U Thant, the Secretary General, proposed in a report to the Council on Friday that the force of 6,160 stay in Cyprus for a further three months and said there was «serious needs» to define its mandate more clearly.

Observers here believed his suggestion would be accepted by the 11-member Council.

U Thant warned that a withdrawal of the force which has had two extensions voted by the Council already, could «lead to utter disaster.»

Khanh Firmly After Aborti

SAIGON, Sept. 14, Reuter — Major General Nguyen Khanh returned to Saigon today firmly in power as Prime Minister after the collapse of yesterday's coup against him.

He immediately went into conference with a group of younger generals who had saved him. They are understood to have told he must strengthen the authority of his government and stand firm against political and religious pressures.

About 1,000 students meanwhile demonstrated in Saigon streets, with banners and slogans condemning «counter-revolutionary coups» and neutralism.

General Khanh flew by helicopter from the ocean resort of Cap Saint Jacques where he had spent last night while coup leaders and loyal generals negotiated a peaceful settlement.

of the Armed Forces and other officials had arrived earlier.

Smiling and waving King Constantine and Princess Anne-Marie moved to their seats walking between two lines of young men and women in national costumes who showered them with rose petals.

After the Royal party arrived, a military band at the entrance to the Stadium gave the signal and the displays began. A mixed band of all Armed Forces led a parade, in which units of euzonas, of the Army, Navy and Air Force schools, of the Harbor Corps, the Police, of school children, Boy Scouts and students of the school of Physical Training took part.

FRANKFURT, Germany, Mon. (AP) — Prince Philip, husband of Britain's Queen Elizabeth, arrived here by plane today for an overnight stopover en route to Athens.

He was accompanied by Princess Anne and Prince Charles. They will attend the wedding of King Constantine and Danish Princess Anne-Marie.

The members of Britain's Royal Family were greeted at the airport by Count Ludwig of Hesse and his wife, Princess Margaret. They will stay at the Hessa's castle in Wolfgarten, near Darmstadt.

Airport officials said Philip flew the royal flight Avra 748 himself when it landed here. He is due to take off at 10 a.m. Tuesday for Pisa, Italy.

But reliable sources said military units throughout the country were on a new alert and all leaves were cancelled. The training periods for reserve officers were extended, the sources said. Units of the Turkish fleet also were reported to be concentrating at the port of Mersin on the Southwest Coast.

A government spokesman said Turkey still was determined to send sup-

plies to Cyprus for beleaguered Turkish Cypriots, "whatever happens."

Premier Ismet Inonu said last weekend in Turkey would send supply ships armed escort to the Cyprus west coast to aid Turkish Cypriots who were running short of food.

Indonesia hits U.K. policy on Malaysia

UNITED NATIONS, Mon. (ReUPI) — Indonesia warned today that any British retaliation for its "crush Malaysia" policy would bring a swift counterattack from Indonesian forces.

Indonesian Deputy Foreign Minister Sudjarwo Djardonegara, addressing the Security Council in reply to Malaysia's charge of aggression by Indonesia, recalled recent news dispatches from London indicating that Britain may resort to armed retaliation against Indonesia.

"Let me say this," Djardarwo said, "if Britain chooses to launch an open attack on any part of Indonesian territory, Indonesia will retaliate with a counter blow forthwith."

The Indonesian delegate launched a spirited attack on Britain, and to some extent the United States, for what he called their interference in Southeast Asian affairs. He accused the British of carrying out "an adventurous policy of gunboat diplomacy" in the region.

MORE AIRCRAFT SENT

In London, an authoritative source said today the British government hoped the United Nations Security Council would take effective action to stop any more Indonesian attacks against Malaysia.

A British Foreign Office spokesman today declined to comment on a spate of recent press reports that Britain might take retaliatory action against Indonesian military bases if Indonesia made any further attacks on Malaysia.

Earlier, it was announced in Singapore, that Britain has ordered more aircraft to reinforce her forces in Malaysia.

Soviet aid talks set for Friday

MOSCOW, Mon. (Reuter) - Negotiations on Soviet military aid for Cyprus will begin here on Friday, Andreas Araouzos, Cyprus Minister of Commerce and Industry, said today.

The Cyprus Minister, who is carrying a special message from President Makarios for Mr. Khrushchev, said his talks with Soviet officials so far had been "very satisfactory."

Araouzos arrived in Moscow last Friday to negotiate a Soviet aid offer originally made a month ago.

"I am optimistic about the results," he said.

MILITARY AND POLITICAL

Araouzos said he completed preliminary arrangements for Friday's negotiations during discussions with "high officials" at the Soviet Foreign Ministry today.

He said the negotiations would cover the "general subject of Soviet military assistance, and that takes in both the military and political sectors."

Araouzos said Cyprus would be represented at Friday's meeting by himself, Kostas Assiotis, Director-General of the Cyprus Foreign Ministry, and Lefkas Georgiades, Cyprus Ambassador in Moscow. He did not know who would represent the Soviet government.

Araouzos declined to discuss details of the coming negotiations, but said he hoped to meet Khrushchev, probably at the end of this week.

"I have a personal message from President Makarios for Mr. Khrushchev, and I hope to deliver it in person," he said.

COSTOPOULOS SETS BULGARIA VISIT

Foreign Minister Stavros Costopoulos will pay an official visit to Bulgaria between September 24 and 29, in return for the visit to Athens by Bulgarian Foreign Minister Badchev last July, when 12 agreements between the two countries were signed.

Indonesian Deputy Foreign Minister Sudjarwo Tjandrongoro, addressing the Security Council in reply to Malaysia's charge of aggression by Indonesia, recalled recent news dispatches from London indicating that Britain may resort to armed retaliation against Indonesia.

"Let me say this," Dudjarwo said. "If Britain chooses to launch an open attack on any part of Indonesian territory, Indonesia will retaliate with a counter blow forthwith."

The Indonesian delegate launched a spirited attack on Britain, and to some extent the United States, for what he called their interference in Southeast Asian affairs. He accused the British of carrying out "an adventurous policy of gunboat diplomacy" in the region.

MORE AIRCRAFT SENT

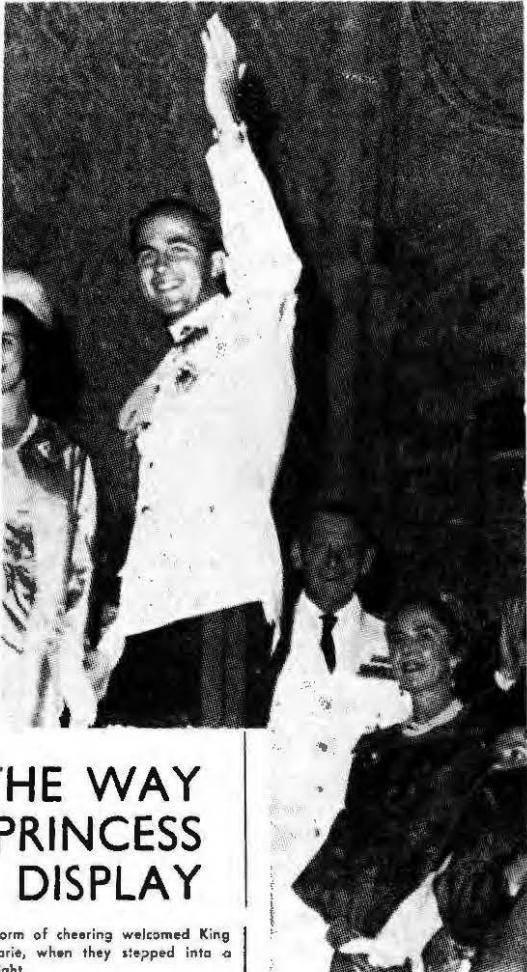

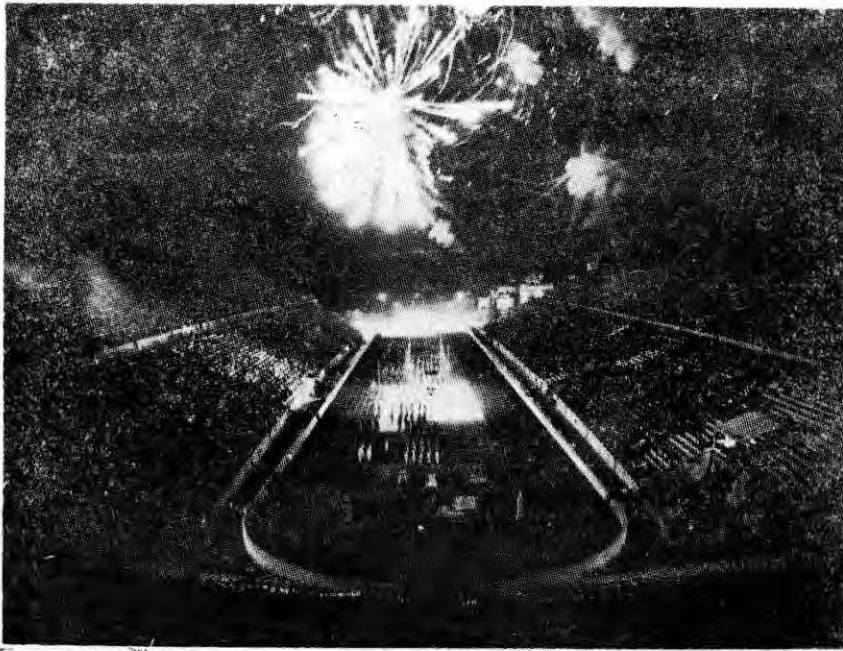

N.Y. schools 'struck' over artificial integration

NEW YORK, Mon. (AP) — More than a million youngsters were moped back to New York's public schools today, but attendance was by a parents' boycott against the busing of children to achieve racial

gration. The Board of Education reported 275,638 students absent from classrooms — about 175,000 above the normal 10 per cent absenteeism on an opening day of school.

White parents' groups which opposed the planned two-day boycott had predicted 250,000 pupils would take part. Last winter, racial integrationists kept almost half the 1,056,000 students away in one boycott, and 267,000 away in a second.

Today's boycott was called to protest a Board of Education pilot plan for speeding racial integration in public schools by busing some children away from their regular neighborhood schools. Parochial schools with 375,000 attendance were not involved.

About 150 schools were picketed by white parents supporting the boycott, called by the Parents and Payers Coordinating Council, and Joint Council for Better Education.

Picket signs read, "children must be political pawns," and "civil for all — but no forced busing." There is no legal segregation in New York public schools. Now neighborhood racial patterns in some schools nearly all negro, Puerto Rican and others virtually white. There are over 400,000 Puerto Rican children in the public school system.

In response to growing pressure from civil rights groups, the Board of Education this term launched a plan to exchange pupils between heavily negro schools and heavily white ones in the same general area. This involved about 2,314 children with about 1,000 of them being pulled out of their immediate neighborhood.

Opponents of the busing say the plan is not opposed to integration as such but are fighting to preserve the neighborhood concept.

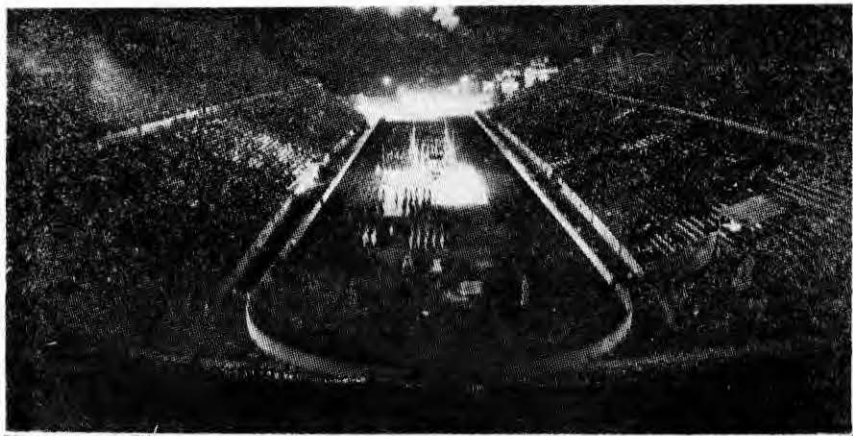

NEW YORK, Mon. (AP) — More than a million youngsters were summoned back to New York's public schools today, but attendance was cut by a parents' boycott against the busing of children to achieve racial integration.

The Board of Education reported 275,638 students absent from classrooms — about 175,000 above the normal 10 per cent absenteeism on an opening day of school.

White parents' groups which sponsored the planned two-day boycott had predicted 250,000 pupils would take part. Last winter, racial integrationists kept almost half the 1,056,000 students away in one boycott, and 267,000 away in a second.

Today's boycott was called to protest a Board of Education pilot plan for speeding racial integration in public schools by busing some children away from their regular neighborhood schools. Parochial schools with 375,000 attendance were not involved.

About 150 schools were picketed by white parents supporting the boycott, called by the Parents and Taxpayers Coordinating Council, and the Joint Council for Better Education.

Picket signs read, "children must not be political pawns," and "civil rights for all — but no forced busing."

There is no legal segregation in New York public schools. However, neighborhood racial patterns make some schools nearly all negro and Puerto Rican and others virtually all white. There are over 400,000 negro and Puerto Rican children in the public school system.

In response to growing pressure from civil rights groups, the Board of Education this term launched a plan to exchange pupils between certain heavily negro schools and heavily white ones in the same general area.

This involved about 2,314 children with about 1,000 of them being bused out of their immediate neighborhoods. Opponents of the busing say they are not opposed to integration as such but are fighting to preserve the neighborhood concept.

U.S. protests Berlin shooting

BERLIN, Mon. (UPI) — The United States sent a protest note to the Russians today charging that East Berlin Police shot into the American sector yesterday and endangered the lives of American soldiers.

The American protest said the East Berlin police fired into West Berlin while hunting for a wounded refugee.

The protest was sent by George C. McGhee, U.S. Ambassador to West Germany, to Pyotr Abramov, Soviet Ambassador to East Germany.

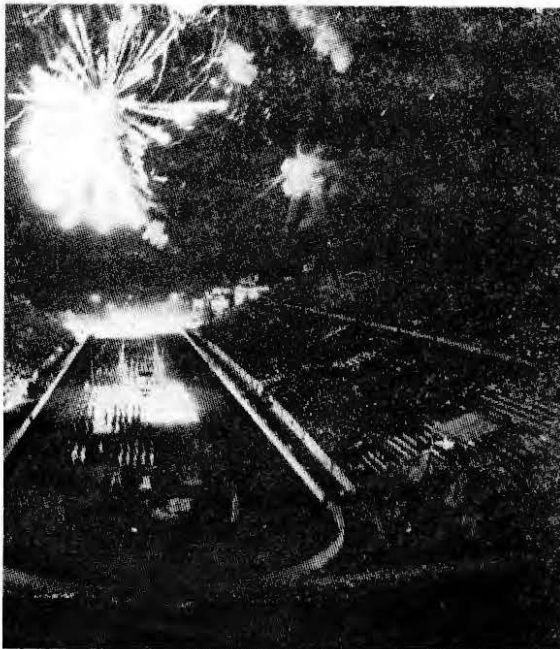

Ecumenical Council resumes

VATICAN CITY, Mon. (Reuter) — Pope Paul promised today the Vatican Ecumenical Council would give more power to Roman Catholic Bishops, but would also confirm Papal supremacy.

The Pontiff was opening the Council's third session in a Latin speech after "concelebrating" mass with Bishops from Africa, Asia, Europe and the Americas in a unique new rite manifesting unity.

Pope Paul, who in his first encyclical last month expressed "distress" the Papal supremacy was being regarded as a stumbling block to unity by other Christian churches, devoted a considerable section of his speech to explaining its necessity.

He said the question of the relative powers of Pope and Bishops was the "weightiest and most delicate" item on the Assembly's agenda.

The Pope turned to observers from other Christian churches, sitting near his throne, and assured them he would make every effort to end "the long, sad history" of disunity.

Meanwhile it was announced the Orthodox Patriarchate in Istanbul has appointed three official observers to the council for the first time.

About 2,500 Bishops and other churchmen heard the Pope's assurance that his role as their supreme leader "in no way defrauds you of your due authority."

The purple-robed prelates, who tomorrow begin debate and voting on six major decrees, streamed up the steps of Saint Peter's Basilica in brilliant sunshine to take their places in tiers of seats erected along the nave.

Cardinal Stefan Wyszyński, Archbishop of Warsaw, arrived with a contingent of Polish Bishops. Four Czech Bishops were also in the Basilica.

But notable absences from Eastern Europe included Cardinal Jozsef Mindszenty, Primate of Hungary, and Archbishop Josef Beran of Prague. Pope Paul sent special greetings "to those whom lack of freedom still prevents from coming to this council."

Nasser, Faisal agree steps to end Yemen war

ALEXANDRIA, U.A.R., Mon. (UPI) — The United Arab Republic and Saudi Arabia announced tonight they have agreed on "full cooperation" to end the long, bloody civil war in the Yemen.

A communique issued after talks between Saudi Premier Prince Faisal and U.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nasser said the two nations would mediate between the Yemeni Nationalists and Royalists in an attempt to end the war.

In the past, the U.A.R. has sent troops and supplies to help the Yemeni Nationalist government, while Saudi Arabia has supplied the Royalists of Imam El Badr, who is fighting to regain his throne.

Sources said the Saudis agreed as a first step to end their financial aid to the ousted Royalists. Other points of agreement included a large scale reduction of Egyptian military forces in the Yemen.

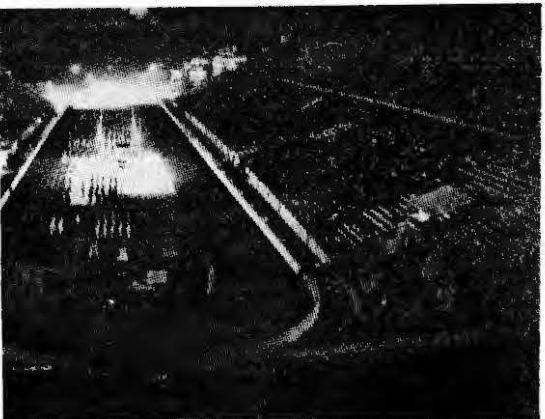

The United States Delegation to the wedding of His Majesty King Constantine of Greece and Princess Anne-Marie of Denmark will depart from Washington on September 13, 1964. The Delegation, Mr. William G. Helis, Jr. of Louisiana and Miss Lynda Bird Johnson, will depart Washington National Airport at 8:00 p. m. EDT on Sunday, and arrive at the John F. Kennedy International Airport at 9:15 p. m. They will then depart New York aboard TWA Flight 840 at 10:00 p. m. for Athens via Rome, Italy.

They will arrive in Rome at 11:00 a. m. (Rome local time) on Monday, September 14, and depart for Athens at 11:40 a. m., arriving in Athens at 2:25 p. m. (Athens local time).

The official party, including Ambassador and Mrs. Angier Biddle Duke and Miss Cassandra Helis, daughter of Mr. Helis, will be met in Athens by Ambassador Henry Labouisse.

The President and Mrs. Johnson are sending as a wedding gift a 24 inch silver Revere bowl with Presidential seal and inscribed with the signatures of the President and the First Lady. Also being given is a silver framed color photograph of the First Family in the Rose Garden, and inscribed by all four members of the family. The frame bears the Presidential seal.

Miss Johnson will wear a floor length white silk Ottoman coat with long sleeves and rhinestone buttons over a matching sheath dress with a high straight neckline. She will also wear a double-bow hat made of the same Ottoman and white wrist one-button kid gloves, white shoes and she will carry a white beaded bag.

The wedding will take place at 10:30 Friday morning.

The Presidential representatives, during their stay in Athens, will attend a reception given by Ambassador and Mrs. Henry Labouisse in their honor on Monday evening. Mr. Helis and Miss Johnson will attend a ball at the Royal Palace on Wednesday evening.

The party will leave Athens Saturday morning at 11:15 (local time) aboard TWA flight 841 for New York via Rome, Italy. They will arrive in New York at 5:30 p. m. Saturday, and will arrive Washington National Airport at 7:50 Saturday night.
