There is set forth below information concerning certain of the individuals who were arrested at the Pentagon during captioned demonstration.

Edward Fields - Fields resides at Five Beacon Street, New York, New York. Fields in 1966 was a member of or attended meetings of the Students for a Democratic Society Chapter at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. The Students for a Democratic Society is an organization which Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, has stated the Party "has going for us."

Joseph W. Frazier - He resides at 698 West End Avenue, New York, New York. In late 1966 Frazier, a member of the Chad Mitchell Trio singing group, was identified as a member of the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America and was pushing this organization to students with whom he came into contact on college campuses. The W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America is a communist-oriented youth organization.

Nancy Kurshan - She resides at 13 East Third Street, New York, New York. This individual, while a student at the University of California at Berkeley, attended a National Membership Conference held by the Students for a Democratic Society at the University of Illinois from December 27, 1965, to January 2, 1966.

Roland W. Lamb - Lamb resides at 170 East Third Street, New York, New York. He is the son of Helen Boyden Lamb Lamont and the stepson of Corliss Lamont. Corliss Lamont has been identified as a member of the Communist Party during

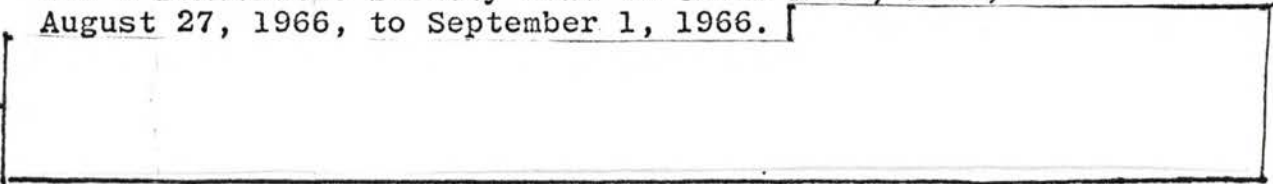

the 1930's and 1940's. In 1967 Corliss Lamont is the Chairman of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee. The Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, established in 1951, is an organization with headquarters in New York, New York, whose avowed purpose is to abolish the House Committee on Un-American Activities and discredit the FBI. It has repeatedly assisted, by means of funds and legal aid, communists involved in violations of the Smith Act of 1940 and similar legal proceedings.

Nathaniel Stillman - He resides at 72 Maple Road, Cornwall, New York. Stillman, as a Harvard University student, was present at a National Communist Party Youth Conference held at Monterey, Indiana, in September, 1965. Stillman also was a participant at the National Convention of the Students for a Democratic Society held in Clear Lake, Iowa, from August 27, 1966, to September 1, 1966.



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Charles Marshall - He resides at 422 East Buffalo Street, Ithaca, New York. Marshall was a member of the Cornell University Chapter of the Students for a Democratic Society during 1966-67 school year.

Sheryl F. Epton - This individual resides at 228 Wait Avenue, Ithaca, New York. Sheryl Epton has been identified as a member of the Cornell University Chapter of the Students for a Democratic Society during the 1966-67 school year.

Burton I. Weiss - He resides at 315½ Eddy Street, Ithaca, New York. Weiss was a member of the Cornell University Chapter of the Students for a Democratic Society during 1966-67 school year.

Michael Zweig - Zweig resides at 2249 Cram Place, Ann Arbor, Michigan. Zweig during the school year 1966-67 was Chairman of the Students for a Democratic Society Chapter on the University of Michigan campus.

Michael Kent Hoover - The present residence of this individual is unknown. In late 1965 and early 1966 Hoover attended eight meetings of the Central Los Angeles W.E.B. DuBois Club. The records at the Juvenile Court, Los Angeles County, Los Angeles, California, described Hoover as a "definite schizoid personality."

Albert Philip Halprin - Halprin is a student at Franconia College, Franconia, New Hampshire. He attended Michigan State University in 1964 and 1965 and while there was a member of the Students for a Democratic Society. Incidental to his claim for classification as a Conscientious Objector, Halprin stated that as a student at Michigan State University he distributed conscientious objector literature and took part in numerous forums, rallies, and teach-ins. He stated that he had given public expression to his point of view by participation in a siege on the White House in August, 1965, and in a march on Washington, D. C., in April, 1965.

Noam A. Chomsky - This individual is a professor of Modern Languages and Linguistics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has been described as one of the most outspoken anti-Vietnam war activists at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and in April, 1966, was one of 360 individuals who announced they would withhold a portion of their income tax in protest of United States policy in Vietnam. Chomsky has been extremely active in numerous anti-Vietnam war activities.

Over at the Air Force today, I had occasion to review an FBI report which revealed that among those arrested at the Pentagon demonstration on October 20-22 was one John Gardosik (date of birth - February 7, 1949).

Gardosik's father is reflected as John F. Gardosik, who has been a White House employee since around 1954. The father has a White House pass. The father-son relationship conclusion is based on a similarity of addresses, namely, 3521 Edwin Street, Wheaton, Maryland.

There is set forth below information concerning certain of the individuals who were arrested at the Pentagon during captioned demonstration.

Bruce Beyer - Beyer resides at 154 Huntington Avenue, Buffalo, New York. On October 20, 1967, several individuals left a package containing Vietnam protests as well as Selective Service Registration and Classification Cards at the Department of Justice Building, Washington, D. C. One of these Selective Service Cards left at that time contained the name of Bruce Beyer.

John Joseph Sanna - This individual resides at 32 Oxford Street, Buffalo, New York. On October 18, 1967, an individual who identified himself as John Joseph Sanna along with several other individuals appeared at Selective Service headquarters in Buffalo, New York, at which time he turned in his Selective Service Classification Card.

Dan Elliott Ackron - This individual resides at 3449 Peachtree Road, Northeast, Atlanta, Georgia. Ackron has been active in numerous anti-Vietnam war groups and civil rights groups and in March, 1967, stated he was a member of the Students for a Democratic Society and the Industrial Workers of the World. The Students for a Democratic Society is an organization which Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, has stated the Party "has going for us." The Industrial Workers of the World has been designated as subversive pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

**ANTI-VIETNAM WAR DEMONSTRATION**

David Louis Duboff - This individual resides at 511 Benjamin Street, Ann Arbor, Michigan. The name of Duboff appeared on a list of the officers of the Voice Political Party, University of Michigan Chapter of the Students for a Democratic Society, in April, 1967. Duboff in January, 1967, was a newly elected member of the Executive Board of the Voice Political Party.

Reverend Ashton Bryan Jones - He resides at 14369 Camargo Court, Los Penasquitos Village, San Diego County, California. Jones in 1963 and 1964 was involved in civil rights demonstrations in Georgia and spent several months in prison for his activities. During the period February, 1965, through July, 1967, Ashton Jones participated in eleven large demonstrations in the Los Angeles area protesting the war in Vietnam and police brutality.

Robert Lee Swartz - Swartz resides at 4821 North Paulina, Chicago, Illinois. Swartz in September, 1966, was observed entering Communist Party headquarters in New York, New York. "New Left Notes," the weekly publication of the Students for a Democratic Society, in its issue of August 21, 1967, contained an article which was written by Bob Swartz of the Students for a Democratic Society and the Chicago Area Draft Resisters. This article concerned a draft resisters conference to be held in Madison, Wisconsin, in August, 1967. In December, 1966, this individual claimed membership in the Industrial Workers of the World.

Michael I. Rubicz - Rubicz resides at 103 21st Street, Seattle, Washington. Rubicz has been an active Communist Party member for several years and in October, 1967, it was reported he had been working recently in trying to recruit young people into the Communist Party.

Bobby L. Turner - This individual resides at 1411 South M Street, Tacoma, Washington. Turner in 1967 attended the Young Political Explorers League Summer Camp near Olympia, Washington, and was present at the July and August, 1967, "People's World" picnics held at Cottage Lake and Long Lake, Washington, respectively. The Young Political Explorers League was started in 1958 at the direction of the Communist Party and is currently under the guidance and leadership of the Communist Party. "People's World" is a west coast communist newspaper.

Jean Carroll Gammon - She resides at 3½ South Dubuque Street, Iowa City, Iowa. Gammon is an active member of the Students for a Democratic Society Chapter at the University of Iowa.

John Marr Blowen - He resides at 1905 Spring Garden Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Blowen was observed burning his Selective Service Classification Card at a demonstration and rally sponsored by the Philadelphia Area Vietnam Committee in October, 1967. The Philadelphia Area Vietnam Committee is an anti-Vietnam war group.

Francis Thomas Femia - He resides at 1905 Spring Garden Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Femia was observed burning his Selective Service Classification Card at a demonstration and rally sponsored by the Philadelphia Area Vietnam Committee in October, 1967.

J. D. Thompson, Jr. - He resides at 3 College Lane, Haverford, Pennsylvania. This individual's full name is Josiah D. Thompson, Jr., and he is employed as an Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Haverford College. On October 16, 1965, on the University of Pennsylvania campus, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, an affair was held to protest United States action in Vietnam. Thompson was one of the speakers and said that the United States soldiers in Vietnam were common criminals and that the real patriots were here, meaning the group protesting.

Horace Bancroft Davis - He resides at 8 Germania Street, Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts. In 1943, 1944, and 1945 Davis was a member of the Communist Party. In October, 1965, Davis was a member of a group which exerted a Marxist influence at the University of Guyana, British Guiana.

Douglas Alfred Tilden - He resides at 168 Pleasant Street, South Weymouth, Massachusetts. Tilden has been very active in demonstrations and protests against United States participation in the war in Vietnam. On October 20, 1967, a number of Selective Service Registration and Classification Cards of individuals were left at the Department of Justice, Washington, D. C. One of these cards was for an individual by the name of Douglas A. Tilden, South Weymouth, Massachusetts.

Elizabeth Aberman - She resides at 552 Riverside Drive, New York, New York. In December, 1965, Aberman's name was on a list of persons who had attended the Washington Summer Action Project, an anti-Vietnam war activity, in August, 1965. Aberman is currently affiliated with the Committee to Aid the National Liberation Front.

Stewart Albert - This individual resides at 13 East 3rd Street, Manhattan, New York. Albert in 1966 met the Governor of California on the University of California at Berkeley campus. When introducing himself to the Governor, Albert stated "I'm a communist, PLP." The PLP is known as the Progressive Labor Party, which is a militant pro-Chinese Marxist-Leninist organization.

Jill Boskey - According to the "Daily News," a New York daily newspaper, issue of September 12, 1967, five individuals temporarily disrupted a session of the United States Senate, Washington, D. C., by showering the Senate floor with anti-Vietnam war literature. Listed as among those arrested was one Jill Boskey of West Orange, New Jersey. Boskey claimed to be a member of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, which organization sponsored captioned demonstration.

Dear Mrs. Stegall:

I thought the President would be interested in the following information concerning the October 21, 1967, anti-Vietnam war demonstration in Washington, D. C.

It is estimated there was a scattering of between 200-300 Negroes who participated at the Lincoln Memorial rally.

It is estimated approximately 80 percent of the demonstrators were between the ages of 18 to 25 years.

There were approximately 2,000 "hippie or hippie-type" individuals in the crowd.

It is estimated about 35 percent of the participants were women.

The types of individuals who left the demonstration after the Memorial rally and did not go to the Pentagon were the greater percentage of the Negroes, the older people, the spectators, and the clean-cut type of youth.

There is enclosed a memorandum setting forth information regarding the subversive elements who participated in the demonstration.

The above information and the enclosed memorandum are being furnished to the Attorney General.

The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, New York City, sponsored an antiwar demonstration in Washington, D. C., October 20-22, 1967. The primary goal of the demonstration was to confront "the warmakers" and "shut down the Pentagon."

The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam is a nonexclusionary coordinating body and welcomes the affiliation of any organization which protests United States intervention in Vietnam. Its objective is to harness the momentum of existing anti-Vietnam war organizations and other groups.

Support for the demonstration at the Pentagon came from a wide spectrum of "left" organizations. This was borne out by the representatives which appeared in Washington, D. C., to participate in the demonstration.

Representing the Communist Party, USA, was a group of over 125 members who came to Washington, D. C., from as far away as Seattle, Washington, to bolster communist support of the demonstration. Various Party leaders came from throughout the Nation to participate in this activity. A group of demonstrators, approximately 300 in number, marched under the Communist Party banner during the demonstration. Among these were Arnold Johnson, Chairman of the Peace Commission, Communist Party, USA; Michael Zagarell, Chairman of the Party's National Youth Commission; and George Meyers, Chairman, National Trade Union Commission. Several National Committeemen were also present. Among these were Roque Ristorucci, Sid Taylor, Jacob Green, and Phil Bart. Several lesser officials such as district organizers were also in attendance.

## ANTI-VIETNAM WAR DEMONSTRATION

The **Socialist Workers Party**, a group designated as subversive by the Attorney General of the United States, was represented by over **75 members** who came from areas such as Minneapolis, Cleveland, Detroit, Milwaukee, Boston, and San Diego. George Novack, National Committeeman, and Paul Benjamin Boutelle, the Socialist Workers Party vice-presidential candidate, were their Party's representatives at the protest. Ludwig Wilhelm Gartner, Socialist Workers Party organizer from San Diego, California, made the trip to represent the group.

The **Young Socialist Alliance**, a Socialist Workers Party youth group, sent over **25 youngsters** as representatives from their organization.

The **W. E. B. DuBois Clubs of America**, a communist-oriented youth group, was represented by a contingent from Brooklyn, New York. Approximately **200 persons** marched under the W. E. B. DuBois Clubs of America banner.

The **Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade**, an organization designated as subversive by the Attorney General of the United States, also sent a group of approximately **25 members** who marched under their own banner.

Representatives from the **Spartacist League**, a Socialist Workers Party splinter group; the **Progressive Labor Party**, a militant pro-Chinese-Marxist organization; and the **Trade Unionists for Peace**, an organization in the trade-union movement set up by the Communist Party, were also present at the demonstration.

Charles Kenyatta, the New York leader of the Negro extremist organization the **Mau Maus**, and **25** of its representatives were on hand for the demonstration.

A large group of youngsters representing chapters of the **Students for a Democratic Society** located on college campuses was also present. The Students for a Democratic

There is set forth below information concerning certain of the individuals who were arrested at the Pentagon during captioned demonstration.

Ruth Best - This individual resides on Dogwood Lane, Pomona, New York. Best in 1962 admitted membership on the National Committee of the Committee for Nonviolent Action. The letterhead of the Rockland Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy in 1961 contained the name of Ruth Best as secretary. The Committee for Nonviolent Action and the Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy are pacifist organizations which are against the war in Vietnam.

Morris Cakars - He resides at 239 East 13th Street, New York, New York. Cakars in 1965 was employed as Administrative Assistant for the Committee for Nonviolent Action. Cakars in 1965 admitted burning his Selective Service registration card at a demonstration in New York City in order to protest the war in Vietnam and to demonstrate his opposition to military service.

Bruce Dancis - This individual during 1966 was President of the Students for a Democratic Society at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. In April, 1967, Dancis was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury in Auburn, New York, on the charge of knowingly mutilating and destroying his draft card. The Students for a Democratic Society is an organization which Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, has stated the Party "has going for us."

Jerome Franz - He resides at 52 East First Street, New York, New York. Franz is a member of the Cornell University Anarchist Society. This organization believes the Government must be eradicated in favor of freedom of the individual and condemns any authority which hinders the free and full development of the individual. Franz was present at a draft card burning held on April 15, 1967, at Central Park, New York, New York.

Gregory Heins - He resides at 82 Avenue B, New York, New York. Heins, a student at Cornell University, was a participant at the draft card burnings at Central Park, New York, New York, held on April 15, 1967.

Thomas D. Hurwitz - This individual resides at One Sheridan Square, New York, New York. Hurwitz on March 10, 1967, was present at the registration place for a class at the New York School for Marxist Studies. The father of Hurwitz, Leo Hurwitz, in November, 1943, was a member of the Communist Party and the mother of Hurwitz, Jane Hurwitz, in 1948 was a member of this organization. The New York School for Marxist Studies was founded in September, 1960, as a result of a decision of the New York District Communist Party, USA.

Harvey Kasdan - Kasdan resides at 1124 Stratford Avenue, Bronx, New York. This individual was a member of the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America at the City College of New York until his graduation from that school in February, 1967. He is presently a volunteer worker at the New York City office of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam which sponsored captioned demonstration. The W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America is a communist-oriented youth organization.

Penny Mitchell - She resides at 64 East Ninth Street, New York, New York. Mitchell, who is also known as Penny Gorchoff, in 1961 was a member of Advance in New York City. Advance was founded in New York City in February, 1960. The Declaration of Principles, adopted at the founding convention of Advance, was essentially the line of the leadership of the Communist Party, USA.

Walter D. Teague III - Teague resides at 103 MacDougal Street, New York, New York. Teague in 1966 was the Organizer and Chairman of the United States Committee to Aid the National Liberation Front of South Vietnam. In 1965 information was received stating that a major committee project of this organization was to encourage Americans to send medical donations directly to the National Liberation Front through the representative of the National Liberation Front in Hong Kong and financial support to the National Liberation Front mission in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

Poleshuck, a student at Rutgers University, Newark, in 1966 described himself as a member of the Students for a Democratic Society and the Progressive Labor Party. The Progressive Labor Party is a pro-Chinese, Marxist-oriented group.

Roger Cross - He resides at 200 Commerce Street, New Brunswick, New Jersey. In 1965 Cross was an active member and leader of the Students for a Democratic Society chapter on the Rutgers University campus.

John Polachek Bassett - Bassett resides at Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts. The name of this individual appeared on the mailing list of the New England Regional Students for a Democratic Society in 1966. The wife of John Bassett, Cynthia Quentin Bassett, was identified as a member of the Communist Party in June, 1967.

Martha F. Dudley - Dudley resides at 2942 Macomb Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C. Dudley, at the time of her arrest, listed her father as Tilford Dudley. Tilford Dudley is Chairman of the District of Columbia Democratic Central Committee. The mother of this individual is Martha Fairchild Ward Dudley. Martha Dudley has been active in several anti-Vietnam war organizations. Tilford Dudley was a member of the National Lawyers Guild in 1947, 1948 and 1949. The National Lawyers Guild has been cited as a communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Mitchell Goodman - Goodman resides in Temple, Maine. In February, 1966, Goodman, a member of the Veterans and Reservists to End the War in Vietnam, spoke at a rally sponsored by the organization across the street from the White House, Washington, D. C. Goodman stated at this rally that veterans knew all about the war in Vietnam and thus were in a position to protest the war. One Mitchell Goodman, a New York writer, was

Jan Flora - He resides at 114 Summit, Ithaca, New York. Flora was one of numerous individuals who burned their draft cards in Central Park, New York, New York, on April 15, 1967.

On October 16, 1967, there was a movement to turn in draft cards to the Federal Marshal. The Resistance Committee in Middletown, Connecticut, was reported to be for active protest of the draft.

Josef Chiehowsky - This individual reportedly resides at the Committee for Nonviolent Action farm, Voluntown, Connecticut. One Joseph Chiehowsky in 1967 was one of 20 anti-Vietnam war demonstrators who took part in a march from Boston, Massachusetts, to the Pentagon. Chiehowsky was arrested by the United States Marshal, Alexandria, Virginia, at the Pentagon at the conclusion of this march. He was sentenced to 30 days in jail, 22 days of which were suspended, and was placed on probation on the condition that he and the other individuals involved do not, "in an unwarranted manner, loiter, sleep, and assemble on and about the Pentagon."

Mr. President:

The attached is a report from J. Edgar Hoover to Mrs. Stegall summarizing the consensus of FBI agents at last weekend's rally.

They concluded that the rally constituted a victory for the elements of subversion who had been seeking to instigate a clash between the demonstrators and the forces of law and order. They state that the violence was not accidental and the crowd was emotionally conditioned throughout the affair by skilled agitators who brought the mob to the brink of violence and then sought ways to trigger it.

Hoover states that it was obvious that the key agitators and troublemakers were not students and that it was a mistake for the newspapers to refer to them as students. He states that they were "vicious rioters, hoodlums, and subversives, who were willfully acting in clear violation of the law. This is how the press should have described the incident, so that the public would not have been grossly misled.

He said the entire affair represented most that segment of society comprised by the subversive-criminal-hoodlum element of the "New Left" supported by the communists. He states "It was the seedbed of traitorous action on the part of individuals who may be expected to be of increasing concern to this Nation's stability and security in the near future." He states it would be pure folly to ignore or dismiss lightly these activities.

I thought the President would be interested in the comments of a number of Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who personally observed the antiwar rally and demonstration at the Lincoln Memorial and Pentagon during the weekend of October 20-22, 1967.

It was the consensus of the Agents that the violent and riotous activities which resulted in more than 600 arrests constituted a victory for the elements of subversion who had been seeking to instigate a clash between the demonstrators and the forces of law and order. They were successful in attaining their goal.

The violent outbursts which erupted at the Pentagon were not accidental. The crowd, whether it realized it or not, was emotionally conditioned throughout the affair by skilled agitators who brought the mob to the brink of violence and then sought ways to trigger it.

The rally at the Lincoln Memorial, for instance, was depicted by some news media as consisting mainly of good-natured students peacefully assembling in a picnic-like setting. But the Agents of this Bureau noted carefully the individuals moving through the crowd carrying Viet Cong flags; placards condemning the United States and supporting communist elements; and banners and other paraphernalia bearing obscene and blatantly vulgar references to the President and other leading governmental figures. (One obscene reference to the President was so evil and filthy that it should not be quoted in any document.) They noted,

too, the individuals distributing communist literature while they exhorted the crowd to cheer and applaud the speakers on the podium using words and phrases such as "ruthless aggressor," "betrayal," "brutal," and the like to describe our Government and its actions in Vietnam.

By mingling and mixing with the demonstrators at the Pentagon, our Agents observed and overheard enough to refute any contention that what was wanted and intended was a peaceful student protest. It was obvious that some of the key agitators and troublemakers were not students. It was equally obvious that those seen carrying blackjacks, railroad spikes, and clubs were not peaceably inclined. Agents were witness to their attempted use of these weapons against the police and soldiers.

The taunts, jibes, and insults directed at the United States Marshals and the military, as well as the chants, cheers, and jeers organized for group participation, were clearly designed to play on the emotions. The mob psychology that developed enabled the agitators to manipulate the crowd with increasing facility and the cries of "smash," "kill," and the like spurred the uproarious charge and forcible entry made by some of the demonstrators through the door to the left of the main Mall entrance late Saturday afternoon. This mob was not interested in speech-making or a peaceful demonstration. From the very beginning, it was clear to all Agents present that these rioters had only one objective--to cause all trouble possible by deliberately violating the terms of the permit to demonstrate and to physically attack the marshals and soldiers in their effort to get into the Pentagon and wreak havoc therein.

Apropos of this, it may be added that it is unfortunate that the local press has repeatedly referred to these rioters and hoodlums as "students." For example, the local press reported that the police had hit the "students" and that soldiers had knocked down a few "students." The individuals who charged the representatives

of law and order and hurled rocks and stones at them to break through the lines to gain entrance to the Pentagon were not acting in the capacity of students. They were vicious rioters, hoodlums, and subversives, who were willfully acting in clear violation of the law. This is how the press should have described the incident, so that the public would not have been grossly misled.

There was most emphatic and concerted agreement among the observing Agents that the antiwar protesters did not represent any responsible segment of this Nation's student youth or conscientiously passive element, religious or otherwise. What it did represent most was that segment of our society comprised by the subversive-criminal-hoodlum element of the "New Left" supported by the communists. It was the seedbed of traitorous action on the part of individuals who may be expected to be of increasing concern to this Nation's stability and security in the near future. It would be pure folly for any of us to ignore or dismiss lightly the activities and identities of those who willfully and willingly contributed to the traitorous challenge to our Government and way of life which the weekend demonstration represented.

It was reported that over 600 demonstrators were arrested during the past weekend in connection with the anti-Viet Nam war demonstration. The majority of those arrested were taken to the Occoquan Processing Center for Federal Prisoners at Occoquan, Virginia.

We have been advised that initially arrangements were made to fingerprint the arrested demonstrators on standard fingerprint cards. This, however, was not done and only the right thumb impression of each arrestee was taken on the information papers used in connection with the commissioner's hearing. A search of the FBI fingerprint identification files will not be possible, therefore, since all 10 fingerprints are required for this purpose.

You may want to bring this information to the attention of the President. The Attorney General is being advised by separate communication.

There is set forth below information concerning certain of the individuals who were arrested at the Pentagon during captioned demonstration.

Peter Wood - Wood is an economist who resides at 6312 Owen Place, Bethesda, Maryland. He has been investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation as a conscientious objector under the provisions of the Selective Service Act of 1948. On the Special Form for a Conscientious Objector which Wood completed on August 25, 1966, he stated he was not a member of any religious sect or organization.

John Gardosik - According to the Polk's 1966 City Directory for the Washington, D. C., Area, Gardosik was listed as residing at 3521 Edwin Street, Wheaton, Maryland, and employed as an engineer at the White House.

Philip L. Marcus - He resides at 2436 St. Paul Street, Baltimore, Maryland. In the Spring of 1967 he was a candidate for a Doctor's degree in Biophysics at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Maryland. He has been active in demonstrations seeking fair housing in the Baltimore area.

Mathew Clark - He resides at Route 1, Box 103, Clarksburg, Maryland. He is the son of Duncan Clark, deceased, who was a speech writer under the John F. Kennedy Administration. On April 15, 1967, while a student at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, he participated in the massive anti-Vietnam war demonstration held in New York.

Jerry D. Coffin - He resides at 205 12th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He participated in a demonstration and rally at Independence Hall National Historical Park, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on October 16, 1967. This demonstration was sponsored by the Philadelphia Anti-Draft Union, an antidraft group of the Philadelphia area. At this demonstration Coffin read a statement of disaffiliation with the draft and urged others to do likewise. Coffin urged military personnel to desert and stated he would aid, harbor, conceal, and protect all deserters who come to him. After making these statements he was then observed by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to burn his Selective Service registration card and two Selective Service classification cards.

Reverend David M. Gracie - He resides at 277 West Harvey Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The "Philadelphia Inquirer," a daily Philadelphia newspaper, in its issue of May 26, 1967, carried an article relating to the transfer of the Reverend Mr. Gracie from Detroit, Michigan, to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. While in Detroit, he was involved in the peace movement, including the establishment of a draft counseling service for Detroit men who desired to avoid military service. He has stated he objects to the war in Vietnam "because it is not a just war."

Mary Judith Coburn - She resides at 2633 Adams Mill Road, Northwest, Washington, D. C. Coburn addressed a meeting sponsored by the Students for a Democratic Society and the Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam in Baltimore, Maryland, on April 13, 1967. Coburn has been identified as Washington correspondent for Ramparts magazine.

The Students for a Democratic Society has been described by Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, as part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." The Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam is now known as the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam which sponsored captioned demonstration.

Paul Morganstern - He resides at 618 "D" Street, Northeast, Washington, D. C. Morganstern has participated in civil rights activities at Boston University and was a spokesman for a group of approximately twelve pickets on November 4, 1966, at the White House concerning civil rights. On December 1, 1966, Morganstern attended a meeting of the Washington Area Committee for the Abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

The Washington Area Committee for the Abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee was founded in Washington, D. C., in June, 1961, to campaign for the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Susan Orrin - She resides at 1816 Kalorama Road, Northwest, Washington, D. C. Susan Orrin is a member of the Administrative Committee of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam and has been very active during the past several months making arrangements for captioned demonstration. Orrin is also employed by The Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, D. C., a private research organization which conducts independent surveys of various operations of the Federal Government.

Willard D. Pittman - He resides at 809 Leonard Street, Austin, Texas. In October, 1965, he was a member of and active in the Students for a Democratic Society at the University of Texas, Austin, Texas. In 1965 he was Chairman of the Student Inter-Racial Committee, an organization of students from the University of Texas who banded together to picket Ray's Lounge in Austin, Texas, for the failure of that establishment to serve Negroes.

William Corley - He is a student at the University of Houston, Houston, Texas, and resides at 3134 $\frac{1}{2}$  Holcomb Boulevard, Houston, Texas. He has participated in anti-Vietnam war activities at the University of Houston and on July 14, 1967, took part in a picketing at the Marine Corps Reserve Training Center at Houston, Texas.

During the march on Saturday 10/21/67 a white girl, accompanied by a negro man, was observed carrying a sign which said, "LBJ sucks". The back of the sign said "Why?"

Another sign carried in the march read, "LBJ pull out like your father should have done".

And a placard in the march depicted the President holding a baby, across which was written "Viet Nam", under it said "The Immaculate Conception".

At about 5:30 P.M., shortly after the last of the marchers arrived at the North Parking area of the Pentagon, three youths were observed taking turns engaging in sexual intercourse with 2 girls. When urged by passing demonstrators to join the assault on the Pentagon, the youths shouted back, "Hell No!, we wont go, we'd rather fuck than fight."

The following was painted in large red letters on the pavement in the North Parking lot: "Suck Pussy".

After most of the marchers left Saturday, the remaining group of hippies announced their intention of continuing the protest. They built fires on the lawn and on the concrete steps of the mall entrance to the Pentagon. Male and female individuals were observed urinating in public and the smell of marijuana was in the air.

After nightfall, 15 to 20 girls confronted the front line of the Military Police and taunted them with such phrases as "Wouldn't you rather fuck then fight?" Some of the girls grabbed the zippers of the M.P. trousers as this occurred.

Small groups of males and females were observed in close contact, going through sexual motions on the grass and standing on the steps.

At about 10:30 P.M. an individual with a bull horn announced there would be a "Piss Call". Subsequently a sizeable group of male and females faced the Pentagon and urinated en masse.

Subsequently on Saturday night one of the male demonstration leaders announced over a bull horn, "We're going to have a fuck-in on the lawn tonight."

A female arrested by the authorities went limp and exposed her body, making it apparent she was wearing only a dress and a bra.

On the following morning as the sun rose numerous silk stockings, female undergarments and sanitary napkins littered the mall steps, lawn and bushes. This debris was collected and carted away by GSA crews.

Scrawled across the concrete wall facing the mall entrance to the Pentagon in prominent black lettering was written, "LBJ fucks Peace, LBJ does not fuck War".

The group demonstrated on Sunday throughout the day and evening in decreasing numbers. Though smaller in number, the vulgarities and obscenities continued. "Mother fucker" was a common expression used over the bull horn by the leaders.

Norman Mailer, the author who has been described as a "concealed" communist.

Barbara Deming, who previously visited Hanoi and is associate editor of "Liberation" magazine.

Jerry Rubin, who has devoted almost all of his time to anti-war activities and who attended the 18th National Convention of the Communist Party as an observer.

I thought the President would be interested in knowing that as of 7:30 a.m., October 23, 1967, 665 persons were arrested while participating in the anti-Vietnam war demonstration held at the Pentagon over the weekend of October 21-22, 1967.

Among those arrested who have been prominent in this demonstration were the following:

David Dellinger, a resident of Glen Gardner, New Jersey, is Chairman of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, which sponsored the demonstration. He is the editor of "Liberation," an antiwar magazine. Dellinger has visited Hanoi to discuss the war with leaders of North Vietnam and the National Liberation Front. He has described himself as "a communist," but not the Soviet-type communist.

Keith Lampe resides at 114 East 13th Street, New York City. He has been active in other anti-Vietnam protests and was one of the individuals arrested on September 11, 1967, for throwing anti-Vietnam leaflets on the floor of the United States Senate from the visitors' gallery. Lampe entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to a \$50 fine or 30 days' imprisonment. He elected to pay the fine. Lampe is Chairman of the Veterans and Reservists to End the War in Vietnam, an antiwar organization at New York City.

Mrs. Dagmar Wilson is a resident at 1406 29th Street, Washington, D. C. Mrs. Wilson is National Coordinator of the Women Strike for Peace, a pacifist organization. She

has been most active in the anti-Vietnam war protest movement. An American, she is the wife of Christopher B. Wilson, who is employed in an official capacity at the British Embassy, Washington, D. C.

Bradford Lyttle resides 2719 Ontario Road, Northwest, Washington, D. C. Lyttle is Chairman of the Committee for Nonviolent Action, a pacifist organization. He was one of the leaders of a group of "Peace Marchers" who walked into Moscow, Russia, on October 3, 1961. The "Peace Marchers" were sponsored by the Committee for Nonviolent Action. On May 7, 1954, Lyttle was sentenced to serve a year and one day in custody of the Attorney General after being convicted for refusing to report for and perform civilian work after being classified as a conscientious objector.

Norman Mailer, an author, resides at 142 Columbia Heights, New York City. Mailer was described in 1950 as a "concealed" communist who did not want himself known to be a communist and as a person who would deny Communist Party membership.

Barbara Deming resides on Pamet Point Road, Wellfleet, Massachusetts. Deming was one of four women who visited Hanoi, North Vietnam; Peking, China; and Moscow, Russia; during 1966. She is associate editor of "Liberation" magazine and has long been associated with the Committee for Nonviolent Action.

Jerry Rubin is a resident of Berkeley, California. He was the coordinator of this demonstration. Rubin is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati, Cincinnati, Ohio, and attended the University of California at Berkeley as a graduate student. Rubin was one of the founders and a leader of the Vietnam Day Committee at the University of California at Berkeley. He has been arrested on numerous occasions for his activities during antiwar demonstrations. Rubin, who has devoted almost his entire time to antiwar activity, attended the 18th National Convention of the Communist Party, USA, as an observer. In 1964, he travelled to Cuba in spite of the State Department ban on such travel.

MR. PRESIDENT:

Attached is an FBI report on the anti-Vietnam demonstrations October 20-22.

On October 20 approximately 350 people met at the Church of the Reformation in Washington, D. C. and at 2 p. m. began a march to the Department of Justice where they allegedly turned in a brief case containing draft cards. A delegation met with a Department of Justice representative. This delegation included Dr. Spock, Reverend William Coffin of Yale, and Gary Rader, leader of the Chicago Area Draft Registers, a group to resist the draft. While they were meeting others spoke to the demonstrators, including Ron Young, of The Resistance, an antidraft organization, Sidney Lens, a former official of the Revolutionary Workers League which has been designated as subversive, and Jane Spock.

On the evening of October 20, the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam met at the Lincoln Memorial Congregational Temple and stated that no definite plans for civil disobedience had yet been formulated. Included amongst individuals who were to make decisions on the nature of civil disobedience were Barbara Deming of the Committee for Non-Violent Action, a pacifist group; Norma Becker, a former member of the Labor Youth League, designated as subversive, and Greg Calvert, a former official of Students for a Democratic Society, which Gus Hall has stated is "going for us."

By 11:45 a. m. on October 21 the crowd was estimated to number 15,000 to 20,000. At the Lincoln Memorial the speakers were David Dellinger, Clive Jenkins, a representative of the British Labor Party, Dr. Spock, The Reverend William Coffin, Dagmar Wilson, Fred Davis, a representative of the Students for a Democratic Society. A spokesman for the Committee then estimated the size of the crowd as between 150,000 and 210,000.

Law enforcement agencies estimated the crowd as between 25,000 to 30,000.

A separate "black caucus" was held near the Lincoln Memorial attended by about 130 Negroes. They were urged not to go to the Pentagon as Negroes would be "slaughtered". About 100 left and marched to the Banneker Playground where they held a rally. Three-hundred and fifty (350) individuals were present. They were spoken to by Lester McKinnie, Charles 37X Kenyetta, the leader of the Mau Maus, a militant black nationalist group from New York, Mary Richardson, who described herself as a pro-Chinese Marxist from Philadelphia. John Wilson, the leader of SNCC, also spoke. This rally

broke up at 5 p. m.

At 2 p. m. the participants began their march from the Lincoln Memorial to the Pentagon. Groups of the demonstrators made several attempts to enter the Pentagon and a small group succeeded in entering one door, but was removed. Another group attempted to scale a wall on the Mall side by using ropes. The Marshalls and troops were compelled to use force in repelling the demonstrators.

Authorities estimated the crowd to be numbered between 30,000 and 60,000. Officials of the Committee estimated the crowd to be over 200,000.

Four hundred (400) people were arrested including Dagmar Wilson, David Dellinger, and Normal Mailer.

Numerous members of the Communist Party, the Socialists Workers Party, the Young Socialist Alliance, the Progressive Labor Party, the DuBois Clubs, the Youth Against War and Fascism, a communist splinter group, were observed among the demonstrators.

At approximately 7 p. m. groups began leaving the area to return home. A few remained in the vicinity of the Pentagon during the night.

On October 22, approximately 75 demonstrators remained in the vicinity of the Pentagon. At 1:15 p. m. approximately 200 people met at the Lincoln Memorial and decided to march to the Pentagon. After their arrival it was estimated that 400 were continuing the demonstration.

A Press Conference was held at the Diplomat Motel with Dellinger and Dagmar Wilson in charge. Dellinger said that "unexcusable" violence had taken place during the demonstration and praised the restraint exercised by troops guarding the Pentagon. He said that the demonstration will mark the birth of a new movement which will be more militant.

There were sympathy demonstrations elsewhere in the country. At Concord, California sixteen demonstrators were arrested. There were 600 that demonstrated in Austin, Texas and marched to the State Capital. Other demonstrations were held at Little Rock, Riverside, California, Hartford, Miami, Chicago, Skokie, Illinois, Louisville, New Orleans, Minneapolis, Moorehead, Minnesota, St. Louis, Dayton, Eugene and Portland, Oregon, Columbia, South Carolina, Memphis, Dallas, and Salt Lake City. There were other demonstrations outside the United States.

Shortly prior to midnight on October 22, those demonstrators remaining were told that they must leave by midnight. When they refused over 200 of them were arrested.

The National Committee to End the War in Vietnam, New York City, sponsored an antiwar demonstration in Washington, D. C., October 20-22, 1967. The primary goal of the demonstration was to confront "the warmakers" and "shut down the Pentagon." The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam includes members of the Communist Party and the Socialist Workers Party among its sponsors. The Communist Party and the Socialist Workers Party have been designated subversive pursuant to Executive Order 10450. There is set forth below a summary of activities on October 20-22, 1967.

Eleven of the demonstrators formed a delegation which met with a representative of the Department of Justice. This delegation included Dr. Benjamin Spock, Cochairman of the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, a pacifist group; the Reverend William Sloane Coffin, Chaplain, Yale University; and Gary Rader, leader of the Chicago Area Draft

Resisters, a group formed at Chicago, Illinois, to resist the draft. These individuals carried a plastic brief case which they claimed was filled with draft cards which they desired to turn in to the Attorney General. The Justice Department representative refused to accept the brief case; however, the delegation left it at the Justice Building.

While the delegation was meeting with the representative of the Department of Justice, several individuals spoke to the demonstrators. These speakers included Ron Young, of The Resistance, an antidraft organization; Sidney Lens, a former official of the Revolutionary Workers League which has been designated as subversive pursuant to Executive Order 10450; and Jane Spock, the wife of Dr. Spock. William Davidon, who identified himself as being from Haverford College, acted as master of ceremonies. Davidon called for an end to the war in Vietnam and said that the reason for the war, as stated by President Johnson, is a "lie." He called draft resisters "courageous individuals" and urged that older people resist the draft by refusing to pay taxes on their telephone calls.

The Reverend Mr. Coffin spoke to the group and described the war in Vietnam as wrong "both legally and morally." He also said that the Attorney General will not be fulfilling his duty unless he prosecutes the demonstrators for violation of the Selective Service Act. Dr. Spock said that people must form a united front against the draft.

Five members of the American Nazi Party heckled the demonstrators. They chanted, "We want dead Reds."

On the evening of October 20, 1967, the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam held a meeting at the Lincoln Memorial Congregational Temple. This meeting was attended by over 50 individuals. A spokesman for the Committee said that no definite plans would be given for civil disobedience and that the best policy would be to wait and see what developed. should be engaged in were Barbara Deming of the Committee for Non-Violent Action, a pacifist group; Norma Becker, a former member of the Labor Youth League, which has been designated subversive pursuant to Executive Order 10450; and Greg Calvert, a former official of Students for a Democratic Society. Students for a Democratic Society has been described by Gus Hall, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA, as a group which the Party has "going for us."

Demonstrators began gathering during the early morning in the vicinity of the Lincoln Memorial. By 11:45 a.m. the crowd was estimated to number 15,000 to 20,000. At noon David Dellinger, National Chairman of the Committee, began the organized program. Dellinger is editor of the "Liberation" magazine, a pacifist publication. He has previously described himself as a communist although not of the Soviet variety. Shortly prior to the start of the organized program, an individual bearing a peace torch arrived at the Memorial. It was announced that this torch had been carried on foot from San Francisco, California.

Dellinger said that this demonstration marked the beginning of a new stage in the American peace movement. He claimed that people will see that the "cutting edge of the peace movement will be sharpened by this gathering." He added that any violence which takes place will be started by "the other side."

Clive Jenkins, a representative of the British Labor Party, was the featured speaker. Jenkins said that the Vietnam war is unpopular in England and that the antiwar demonstrations are supported by the English people. During his speech the podium was attacked by a few individuals who knocked Jenkins down and cut off the sound system. These individuals were arrested by local authorities.

Dr. Spock charged President Johnson and other United States officials with giving aid to the enemy. He said that they tried to silence the peace movement but that it will not be silenced. He said that President Johnson has "betrayed us." The United States was described as a "ruthless aggressor."

The Reverend William Sloane Coffin, Chaplain of Yale University, said that clergymen should be ashamed that they have not banded together as a club to oppose the "immoral" war in Vietnam. He said that President Johnson is fighting an unconstitutional war and that every effort must be made to stop it.

Dagmar Wilson, a leader of Women Strike for Peace, a pacifist group, followed the Reverend Mr. Coffin as a speaker. She described her visit to North Vietnam and said that she had been horrified by the suffering the United States is inflicting upon the Vietnamese people. She demanded that the United States find ways other than war to solve its problems.

Fred Davis, a representative of Students for a Democratic Society, said that he had just returned from Hanoi and that every farmer and schoolboy in North Vietnam is totally committed to the war and is confident of victory. He said that the United States is fighting a war of "aggression" and that final victory will be "ours." He pointed out that he meant the North Vietnamese when he used the word "ours."

A spokesman for the Committee then estimated the size of the crowd as between 150,000 and 210,000. Estimates by law enforcement agencies observing the demonstration ranged from 25,000 to 30,000.

A group of approximately 100 left the demonstration and marched to the Banneker Playground where they held a rally. By the time the rally started, 350 individuals were present. He urged Negroes to refuse to be inducted into the armed services and to arm themselves to fight in the United States.

The rally broke up at 5 p.m.

Upon their arrival at the North Parking Lot at the Pentagon, the demonstrators marched into the area facing the Mall entrance to the Pentagon. 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Demonstration leaders held a press conference at the Diplomat Motel during the afternoon. David Dellinger and Dagmar Wilson were in charge of the conference. Dellinger described the demonstration as a tremendous victory and said that the people had demonstrated that the war must be stopped and United States troops brought home. He called attention to the fact that military authorities had estimated the number of demonstrators at 55,000 but that the Committee felt that at least 150,000 people had participated in the demonstration. He said that "unexcusable" violence had taken place during the demonstration and praised the restraint exercised by troops guarding the Pentagon. He said that this demonstration marked the birth of a "new movement" which will be more militant, more persistent, and more insistent. In answer to a question, he explained that if this meant being "radical" then the new movement will be "radical."

Mrs. Wilson also claimed that the demonstration marked a victory for the antiwar movement. She praised the conduct of United States troops guarding the Pentagon.

Dellinger said that the demonstration leaders will return to their homes although three officials of the Committee plan to stay in Washington, D. C. According to Dellinger, demonstrators at the Pentagon are on their own and will have to make their own decision as to whether they will continue to demonstrate.

By 9 p.m. the number of the demonstrators at the Pentagon had dwindled to approximately 100 individuals.

1. The following significant events associated with the demonstration are listed in chronological order:

- 211130 EDT - Demonstrators numbering approximately 25,000 rallied at Lincoln Memorial.
- 211415 EDT - Demonstrators departed Lincoln Memorial for Pentagon.
- 211600 EDT - Demonstrators arrived at North parking lot.
- 211730 EDT - An attempt was made to gain access to the Pentagon which resulted in 4 entering the outer door at Corridor 7. These were immediately evicted.
- 211730 EDT - March organizer - David Dellinger, author Norman Mailer and Mrs Dagmar Wilson, leader of the Women's Strike for Peace were arrested.
- 212100 EDT - Demonstrators dwindled to about 2,000 near Mall entrance.
- 220145 EDT - 22,000 out of town demonstrators departed the D.C. area. Estimated 3,000 out of town demonstrators remained. About 400 maintained an all night vigil in North Parking/Mall area.
- 221600 EDT - Maximum of 800 demonstrators congregated at the Mall entrance.
- 230030 EDT - Demonstrators numbering about 365 remaining at Pentagon. 240 arrested, remainder bussed to D.C. area.

2. Cumulative casualties are 21 demonstrators, 15 police or marshalls and 9 active military. There were no serious injuries. Approximately 679 demonstrators were arrested during the 38 hour period 211030 - 230030 EDT.

3. The demonstration was confined to the North Parking lot and the Mall entrance. South Parking remained clear of demonstrators throughout the week end and was available for access to the Pentagon by authorized personnel.

4. There are no scheduled demonstrations for 23 October. The majority of the troops in the Pentagon area have been released and will be clear of the Pentagon by 230630. However, one MP Battalion will be available in and around the Pentagon until possibility of further demonstration has ceased.

Subject: 21 October Demonstration

1. An unknown demonstrator announced over a megaphone that all demonstrators at the Mall would leave at 0600 EDT, 22 October 1967. As of 0700, 50 demonstrators remained. The demonstrators will reportedly gather at the Lincoln Memorial to decide on further action.
2. 351 demonstrators have thus far been arrested at the Pentagon.
3. 10 military, 14 US marshals, and 17 demonstrators have been injured to date during the demonstration.
4. It is currently estimated that approximately 22,000 out-of-town demonstrators have departed the DC area. It is further estimated that approximately 3000 out-of-town demonstrators remain in the DC area.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

Subject: 21 October Demonstration

1. This constitutes an update of NMCC MFR, Subject as above, dated 1400 EDT, 21 October 1967.
2. There are an estimated 25,000 demonstrators and spectators presently in the vicinity of the Pentagon.
3. It is reported that black power groups plan to enter the Pentagon and disrupt activities by sitting in corridors, offices and meeting rooms. Their alternative objectives are to block doorways and entrances to the Pentagon and block delivery service and obstruct vehicles coming to the Pentagon. These groups plan to conduct their disruptive tactics until 1200 hours, EDT 23 October 1967.
4. Approximately 100 canvas bags have been passed out to demonstrators who say they will participate in civil disobedience. These bags contain steel ball bearings and cannister of tear gas.
5. Fifty DC Army National Guard troops have been deployed to 7th and T Street in Washington where a negro demonstration is in progress. DC police were also dispatched to the scene.
6. The following quotes of interest were made at the demonstration in Washington: Dr Benjamin Spock: "The way in which Lyndon Johnson is waging war is disastrous to our country in every way. We protesters believe that we can save our country if we can persuade enough of our fellow countrymen. We do not believe the Vietnamese people - North or South - are the enemy. They wish no harm to the United States. They have only defended themselves against the onslaught of American force." Dellinger: "Those who wish to protest a bit more militantly will be able to do so."
7. About 2,000 people opened a two day vigil in New York's Battery Park today in support of American servicemen in Vietnam. In contrast anti-Vietnam demonstrations have occurred in Oslo, Amsterdam, Frankfurt, Berlin, Paris and Dublin.

8. At 1527 EDT there was a scuffle on the grass in the front of the Mall entrance between demonstrators and members of the American Nazi Party. There were no arrests.

MR. PRESIDENT:

The attached FBI memorandum concerns the October 21 anti-Vietnam war demonstration to be held in Washington, D. C.

On October 17 Dave Dellinger, Chairman of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, stated at a Washington, D. C. press conference that the demonstration will be peaceful and that the Committee will not initiate violence.

Arnold Johnson, national functionary of the Communist Party, USA, has stated that he plans to take part in civil disobedience on October 21. According to Johnson, the Communist Party has contributed to the financial support of the demonstration, but not under the name of the Party.

The Revolutionary Contingent and the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) plan to participate in a snake dance on October 21.

One individual reported that he attended a meeting where members of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) also attended and that they argued in favor of civil disobedience.

At a recent meeting in Detroit it was stated that 60 black militants are planning to attend the demonstration and are attempting to raise funds. The black militants plan to disperse into the ghetto areas of Washington, D. C. on the afternoon of October 21.

SDS has indicated it might hold a protest at the Bolivian Embassy because of the execution of Che Guevara. The protest may also be held at the Selective Service Headquarters on October 21.

Counterdemonstrations are planned by the White Party of America and the National Renaissance Party. These are racist organizations. It is also indicated that the American Nazi Party will counterdemonstrate on its own.

A rumor that "hippies" plan to bomb the Pentagon was received and an investigation is being conducted to identify the proposed bomber.

The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, headquartered at New York City, is organizing the anti-Vietnam war demonstration to be held in Washington, D. C., October 20-22, 1967. The primary goal of the demonstration is to confront "the warmakers" and "shut down the Pentagon." The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam is an organization which includes Communist Party, USA, and Socialist Workers Party members within its sponsorship. Both the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party have been designated as subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450. There is set forth below a summary of current and planned activity in connection with this proposed demonstration.

Current Intelligence

On October 17, 1967, Dave Dellinger, Chairman of the National Committee, held a press conference at Washington, D. C., and stated the demonstration on October 21, 1967, will be peaceful and under no circumstances will the National Committee initiate violence. Jerry Rubin, Project Director of the October 21 demonstration, was also present at the press conference and stated the demonstration would continue until 12 midnight, October 22, 1967. It was mentioned continuous music in Potomac Park will be offered by "hippies." Each day until October 21, 1967, individuals will walk from the Lincoln Memorial to the Pentagon in order to "research the route and get the police into shape." It was stated

that if the police use clubs or chemicals, action will be taken against them, but the National Committee officials hope that the "police will not disgrace themselves." The intention is to hold a "teach-in" at 8 p.m., on October 20, 1967, at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Washington, D. C.

During a recent Communist Party peace caucus, Arnold Johnson, national functionary, Communist Party, USA, stated he planned to take part in civil disobedience in Washington, D. C., on October 21. All Communist Party, USA, clubs are to be canvassed for "marshals" who can take part in the Washington, D. C., demonstration. According to Johnson, the Communist Party has already contributed to the financial support of the demonstration; however, this was not done under the name of the Party.

The Revolutionary Contingent, a recently formed small group of radicals in New York City, held a meeting at which a statement was read urging no civil disobedience be held in Washington, D. C., on October 21, 1967. The Revolutionary Contingent intends to participate in the demonstration and its only plan is to start a snake dance on October 21 at 1 p.m. The Students for a Democratic Society will participate in the snake dance.

The Students for a Democratic Society is a militant youth organization which Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, has described as a group which the Party has "going for us."

The snake dance will not go in the direction of the Pentagon because the Revolutionary Contingent believes Virginia laws are too rigid and tough.

An individual claiming to be a promotional organizer for the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam has been arrested in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on a charge of petty larceny. He has stated that he attended

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The Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee and the Congress of Racial Equality are both civil rights organizations.

At a recent meeting of the Detroit Committee to End the War in Vietnam, an organization opposed to the American Vietnam policy, it was stated that one and one-half buses from Detroit are to be designated solely for black militants. Approximately 60 black militants are planning to attend the Washington, D. C., demonstration and are attempting to raise the necessary funds. It was indicated at this meeting that black militants plan to disperse into the ghetto areas of Washington, D. C., around 4 p.m., or 4:30 p.m., on October 21, 1967.

Julie McKenzie, a coordinator of the Minnesota Coordinating Committee, an anti-Vietnam war organization, has stated that approximately 200 of the total demonstrators at Washington, D. C., on October 21 are scheduled to carry out planned civil disobedience. This civil disobedience does not include violence and is limited to an attempt to gain entrance to the Pentagon. According to McKenzie, the 200 individuals referred to expect arrests will be made as they do not intend to leave the Pentagon unless carried "bodily from it." McKenzie said that in the event these 200 individuals are barred from the Pentagon, they will seek to block the main entrances of the Pentagon by sitting down.

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Some members of the White Party of America and friends will march with the National Renaissance Party as counterdemonstrators in the October 21 activities at Washington, D. C. The members of the White Party of America will march under the banner of the National Renaissance Party. The leader of the National Renaissance Party expects 15 or 16 demonstrators to participate. The plans of the National Renaissance Party are to depart New York City at 3 a.m., October 21, arriving in Alexandria, Virginia, at the headquarters of the White Party of America at 9 a.m., October 21, 1967. Approximately two-thirds of the National Renaissance Party members will wear Nazi-type uniforms and will appear at the Lincoln Memorial at 12 noon. These individuals will then march to the Pentagon, arriving at that location at 3 p.m. James Madole, leader of the National

MR. PRESIDENT:

The attached FBI memorandum reports activities of anti-war groups during "Stop the Draft Week", this week.

On October 18 the UCLA chapter leader of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) led 35 individuals in picketing an induction center.

Approximately 225 high school students held an anti-draft rally at Hancock Park in Los Angeles.

The demonstration at the induction center in Oakland, California, which began on October 16 continued. Approximately 1200 individuals picketed, with the police department making numerous arrests of those blocking entrance to the center.

Other anti-draft demonstrations are reported to as having taken place at San Francisco, Chicago and Philadelphia.

A group of 30 students at the University of Idaho plans a march past the office of the local draft board on October 21.

A group of Cornell University students demonstrated at the State Department Auditorium in Washington, D. C. during a speech by Paul Goodman, a critic of the war in Vietnam. 31 individuals, led by a Cornell University student, picketed the Auditorium. Goodman allegedly arranged for these demonstrators through a contact on the Cornell University campus.

DEMONSTRATIONS PROTESTING UNITED STATES  
INTERVENTION IN VIETNAM

The Communist Party and other organizations are continuing their efforts to force the United States to change its policy toward Vietnam. There is set forth below a summary of current and planned future activity through which they hope to accomplish this end.

Antidraft Activity

It was previously reported that demonstrations took place throughout the United States on October 16-17, 1967, as a part of national "Stop the Draft Week." The following demonstrations took place on October 18, 1967.

The leader of the University of California at Los Angeles chapter of Students for a Democratic Society led 35 individuals in picketing the Armed Forces Induction Station at Los Angeles, California. The pickets carried signs urging resistance to the draft and an end to the war in Vietnam.

Students for a Democratic Society is a militant youth group which has been described by Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, as a group which the Party has "going for us."

Approximately 225 high school students held an antidraft rally at Hancock Park, Los Angeles, California. Speakers urged resistance to the draft and demanded that high schools provide counselors to advise students how to avoid the draft and "how to get to Canada to escape the draft."

Other antidraft rallies were held at college campuses in the Los Angeles area.

The demonstration, which began on October 16, 1967, at the Armed Forces Induction Center, Oakland, California, continued. Approximately 1,200 individuals picketed the Center. The Oakland Police Department made numerous arrests when groups of demonstrators attempted to block the entrance to the Center. Only ten demonstrators remained when the Center closed for the day.

Antidraft groups in the San Francisco, California, area held a rally on the campus of the University of California at Berkeley. Speakers urged the 1,200 spectators to help close down the Armed Forces Induction Center at Oakland. An announcement was made that a massive confrontation with the police will take place at the Center on October 20, 1967.

Women for Peace, a pacifist group, Chicago, Illinois, sponsored a demonstration in front of the United States Armed Forces Induction Center, Chicago. The 75 women tried to enter the Center but were denied entrance by representatives of the Chicago Police Department. During the attempt to enter the Center, the demonstrators shouted the slogan, "Hell no. We won't go," and engaged in a pushing contest with the policemen. The demonstrators carried placards reading "Bring Them Home Alive," "Military Refuses Women Hearing" and "No Longer Will We Offer Up Our Young for War."

After the demonstration at the Center, the demonstrators marched to the Chicago Civic Center where they held a rally. Gary Rader, the leader of the Chicago Area Draft Resisters, a group formed to encourage resistance to the draft, was the principal speaker at the rally. Rader thanked the members of Women for Peace for their support and said that increasing numbers of men are gaining courage to resist the draft. A representative of Women for Peace presented Rader with a check for \$500.

Rader chaired a meeting of the Chicago Area Draft Resisters during the evening. One individual stated during the meeting that he could close up the Center if he could get \$20 and that there "wouldn't be any doors on the Induction Center." Rader objected to this statement and told this individual, "If you get off marijuana, you wouldn't do it."

Another individual said that he could definitely get demonstrators into the Center but that his means of entry are secret. Potential demonstrators at the Center were advised to turn over tables, tear up files and make shambles of the Center.

It was also announced at the meeting that the Chicago Area Draft Resisters had chartered four buses to carry individuals to Washington, D. C., to take part in the demonstration on October 21, 1967. Robin Maisel, a member of the Socialist Workers Party, is in charge of the demonstrators planning travel to Washington. The Socialist Workers Party has been designated as subversive pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A group of students at the University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho, plans to march past the office of the local draft board, Moscow, on October 21, 1967. The 30 students will end their march on the campus.

It was previously reported that a group of students from Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, would demonstrate at the State Department Auditorium, Washington, D. C., during a speech by Paul Goodman, who has been highly critical of the war in Vietnam. Thirty-one individuals, led by a student from Cornell University, picketed the Auditorium. The demonstrators sat down in the entrance to the building and demanded to see Goodman. Goodman, after his speech, spoke to the demonstrators who then left. Goodman reportedly had contacted Sheryl Epton, a Cornell University student who formerly lived in a common-law relationship with Goodman's son, and arranged with her to hold a demonstration. She succeeded in obtaining demonstrators from several schools in the Ithaca area.

The Philadelphia Antidraft Union, a group formed to resist the draft, sponsored a march through downtown Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The 65 demonstrators carried placards urging resistance to the draft. Included among them were several members of the Communist Party and the Young Socialist Alliance, the youth group of the Socialist Workers Party.

OAKLAND POLICE, POWER STRUCTURE AND U.S. GOVERNMENT AT OAKLAND INDUCTION CENTER AT SIX A.M., OCTOBER TWENTY BY TAKING UP WHERE ANTIWAR DEMONSTRATORS LEFT OFF OCTOBER SEVENTEEN LAST. ONE

AT ALLENTOWN, PENNSYLVANIA, SEVERAL MEMBERS OF THE STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY CHAPTER, LEHIGH UNIVERSITY, PLANNED TO ACCOMPANY AN INDUCTEE TO THE LOCAL DRAFT BOARD ON OCTOBER TWENTY INSTANT WHERE TWO WOULD ATTEMPT A SIT-IN AND OTHERS WOULD DEMONSTRATE.

IT WAS ANNOUNCED TO THE PRESS AT TUCSON, ARIZONA, THAT THE SELECTIVE SERVICE DRAFT BOARD WOULD BE PICKETED OCTOBER TWENTY INSTANT SPONSORED BY THE STUDENT PEACE ASSOCIATION WHICH WAS FORMED TO UNITE STUDENTS AND EXPLORE PEACEFUL SOLUTIONS TO ARMS RACE AND COLD WAR.

AT PORTLAND, OREGON, OCTOBER NINETEEN LAST, SIX DEMONSTRATORS FROM REED COLLEGE CHAINED THEMSELVES TO MAIN DOORWAY AT SELECTIVE SERVICE HEADQUARTERS PREVENTING INGRESS TO PERSONNEL ARRIVING FOR WORK. EMPLOYEES THEN USED A SIDE DOOR. WHEN THE DEMONSTRATORS FAILED TO COMPLY WITH THE ORDER OF A SELECTIVE SERVICE EMPLOYEE TO CLEAR THE ENTRANCE, THE SIX DEMONSTRATORS WERE ARRESTED FOR TRESPASSING.

MR. PRESIDENT:

The attached FBI memorandum concerns the October 21 anti-Vietnam war demonstration to be held in Washington, D. C.

On October 17 Dave Dellinger, Chairman of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, stated at a Washington, D. C. press conference that the demonstration will be peaceful and that the Committee will not initiate violence.

Arnold Johnson, national functionary of the Communist Party, USA, has stated that he plans to take part in civil disobedience on October 21. According to Johnson, the Communist Party has contributed to the financial support of the demonstration, but not under the name of the Party.

The Revolutionary Contingent and the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) plan to participate in a snake dance on October 21.

One individual reported that he attended a meeting where members of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) also attended and that they argued in favor of civil disobedience.

At a recent meeting in Detroit it was stated that 60 black militants are planning to attend the demonstration and are attempting to raise funds. The black militants plan to disperse into the ghetto areas of Washington, D. C. on the afternoon of October 21.

SDS has indicated it might hold a protest at the Bolivian Embassy because of the execution of Che Guevara. The protest may also be held at the Selective Service Headquarters on October 21.

Counterdemonstrations are planned by the White Party of America and the National Renaissance Party. These are racist organizations. It is also indicated that the American Nazi Party will counterdemonstrate on its own.

A rumor that "hippies" plan to bomb the Pentagon was received and an investigation is being conducted to identify the proposed bomber.

SUBJECT: October 21 Demonstration

As of this moment, there still is no confirmed or hard intelligence that any specific group will demonstrate at the White House. There is nothing additional to that previously reported in this regard.

After discussions late today with the police, security arrangements for the White House appear most adequate to cope with any foreseeable exigency.

A couple of "hippies" reportedly discussed bombing the Pentagon from a helicopter; both have been arrested on local charges, one in New York and one in Philadelphia.

I assume you are aware that the south side of Pennsylvania Avenue between 15th and 17th Streets will be closed to pedestrian traffic.

MR. PRESIDENT:

The attached FBI memorandum reports activities of anti-war groups during "Stop the Draft Week", this week.

On October 18 the UCLA chapter leader of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) led 35 individuals in picketing an induction center.

Approximately 225 high school students held an anti-draft rally at Hancock Park in Los Angeles.

The demonstration at the induction center in Oakland, California, which began on October 16 continued. Approximately 1200 individuals picketed, with the police department making numerous arrests of those blocking entrance to the center.

Other anti-draft demonstrations are reported to as having taken place at San Francisco, Chicago and Philadelphia.

A group of 30 students at the University of Idaho plans a march past the office of the local draft board on October 21.

A group of Cornell University students demonstrated at the State Department Auditorium in Washington, D. C. during a speech by Paul Goodman, a critic of the war in Vietnam. 31 individuals, led by a Cornell University student, picketed the Auditorium. Goodman allegedly arranged for these demonstrators through a contact on the Cornell University campus.

The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, headquartered at New York City, is organizing the anti-Vietnam war demonstration to be held in Washington, D. C., October 20-22, 1967. The primary goal of the demonstration is to confront "the warmakers" and "shut down the Pentagon." The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam is an organization which includes Communist Party, USA, and Socialist Workers Party members within its sponsorship. Both the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party have been designated as subversive by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450. There is set forth below a summary of current and planned activity in connection with this proposed demonstration.

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Transportation Arrangements

Tentative nationwide travel arrangements indicate approximately 465 buses are scheduled to carry demonstrators to Washington, D. C. The capacity for these buses is estimated at 20,925 individuals. Additional figures forecast approximately 6,115 more demonstrators will come by train, some private vehicles, and transportation not yet arranged. Participation in the demonstration from Washington, D. C., and the Greater Washington area has been estimated at 1,500. The current total estimated number of demonstrators based primarily on tentative projections is 28,540.

It is to be noted that 243 of the above-mentioned buses are coming from the New York area. Seventy of those buses have been reported filled. A New Jersey bus firm supplying 75 of the New York City buses has withdrawn from the commitment and the New York City bus broker is now pressed to find necessary buses. It is also indicated some New Jersey bus drivers will not transport demonstrators to Washington, D. C., for personal patriotic reasons.

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Metropolitan Police Department, Washington, D. C., has been furnished information which is of pertinent interest to that Department concerning this demonstration. Military intelligence agencies and other appropriate Government agencies have all previously been furnished pertinent data concerning this demonstration.

1. (C) Situation.

a. The National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (NMC) is planning massive demonstrations against the Pentagon and other Government buildings in the Washington, D. C. area on 21-22 October 1967. There is a possibility that this demonstration could develop into a civil disturbance beyond the capability of civil authorities to control.

b. The Secretary of Defense, on 26 Sep 67 (ref a), assigned the responsibility to the Department of the Army to develop comprehensive

plans to deal with contingencies which may arise in connection with the demonstrations.

c. Forces Available.

- (1) Task Force INSIDE (TFI) as specified in ref d (modified).
- (2) Four (4) MP Companies from USCONARC/ARSTRIKE resources.
- (3) Military Department personnel provided for the internal security of DOD facilities.
- (4) Task Force WASHINGTON augmentation forces (TFW AUGF) as specified in ref d.

d. Assumptions.

- (1) The U.S. Government will permit a peaceful and lawful demonstration, in the Washington Metropolitan area, to include the Pentagon environs. Specific areas will be designated for demonstration purposes.
- (2) Minimum support necessary for health and humanitarian interests will be provided to the demonstrators by civil agencies of the government.
- (3) The demonstrators will be granted permits to assemble in the District of Columbia, to march across the Memorial Bridge and by

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the most direct route to the North Parking area of the Pentagon. 7  
The demonstrators will be permitted to assemble and rally in the North Parking area, then move to the Mall triangle, and may picket on a portion of the sidewalk at the Mall entrance. No assembly or picketing will be authorized in any other areas of Pentagon property.

(4) Current estimates are that approximately 27,000 will attend this demonstration (preparations must also be made for larger attendance).

(5) The District of Columbia National Guard will be used in its militia role to support the Metropolitan Police under D.C. supervision.

2. (C) Mission.

Prior to 21 October 1967, DA will position military forces and take such other actions as necessary to:

- a. Provide protection for the Pentagon and environs.
- b. Be prepared to assist civil authorities in enforcing rules established by proper authority for the demonstrators.
- c. Be prepared to provide protection to other critical Federal facilities in the Washington Metropolitan area.
- d. Be prepared to restore and maintain law and order in the Washington Metropolitan area which is defined, for this purpose,

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as that area bounded by Interstate Highway 495. 7

3. (C) Execution.

a. Concept of Operations.

(1) General.

(a) This plan provides for the provision of military forces under the direct control of the CSA in conjunction with local civilian and Federal agencies, to protect the Pentagon, other critical Federal buildings and to quell civil disorders in the Washington Metropolitan area. Task Force WASHINGTON/Operation Plan 563-1 (ref d), modified as required, utilizing initially the military forces of Task Force INSIDE, plus four MP companies, will be executed to provide for the initial security and control required during this planned demonstration. In the event civil disorder occurs which is beyond the capability of TF INSIDE (TFI) to cope with effectively, Task Force WASHINGTON Augmentation Forces (TFW AUGF) will be employed as required.

(b) MG Charles S. O'Malley, Jr. is designated Initial Task Force WASHINGTON (ITFW) Commander and will command the military forces initially engaged in this operation.

(2) Preparatory actions. CSA directs Defense Condition (DEFCON 4) for TFI, HQ TFW AND TFW AUGF on or about 17 Oct 67.

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(3) Employment actions.

(a) Internal security of the Pentagon will initially be provided by GSA Police with assistance by unarmed military personnel from the Military Departments occupying the building.

(b) External security of the Pentagon and environs will be provided by uniformed MP (four (4) companies, approximately 600 personnel) in Class A uniform, with helmet liners and protective masks, and equipped with the usual MP accoutrements including arm bands, night sticks, and holstered pistols. These personnel will be used for patrolling, surveillance and control, and as visible evidence of authority and intent to limit the demonstrators to designated assembly areas.

(c) The demonstrators will be permitted to assemble in designated areas and may be allowed to picket. Areas are presently being negotiated. Those demonstrators attempting to enter "Off Limits" areas will be apprehended by civil/military authorities.

(d) Disposition of forces: In addition to the four MP Companies to be used for external security, three (3) battalions of TFI will be strategically prepositioned inside the Pentagon, well out of sight; two (2) battalions (one USMC) at Anacostia Naval Air Station; (1) battalion at South Post Fort Myer, Va.; one (1) battalion at Fort

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Meade, Md. The 1st Bn, 3d Inf, stationed at North Post, Ft Myer, will be prepared to provide protection for the White House. The USMC Bn prepositioned at Anacostia NAS with one (1) Company at the Marine Barracks, 8th and I Sts, will be prepared to provide protection to the Capitol. The D.C. National Guard will be used in its militia role to support the Metropolitan Police under D.C. supervision.

(e) In the event civil disorder at the Pentagon or in the District of Columbia becomes a threat beyond the capability of TFI forces and local authorities, CSA will direct Commander, TFW AUGF to assume command of the operation and employ TFW forces as required.

(f) Additional augmentation forces for TFW, required to restore and maintain law and order, will be deployed to the Washington area as directed by the CSA.

b. Tasks.

(1) OASD (A).

Arrange for internal security for those DOD facilities in the Washington area, exclusive of the Pentagon and its annexes that are the responsibility of OSD, as listed in ref g.

(2) CNO, CSAF, CMC.

(a) Provide internal security with personnel from within own resources for areas in the Pentagon assigned by the Army

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Headquarters Commandant, and in all other facilities in the Washington area that are a Departmental responsibility, as listed in ref g.

(b) Pass operational control of forces authorized TFI to CG TFI upon request of CSA.

(3) CINCSTRIKE.

(a) Plan for and move designated forces of TFW AUGF requiring rapid air movement from home stations.

(b) Be prepared to position one Brigade Task Force (TFW AUGF) designated by CGUSCONARC/CINCARSTRIKE at Andrews AFB, prepared for commitment to protection of the Pentagon and to quell civil disorder in the Washington Metropolitan area. When directed, launch aircraft during the evening hours of darkness 20 Oct 67 so as to close Andrews AFB prior to 210600 Oct 67.

(c) Be prepared to deploy additional TFW AUGF to Washington, D. C. as directed by CSA.

(d) Redeploy these forces to home station on order.

(4) CGUSCONARC/CINCARSTRIKE.

(a) Provide forces for TFI plus four (4) MP companies.

(b) Designate TFW AUGF as directed by CSA.

(c) Provide logistical support to TFI and TFW AUGF as required.

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(5) Commander, TFW AUGF.

(a) Establish TFW AUGF Main CP in Gymnasium, North Post Ft Myer. This becomes HQ TFW on order.

(b) Establish a staff element with fully operational communications facilities at Metropolitan Police Station, 300 Indiana Ave., S.E., Washington, D. C., NLT 210600 Oct 67. Maintain low visibility of preparatory activities in this regard. Be prepared to activate and staff this location as TFW ADV CP on order.

(c) Move elements of 50th Sig Bn and 35th Sig Gp from Ft Bragg to Ft Belvoir early 18 Oct 67 by surface transportation.

(d) Be prepared to assume command of TFW on order of CSA.

(6) Commander, ITFW (CGTFI) (CGMDW).

(a) Protect the Pentagon and ancillary buildings in accordance with the concept of operations.

(b) Be prepared to protect other designated critical Federal facilities and restore and maintain law and order in the Washington Metropolitan area.

(c) From TFI resources prior to 210600 Oct 67:

1 Position three (3) battalions in the Pentagon

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uniformed and equipped in accordance with para 2, Annex G, ref c.  
(Position four (4) MP companies outside the Pentagon for crowd control  
on order).

2 Position two (2) battalions (1 USMC minus 1  
company) at Anacostia NAS.

3 Position one (1) battalion at South Post, Ft  
Myer, Va.

4 Position one (1) battalion at Ft Meade, Md.

5 Be prepared to employ three (3) companies,  
1st Bn, 3d Inf stationed at North Post Ft Myer and Ft McNair to pro-  
tect the White House if required.

6 Be prepared to employ the USMC Bn (-) preposi-  
tioned at Anacostia NAS and one (1) company of Marines stationed at  
Marines Barracks, 8th and I Sts, to protect the Capitol if required.

7 Be prepared to provide minimum essential first  
aid using mobile medical teams, and potable water facilities for  
demonstrators at the Pentagon as required.

8 Provide internal security for the Pentagon and  
ancillary buildings using GSA Special Police and military personnel pro-  
vided by building occupants.

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9 Be prepared to provide control of picketing groups (if authorized) in the designated area(s).

10 Provide necessary announcements to Pentagon occupants in regard to parking, bus service, and entrance control and departure procedures.

11 Provide fire control plan for Pentagon.

12 Provide utilities control plan for Pentagon.

13 Provide traffic control, parking and embarking.

plan for demonstrator busses on Pentagon property.

c. Coordinating Instructions.

(1) This plan is effective upon receipt for planning.

A confirming directive based on latest intelligence will be provided prior to execution.

(2) The Military Department designated to provide internal security of DOD facilities other than the Pentagon will utilize the basic Pentagon Internal Security Plan, (Annex D to ref f), modified as necessary for each facility. Details of this plan are available from the Army HQ Comdt, Rm 1B858, Pentagon, X 55608.

(3) Direct communication and coordination between Military Departments, Commands, Tasks Forces, staffs and agencies is

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authorized and directed. Liaison Officers will be exchanged as required.

(4) ACSC-E, DA, will furnish still and MOPIC photographers, closed circuit TV facilities and all special communications. Plans will be completed sufficiently in advance to permit installation and operation in minimum time and in the least conspicuous manner.

(5) No visible preparation in support of this plan will be initiated prior to the hours of darkness on 20 Oct 67.

(6) Prior to establishing air observation posts, details will be fully coordinated with the Army Operations Center.

(7) Military Departments, Commands, activities and agencies concerned will forward three (3) copies each of orders/instructions/plans to execute this plan to DCSOPS, DA, ATTN: AOC, NLT 1200 hours 20 October 1967.

(8) CINFO, DA, will provide public information guidance to all concerned separately.

(9) Plans, orders and directives in support of this plan will be classified CONFIDENTIAL.

4. (C) Administration and Logistics.

a. Logistics.

(1) Annex G, Logistics and Personnel, ref c.

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(3) Task Force' battalion-size units will deploy from 7 home station with equipment as prescribed in Annex G, ref c.

5. (C) Command and Signal.

TFW, AUGF. During the planning for movement of TFW AUGF to the Washington Metropolitan area, the chain of operational command is from CSA to CINCSTRIKE.

(3) Upon arrival of TFW AUGF in the objective area, operational command passes from CINCSTRIKE to Commander, TFW AUGF.

SUBJECT: October 21, 1967

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP) of New York which has now decided to participate in the October 21 demonstration is a left-wing, pro-Chinese Communist, Marxist-Leninist group. The PLP has publicly stated that it would "assassinate the President if it sufficed our ends."

The PLP is led by William Epton who left the Communist Party because it was not sufficiently militant or aggressive. After the 1964 Harlem riots, Epton was charged with rioting, conspiring to riot, and criminal anarchy. He was sentenced to a year in prison but is now free pending an appeal. Epton personally is very aggressive and urges his followers to arm themselves with weapons and to attack the police on any possible provocation. He and his followers are dangerous.

As revealed yesterday, the PLP plans to return to the White House and demonstrate with anyone they can recruit in the "ghettos" of Washington. This now makes at least two groups that have announced intentions to picket the White House.

You should have previously received the above from both the FBI and Secret Service.

Subject: October 21 Demonstration

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) claim they will not cross the bridge to the Pentagon on October 21 with the main demonstration. They plan to participate in a "snake dance" with 1000 other persons through the streets of Washington. They intend to break through police lines. This is presumably the same "snake dance" that is being organized by "hippies" to march to the White House. This group may also spray people and buildings with a disappearing dye.

Possibly additional areas of protest by the SDS are Selective Service Headquarters and the Bolivian Embassy (because of "Che" Guevara's death).

The Veterans and Reservists to End the War in Vietnam (VREWV) believe that for the demonstration to be a success, there must be a confrontation with the police resulting in injury to the marchers. This could serve as a catalyst for the crowd to overrun the police.

So far, counterdemonstrations are planned on October 21 by the White Party of America (WPA), the National Renaissance Party (NRP), and the American Nazi Party (ANP). The WPA will demonstrate under the NRP banners. This combined group, some in Nazi-type uniforms, also intends to march from the Lincoln Memorial to the Pentagon, arriving there at 3:00 P. M. The ANP intends to start its counter-demonstration at 9:00 A. M. at the Pentagon. The number of counter-demonstrators should not be great.

He is described as an extremist, possessing revolutionary tendencies, mentally deficient, armed and dangerous. (Hoffman, however, has said he would be unarmed when he came to Washington.)

The DCPSV also plans to picket Henry Cabot Lodge when he appears at SMU on October 24. This will be an anti-war demonstration, not an attack on Lodge.

The attached FBI ticker tape reports that the Miami contingent planning to come to Washington, D. C. on October 21 for the demonstrations includes Jennie Jaffe and Alfred (Al) Featherston.

Jaffe is reported to be a member of the Miami Communist Party. Featherston advised a source in 1964 that he believed in the Communist theory even though he was not a member of the Communist Party. A confidential informant of a state law enforcement agency advised in 1964 that Featherston allegedly stated "it would be a good idea to be able to help the Communist Party to eliminate President Johnson."

Featherston has been described as dangerous and known to use firearms.

Attached is another FBI memorandum on the Anti-Vietnam War demonstration planned for October 20-22 in Washington, D. C.

Although initially the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam stated that 200,000 will converge on Washington, D. C., recent estimates by the Committee deflated the estimate to 50,000.

The Committee announced that various acts of civil disobedience throughout the nation would begin on September 11 and work up to a peak on October 21. October 16-21 has been designated as "Antidraft Week".

On October 20 a group plans to demonstrate at the Department of Justice. On October 21 demonstrators will assemble at the Lincoln Memorial, and following a rally, will march to the Pentagon via the Arlington Memorial Bridge. The demonstration at the Pentagon is expected to continue Sunday and possibly Monday, October 22 and 23.

The FBI reports that they expect between 20,000 and 30,000 demonstrators to be in Washington, D. C. on October 21, not including curiosity seekers or tourists. The majority of participants are expected to come from the New York City area, with other organizations coming from upstate New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, West Virginia, Maryland, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Texas, California, North Carolina, Florida, Georgia, and Canada.
