

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

1. TELEPHONE CALL EARLY THIS MORNING FROM PRESIDENTIAL LODGE (REFTEL 1291) WAS MADE BY ROBERT GABOR OF PEACE THROUGH FREEDOM WHO HAD SPENT EVENING WITH PRESIDENT. SUGGESTION FOR BREAKFAST APPOINTMENT CAME FROM GABOR AND WAS IMMEDIATELY AGREED TO BY OBOTE. GABOR PRESENT AT BREAKFAST SESSION BUT NO OTHERS.

- 2. DURING CONVERSATION THIS MORNING GABOR ASKED THE PRESIDENT IF HE HAD BEEN THINKING ABOUT VISITING UNITED STATES. PRESIDENT REPLIED THAT HE HAD BEEN THINKING ABOUT SUCH A VISIT BUT WOULD DISCUSS IT PRIVATELY WITH ME AT SOME LATER DATE. (FROM THIS I CONCLUDED THAT IT WAS BETTER FOR ME NOT REPEAT NOT TO RAISE THE QUESTION OF HIS REPORTED PLANS TO GO TO MORTREAL AND THE SUGGESTION MADE IN DEPT 144846).
- 3. GABOR REPORTED TO ME THIS MORNING THAT LAST NIGHT OBOTE HAD TOLD HIM THERE HAD BEEN A MILITARY PLOT AGAINST HIM INVOLVING ARMY PERSONNEL IN THE EAST OF UGANDA BUT THAT HE HAD BROKEN IT UP BY MAKING CERTAIN TROOP MOVEMENTS. HE ALSO TOLD GABOR THAT LOWER LEVEL MEMBERS OF THE UPC WERE INVOLVED IN THIS PLOT BUT HE DID NOT SPECIFY NAMES NOR DID HE INCLUDE ANY CABINET MEMBERS.
- 4. GABOR ALSO TOLD ME THIS MORNING THAT OBOTE HAD TOLD HIM LAST NIGHT THAT HE PERSONALLY HAD DICTATED STORY PUBLISHED TODAY'S ISSUE THE PEOPLE REPORTED IN REFTEL 1288. WHILE I BELIEVE IT IMPORTANT BRITISH KNOW THIS, I FEEL STRONGLY THIS INFORMATION SHOULD BE PASSED TO THEM THROUGH COVERT CHANNELS IN ORDER AVOID ANY POSSIBILITY FUTURE EMBARRASSMENT TO ME HERE I THEREFORE PLAN TAKE NO ACTION ON THIS VIS-A-VIS ACTING BRIT HICOM KAMPALA. GERMAN EMBASSY ITSELF WAS THIS WEEK CHARGED IN FORMAL NOTE FRON FOREIGN OFFICE OF COMPLICIT IN PROVIDING A GERNAN AGENT TO TRAIN KABAKA'S SECURITY POLICE. CERMAN EMBASSY IS DESYING THIS CHARGE IN STRONG TERMS AS IT HAS NO EASIS IN FACT.



Substance Obote's argument in imprecise Congo statement yesterday in Parliament was: Since military action cannot solve Congo problem, GOU not taking sides between opposing Congo forces. Instead it wishes all concerned to sit down at conference table and negotiate political reconciliation. Uganda under military attack because it does not consider Gbenye and other anti-Tshombe forces as rebels but rather nationalists.

Obote made no mention of GOU assistance to rebels, stating only that GOU "maintained contact" with various leaders including Gbenye. Remarks suggest there is no legitimate government of Congo and therefore all factions must meet form such government. This is retrogression from previously-reiterated GOU recognition legitimacy GDRC and approaches policy non-recognition of fellow OAU state.



Latest GOU response Congo attacks has been to round up and intern Congolese refugees in Kampala area.

Roundup in residential area began night of February 22 and continued February 23. Refugees taken to Mengo Social Center and confined under guard. Police source told Embassy officer that order was "spur of moment" decision by director refugees Mubanda and that police had no explicit guidance as to who should be picked up. Said he understood screening being done by Mubanda's staff but personally doubted whether it could be effective. Another source informs that all Congolese who entered Uganda since GDCRC independence are affected, that all will be repatriated to Congo at unspecified time in future.

Uganda Closing of Rwanda Border

Recent events make unfortunately clear that closing of Rwanda border resulted from GOU anti-GDRC policy, and was specifically designed cut off flow of gasoline and other POL to ANC.

Doubt action resulted from any GOU desire punish Rwanda for use Kamembe in support GDRC or as retaliation other assistance extended ANC. On contrary, through out Congo crisis GOU has maintained extremely close relations Rwanda (especially in security field) and is net gainer from extensive entrepot and illegal trade. Moreover GOU cannot afford prolonged break with GOR because of need maintain close cooperation at border regarding Tutsi refugees in Uganda. Tangled skein political lines involved in refugees but GOU shares GOR's concern that refugees not go on rampage or attack GOR.

Closing of Rwanda border has long been aim of Minister Planning and Community Development Nekyoh. Department

will recall that he told Embassy Office on December 9 that Congo and Rwanda borders closed (Embassy telegram 923). Altho he unable implement decision then, he and Army Chief of Staff Amin have gradually extended military control of Congo/Rwanda border points, starting in West Nile and gradually extending southward to Kisoro and finally Merama Hill.

Separate message (Brussels, Department and Kigali only) gives Belgian Ambassador Rittweger's report to his Foreign Office on border closing; he states when GOR Ambassador made oral protest to Foreign Office here stressing obligation permit transit to land locked area, latter embarrassed but made no commitment. Rittweger believes GOU beginning appreciate magnitude error in cutting off Rwanda and will rescind action.

On February 14 police special force units replaced Uganda military at both West Nile border points (Vurra and Goli) and at Rwanda posts (Kisoro and Merama Hill). American missionary who travelled Arua-Kampala February 23 told Embassy that commander special forces unit posted Goli had told him last week that special forces had replaced military because latter undisciplined and would not follow orders. Police special force have specific instructions that personnel and goods are not to pass in either direction at these points.

Embassy informed today that Rwandese Ambassador in company Belgian Ambassador Rittweger (stationed Dar-es-Salaam accredited here) proceeded Kigali via charter plane today discuss border closing. GOU reportedly interested in entering into conversations GOR with view early opening of border. Allegedly GOU making no conditions except safety its border.


Reference: Department Circular telegram 1539 and Leopoldville's 3020 to Department.

Leopoldville's 3020 to Department permits conclusion that no bombing, rocketing or machine-gunning occured at Goli. Fact that planes over Mahagi roughly seven air miles from Goli in our view leaves question open as to whether diversion made. Department Circular telegram states Department satisfied no basis for allegation GDRC air operations involved attack on Uganda territory and indicates information available suggests incident manufactured. Embassy wishes comment on this trend of thought and recommend some cautions.

Embassy has determined from high EXPAT official Ministry Internal Affairs that final and detailed report of incident occuring February 13 not yet received that level and further that Ministry Foreign Affairs pushing that Ministry for report. Slowness preparation report probably more inefficiency than anything else. Embassy officer discussed with this official possibility staging of affair and he of opinion this highly

We understand that entire press corps Nairobi has made request to GOU for permission visit West Nile and specifically Goli and Paidha. We are also informed that GOU has intentions granting of such request and decision expected February 22. Above Ministry Internal Affairs official stated opinion that permission might well be granted.

Missionary source resident in area has reported his personal observations to effect that when travelling Arua-Goli February 14 bridge over stream marking boundary at Goli had been heavily attacked and damaged. Bridge is roughly 200 yards from Customs Post previously reported as attacked. Missionary source added that attack by planes in vicinity Customs Post February 13 had caused number of children from Mission in vicinity flee toward Arua. Source could not state bridge damaged February 13 nor did he report damage to Customs Post in letter from which we gleaned above.

In all reporting from this Embassy we have gone only so far as to state that something happened at Goli on February 13 with indications that it was not "staged". Charge has had request for appointment pending Minister State Foreign Affairs Odaka since morning February 17 with one of objectives demand for full report on Goli incident, but no response or explanation for delay has been forthcoming.

We believe Department may be treading on thin ice charging or assuming that affair was staged prior to having pressed GOU to produce detailed report and examination of area by neutral observers. This in effect is calling GOU liar without demanding proof of incident and we in good position demand proof because we charged as main culprit. Furthermore taking this stand may well stiffen GOU attitude towards more sober approach this incident and border violations between GDRC and Uganda (Embassy telegrams 1433 and 1436). In current highly charged atmosphere any direct questioning of GOU's integrity can only cause reaction making it more difficult return to reason. This particularly true with Obote personally since he in nervous, taut mood following demonstration fiasco of February 16.

We believe line should be that since we do not have all facts from GOU, that we are without knowledge whether the incident occurred as reported by GOU and that we awaiting full and detailed report with hope that it will be supported by opportunity for neutral outsiders examine area and damage. Until such event occurs, facts and GOU's motivation remain unknown. This might be coupled to or lead to establishment of neutral border observer team (possibly under OAU auspices) which would seem desirable move better US-GDRC and GOU relations.



- 1. First GOU statement tonight reported reference telegram is encouraging sign GOU backing away from further inflation border incidents. Tone is consistently moderate even though story of ANC ambush and kidnapping of six Uganda's soldiers on Uganda territory is pretty hard to swallow. Reference to unfounded allegations "at times like these" presumably pointed at GDRC but could also apply to GOU. Most important is earnest effort made in last sentence to absolve GDRC and Leopoldville authorities of blame by shifting it to mercenaries. This would seem give opening for pursuance GDRC border inspection proposal.
- 2. While moderates here have been working on Obote, believe he would not have backed down had Tshombe taken hard line in press remarks. Urge Department and Leopoldville give maximum play to GOU statement, pointing out it is significant step toward cooling off.
- 3. Refutation of Newsweek article (second statement) is typical Odaka emotional reaction and also had his hallmark of sloppy

During interval when police were occupied repelling mob and prior arrival special force troops, some of demonstrators gained access to building's fire escape, proceeded to roof and hauled down Embassy Flag. Flag, somewhat torn, caught on ledge and Embassy officer retrieved it. Meanwhile in street group of red-shirted youth wingers burned another American Flag. No serious casualties to police or demonstrators although demonstrators bruised by police batons and 4 police injured by rocks.

Two delegations admitted separately to deliver protest to Charge. First, headed by Minister State and UPC Secretary General Ibingira, included Ministers Animal Industry, Game and Fisheries Babiiha; Attorney General Binaisa; and Abu Mayanja, Kabaka Yekka MP. Group stated that Latim, DP Leader and Parliamentarian, had been scheduled to appear with others but had been unable to get through crowd. Presented three page, unsigned, mimeographed protest entitled "Protest by the People of Uganda". Principal points: US support of Tshombe in disregard of OAU resolution constitutes violation of UN Charter and has resulted in naked aggression against Uganda. Ugandans will not tolerate another Vietnam in Africa nor allow Uganda to become extension of Congo dispute and battlefield for US ideology. US desires exploit Africa's wealth for financial adventurers and speculators of Wall Street.

Uganda wants Congo problem solved at round table conference but this wishful thinking so long as US military aid pouring into Congo and US supports Cuban rebels and Tshombe. If attacks continue against Uganda they will be regarded as declaration of war by US, Belgium and Congo (L). Uganda people demand US halt all military aid to Tshombe, withdraw Cuban rebels from Congo, use influence on Tshombe to withdraw all other mercenaries, guarantee that territorial integrity of Uganda not violated with aid of American arms, and allow OAU find African solution.

Charge noted American regret over violation of Uganda territory and promised that US would support protest to GDRC if facts as alleged proven true. Said he wanted make special point /that Uganda

that Uganda Government had sponsored demonstration which supposed to be peaceful. On contrary, it had evidenced violence, very thing which was being protested. Amid explosion of tear gas grenades Ibingira quickly replied that delegation regretted violence and that protest had only peaceful intent.

supported OAU in efforts find African solution and made four points: US responsible for Tshombe's utilization of planes and bombs; use of US-made planes and Cuban rebels constitutes American involvement in bombing of Uganda; US and other foreign powers should respect non-alignment and keep Cold War out of Africa; US policy has failed in Africa and Tshombe should learn to respect African opinion and honor pledges to OAU.

Interesting note that student representatives brought to door of Embassy by Minister State Foreign Affairs Odaka who waited while protest presented. This delegation and its protest more sober and sophisticated than UPC effort.

Embassy will send strong note protesting lack of police protection during GOU-sponsored demonstration and delay in despatch and early withdrawal special force unit, directly resulting in damage to Embassy and desecration American flag.

Comment: Demonstration not well organized or directed and turn out certainly not impressive in light of GOU support and obvious desire create crisis atmosphere. (Magei had publicly urged employers release workers to participate, and some GOU offices closed.)

Protest delegation was clearly unhappy with role. Babiiha in particular looked as though he preferred be anywhere else.

Ibingira may well have had foreboding that Youth Wingers waiting for him.

After reading note Embassy officer expressed profound regret at reported violation Uganda territory and stated would bring to Department's attention immediately. Asked Odaka whether he had sent similar protest to GDRC. Odaka replied that Belgian Ambassador being called in and that GOU had cabled protest to Leopoldville.

Odaka then launched thirty minute emotional diatribe. Following were main points:

(A) Congo had started war against Uganda;(B) GOU small country which had no arms to protect itself; (C) Uganda had been "falsely accused" of assisting rebels; (D) inconceivable that US could not control use of military equipment provided Tshombe (here mentioned Ankole panching scheme and US protest over use of aid-supplied information vans by UPC as examples our concern over end use assistance material); (E) Tshombe was American puppet and if US continued present policy it was starting war against all Africa; (F) there close parallel between Congo and Viet-Nam; US should get out of both countries; (G) if US could not prevent aggression by its aircraft, Uganda would have no alternative but give up US assistance and remove American presence Uganda; (H) if Uganda territory again attacked GOU request meeting of Security Council; (I) GOU had been seriously considering acceding to CDRC request establish Embassy Kampala but under present circumstances this impossible; (J) proposed trip to West Nile by Embassy officer no longer possible.

Embassy officer pointed out that while aircraft may have yeaknedjemt* US supplied, they not flown by American citizens and were under control of GDRC, not us. Noted that villages were only few hundred yards from Congo border, that Mahagi had

been scene intense fighting, and that he was sure that if GOU's reports were correct, violation had been inadvertent. Said there definite limited action USG could take with sovereign government but was sure report would be brought to urgent attention GDRC. Said reported incident seemed to underline need for Uganda push action by OAU and contrary to Odaka statement, GDRC Embassy here would seem more than ever desirable. At termination January 16 Kampala meeting, 6 EA Ministers of Foreign and Internal Security Affairs plus Zambian Foreign Minister issued following communique:

"Ministers responsible for External Affairs and Internal Affairs and Security of Uganda, Kenya and Tanzania, joined by Minister for Foreign Affairs from Zambia, discussed matter of common interest affecting security of their countries. and agreed upon need for closer cooperation and consultation in these matters.

Particular attention was paid to question of persons declared prohibited immigrants in any one of the countries, and it was agreed to recommend to their governments that any persons so declared should be treated similarly by all other governments.

Among many other things discussed was situation in Congo and Mozambique. Ministers expressed necessity frame common policy toward refugees from these and other troubled areas.

Ministers recognized that certain refugees and freedom fighters constituted a security risk in the host countries.

They however recommended that OAU be requested give greater authority to coordinating committee of liberation of training and movements of true freedom fighters."

Comment: Most distrubing feature of communique is recommendation that OAU give greater authority to ALC for "training and movements of true freedom fighters". Although drafting is unclear, sense of passage which linked specifically to Congo and Mozambique, appears pressage Kenyatta sub-committee recommendation bring ALC active presence into West Nile.

With GOU effectively barring outsiders from West Nile (Embassy informed January 16 that EMBOFF would not be issued permit visit Americans in West Nile) practical conditions now obtain for area be used as staging as well as rebel supply and re-equipment depot.

From logistic standpoint West Nile has only two access roads from rest of Uganda (Pakwach and Laropi) both of which require ferries across Nile. It certainly questionalbe whether GDRC assurances to respect neighboring country borders would be honored if in fact rebel troops and ALC "volunteers" are based in and can retreat to West Nile.



"The Government of Uganda is in receipt of the personal note from the Secretary of State to the Prime Minister, which we are acknowledging through our Ambassador in Washington and also your Aide-Memoire dated 4th January, concerning the supply of material and personnel to Congo Rebels and has the honor to answer as follows:

- "1. The Government of Uganda would be grateful if an indication of assistance extended by the United States to the Congo and in particular its duration was given. As you know, African Governments, including the Uganda Government, have called on the withdrawal of foreign interference in the Congo. The Government of Uganda would, therefore, appreciate the extent to which the United States Government is militarily committed to helping the Congolese Government.
- "2. Although it is noted that, 'Tshombe called on African States to supply troops to suppress the rebellion, requested the United States and Belgium to continue their military aid, and also recruited mercenaries, the Uganda Government would like to recall that in the same summer at Addis Ababa by a

resolution passed with the approval of Tshombe, most of the African Governments called upon Tshombe to realize this was a civil war whose solution was essentially political, to stop fighting and also to withdraw mercenaries as pre-requisites for a political solution under the Ad Hoc Committee of the organization of African unity.

"3. It is noted with regret that with the aid of United States Government, Tshombe instead has insisted on the impression of the rebellion. This has been aggravated considerably by the activities of the 24th November, 1964, and by the continued use of mercenaries who it is regretted are supplied with United States military equipment. The question of United States favoring the utilization of African rather than mercenary troops is also noted but it is the Government of Uganda's view that no African troops could replace the mercenaries as their objective and functions are essentially wrong, because as soldiers of fortune they are hired not to keep law and order but to shoot and kill. This was first pronounced by President Tsiranana of Malagasy Republic and subsequently confirmed by all African member states at the Addis Ababa conference in September.

"It is emphasized that the Government of Uganda would not be opposed to the United States Government giving military aid by the supply of United States troops whose aim would be to keep law and order but the Government of Uganda is opposed to the supply of United States military weapons, which are given to the mercenaries. The Prime Minister has already written to the Ambassador on this point.

"4. It is not for us to answer allegations against other governments either by Congo or the Government of the United States. It is, however, on record that both Ghana and the Sudan have denied such allegations.

Odaka said Aide-Memoire represented thing of Prime Minister Obote, but that a separate acknowledgment of Secretary's personal message to him is being directed through Ugandan Ambassador Asea in Washington. Odaka further indicated that message to Secretary is along similar lines to above Aide-Memoire and contained no startling departures.

I scanned Aide-Memoire in presence Odaka who was in most friendly and serious mood. I noted that repeated reference to US "interference" in Congo was not accurate in face indisputable fact assistance given at request legally constituted central government. Odaka did not make issue of this. I also filled him in on USG military and internal security assistance to Congo contained talking paper number 2 CA-5477, which at least partially responsive to paragraph number 1 Aide-Memoire.

Second paragraph of numbered paragraph 3 of Aide-Memoire surprisingly and emphatically indicates GOU would not be opposed
to use US troops and equipment in Congo to maintain "law and
order" so long as weapons not provided to mercenaries. This
most unusual thought coming from African Government and represents
deep feeling re mercenaries as well as confidence in USG sincere
efforts stabilize Congo. Missing from GOU thinking set forth in
Aide-Memoire is any proposal for African assistance to GDRC to
end that mercenaries could be dispensed with.

Seems clear Obote wants work with us to open up new initiatives on Congo and we should of course take every step keep dialogue going. Presume that his message to Secretary will give further opportunity to do this.

Embassy Officer has discussed with Acting British HICOM Aston and Defense Advisor developments at London talks on British military aid to GOU. Prime Minister Obote and Minister Internal Affairs discussed following matters with Sandys, CRO:

- British officers would no longer be seconded to Uganda army but would be attached as advisors. GOU is to supply list of advisor requirements at early date for British review and consideration (not yet supplied).
- 2. Shopping list military supplies and equipment including military hardware prepared by Uganda army staff for Onama prior to departure for London was not presented in that form to British. Obote presented much reduced list containing only vehicles all types; 2 helicopters, 4 caribous and 5 beavers for police air wing; and some communications equipment. Numbers of vehicles increased from original list but list item-wise small. There was no request for military hardware to modernize army nor was subject of Uganda "Air Force" raised possible that GOU has abandoned idea and substituted "police air wing" mentioned above.

British took equipment request under advisement and no firm decision yet made whether GOU will be allowed to finance from Commonwealth loan fund or required pay cash. Grant for items discussed considered unlikely.

Aston informed Embassy Officer that British HICOM had received instructions July 17 withdraw all seconded officers from Uganda army. Acting HICOM stressed he not informed and unable to predict whether this action final or will be followed by assignment new group attached officers serve in advisory capacity. He described situation as still under review and largely dependent on actions and nature of requests of GOU.

Contrary to information reported Embassy telegram 51, Aston stated that British Commander and British seconded officers Uganda army headquarters were replaced June 29, not July 1, by Ugandan officers without prior notice or consultation of any kind. British HICOM called immediately on Obote for explanation and determination of status. According Acting British HICOM Obote explanation flimsy and lacking in candidness, giving impression that he only learned of event after the fact. Onama's announcement of changeover was made in routine manner on July 1 in accordance British desires since they wished no unsettling public controversy to arise during period London discussions.

It also noted during conversation with Acting HICOM that Israeli mortars arrived Entebbe June 29. In meanwhile British have learned that 9 Israeli officers are expected to be working with Uganda army soon as training advisors with both battalions.

Comment: From tenor of conversations with British colleagues it quite apparent they extremely critical and resentful at manner in which Onama proceeded in changeover of command.

This coupled with assignment of more Israeli officers as advisors could well result complete withdrawal British military advisors. Acting HICOM commented it looked as though GOU wanted Britain meet equipment requirements while Israelis filled advisory role. British Defense Advisor later in an aside indicated this arrangement hardly acceptable and they do not intend play "second fiddle" to Israelis. In Embassy view British are prepared pull out of both military supply and advisory fields leaving them open to Israelis. It is believed that Onema already committed to this course. However, Obote himself must now decide what course Uganda is to follow and we assume this is matter he will give urgent attention to on return from CAU Conference.

I reviewed above developments with Aston yesterday and reiterated our hope GOU would continue look to UK for internal defense and security equipment and advisors for both army and "air force". We agreed that if GOU for own reasons turned to Israel for such assistance there was nothing intrinsically bad in this from point of view our national interest but HICOM concentred that Israeli Embassy here being secretive on whole matter and though he had given lead to Israeli Ambassador Michael in recent conversation

EMBASSY IN DISCUSSIONS WITH EXPAT OFFICIALS, SECONDED BRITISH OFFICERS AND UK HICOM HAVE REVEALED THAT SIGNIFICANT CHANGES MAY BE DEVELOPING IN UGANDA ARMED FORCES AND DEFENSE POLICY. FOLLOWING ARE MIGHLIGHTS:

1. ARMED FORCES ACT 1964 WAS INTRODUCED INTO PARLIAMENT BY MINISTER INTERNAL AFFAIRS ONAMA ON JUNE 19, 1964, BUT HAS NOT YET BEEN AND MAY NOT BE DEBATED THIS SESSION DUE ABSENCE ONA MA ATTEND LONDON COMMONWEALTH CONFERENCE AND CAIRO OAU CONFERENCE. THIS BILL PROVIDES FOR FORMAL CREATION OF ARMY AND AIR FORCE AND RESERVE; VOLUNTEER FORCE AND RESERVE. PRESIDENT BECOMES COMMANDER IN CHIEF. BILL PROVIDES FOR APPOINTMENT CHIEF OF DEFENSE STAFF, ARMY CHIEF OF STAFF AND CHIEF AIR STAFF, ALL OF WHOM RESPONSIBLE TO DEFENSE COUNCIL. REMAINDER OF BILL DEALS PRIMARILY WITH PERSONS SUBJECT TO CODE OF SERVICE, DISCIPLINE, SERVICE OFFENSES AND TRIAL AND PUNISH-MENT OF SERVICE OFFENSES.

COMMENT: BILL DRAFTED BY V.C. CRABBE, GHANA IAN WHO SERVING AS FIRST PARLIAMENTARY COUNSEL, MINISTRY OF JUSTICE, AND FOLLOWS CLOSELY CANADIAN AND GHANAIAN ARMED FORCES BILL. BILL GIVES REASONABLE FRAMEWORK TO ESTABLISHMENT UGANDAN ARMED FORCES BUT PROVIDES FOR STRUCTURE VERY DIFFICULT TO STAFF UNDER PRESENT CIRCUMSTANCES (ARMY HAS 120 OFFICER SPACES OF WHICH @ ARE FILLED). PERHAPS OF GREATER CONCERN ARE ELABORATE PROVISIONS FOR WRITTEN RECORD IN ALL ACTIONS TAKEN BY OFFICERS AGAINST SUBORDINATES WITH RECORDS PASSED UP THROUGH CHARMELS

FOR FORMAL REVIEW. ACCORDING TO SECONDED BRITISH OFFICERS, THESE DEMANDS ON OFFICERS AT COMPANY LEVEL PRACTICALLY IMPOSSIBLE FULFILL DUE PRESSURE OTHER DUTIES, LACK OF STAFF AND NEAR ILLITERACY IN MANY INSTANCES. ADVERSE EFFECT ON DISCIPLINE LIKELY BE DRASTIC.

2. MINISTER INTERNAL AFFAIRS ANNOUNCED JULY 1 THAT COMMAND OF UGANDA ARMY HANDED OVER FROM COLONEL GROOME, BRITISH SECONDED OFFICER, TO COLONEL O.L. HE IS FROM TESO AND WAS ORIGINALLY PROTEGE MINISTER JUSTICE OBWANGOR, TESO POLITICAL BOSS. HE HAS APPROXIMATELY THREE YEARS EXPERIENCE AS OFFICER AND ACCORDING EMBASSY SOURCES IS ILL PREPARED FOR PRESENT POST, NOT OF HIGH INTELLIGENCE AND CAN BE EXPECTED BLINDLY CARRY OUT ONAMA'S ORDERS.

OPOLOT REPLACED AS COMMANDER SECOND BATTALION BY MAJOR HUSSEIN SULEIMAN, WHO REPORTEDLY OF GOOD BACKGROUND AND CAPABILITIES. FIRST BATTALION REMAINS UNDER COLONEL AMIN, A COMPETENT OFFICER WHO ORIGINALLY ONAMA PROTEGE BUT WHO HAS REPORTEDLY BECOME DISILLUSIONED WITH ONAMA'S INTERFERENCE IN COMMAND. HE PRESENTLY ON STUDY COURSE IN BRITAIN. UGANDA OFFICERS REPLACING BRITISH SECONDED OFFICERS IN HEADQUARTERS STAFF ALL FROM SOUTH, I.E., BUGANDA AND ANKOLE, WHICH MOVE IS BELIEVED DIRECT EFFORT ONAMA REMOVE SOUTHERNERS FROM CHANNEL OF COMMAND WHILE COMMAND POSITIONS REMAIN IN HANDS NORTHERNERS WITH WHOM HE HAS INGRATIATED HIMSELF. AT SAME TIME ABOVE ACTION ALL PRITISH OFFICERS WITH TROOPS REPLACED BY UGANDANS BUT NO ANNOUNCEMENT SO MADE. SENIOR BRITISH OFFICER HAS INSTRUCTED THAT NO SECONDED BRITISH OFFICER SHOULD ACT IN AN ADVISORY CAPACITY AT ANY LEVEL UGANDA ARMY PENDING DETERMINATION OF STATUS AT LONDON TALKS.

IF ISRAELIS SUCCESSFUL UGANDA ARMY LIKELY TAKE ON ANTI-ARAB COLORATION THEREBY INTENSIFYING RACIAL ISSUE IN STATE BORDERING SUDAN. ONAMA PROCEEDED TO LONDON WITH LONG SHOPPING LIST NEEDED EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES (EMBASSY TELEGRAM 1243) AND WHOLE QUESTION STATUS BRITISH OFFICERS TO BE RESOLVED THERE. "ONAMA CAN BE EXPECTED MAKE BID FOR ERITISH GRANT OR LOAN COVER ALL ARMY REQUIREMENTS. HOWEVER, ITEMS REQUIRED TO MODERNIZE TWO BATTALIONS INCLUDING SIX FERRETS, ARE BUDGETED FOR CURRENT FISCAL YEAR. IF THIS TRANSPIRES UGANDA ARMY WILL PROBABLY RECEIVE WHAT IT WANTS WITH PRESTIGE BEING IN FOREFRONT OF MOTIVATION RATHER THAN A SOUND AND SOBER MODERNIZATION OF ARMY WHICH UGANDA NEEDS. ON OTHER HAND GOU OVERTURES TO AND ACCEPTANCE OF ASSISTANCE FROM ISRAEL MAY BE PART OF STRATEGY DESIGNED TO GET BRITISH TO SUPPLY ARMY EQUIPMENT PROMPTLY AND ON FAVORABLE TERMS OR UNDERWRITE AIR FORCE (EMBASSY TELEGRAM 1243). DIRECTION OF UGANDA POLICY WILL NO DOUBT DEPEND MUCH ON OUTCOME LONDON TALKS, DETAILS OF WHICH NOT YET KNOWN HERE. Minister Internal Affairs Onama called me to his office in Parliament Building yesterday afternoon.

Onama said it had been decided Uganda must have a small tactical "air force" for internal security and defense purposes. What they had in mind was squadron of 12 fighter jets of "Hunter" class. They wished planes and training to be supplied by US. They aware that this was an expensive matter and would require 3 or 4 million pounds outlay from Uganda's resources. Decision to establish small air force had been pending for some time but had been brought to head by recently announced British agreement train a Kenya air force, and deteriorating situation in two of Uganda's neighboring countries, namely, Sudan and the Congo. Onama said GOU expected situation be very bad in eastern Congo by August and that Uganda would face additional refugee problem.

Onama said that decision request USG for assistance in establishing proposed air force was known only to himself, the Prime Minister and Mr. Davies, his Permanent Secretary. The decision would be reported to Cabinet meeting on Tuesday, June 9.

I thanked the Minister for confidence he had indicated in US in making this request. I then reviewed with him our general policy of looking to British or other former metropolitan power to supply arms needed for internal security and defense in newly independent African countries, our wish of course to avoid giving any impetus to an "arms race" in East Africa which would put disproportionate load on the economies, or any action that would set up rivalries between countries, etc. I also reviewed my understanding of GOU's

agreement with UK following recent withdrawal of UK troops; that UK would continue and expand its training of army officers, would continue for time being to command Uganda rifles, would maintain officers in advisory capacity at batallion and company level, would provide flight training in Kenya for Ugandans, and would sell to Uganda necessary arms and military equipment for army. Onama said my understanding of this agreement correct but as regards air force Uganda had never had one and had no agreement and had made no request to any other country to supply and train one. They had decided against going to British for such facility and were now asking whether US would do so.

I again expressed appreciation GOU's confidence and told Onama that I would report his request immediately to my government and it would be taken under most active consideration. I could go no further at moment but I assured him I agreed that Uganda had need for such a force which obviously was of size and nature to be used only for internal defense, to prevent possible military or insurgent incursions from neighboring countries, and to give authority to Uganda's determination to live in peace with its neighbors.

Onama then remarked, perhaps casually and perhaps with intent, that he was leaving June 11 for Israel with a few of his police and military advisors to accept long-standing invitation from government of Israel to inspect their internal defense setup. The inference might be drawn that if USG could not respond positively Uganda would look next to Israel. However, professionals in Uganda army and police have not been happy with training so far provided by Israel and I believe they reluctant go to them for "air force."

I told Onama that conceivably I would have some indication of my government's reaction before he departed on Thursday but if not, I would see him at once on his return from Israel June 18. He was agreeable to this.

- 1. While there is certainly some element of "keeping up with the neighbors" in Onama's request, I believe an "air force" for Uganda of type requested is eminently justified in view of very unsettled and even threatening situation in her two largest neighbors who are relatively powerfully armed. No one could suspect that Uganda in her size and position has any aggressive intent. Onama assured me his mention of influx of refugees had nothing to do with need or use of air squadron. What Uganda feared is possible incursion into Uganda of foreign forces following the refugees and he cited situation in Burundi and Rwanda where "Jeunesse" forces had reportedly intruded recently.
- 2. In my own view Onama's request to us comes under idea conditions to elicit favorable response. Request is uninspired by us and there is no advance commitment on our side. British have no undertaking in this field and should not object to our entering it. When I reminded Onama that there might be some political "fall out" for Uganda with other African countries, if and when US aid for such project became public, he dismissed this as inconsequential and something Uganda was quite prepared to live with.
- 3. Onama said he envisages a 4 or 5 year period of training, first in US and then in Uganda before proposed squadron could be fully manned and maintained by Ugandan personnel.
- 4. He said Entebbe airport would not be base for squadron but new air base must be established, probably at Jinja, adjacent

- 6. I recommend that I be authorized on urgent basis tell Onama that my government is giving favorable consideration to GOU request. I should like to so inform him before his departure for Israel June 11, but no harm would be done if this not possible. However, we must respond by 18th.



I called on UK HICOM Hunt 9 o'clock this morning. He gave me following chronological outline events yesterday.

- 1. At 10:30 a.m. he called on Obote in Entebbe by previous appointment discuss developments Zanzibar, Tanganyika and East Africa generally. Obote expressed deep concern that fine leader like Nyerere brought under pressure military. He and Hunt agreed it would be intolerable development if duly appointed heads of government and elected representatives of people were to be at mercy of insurgent sargeants and corporals as had happened in Congo and now apparently East Africa. Hunt said he and Obote developed this theme at some length and had meeting minds.
- 2. At 3:55 that afternoon he had unexpected call from Obote. PM recalled their conversation that morning, said unrest and dangerous situation developing at Jinja barracks first battalion Uganda Rifles and said he wanted troops sent in from Kenya. Hunt asked if he meant African troops. Obote said no, British. HICOM said this serious request and would Obote put it in writing. When he said he would, Hunt agreed find out at once if his government willing.
- 3. To make long story short, Hunt said HMG agreed and he went at once Entebbe carrying formal request for British troops which Obote signed.

Spokesman company noted Onama's earlier announcement had provided pay increases for non-coms but none for privates and they demanded immediate raise. Atmosphere got nasty and though Onama allowed to leave, many Askaris remained outside barracks and refused obey officers.
- 7. Hunt said he amazed at speed with which British forces were able respond Uganda's appeal and he was at airport Entebbe with Minister Information Nekyon to meet them. Commented troops did not know what to expect and debarked from planes in full battle dress and deployed for action. Nekyon impressed.
- 8. During night one company secured airport, one company remained in reserve Entebbe, and one company proceeded Kampala and moved into police barracks at 4:00 a.m. Friday. Hunt said an additional full battalion was in reserve in Kenya ready to fly to Uganda.

In discussion situation Hunt and I agreed Obote had moved boldly, taken risks, but kept peace and order and, not incidentally, retained his position as Prime Minister Uganda and leader government by requesting British intervention. We also agreed Obote carries some heavy responsibility for letting situation and his leadership deteriorate over past months, first by never taking strong stand against increasingly militant UPC youth wing command second, by himself contributing to fears and divisions in country by recent imprudent speeches denouncing and threatening all political opposition in Uganda.

My own observation is that British have played well the role of responsible friend in Ugandas time of need despite the unfriendliest treatment recently of some of their citizens in Uganda.



Although they sing in different voices, the real tune is the same—through negotiation they want to preserve what U.S. Imperialism will soon lose completely on the battlefield..... Whether one resolutely supports the Vietnamese people in defeating U.S. aggessors completely may serve as a touchstone to see whether one is a true or a fake revolutionary and whether one is truly or untruly opposed to imperialism."
- b. August 3 PEOPLE'S DAILY editorial declared "The United States will never lay down its butcher knife, nor will it ever mend its evil ways and be benevelent. In face of such a nefarious aggressor, any begging or any wish for something good to turn up will only feed its ferocity. The only correct way is to do the United States what it does to us: to wage a tit-for-tat struggle against it. Only by smashing the Johnson administration's adventurous plan for

expanding the war in the course of its escalation can peace in Vietnam and Indochina be restored."

o. ChiCom Government statement issued August 7 stated:

"Johnson said (July 28) that the United States was ready to discuss any proposals of any government including those already set forth by Hanoi. This can deceive nobody....All countries and people who love peace and uphold justice must unite, thoroughly expose the 'peace talks' swindle of the United States, and resolutely support the Vietnamese people in their just struggle to defeat the U.S. aggressors...."

ERIFASI OTEMA ALLIMADI OF UGANDA


Erifasi Otema Allimadi was born in the Acholi district of Uganda on February 11, 1929. He completed secondary school at Gulu and began, but did not complete, a correspondence course leading to a London General Certificate of Education.

From 1947 to 1956 Allimadi served as a minor medical functionary, first with the British African army and, thereafter, with the Uganda Medical Service. After a year in business he turned to politics and until 1960 held positions concurrently with the Acholi District Council and the Uganda National Congress (party). In 1960 he joined with Milton Obote in forming the Uganda People's Congress, eventually rising to the post of National Vice Chairman. After failing to be elected as an independent Member of Parliament in 1962, Allimadi successively served on Uganda's UN delegation in 1963, as Chairman of the Government's Press Censorship Board during its brief existence in 1964, and as Deputy Permanent Representative to the UN in 1964-65.

The selection of Allimadi for the post of Ambassador to Washington represents a victory for the northern radical clique which currently guides Uganda's affairs. He can be expected to be loyal to President Obote on the basis of their long and close relationship.

Allimadi was once regarded as a radical left wing member of the UPC and is well known for having been the sponsor of many students to various countries in the Communist world during Uganda's pre-independence days. He has traveled to Czechoslovakia, the USSR, and Communist China, as well as to Greece and Switzerland. Since independence, however, he appears to have tempered his views and it is probable that his previous radical tendencies were largely opportunistic. According to USUN, during the year Allimadi served as Deputy Permanent Representative he was helpful and friendly to Americans and partial to the US point of view.

GEORGE KAMBA

UGANDA

George Kamba was born in the Bukedi District of Uganda in 1927. He received his Primary, Secondary, and High School education at the Nabumali School in his home district. He entered the Kampala, Uganda, Engineering School in 1948 and in 1953 received a degree as a Civil Engineer. For the next eight years he combined a career in working for the Government as a regional engineer with a rising interest and activity in politics. In 1958, he was elected Secretary General of the Bukedi District Administration, which office he held until he was appointed first Uganda High Commissioner to India in 1964. He is said to be a very active sportsman.

During his period in India, Mr. Kamba made friends with a number of members of the staff of the United States Embassy. Such information as we have concerning him is favorable in nature.

Subject: Success of Obote's Power Grab Still in Doubt

Take-Over May Unleash Conflict. Prime Minister Apolo Milton Obote seized supreme power on February 22 and arrested five leading ministers of his former government. Obote probably acted in political desperation, and there is a strong possibility of violent opposition to his "coup by decree." We still do not know precisely who is lined up with and against him in the present situation. Of particular importance, the loyalties of the police and army are still in doubt. Uganda's regional, ethnic and religious divisions are deep and sometimes bitter; they permeate all elements of the political. and governmental system, including the security forces. It is unlikely that Obote has so effectively orchestrated his take-over as to preclude the possibility of violent counter-action from one or another of the elements opposed to him.

Obote Seeks to Pre-Empt Conservatives. Obote and his radical, mainly northern, supporters have been on the defensive since the Uganda Parliament, earlier this month, condemned Army Chief of Staff, Colonel Idi Amin, for diverting into his pockets and those of others (including Obote's) substantial quantities of gold "liberated" from the Congo early in 1965.

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Threats of an Amin-led military coup ten days ago failed to materialize, and Obote's position seemed weaker than ever. Thereafter, Obote's opponents -- mainly southern moderates -- pressed their attack, demanding Amin's arrest and suggesting that Obote himself resign. His hold on the Premiership threatened, Obote moved to seize power.

Role of the Army and Police will Prove Critical. The arrest of five southern ministers (including the leading moderate, Minister of State Grace Ibingira) by the police suggests that the latter are giving substantial support to the Prime Minister. The police are probably Uganda's strongest single security force, While the army could offer opposition, it is more likely to split into antagonistic factions than to act in any unified way.

To Obote's advantage, however, is the fact that three of the four battalion commanders are northerners, as are most of the enlisted ranks. On the other hand, the Army Commander, Brigadier Opoloto, is usually identified with the southern moderates, as are a number of junior officers at army headquarters. Opoloto does not clearly command substantial personal loyalty within the army, however, and even if he has not already been deposed, he cannot be depended upon to resist Obote's move.

Obote Not Yet Firmly in the Saddle. With the balance of armed power in doubt, it is still an open question whether Obote can carry off his coup. He will probably encounter strong -- perhaps violent -- opposition in the capital, for Kampala is the heart of the conservative southern kingdom of

Buganda. The appeal of traditionalism is even stronger in outlying southern areas. How effectively this can be translated into action against Obote depends in the last analysis on the determination of southern leadership to resist and on Obote's willingness -- and ability -- to resort to harsh and perhaps widespread repression to maintain himself in power.

International Aspects. If he can hold power, Obote will probably in time steer Uganda away from close ties with the West, toward warmer relations with communist countries and closer alignment with Africa's radical states. The southerners are closely identified with the West, especially by Ugandan radicals. Ibingira specifically has close ties with the US, and Obote might single out the US as the malefactor that forced him to take steps against the southern ministers.

Ambassador Asea said that he was not coming to deliver a protest over the border violations. He said that this had been done already in Kampala. He did want, however, to talk with the Secretary about his Government's feelings with respect to the Congo and to ask the Secretary for his comments on our Congolese policy. Before going into the Congo problem, the Ambassador said that his Government was angry about the demonstration which had recently taken place in front of our Embassy in Kampala. It was the Ambassador's opinion that hired thugs were responsible for the damage. He wished to point out that the police had used tear gas to disperse the unruly crowd. Ambassador Asea hoped very much that this demonstration would not color our friendly relations.

The Ambassador then launched into a discussion of his Government's views on the Congo situation. He noted his Government's concern over the possibility of outbreaks of violence and stated specifically that there were no Uganda troops in the Congo. The Government of Uganda contends that because of our alliance with the Congo we must be held partly responsible for these border violations. The GOU believes that the USG must have known of the bombing attack at Goli. He also pointed but that the planes were of US manufacture and were piloted either by mercenaries or Cuban refugees who had been recruited and trained by the United States. The Ambassador said that there are moral obligations involved in the world-wide sale of weapons. At this point the Secretary interposed, "By the USSR?", and the Ambassador replied, "Of course." Ambassador Asea, as if thinking out loud, wondered what would happen if an OAU mission went into the Congo. The Secretary asked, "With or without the permission of the GDRC?", to which Ambassador Asea replied, "With that permission."

The Secretary said that U.S. policy is to support the security, prosperity and independence of Uganda, land he pointed out that we have an identical attitude with respect to the GDRC. He referred to his January 1 message to Prime Minister Obote and said that if the facts bear out the allegations we would support a protest to the Tshombe Government. He said, however, that it was becoming increasingly clear that the reports of the bombing were not correct and noted that no observers had been permitted into the area to inspect the damage and to determine its cause. The Secretary then asked the Ambassador if Uganda had arms and aircraft. When the Ambassador did not reply to this, the Secretary went on to say that he believed Great Britain had furnished military equipment to Uganda and then asked if the UK controls the use of these arms. Again, Ambassador Asea did not reply.

The Secretary urged that the COU make public its intention to leave the Congo alone and to be sure that nothing goes either way across the border.

He noted that Uganda cannot be a safe haven or sanctuary. This, he said, was highly dangerous. He had seen reports that Uganda personnel were in Kasindi and Mahagi, that the rebels were receiving assistance and staging rights in Uganda, and that arms for the rebels were being allowed to transit Uganda. This, he said, was a very serious matter

The Secretary reviewed for Ambassador Asea the history of United States assistance to the Congo, noting that we would prefer to give only economic aid.

He said that foreign policy could not be based on personalities and that we had not expected Tshombe to become Prime Minister. The Secretary made reference to the fact that the Soviets and others were furnishing arms to the rebels in violation of the most elementary principles of the United Nations and that certain African states were permitting this. He urged the GOU to refuse to become involved in these illegal activities and stated that such a refusal would obtain widespread support.

Ambassador Asea replied that his Government had always respected the legal GDRC and had safeguarded their interests. He said, however, when the bombing took place the mood in his country had changed. He replied rather ambiguously to the Secretary's remarks on safe haven and training for the rebel soldiers. He contended that Uganda had always acted with restraint and that if the reports of the occupancy of Mahagi and Kasindi were true

it was a retaliatory action. The Secretary said that he would be very interested in hearing if the United States could assist in any way to maintain the integrity of the border. The Ambassador said he felt the first step was up to the OAU. Ambassador Asea made a final reference to the GOU attitude on refugees which he said demonstrates the correctness of the Uganda attitude towards its neighbors. In concluding, the Secretary suggested that both governments should draw back from the border.

Major Political Considerations

The Secretary asked the Vice President what he considered to be Uganda's greatest current problem. Without hesitation Sir William stated that it was Communism. The Communists, he said, are already on Uganda's borders (meaning in Tanzania). The Red Chinese and Soviet Embassies in Kampala were becoming extremely active and devoting their attention to the unemployed and more radical youth elements. There was considerable evidence of their success.

Sir William at this point digressed to deplore the deterioration of relations with Tanzania and to confess his perplexity over the course Julius Nyerere seems to have chosen. With respect to Kenya, Sir William stated that relations were currently excellent now that the disagreement last month over the shipment of Chinese arms from Tanzania through Kenya had been settled to everyone's satisfaction. He emphasized the importance to Uganda of maintaining good relations with Kenya. This led to a discussion of the difficulties faced by landlocked states of which Africa has quite a number. Hr. Mulcahy stated that we had been particularly unhappy to see landlocked Uganda place restrictions upon traffic to and from landlocked Rwanda and hoped that this situation would shortly be cleared up. Sit William said that he thought that much of this friction had already been removed. The Secretary indicated his agreement with Sir William's hope that the Africans would find a formula which would prevent landlocked states from becoming victimized by others.

Congo-Uganda Relations

The Secretary led the discussion from this point into Congo-Uganda relations. He said that we had been particularly concerned by the deterioration of relations between the two countries a few months ago but were happy that the differences now seemed to be resolving themselves. He felt that it was not in Uganda's interest to allow outsiders to use the Congolese border for activities against the Central Government there. Sir William expressed his wholehearted agreement, adding his conviction that his own government had never sanctioned anti-Congolese activities across the border. It had become clear in recent weeks that some dishonest individuals had been largely to blame for the troubles along that border. He firmly expressed Uganda's hope for only the best relations with the Congo. He mentioned the importance of the cross-border trade to both countries and said he hoped it would soon be flowing freely once again. The Secretary said that he wanted to reiterate what he had already told Prime Minister Obote that the United States was equally concerned with the integrity of Uganda's borders as it was with those of the Congo.

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Briefing Memorandum for the President

SUBJECT: Meeting with Ambassadors Leonhart, Attwood and Deming

Tanzania

Ambassador William Leonhart is scheduled to arrive in Dar-es-Salaam at the end of February. As you know, Tanzania has publicly stated they are recalling their Ambassador, Othman Shariff. This is a result of our having requested the withdrawal of their Counselor in Washington in the aftermath of the expulsion of our Counselor Robert Gordon and Consul General Frank Carlucci. Ambassador Leonhart will be bringing with him your reply to President Nyerere's letter to you of January 28.

While the recall of Ambassador Shariff by Tanzania does not mean a break in diplomatic relations between our two countries, it is apparent that President Nyerere is upset. He believes it unjust for us to ask for the recall of their Counselor, an innocent man, because he has expelled two of our officers whom he believes were engaged in subversive activities. He has refused, however, to provide evidence which would substantiate his allegation, or to participate with us in a joint inquiry into all the facts of the matter.

Kenya

Kenya, the most economically developed of the East African countries, became independent December 12, 1963. Politically, tribal differences and particularly the drive for power of pro-communist politicians led by Vice President Odinga and amply financed by the Chicoms and/or the USSR were of concern to the US. Suspicions of US intentions were fed by events in the Congo. Ambassador Attwood recently had his first talk with President Kenyatta since Stanleyville. He believes we should try to get Kenyatta and his moderate Ministers concentrating on internal problems and away from the emotional Congo issue. The invitation to President Kenyatta for a State Visit to the US pleased him greatly as did the announcement by Ambassador Attwood of our willingness to supply corn to alleviate the food shortage and US plans for assistance to the Kenya Police Airwing. Ambassador Attwood believes the atmosphere both with the President and, in general, has improved in recent weeks.

Uganda

Our relations with Uganda which were very close and friendly prior to the Stanleyville rescue operations, have recently taken a turn for the worse. In early January, Prime Minister Obote held a press conference in which he attacked US policy in the Congo in very strong terms. Although it appeared from a meeting he had with our Charge on February 2 that he

was moderating his stand somewhat, recent allegations that Uganda border towns were bombed by Congolese planes supplied by the US and piloted by mercenaries have resulted in a sharp protest to us by the Government of Uganda.

In spite of disagreements over the Congo, we feel that Uganda still has an underlying feeling of friendship for US. We have an effective AID program there and senior officials both privately and publicly have expressed their appreciation for our assistance.

On Tuesday, we were advised of a demonstration in front of our Embassy. Damage was minor - one window broken. The flag was cut down by a demonstrator but was saved from further damage by an alert Embassy officer.

Harrison

Dr. Harrison has called at the Department of State a number of times, the last occasion being approximately one year ago. At that time he stated that he was employed by the Ministry of Health of Buganda, a tribal Kingdom in Uganda. He was interested in obtaining secondhand medical equipment; at the same time, he mentioned the High Protein Food factory he writes of in his memorandum to you. quently, Dr. Harrison returned to Uganda and became further involved in the food factory and other projects. He approached our AID Mission in Kampala on two separate occasions to discuss his food program.

Our feeling is that while there is some merit in the plans he outlines, there has not been enough study given to these projects; nor have the proposals-been, to our knowledge, in any way co-ordinated with on-going programs sponsored by the Government of Uganda. They also have not been integrated with the various Uganda development plans which we feel are sound and well thought out.

In addition to these basic objections, we are concerned that there does not seem to be any serious attempt to set up real organizations to back these plans. are indications of contributions from various United States companies and foundations, but little evidence of substantial

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financial backing. Furthermore, Dr. Harrison's connection with a local government (Buganda Ministry of Health) gives us some concern as there might arise questions of conflict of interest.

The Public Health Division of the AID African Bureau is however, continuing to explore ways of assisting Dr. Harrison.

Dear Mr. Watson:

I wish to thank you for your kindness in your consideration of my recent letters to you, and also for arranging the conference with Mr. Ulric Haynes.

From my brief contacts with you I feel strongly that you can and will help me in the problem I have brought to your attention. I would greatly appreciate the opportunity to have a brief conference with you.

The only reason I am bringing this problem to your attention is because I have exhausted every routine channel (almost everyone concerned with these programs in the state department or AID knows me-smile). I am almost certain there is no other country at present, certainly not in Africa, that has the four major AID programs I have listed on the inclosed paper, organized and in operation or ready to start. These four AID programs are without question the most important, most basic, and most far reaching of our gigantic efforts to build democracy around the world.

The African government for which I am working is asking for and is in dire need of all four of these programs NOW. I must not, we cannot let our "neighbors" down unless all avenues are completely exhausted (to let them down is to let ourselves and our boys in Viet Nam down). Only God in heaven knows where the leftest movements in East Africa will lead to, when the powder keg in Southern Rhodesia will explode and how far its ashes will scorch the earth, or how long the period of relative peace will last in the Congo, Nigeria, Dahomey, etc. I need not remind us of the financial burden we carried so recently in the Congo, or of the present Viet Nam costs in money and lives.

I've come to a "dead end" street in two of the major programs listed on the paper. I am confident you can help at this stage once you see the problem. Within a matter of months portions of this program can be extended to the Congo, Zamoia, etc.—in any direction that the state department would indicate. Each of these projects is 100% controlled by some of Americas most dedicated and most knowledgable citizens, and the projects are 100% designed and operating to uplift the masses of the people. With a minimum of our financial appropriations a maximum good will come to the given countries, and without doubt prevent the heart rending cost in lives and distruction that must come where social injustice continues to exist.

Forgive me for repeating what you already know and what our President is saying and has said far more effectively than I can. Let me rest this matter in your competent hands at this point. I trust I may have the privilege of meeting you.

FOUR OR PLANS ADOPTED FROM "THE GRE SOCIETY" THAT HAVE BEEN INITIATED IN EAST AFRICA

As stated again and again by our President, the following five <u>basic human needs</u> must be the ground substance for any hope for world peace and political stability:-FOOD, CLOTHING, ADEQUATE SHELTER, EDUCATION, AND A JOB. The following plans will do much to secure these specific needs.

- A HI-PROTEIN FOOD FACTORY IN EAST AFRICA with an AGRICULTURAL PROGRAM TO PRODUCE MORE PROTEIN FOODS:
 - (a) Specific emphysis is being placed on pre-school malnutrition.
 - (b) The protein crop is being grown by thousands of peasant farmersthus providing them with the MONEY, indispensable to raising their standards of living, and at the same time solving their most pressing problem--MALNUTRITION. (this project is in operation now)
- 2. A FIVE MILLION DOLLAR (\$5,000,000) CO-OP HOUSING PROJECT.
 - (a) This is an AID guaranty program started over one year ago.
 - (b) It is the ONLY 100% PRIVATE OWNERSHIP HOUSING PROJECT of this size started in Africa.
 - (c) This is the only US foreign AID housing scheme, so I understand, organized and financed so as to establish a continuing HOME BUILDING AND HOME OWNERSHIP program for those most in need of better housing.
- 3. SMALL INDUSTRIAL (mainly RURAL -- "grass-roots") ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT.
 - (a) This plan is being engineered by experienced specialists from two top American Universities, and the University in the African country with the cooperation of the local African Government Economic Planning Ministry.
- 4. A PUBLIC HEALTH SCHOOL--to train SUB-PROFESSIONAL RURAL PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICERS.
 - (a) Only one US MEDICAL UNIVERSITY has pioneered such a school in an underdeveloped country.
 - (b) This US Medical School started their first foreign Public Health School in a Church Mission Hospital in Tanzania five (5) years ago.
 - (c) This educational program has successfully met the needs for rural or village Public Health progress and Community Development to achieve a higher standard of living.
 - (d) With the supervision of this Medical School and one other US Medical School a similiar Public Health School is being opened by my department for the country where I work.
 - (e) This will be the first Public Health School of this type (a "grassroots" educational program) operated by the government of any developing country.

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BRIEFING MEMORANDUM

Subject: Your meeting with Ambassador Asea of Uganda

- We do not believe that Ambassador Asea will bring up anything of great substance during his call on you. He might, however, mention:
- A visit to the United States of President Sir Edward Mutesa. The President was planning a private visit to the United States last July, primarily to see the World's Fair. He had hoped to come to Washington informally to meet you. We understand that he still is thinking about a short trip to the United States along the same lines.
- b. United States assistance. Ambassador Asea might thank you for United States assistance to Uganda which has been primarily in the fields of education and agriculture.
- 2. You may wish to bring up:
- a. Nonalignment. We respect the desires of a country to remain, within its capabilities, out of the East-West struggle. We believe, however, that true nonalignment involves responsibility and integrity.

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THE REMARKS OF

Mr. President:

I have the honour to present to you the Letter of

Credence by which Six Edward Mutesa, the President of the

Sovereign State of Uganda accredits me as the first

Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the United

States of America. I am conscious of the heavy responsibility

which is involved, but I feel confident that with the

cooperation of the United States Government I will strengthen

and promote the friendly relations which exist between our two

Governments and peoples.

The United States of America and Uganda have many similar possessions like great lakes, and long rivers. Sir, if you would allow me to mention a personal observation which I have made during my short stay in Washington, I would like to say

Ugandans! The other striking similarity between our two countries which I might mention is that both the United

States of America and Uganda are led by Presidents as Heads

of State. In this connection I would like to take the liberty to pay tribute to the late President John F. Kennedy who the world has come to recognize as a great Leader. He will forever be remembered as the Champion of Peace, Justice, and Equality.

In bidding me farewell my President, Sir Edward Mutesa asked me to convey to you his personal greetings and to say how sorry he was that he could not visit the United States of America as was arranged because of illness. However, he hoped it would be possible for him to make a visit in not a too distant future.

May I take this opportunity, Mr. President, to express
to you the sincere gratitude of the Uganda Government and
people for the various assistances which you have given to
Uganda since her Independence. The American aid has helped
Uganda to

Uganda to push shead with some of her vigorous projects such as Secondary Schools Expansion, Group Farming, and others. The Uganda Government is also appreciative of the fact that the United States of America is the biggest buyer of Uganda coffee. Long may this continue. Uganda would in turn like to offer to American people her world renown tourist attractions. As more and more Americans visit Uganda so will the ties and bonds of friendship between Americans and Ugandans grow stronger and stronger; for there is nothing to equal personal contact in promoting friendly human relations.

I would wish in conclusion, Mr. President, to express my most sincere wishes for your own well-being and for the happiness and prosperity of the American people. Now Mr. President, I have great pleasure in presenting to you my Letter of Credence as the first Ambassador of Uganda to the United States of America.

Dr. Solomon Bayo Asea Newly Appointed Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Uganda to the United States

Dr. Asea was born in the West Nile district of Uganda in 1924. He was educated at King's College, Uganda, often described as the Eton of East Africa, and Makerere College, Uganda. At Makerere he studied medicine and was the first African to gain the degree of the East African medical society. He subsequently studied in the United Kingdom where he attained high honors in the fields of public health and tropical medicine. He has served as director of a number of government hospitals in his native country and has worked in the Ministry of Health as well. Our Embassy in Kampela advised that Dr. Asea was especially selected by Prime Minister Milton Obote for this position.

The Ambassador entered the Ministry of External Affairs in January of 1964 and attended the Commonwealth meeting in London this past June. Following the Commonwealth meeting, he attended the meeting of the Organization of African Unity in Cairo.

Ambassador Asea is married and has seven children, all of whom are with him in Washington. One of his daughters is going to the National Cathedral School; the other children attend public schools near their Embassy. He speaks excellent English. His recreations are music and photography.

Dr. Solomon Bayo Asea Newly Designated Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Uganda to the United States

Dr. Solomon B. Asea was born in Uganda in 1920. After primary school, he attended Kings College, Budo, and Makerere University College, Kampala, from which he graduated with honors. He attended graduate schools in Liverpool and London and has several advanced degrees in various fields of medicine, particularly public health. Prior to his entry into the field of Diplomacy in 1964, he was Medical Superintendent of the Government hospital at Gulu, an important provincial center in Uganda and also served as Senior Medical Officer in the Ministry of Health in Kampala. In the Ministry of External Affairs, he served as Under Secretary before being designated Ambassador to the United States.

Deteriorating Security Situation in East Africa:

Uganda, the New Flash Point

British Troops Respond to Uganda Appeal. British military assistance probably will stabilize internal security and shore up the government of Prime Minister Milton Obote for the time being. Obote, however, has been under serious pressure in recent weeks from radical groups within his own party as well as from the opposition. Obote's reliance on British troops will probably in the longer run further undermine his strength, adding to other complaints the accusation that he has brought back the former colonial master.

Likely Impact in Kenya. We believe that Prime Minister Kenyatta, who probably concurred in this deployment of British troops from their Kenyan bases, did so because he himself is fearful that the virus of army dissidence will spread to Kenya. The British action is likely to give pause to potential trouble-makers in the Kenyan army. (Some 4,000 UK troops are presently stationed in the country.) However, as in the case of Uganda, the more volatile elements both within and outside the government coalition will accuse Kenyatta of complicity with British neo-colonial machinations, and could over time threaten the Prime Minister's position.

Likely Impact in Tanganyika. Dar-es-Salaam remains unsettled following the recent mutiny. The British move in Uganda will undoubtedly

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have an impact on the Tanganyikan mutineers. We are unable to estimate at this time, however, whether the swift British response to Obote's appeal will cow the Tanganyikan army or provoke it to further disorders leading to a possible coup d'etat.

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Situation Report - January 23, 1964 - 1300 -

- 1350 In response to request from CINCSTRIKE, regarding disposition of the USS MANLEY, State felt that the ship should remain off Dar for a period of from two days to a week in view of situation which is still troubled.
- 1417 London Reuters item repeated over FBIS #75) reported that mutinous Uganda soldiers kidnapped Interior Minister Onama when he went to talk with them about their demands for ouster of British officers and higher pay.
- 1421 FBIS 79 reported British troops are being flown from Kenya to Uganda at request of Uganda premier. The Commonwealth Relations office reported that seven planes carrying troops are on the way to "help the maintenance of law and order."
- 1420 FBIS 78 reported that Lima AFP reported that according to unconfirmed rumors Field Marshall Okello was shot to death in Zanzibar.
- London's 3464 reported that Commonwealth Relations office had received request from Obote today to send UK troops to Uganda as a precautionary measure in view of disturbance at Jinja. UK Ministers have agreed and small body of UK troops are now enroute from Kenya. Troops will also secure Entebbe Airfield should further UK force be required. Obote has confirmed request for troops in writing and he will inform his nation by broadcast tonight. Kampala is reported to be quiet.
- 1620 FBIS item #93 reported from Uganda Domestic Service that the Prime Minister issued a statement saying that the situation at the Army Barracks at Jinja is completely normal. The statements said that the Minister of Internal Affairs was on his way from Entebbe to report to the PM. The main point made by the troops was pay increases but they are all loyal to the government. Because of the confused situation at Jinja during the afternoon the cabinet had requested British Government to send troops to help insure maintneance of law. In view of normal situation it will not be necessary to stay long. All business and government offices should open tomorrow.
