THE BOMB IN SPAIN

(1) QUESTION: Have you lost a nuclear bomb?

ANSWER: There were several unarmed nuclear weapons aboard the U. S. B-52 bomber which crashed January 17, 1966, at Palomares in Spain. One of those weapons has not yet been located.

- (2) QUESTION: How many bombs were involved in all? ANSWER: Four.
- (3) QUESTION: Were they nuclear or thermonuclear weapons? ANSWER: Thermonuclear.

(4) QUESTION: Did any of them explode?

ANSWER: If you mean whether there was a nuclear explosion, the answer is emphatically no. Two of the weapons experienced nonnuclear, TNT-type explosions on impact with the ground. This resulted in the scattering of plutonium (PU-239) and uranium (U-235) in a small area in the immediate vicinity of impact -at most, 100 or 150 feet around the impact point.

(5) QUESTION: Will the missing bomb go off? Will it cause radioactive contamination?

ANSWER: Again, the answer to both questions, emphatically, is -- no.

There is no reason for concern, either about a nuclear explosion or radioactivity. U. S. nuclear weapons contain safeguards designed expressly to prevent an accidental nuclear explosion. We have had no such explosion during our 20 years of handling nuclear weapons. Radioactivity from the missing weapon would pose no threat, even if the weapon broke up and some of the nuclear material were scattered. U. S. and Spanish scientists have determined that no health hazard exists as a result of the January 1966 accident.

(6) QUESTION: If it is so safe, why are you hunting for the lost bomb?

ANSWER: To recover the bomb, the design of which is highly classified; to recover other classified material, and also debris from the wreckage which may help analyze causes of the crash.

(7) QUESTION: Is this the first crash of an aircraft with nuclear weapons aboard?

ANSWER: No, there have been others -- and none has resulted in a nuclear explosion.

The safety record of the U. S. nuclear weapons program has been exceptional in two ways: (a) accidents have been very few; (b) accidents with nuclear explosions have never happened, because highly reliable safety features have been designed into every weapon. The result has been a weapon so safe that accidental nuclear explosion is precluded even when the weapon is struck, dropped from great heights, or subjected to fire. The most that has ever happened -- and it happened in the crash in Spain -- is that a small part of the nuclear material in a bomb has been scattered over a small area. This material produces alpha radiation -- rays of very short range which cannot pierce skin, hence pose no threat of "external radiation" (from outside the body) as do rays from a nuclear explosion.

(8) QUESTION: When and where were the previous crashes with nuclear weapons aboard?

ANSWER: There

ANSWER: There have been several such accidents since 1958, all publicly announced by the U. S.

(9) QUESTION: What about the plutonium which was scattered when the bomb broke up in Spain? Isn't that terribly radioactive?

ANSWER: Contrary to popular impression, alpha rays from plutonium cannot even penetrate the skin. Plutonium is a man-made element and its properties are very well known. In the form used in weapons it is a heavy, dark brown or black metal similar to lead. Alpha rays extend only a few centimeters in air and are stopped by any solid, such as tissue paper or skin, and plutonium can be safely held in the hand. There is thus no hazard from plutonium outside the body.

It can be swallowed in small quantities with negligible hazard, since in weapons grade it is virtually insoluable and almost all of it quickly passes on out of the body.

Taken into the lungs in large quantities, it can cause a hazard. However, plutonium scattering experiments in Nevada since 1957 showed that even if a person standing in a cloud of plutonium dust inhaled the material, it would result in a radiation dose to the lungs that is only about half the yearly amount permitted for all organs in the body of a U. S. atomic industry worker. This permissible dose level is prescribed in standards issued by the International Commission on Radiation Protection, a group of scientists from a number of countries.

The Nevada experiments tell us that hazardous levels of inhalation did not exist in Spain and are unlikely to exist in similar accidents. Spanish and U. S. scientists have explored all possibilities of risk to health and they are convinced no health hazard occurred in this case.

The properties of uranium, which was also present in the accident in Spain, are similar but even less potent. Metallic plutonium and uranium of the types used in weapons are completely different from "fission products" — the products of a nuclear explosion or reaction — which pose an external health hazard (from outside the body). The weapons materials are very heavy. Fragments settle to earth or sink in water rapidly, within a very limited area. If there were particles small enough to be suspended in water, they would soon be dispersed.

(10) QUESTION:

(10) QUESTION: If plutonium and uranium are so safe, why did you make radiological surveys and buy up crops and farm animals in Spain, and why are you removing soil?

ANSWER: Such measures are part of the standard, planned-in-advance emergency procedures in any accident involving nuclear armament. They are intended to go to the point of absolute assurance — to take extra precautions on the safe side. U. S. standards are based on "lifetime" exposures. This means that if a certain amount of radioactive material might be dangerous to a man living in it or working with it for a lifetime, we clean up and correct those conditions with a very large margin of safety in every case.

(11) QUESTION: How do you know that the tomatoes, meat, and milk from the farms in the area of impact in Spain are not contaminated?

ANSWER: We know this definitely, from repeated surveys made by leading Spanish and American scientists at the site. All produce which could conceivably have been affected has been disposed of. The remainder shows no trace of radioactive material. There is no hazard whatever from consuming those farm products. In fact, Spaniards and Americans at the site have been eating them regularly, and the farmers have been moving their products to market again for some time.

(12) QUESTION: What about the ocean water -- and the fish?

ANSWER: Tests conducted on the sea water by U. S. scientists have failed to detect the slightest sign of radioactivity from this accident. Even if some small amount of the nuclear material were released into the water, it would form an insoluble compound that is heavy, and thus would sink to the bottom. Any particles small enough to be suspended in the water would be greatly dispersed and diluted amid masses of sea water, and hence would represent no health hazard.

Tests on fish in the area have also been entirely negative -- no radioactivity. This too is natural, since fish would not be likely to ingest the particles as food any more than they would pieces of iron. If a fish should accidentally swallow a particle, it would leave the body of the fish by natural elimination. Any material passing into its system through the gills would not affect the flesh of a fish, and scientists agree that no harmful amount would remain. Thus eating fish caught in the area would not be a health hazard.

(13) QUESTION: Was the accident in Spain a violation of the test ban treaty, as the Soviet Union has charged?

ANSWER: Of course not. This is far-fetched, even for a Soviet propagandist. The test ban treaty prohibits "any nuclear weapon test explosion, or any other nuclear explosion..." Since no nuclear explosion occurred in the Palomares incident, there was no treaty violation.

(14) QUESTION: What about Soviet charges that the accident in Spain violated the 1958 "open sea convention," prohibiting contamination of the oceans with radioactive materials?

ANSWER: Again, propaganda without foundation. Not only was there no contamination of the ocean, as I have already pointed out (Question No. 9), but that treaty bears no relation at all to the crash. The article of the treaty from which the Soviets quoted out of context deals with (a) "the dumping of radioactive waste" and (b) cooperation with international organizations to prevent pollution.

(15) QUESTION: Why do you endanger people by carrying nuclear weapons around in aircraft?

ANSWER: No one has been endangered, and the U. S. precautions and safeguards against an accidental explosion have proven completely effective. Our flights are a function of the United States nuclear deterrent force, strongest in the world, which has helped prevent nuclear war or world war for the past 20 years.

The U. S. force is constantly in readiness to protect our own people and all the people in countries allied with us. The main essential in preventing war is to be prepared, so U. S. missiles, planes, submarines, guns and men are ever ready. The result is that aggression can be deterred and war prevented in cases such as the Cuban missile crisis in 1962, when the Soviet Union tried to sneak nuclear missiles into Cuba as an aggressive threat to the U. S. American superior strength, preparedness, resolve and restraint forced the Soviets to withdraw their missiles.

ANSWER: For reasons of military security I cannot comment on this question. However, the people of all countries can be assured that the U.S. will never relax its concern with nuclear safety.

(17) QUESTION: Doesn't flying around with nuclear weapons increase the chance of war by accident or misunderstanding?

ANSWER: Quite the contrary. As I have explained (Question No. 15), airborne nuclear weapons are an important part of the U. S. nuclear war-preventive deterrent. In addition to its successful program to avoid accidental nuclear explosions, the U. S. is the pioneer and foremost practitioner of devices and procedures to prevent outbreak of war by misunderstanding.

President Johnson disclosed some specifics in September 1964:

"We have worked consistently to bring nuclear weapons under careful control and to lessen the danger of nuclear conflicts, and this policy has been the policy of the United States of America for 19 years now, under both Democratic and Republican administrations...The release of nuclear weapons would come by Presidential decision alone. Complex codes and electronic devices prevent any unauthorized action. Every further step along the way from decision to destruction is governed by the two-man rule. Two or more men must act independently and must decide the order has been given. An elaborate system of checks and counterchecks, procedural and mechanical, guard against any unauthorized nuclear bursts. In addition, since 1961 we have placed permissive-action links on several of our weapons. These are electromechanical locks which must be opened by secret combination before action at all is possible, and we are extending this system."

One of the checks to which the President referred is the well-known command control system, through which U. S. aircraft cannot proceed beyond a certain point without a positive, unmistakable command originating at the highest level of government. This "fail-safe" system has worked without flaw since its inception over a decade ago. Similar systems keep all U. S. nuclear deterrent systems under constant control -- including land-based and submarine-based long-range missiles. In addition to its own independent measures, the U. S. suggested and urged adoption of one quick method to reduce the risk of international misunderstandings in crises -- the "hot line" -- a constantly manned direct teletype link which was installed between Washington and Moscow in 1963.

Question 1: The President was first notified that an accident involving nuclear weapons had taken place over Spain at 7:05 AM, Monday, January 17, 1966. He was informed by means of a regular report which he received every day at this hour. We do not know where he was at the time he read the report, but most likely, he was in the Mansion.

Question 2: The text of the message first conveyed to him was as follows:

"A B-52 and a KC-135 Tanker collided while conducting a refueling operation 180 miles from Gibraltar. The B-52 crashed on the shore in Spain and the Tanker went down in the sea. Four survivors have been picked up and three additional life rafts have been sighted. The B-52 was carrying four Mark 28 thermonuclear weapons. The 16th Nuclear Disaster team has been dispatched to the area."

We do not know what his immediate response was.

The President was personally informed of subsequent developments several times during Monday, and received a special report on the incident at 9 PM that night. He was kept

CONFIDENTIAL

informed in writing every morning at 7 AM and, for the first few days, each evening at 9 PM. One of the reports included a map of the area and current information of the location of the accident, the remains of the planes, and the location of the weapons.

Question 3: We do not know whether the President issued any personal orders or directives relating to the incident. It is most likely that he talked to both Secretary Rusk and Secretary McNamara by telephone and in person, but our records do not indicate when he did so.

Our records do not reflect the President's order covering the information policy in effect during the first weeks of the incident. One of the factors in deciding on what information should be made public was the attitude of the Spanish Government, and two was accutely sensitive to any public statemade ments/about the accident and the presence of nuclear weapons.

The Department of Defense Public Information Office would have more details about the press handling of the accident.

Question 5: Our records do not contain any information as to the President's reaction when he was informed that the bomb had been located, or when it was recovered.

I have been trying to reach you for some time to ask for a little information I need in connection with a book I am doing about the incident involving an Air Force crash and successful hunt for a missing H bomb off Spain.

I am trying to reconstruct the story as far as possible. I understand that the President did give the incident some personal attention and I would not like to leave him out of the story.

The following questions are the ones I would like to ask the White House. I do not expect to be able to get to Washington again in the near future and would therefore be very grateful if you could either send the answers or call me at your convenience, because I doubt that the whole thing would take more than a few minutes on the phone.

- Questions: 1. At what time was the President first notified that an accident involving nuclear weapons had taken place over Spain? Who informed him? Where was he at the time?
- 2. Is the text of the first message available? Is his response available? To what extent was the President personally informed of subsequent developments relating to the incident? Any descriptive or special details available?
- 3. Did the President issue any personal orders or directives relating to the incident? If so, any details available?
- 4. I have heard a report that the President was the person who ordered a relaxation of the very restrictive information policy in effect during the first six weeks of the incident after he had seen a factual series of articles about it in the Washington Port making clear that a good many false rumors had achieved wide currency

Because of inaccurate press reports, our Embassy in Madrid will release tonight the following statement:

"The undersea vessel, Alvin, made contact on March 16th with an object lying in 2,500 feet of water approximately five miles off shore near Palomares.

"Military experts have evaluated underwater photographs taken of the object and believe it to be the missing nuclear weapon. Actions are being taken to recover the device.

"The photographs show a parachute attached to an object which is similar in size and shape to the missing nuclear weapon. The parachute, however, is covering part of the object preventing positive identification. Experts who have examined the photographs indicate that the casing appears to be intact, thereby precluding any radioactive contamination in the water."

B-52/KC-135 ACCIDENT IN SOUTHEASTERN SPAIN

The following information is furnished on the recovery and search operations for the weapons from the B-52/KC-135 crash in southeastern Spain.

One weapon was located 200 yards from the shoreline and recovered intact. The weapon did not break up, and there are no radiation effects in the area.

A second weapon was located in a vegetable garden in Pueblo Palamares approximately two miles northwest of the first. The weapon was broken up to the extent that radiation from fragments of plutonium in the weapon has been monitored in the immediate area. Fragments are being removed and standard decontamination practices are underway. The vegetables in the garden are being bought and destroyed.

The third weapon was located in a rocky uninhabited area about one mile west of Pueblo Palamares. The weapon is in a similar condition to the second weapon.

All areas where weapons or components are located are under guard.

The remaining weapon (fourth) is still unaccounted for and the search for it is continuing.

The crash site area is located in a very sparsely populated, remote area of Spain.



South Vietnam

The stand-down of offensive military operations by Vietnamese and Free World forces in observance of TET came to an end at 5:00 A.M. EST this morning. The cease fire period announced by the Viet Cong is scheduled to continue until noon EST today.

There were 88 cease fire violations by the Viet Cong reported up to the time the holiday period ended. Fifty-six of these were against U.S. forces, 23 against the South Vietnamese and 9 against the Koreans. Total casualties were: 6 US, 4 South Vietnamese and 7 Koreans killed; 17 US, 23 South Vietnamese and 26 Koreans wounded, and 8 Koreans missing. Fifty-nine Viet Cong were killed and two captured.

As offensive ground and air operations are resumed, U.S. forces are participating in four operations of battalion-size or larger. The mission of the largest of these (Operation VAN BUREN), with five U.S., two Korean and two South Vietnamese battalions, is to secure the rice harvest in the valley southwest of Tuy Hoa, approximately 40 miles south of Qui Nhon.

Two other operations, BUCKSKIN and SHORT FUSE, are search and destroy operations 25 and 40 miles north of Saigon respectively. Operation KAMEHAHA is providing road security in Pleiku Province.

At 11:05 A.M. EST today, 15 B-52's will attack a target area 40 miles east-southeast of Saigon reported to contain 3 Viet Cong base camps, a Viet Cong battalion and a regimental command headquarters. An hour and twenty minutes later, 12 more B-52's will attack another Viet Cong troop concentration 45 miles north-northwest of Saigon.

Yesterday, 233 U.S. aircraft attacked military targets in Laos.

South Vietnam

Communist guerrilla activity has intensified over wide areas of the country on the eve of the Tet cease-fire. A series of incidents near Saigon during the past two days has resulted in heavy civilian casualties.

The South Vietnamese Army Special Forces camp at Minh Thanh received mortar and small arms fire early yesterday, and an outpost north of the camp was probed. Elements of the Viet Cong attacking units, estimated to be five companies, were also reported on the nearby airstrip. Air strikes were called for, and a reaction force was dispatched to the area. So far, 14 defenders have been killed and 27 wounded.

Two South Vietnamese were killed and 21 wounded when a command post in Quang Ngai city received 20 to 25 rounds of mortar fire and light ground probing attack last night. Nine rounds of the mortar fire landed in an orphanage compound during the attack killing 3 adult civilians and wounding 5 children. A nearby observation post manned by a Regional Force company of about 100 personnel was overrun. Casualties for this action have not yet been determined.

In Thua Thien Province, northern South Vietnam, a special forces patrol base manned by 53 South Vietnamese and 2 US Special Forces, was attacked for ten hours yesterday. Thirty air sorties were flown in support of the camp. Four South Vietnamese were killed and 6 wounded. Viet Cong casualties are not known. In the same province Il Viet Cong were killed in a one-day combined US/South Vietnamese search and destroy operation.

An outpost 50 miles west of Saigon was overrun early yesterday. Seven hours later a South Vietnamese reaction force had reached the camp and reported 13 Vietnamese killed, 8 wounded and 7 missing. They also reported that 9 civilians had been killed and 5 wounded. A large number of South Vietnamese youths were captured by the Viet Cong.

Twenty one operations of battalion size or larger are in progress at the present time. US forces are participating in seven of these operations.

A combined operation involving 2 US Marine and 4 South Vietnamese battlions, which began on January 9 south of Danang, was terminated yesterday. Viet Cong casualties were 34 killed, 29 captured and 221 suspects detained. US casualties were 4 killed and 51 wounded.

Three battalions of the US 1st Infantry Division continue Operation Buckskin 20 miles northwest of Saigon. Casualties to date are 13 US killed and 95 wounded, 2 South Vietnamese killed, 11 wounded and 1 missing, and 48

Four survivors of the B-52/KC-135 collision over Spain yesterday have been recovered and are reported to be in good condition. The bodies of the remaining 7 crew members of the 2 planes have been reported recovered. The nose and tail section of the B-52 have been identified as part of the wreckage on land. The fuselage section has not been located. One of the 4 thermonuclear weapons has been found intact near the crash scene and is under guard. The remaining 3 are still missing. A disaster control team is on the site. Three Hundred Air Force personnel are proceeding to the scene to assist in search operations.

South Vietnam

During the past 24 hours the Viet Cong have launched a series of sharp attacks against government installations. A special forces camp in Binh Long Province was mortared and overrun and a nearby village was occupied. Vietnamese casualties were 34 killed, 60 wounded, and a village chief and Vietnamese special forces soldier captured.

The Thu Duc Infantry School, northeast of Saigon, was attacked by an estimated Viet Cong company resulting in one soldier killed and 26 wounded. Thirty Viet Cong were killed.

The Viet Cong attacked a Regional Force outpost approximately 5 miles Southwest of Queng Ngai. Friendly losses were 8 killed and 12 wounded. Four Viet Cong were reported killed.

Another Viet Cong force attacked two Regional Force Companies approximately six miles south of Danang, resulting in friendly losses of 9 killed and 12 wounded. Viet Cong losses are not known.

A mine exploded today under a bus about 40 miles west of Saigon, killing 26 Vietnamese civilians and wounding 4.

A US pilot spotted an estimated Viet Cong battalion crossing a river approximately 20 miles west of Saigon. Nineteen aircraft were diverted to strike one force resulting in a reported 7 Viet Cong known killed and an additional 35-45 estimated killed.

Operation Jefferson, a Korean/US/Vietnamese operation 60 miles south of Qui Nhon, has been terminated. Final casualties are 3 US killed and 8 wounded, 29 Koreans killed and 66 wounded, 13 South Vietnamese killed and 18 wounded. Viet Cong casualties were 391 killed and 14 captured.

Dominican Republic

General Palmer is scheduled to depart the Dominican Republic today. He will be relieved as US Commander Dominican Republic by General Robert Linvill.

Chuck Johnson has phoned over the following information regarding the B-52 crash:

- 1. Under procedural agreement #14, we have the right in the case of any accident involving aircraft from within Spain or over-flying Spain, to go to the site and conduct rescue, salvage, and decontamination operations within a ring cordoned off by our own forces. Under the agreement, the Spanish will also set up an external ring to keep out unauthorized persons.
- 2. A General is being flown out from SAC in Omaha to take charge of the operations.
- 3. A decontamination team is at this moment on its way to the area from Germany.
- 4. At this moment, it is not quite clear as to the precise location of either aircraft. The area is very remote and uninhabited. Our only information comes from a civil policeman who has telephoned the information that he has found a couple portions of an aircraft -- one section containing two bodies.

"The impact of the weapons on land caused rupture of weapons cases, which resulted in scattering of a small amount of plutonium (PU 239) and uranium (U 235) in the immediate vicinity of the points of impact. There was no nuclear explosion.

"Built-in safeguards perfected through years of extensive safety testing, have allowed the U.S. to handle, store and transport nuclear weapons for more than two decades without a nuclear detonation. Thorough safety rules and practices also have been developed for dealing with any weapon accident which might result in the spilling of nuclear materials.

"Radiological surveys of the Palomares area and its human and animal populations have included detailed laboratory studies by leading Spanish and U.S. scientists. They have obtained no evidence of a health hazard. These experts say there is no hazard from eating vegetables marketed from this area, from eating the meat or fish or drinking the milk of animals.

"Steps have been taken to insure that the affected areas are thoroughly cleaned up, and some soil and vegetation are being removed.

do not carry critical comment and are being treated simply as an unusual news event. American Embassy officials report Spanish foreign office is of the opinion that coverage has reached its peak and will now decline. Straight accounts appeared on the inside pages of the 18 Jan issues of the Paris edition of NY times and tribune. Issues of 19 Jan did not carry any reference to the accident. Film from accident scene has appeared on Spanish national TV and accounts have been reported over Spanish radio, again with no critical comment. Queries from American News bureaus in Madrid have diminished appreciably. Representatives of UPI and the London Daily Mirror have been reported on the scene this date.

NOFORN Overflights Spanish territory carrying nuclear weapons were suspended by confidential Wheeler to Munoz Grandes letter of January 22. Because arrangements for overflights of Austria, Switzerland, Frame or Morocco with nuclear weapons for various reasons not feasible. resumption such overflights of Spain extremely important not only in maintaining our tactical alert and dispersal plans but also in providing nuclear logistics support to forces in Mediterranean area. Restoration US overflights could have favorable influence elsewhere in world where such flights involved. Early approach Spanish authorities is desirable to seek resumption such flights through Spain.

Since suspension was instituted on basis oral request from Munoz Grandes, may be possible resumption flights with certain adjustments could be arranged through same channel. Would appreciate your comments on timing such approach and on following suggestions

We of course wish maintain greatest possible flexibility but following adjustments in flights with nuclear weapons, although undesirable, could be suggested progressively as basis obtaining relaxation of present overflight restrictions:

- 1. Keep to minimum overflights of Spain and landings at joint air and naval facilities with nuclear weapons.
- 2. Modify or specify flight routes for which tactical and logistic flights would be permitted.
- 3. Limit overflights to logistic air transport of nuclear weapons and emergency dispersals in periods of tension.
- 4. In event foregoing not acceptable as basis for resumption of overflights, hold options open and advise. We would not wish to limit resumption to logistic overflights only.

We would assure Spanish authorities that in-flight refueling operations involving aircraft carrying nuclear weapons would not be conducted over Spanish territory except in event of extreme in-flight emergency.

Overflight Straits of Gimbraltar separate subject not to be discussed question of in connection mainland flights. We would consider flying Straits only if above approach would be unsuccessful. END.

- 1. FOLLOWING RESUME CONFIDENTIAL REPORT TO AMBASSADOR FROM EMBOFFS RE SITUATION CRASH AREA.
- 2. LOCAL POPULATION SOMEWHAT APPREHENSIVE RE HEALTH HAZARDS AND COMPENSATION FOR DAMAGES. NO PANIC NOR OPEN RESENTMENT NOTED. US MILITARY, NATURALLY PREOCCUPIED WITH SEARCH AND RECOVERY OPERATION MAY NOT APPRECIATE FULLY LOCAL SENSITIVITY CLAIMS QUESTIONS.
- 3. CLAIMS PROCEDURES IN PROCESS FORMULATION BUT MOVING SLOWLY. FARMERS WHO UNABLE TO WORK FIELDS OR TO MARKET CROPS RUMORED BE "RADIOACTIVE" ARE ENCOUNTERING ECONOMIC STRAIN. USAF CLAIMS SHOULD BE PROCESSED EXPEDITIOUSLY AND GENEROUSLY.
- 4. SPANISH AIR FORCE GENERAL RAMIRO PASCUAL RECENTLY APPOINTED SPANISH AUTHORITY ON SCENE MIGHT PROVIDE KEY TO NECESSARY SPANISH-AMERICAN COORDINATION ON CRUCIAL LOCAL PROBLEMS ESPECIALLY CLAIMS. WOULD BE MOST USEFUL IF COMMANDER 16TH AIR FORCE BE GIVEN AUTHORITY AND RESOURCES TO EXPEDITE CLAIMS, AND COOPERATE FULLY GENERAL RAMIRO PASCUAL RE COMMUNITY RELATIONS. SUBSTANCE THIS REPORT BEING DISCUSSED WITH JS JUSMG.

1. FOLLOWING IS ROUNDUP DEVELOPMENTS RELATED 8-52/KC-135 ACCIDENT SINCE LAST REPORTS (EMBTELS 867 AND 869):

A. SHORTLY AFTER NOON JANUARY 21 FORMIN TELEPHONED AMBASSADOR TO CONVEY "EXTREME CONCERN" OF CHIEF STATE UPON READING UPI STORY CABLED BY SPANISH EMBASSY WASHINGTON (TEXT ABOUT SAME AS THAT QUOTED DEPTEL 834). FORMIN SAID HE SENDING SAGAZ TO DISCUSS QUESTION.

B. SAGAZ ARRIVED DISPLAYING CONSIDERABLE AGITATION. USING SUCH TERMS AS "DEEP CONCERN", "EMERGENCY" AND "CRISIS", HE COMPLAINED PARTICULARLY ABOUT PASSAGES IN UPI STORY CONCERNING ALLEGED ATTITUDE OF "US DIPLOMATS" AND THAT PURPORTING DESCRIBE COMPLAINTS OF SPANISH INHABITANTS OF ACCIDENT AREA AGAINST GOS FOR PERMITTING OVERFLIGHT NUCLEAR-ARMED USAF AIRCRAFT. SAGAZ DID NOT FAIL RING IN POTENTIAL BLOW TO TOURISM OF RADIATION SCARE. HE ENDED PRESENTATION SAYING THESE REVELATIONS HAD EFFECT LIBERATING GOS TO TAKE INDEPENDENT ACTION ON ITS OWN AND MENTIONED POSSIBILITY CONVENING PRESS CONFERENCE FOR FULL DISCLOSURE ALL FACTS AND GOS POSITION. AMBASSADOR REFUTED UPI ATTRIBUTION TO US DIPLOMATS, MENTIONED IMMINENT RETURN CHIEF JUSMG FROM SCENE ACCIDENT WITH UP-TO-DATE ACCOUNT OF CIRCUMSTANCES THERE FOR OUR INFORMATION AND THAT OF GOS, AND REFERRED TO DESIRABILITY REMAINING CALM AND CONTINUING MUTUALLY ADVANTAGEOUS US-SPANISH COLLABORATION IN DEALING WITH DELICATE SITUATION OF

EQUAL AND COMMON CONCERN TO BOTH GOVTS. IN THIS MANNER, AMBASSADOR SUCCEEDED IN QUIETING SAGAZ, WHO AT END OF CONVERSATION AGREED AWAIT FURTHER REPORTS FROM SCENE.

C. UPON RETURN FROM ALMERIA, CHIEF JUSMG REPORTED TO AMBASSADOR: FOURTH BOMB STILL MISSING AND PROBABILITY WAS IT DROPPED INTO SEA; USN MINE SWEEPERS ABOUT TO BEGIN SEA SEARCH OPERATIONS WITH HELP TWO LOCAL FISHERMEN WHO REPORTED HAVING SEEN OBJECT WITH PARACHUTE DROP INTO WATER; RECOVERY OF FRAGMENTS WRECKAGE ON LAND CONTINUING AND ALL LEADS AS TO POSSIBLE LOCATION FOURTH BOMB BEING FOLLOWED UP; AREAS OF RADIATION ON LAND HAVE BEEN IDENTIFIED, ARE SMALL AND NOW CLOSED OFF; WATER TRUCKS BEING BROUGHT UP TO LEACH THESE SPOTS; CROPS AND LIEVESTOCK POSSIBLY AFFECTED BEING BOUGHT UP; MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS BEING MADE OF PERSONS IN AREA WHO COULD HAVE BEEN EXPOSED; COMMUNITY LEADERS AND GENERAL PUBLIC BEING ASSURED WITH EFFECT THAT WHILE THEME SOME NATURAL FEAR AND UNCERTAINTY AMONG PEOPLE THERE NO EVIDENCE OF MASS FRIGHT OR PANIC; SPANISH IN AREA, INCLUDING CIVIL AUTHORITIES, GUARDIA CIVIL AND SPANISH NUCLEAR SCIENTIFIC AND MEDICAL TEAMS, COOPERATING TO FULL IN THESEFFORTS. GENERAL DONOVAN ALSO MENTIONED THAT NUMEROUS INTERNATIONAL PRESS PREPRESENTATIVES ARE IN AREA, INCLUDING UPI, PARIS MATCH, BRITISH PRESS, CBS-TV AND POSSIBLY FRENCH IV CREWS.

D. AMBASSADOR CALLED IN LOCAL UPI BUREAU CHIEF STATHOS, FIRMLY REFUTED ATTITUDE "US DIPLOMATS"AS ATTRIBUTED BY UPI FILE AND CHALLENGED HIM ON SOURCE HIS INFORMATION THIS POINT. STATHOS APPEARED SHAKEN, STATED HE HAD OBTAINED INFORMATION ON THIS POINT "AT THIRD HAND" AND REPEATEDLY APOLOGIZED FOR FILING STORY WITHOUT CHECKING WITH EMBASSY (SEE F BELOW).

E. FOLLOWING DISCUSSIONS SUBPARAGRAPHS C AND D ABOVE, AMBASSADOR TELEPHONED FONOFF (ABOUT 1930). GAVE SAGAZ SUMMARY AND OFFERED SEND EMBOFF TO GIVE FULL REPORT, WHICH SAGAZ QUICKLY ACCEPTED. SAGAZ LISTENED INTENTLY AND SHOWED KEENEST INTEREST IN ACCOUNT STATHOS ADMISSION HE HAD NOT RECEIVED INFORMATION RE "US DIPLOMATS" ATTITUDE FROM EMBASSY, BUT FROM OTHER SOURCE. WE ASSURED SAGAZ WE OPEN TO ANY SPANISH SUGGESTIONS ON HOW BEST HANDLE SITUATION BUT REITERATED BELIEF WE SHOULD CONTINUE WORK IN CLOSE CONCERT. SAGAZ INDICATED CONCURRENCE, SAID HE HAD NO SUGGESTIONS TO MAKE FOR TIME BEING AND APPEARED CALM, ALBEIT OBVIOUSLY CONCERNED. EMBOFF HAD IMPRESSION SAGAZ WANTED GET STATHOS INCIDENT PARTICULARLY CLEAR TO REPORT TO SUPERIORS.

F. MORNING JANUARY 22, STATHOS UPI TELEPHONED MABASSADOR TO REITERATE APOLOGIES, OFFER MAKE RETRIBUTION AND DISCLAIM ANY ATTEMPT "MAKE TROUBLE". HE ADDED THAT HE NOW BELIEVED HE "HAD BEEN HAD" BY HIS SPANISH INFORMATION SOURCES (OTHERWISE UNIDENTIFIED) FOR POLITICAL REASONS AND EXPRESSED APPREHENSION ABOUT HIS POSITION IN SPAIN.

G. CHIEF JUSMG GAVE REPORT OF DEVELOPMENTS AT ACCIDENT SITE TO VP MUNOZ-GRANDES ALSO MORNING JANUARY 22. MUNOZ-GRANDES DID NOT APPEAR DEEPLY PERTURBED BUT HE DID REQUEST THAT FLIGHTS OF NUCLEAR-ARMED USAF BOMBERS OVER SPAIN BE STOPPED. (CHIEF JUSMG REPORTING THIS REQUEST THROUGH MILITARY CHANNELS.)

 ACTIVE AND "ONLY NORMAL THAT PEOPLE WORKING OVER THAT SPOT
 HAVE BEEN CONTAMINATED". OFFICIAL ADDED: "BUT IF SO, THIS
 IS VERY, VERY SLIGHT AND OFFERS NO DANAGER TO ANYBODY. ALL
 TRACES SHOULD HAVE DISAPPEARED COMPLETELY IN TWO OR THREE
 DAYS".
- C. OF THREE MADRID MORNING DAILIES, ONLY YA CARRIED FOLLOW-UP STORY TODAY: BRIEF BUT REASSURING FRONT PAGE STORY MEADED: "SEARCH AND SECURITY MEASURES PROCEEDING IN ALMERIA. NO DANGER FROM AIR ACCIDENT EXISTS. INHABITANTS OF INVOLVED ZONES" HAVE NOT BEEN EVACUATED". STORY IN SAME TONE SAYS: "LIVE GOES ON NORMALLY IN AFFECTED ZONE SINCE LOCAL MEASURES WHICH ADOPTED IN SMALL DEGREE REPRESENT ONLY EXCESS CAUTION. PROOF OF THIS IS THAT INHAITANTS OF LITTLE RURAL SETTLEMENTS IN ZONE HAVE NOT BEEN EVACUATED".

- 3. UNDERSTAND ONE AEC REPRESENTATIVE FROM ALBUQUERQUE ALREADY IN SPAIN AND THREE MORE DUE ARRIVE JANUARY 23.
- 4. BELIEVE WE MUST BE PREPARED FOR CONTINUED AND POSSIBLY INCREASED MEDIA TREATMENT OF ACCIDENT UNTIL FOURTH BOMB LOCATED AND REMOVED. IF MUCH MORE TIME ELAPSES WITHOUT SUCCESS IN SEARCH, WE MAY BE FACED WITH PRACTICAL NECESSITY ADMITTING OFFICIALLY ONE BOMB STILL MISSING. THIS IN TURN CARRIES OBVIOUS DANGERS INCLUDING POTENTIALLY TRIGGERING OFF FURTHER GOS OFFICIAL STATEMENTS POSSIBLY INCLUDING PUBLIC REFERENCE TO SPANISH DEMAND THAT REFUELING AND/OR OVERFLIGHTS NUCLEAR-ARMED AIRCRAFT BE STOPPED. IT THEREFORE CLEARLY OF UTMOST URGENCY THAT NO EFFORT BE SPARED LOCATE FOURTH BOMB WITH MINIMUM DELAY. URGE ALL NECESSARY US RESOURCES BE PROVDED FOR SEARCH.

1. WITH REFERENCE EFFECT OF B-52/KC-135 ACCIDENT ON US-SPANISH RELATIONS, WE HAVE BEEN IN CLOSE AND CONTINUOUS CONTACT WITH FONOFF SINCE MONDAY AND HAVE DETECTED NO APPRECIABLE TENSION SO FAR. ITEMS:

A. IN LONG DISCUSSIONS AT SAGAZ LEVEL JANUARY 19 AND 20 ON PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENTS ATMOSPHERE PRIMARILY ONE OF COMMON CONCERN OVER PROBLEM CONFRONTING BOTH COUNTRIES; NO EXPLICIT OR IMPLIED RESENTMENT DIRECTED AT US. FOCUS OF FONOFF INTEREST APPEARED BE EFFECT ON SPANISH OPINION OF PUBLIC REVELATION NUCLEAR-ARMED US BOMBERS OPERATING IN SPANISH AIR SPAACE. SAGAZ ALSO MENTIONED, WITHOUT GREAT STRESS, THAT SENSATIONAL STORIES ABOUT MISSING BOMBS AND RADIATION COULD EXCITE SPANISH PUBLIC, WHICH UNSOPHISTICATED IN SUCH MATTERS, TO EXAGGERATED REACTION. SOME FONOFF OFFICIALS AT LOWER LEVEL DID EXPRESS SURPRISE THAT "RISKY" REFUELING OPERATION SHOULD BE CARRIED OUT OVER LAND RATHER THAN SEA.

B. AMBASSADOR WAS REQUESTED TO CALL ON FONMIN JANUARY 20 (EMBTEL 865) AND HAD LENGTHY, UNHURRIED DISCUSSION. QUESTION OF NATO USE JOINT BASES HERE AND GIBRALTAR DEFINITELY DOMINATED CONVERSATION AND TOOK MARKED PRECEDENCE OVER REMARKS EXCHANGED ON BOMBER ACCIDENT. THRUST OF FONMIN'S COMMENST LATTER SUBJECT WAS CONCERN OVER EFFECT ON SPANISH PUBLIC OPINION OF NEWSPAPER STORIES AND HE SPOKE IN TERMS OF US-SPANISH COLLABORATION TO CONTAIN REPERCUSSIONS.

C. THERE HAVE BEEN NO OTHER APPROACHES ON PART SPANISH CIVILIAN AUTHORITIES (SUCH AS MININFO) TO EMBASSY ON THIS SUBJECT.

 - 4. GOS, SPECIFICALY FONOFF, EVIDENTLY IS BEING KEPT CURRENTLY INFORMED OF DEVELOPMENTS AT SITE AND IN INTERNATIONAL PRESS; IT THUS APPEARS BE OPERATING IN AWARENESS ALL ESSENTIAL FACTS, WHICH COMING FROM OWN SOURCES AS WELL AS FROM EFFORTS JUSMG AND EMBASSY.
 - 5. OF RELATED INTEREST IS INQUIRY TO EMBASSY FROM LOCAL AP CORRESPONDENT AS TO WHETHER SOVIET TRAWLER, REPUTED TO BE IN ROTA AREA, HAD APPEARED ON SCENE. NO MENTION TO US SO FAR BY GOS OF THIS SUBJECT.
 - G. AGREE WE SHOULD KEEP DEVELOPMENTS UNDER CONSTANT AND CAREFUL REVIEW AND EMBOFF BEING SENT TO AREA. - (1) WITH REFERENCE B52-KC-135 ACCIDENT, ALL THREE MADRID MORNING DAILIES CARRIED FULL TEXT STATEMENT ISSUED BY AIR MINISTRY AFTER FOREIGN PRESS PLAY AND OUR ANNOUNCEMENT OF NUCLEAR ARMAMENT AND RADIOLOGICAL SEARCH VIRTUALLY FORCED GOS TO BREAK OFFICIAL SILENCE. TEXT STATEMENT FOLLOWS:

- (8) REPORTS CIRCULATING HERE THAT FOREIGN (INCLUDING US) NEWSREEL AND TV CAMERA CREWS PLANING TO GO TO CRASH SCENE FILM STORY.
- (9) IF SECURITY MEASURES IMPOSED BY SPANISH REMAIN IN EFFECT DIFFICULT FORESEE WHAT CAN BE FILMED OR REACTION MEDIA. DUKE

Following inter-agency agreed press statement has been drafted with view to release in Spain, perhaps as joint Embassy-Air Force release with concurrence GOS. Alternatively, could be reworked into joint U.S.-Spanish release, to be issued simultaneously in Madrid and Palomares area. Our idea is to have put out in Spain self-sufficient statement designed tell what happened within security limits, to have no press conference, and to answer no questions concerning search operations. 2. Begin verbatim text:

Search is being pressed off the Spanish Coast for the recovery of material carried by the two planes involved in the recent air collision and for fragments of wreckage which might furnish clues to the cause of the accident. Included aboard the B-52 which collided with the KC-135 tanker were several unarmed nuclear weapons, one of which has not yet been recovered.

When this search and investigation have been concluded, further announcement will be made of the results.

The impact of the weapons on land caused rupture of weapons cases, which resulted in scattering of a small amount of plutonium (PU 222 239) and uranium (U 235) in the immediate wix vicinity of the points of impact. There was no nuclear explosion.

Built-in safeguards perfected through years of extensive safety testing, have allowed the U.S. to handle, store and transport nuclear weapons for more than two decades without a nuclear detonation.

Thorough safety rules and practices also have been developed for dealing with any weapon accident which might result in the spilling of nuclear materials.

Radiological *********************** surveys of the Palomares area and its human and animal populations have included detailed laboratory studies by leading Spanish and U.S. scientists. They have obtained no evidence of a health hazard. These experts say there is no hazard for from eating vegetables marketed from this area, from eating the meat or fish or drinking the milk of animals.

Steps have been taken to insure that the affected areas are thoroughly cleaned up, and some soil and vegetation are being removed. These measures are part of a comprehensive program to eliminate the chance of hazard, to set at rest unfounded fears, and thus to restore normal life and livelihood to the people of Palomares.
