

#### Mr. President:

We present our case to you.....a man among men. We are only the little people on our great American society of today, but we are the people of the United States of America.

Our positions are not that of leaders. Our occupations are not that of Kings. Our father is God....Our mother is Mary. Our birthplace....Heaven! Our future....nary! Our voices have been neglected. Our pleas have not been acknowledged, for we are of the poverty-stricken class of people.

Our pockets do not bulge with gain. Our income totals that of a pauper. Our debts consume the entire amount. Our home is up for sale in hope of a new start in life. Our lives are not lived for self-satisfaction, but for our children. We have two. One boy and one girl. Our daughter is married. We now are alone.

Our case is that of our son, Alex Bencze. Alex is 16 years of age. At the age of 15, he was adjoined in a theft account with a certain Ronald Newwirth. Ronald being 18 years of age.

Alex was tried and sentenced in January of 1967 through Juvenile Court to the Indiana Youth Center at Indiana Boy's School in Plainfield, Indiana. Ronald Neuwirth was tried and sentenced through Criminal Court, for this was not his first offense in robbery, to Greencastle, Indiana.

Before Ronald Neuwirth's sentence was served fully, he wrote a letter to Governor Branigin (Governor of Illinois) and requested freedom. Upon doing so, he was fully pardonned.

We have written the Governor three times for our son's pardon as well. My daughter has written once. Her husband has done the same. Our son has also written him. We have heard nothing. Our prayers go unanswered. You are our last hope for justice.

We ask...."Can it be possible that our son, Alex Benoze, is to carry the full sentence of this crime in his heart for the wrong-doings of two?" Is this what our great American society of today calls "JUSTICE?" One is released, free to walk the streets while the other pays for both their crime.

A young boy's mind can be twisted and molded from the teachings of our leaders and parents. Our son writes us and asks Why? Why was he chosen to inherit the bitter parts of life? Is it because he is not important? Is it because justice is only meant for some and not others? My philosophy is "Be he white or be he black....be he rich in wealth or rich in heart.....Under God, be they brothers!" But, also, our philosophy of life does not hold true.

Our son has well learned his lesson. His letters show his true face. He is but a boy praying for freedom and acknowledgement. Begging for the same chance in life that Ronald Neuwirth was given.

The scales of justice are supposed to balance equally. Our son, so far, has learned they do not. Please do not let his mind grow twisted. For Justice and Freedom are the very backbones of our great "America."

We now ask of you, a leader who can destroy or strengthen this young boy's mind and life. Please give him the chance Ron was given. Issus him a pardon as well.

MR. PRESIDENT:

You have a date at 6:00 p.m. with Peter Benchley who has been employed, effective March 1, as a research-writer. Mr. Benchley is from the very distinguished writing family of Robert Benchley who is his grandfather and Nathaniel Benchley who is his father. He will be 27-years old in May.

His last job was Editor of the Radio and Television Department of Newsweek. He felt that he was stymied there and wanted advancement within the company which he could not get because the jobs of the key executive editors over him were all filled. Since I had known him slightly, as President of NBC, he approached me to help him get a job in the government and said he was interested in the research-writer field. The radio and television section of Newsweek was always well-written, and my chat with Kay Grahamand Lester Bernstein, one of the editors of Newsweek, was favorable. We did not "take" him away from Newsweek. He quit voluntarily and Kay recommended him to Mac Bundy for a job but he was more interested in the government than in a foundation, although I don't know whether Mac finally offered him a job.

He is somewhat sky, diffident, and young but I believe he could be developed well. Previous to working for Newsweek, he worked for the Washington Post as a special assignment reporter.

He was educated at Phillips Exeter and Harvard 1961. He has written articles for Holiday, The New Yorker, Diplomat, Yogue, TV Guide and two books - "Jonathan Visits the White House" and "Time and a Ticket." He speaks and reads French well and Italian fair. For one year he traveled extensively throughout Europe, the Middle East, Far East for educational purposes.

Both John Macy and I interviewed him and were impressed by him. John Macy has had him investigated and I understand he is cleared. He served for a period in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserves.

Dear Mr. President,

This short letter is just to let you know the way I feel about the increasing number and intensity of racial riots in this country.

Reading the New York Times dated July 29 there is an item that made me write this letter, they claim that Congress did not receive as many letters about the riots as they expected. Let me add mine to the list.

I think that for every letter you receive there must be about twenty people whe felt like writing was actually never did. Lets make no mistakes about it, Riots are the only topic of conversation today and most people are talking about when the authorities are going to put a stop to the <u>looting</u> and <u>arson</u>. It does not make any difference whether it is the City or the State or the Federal Government who does it.

I am white, born in Argentina, American citizen by conviction only, married to an American girl and consider myself liberal in most cases, support most of the Supreme Court decisions in civil liberties but I cant support any riots. The main reason why I decided to be and became an American citizen was because I was tired of living in South American outside the rule of Law, if you people do not put a stop to all this looting and arson the Latin American revolutions are going to look like peanuts compared with what can happen here. Another thing: No matter how many speeches you make and how many times you pray, the problem is not going to be solved until the white people of this country agree to sell houses to negroes in their own neighborhood and do not move out as soon as a negro moves in.



Most Honorable Gentlemen:

What I would say to one I would say to all, therefore this same letter is addressed to all of you.

I can in no way agree with the President's proposed 10 percent income tax surcharge. Realizing that I am just John Q. Public and not in possession of all the facts it will be easy for you to disregard my sentiments with "he's unqualified because he doesn't know the facts." To this I simply retort that since Mr. Johnson has been in the White House who has had the facts?

We hear the pro and con discussion with regard to debt. Some debt is necessary, but debt as a way of life is basicly unsound. Debt has become a way of life in the United States and has gotten out of hand—privately and in government. It would be marvelous if I, on a \$10,000 a year job, could decide that I wanted to spend \$150,000 per year and thus go to my employer and tell him that I wanted him toraise my wages to cover my desire to spend. But I can't, and yet Mr. Johnson thinks he is privileged in this regard and can go to his employer (the people of the United States) and not ask, but tell them that they have to give him more money because he doesn't have the intestinal fortitude to live within a budget which is determined by his income. In any normal spending situation a decision has to be made, but Mr. Johnson doesn't make a decision about priority spending—he just spends for everything. He's been spending billions a year on poverty which has not solved one ghetto problem. Mr. Johnson's approach to the whole problem reminds me of a man walking around with a bushel basket over his head.

Needless to say I'm fed up with what's going on in Washington, D.C. I think it's time for a drastic change. I'm willing to work day and night for a drastic change. By this I mean that when election time rolls around in 1968 I'm going to be ACTIVELY campaigning FOR men who voted against the 10 percent individual income tax surcharge, and campaigning ACAINST LYndon B. Johnson and any member of Congress who votes for the 10 percent tax surcharge.

Mr. Johnson has affronted my intelligence, integrity and character too long. A change must be made.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT:

FROM: George Christian

The following is a report from Peter Benchley, whom I have asked to make an independent appraisal of television news coverage. Benchley has good contacts with the television news people in New York, and unless you disapprove I am asking him to re-establish these associations in addition to his regular duties.

Herewith is his initial report:

As we discussed at the beginning of the week, I've been monitoring the network news broadcasts. Below, for your information, are a few comments on the first week's perusal. I gave ABC short shrift for two reasons: 1) you said you felt they are doing a reasonably objective job, so I thought I'd concentrate on the other two, which tend to offend. 2) I was limited to one set, as you know, and had to choose between NBC and ABC at night.

Granting that this has been a tough week for the Administration on Vietnam, CBS and NBC still did little to balance their broadcasts. On Wednesday, for instance, when the thunder came from the right (Thurmond, Stennis, Ford) NBC interviewed no friendly. Congressmen and offered no Administration rebuttal. They claimed the White House was silent, which you would know better than I. CBS offered neither rebuttal nor explanation.

On Tuesday, CBS showed the liberal opposition to the war, and then broadcast a very fatalistic film about the slow war of attrition, which, they implied, no one will wing. That was a dark day, and if I had been a foreign observer, I would have concluded that the United States is a monarchy -- gum by one man in defiance of an angry but ineffectual. Congress?

There was one exception to the rule of lazy coverage. On Friday, when the storm broke about corruption in the Vietnamese elections, CBS took the trouble to go to Bill Bundy about the problem. His answer was slightly evasive, but at least the Administration had been given the chance to speak. NBC declared, simply, that the State Department said it was not concerned about the elections.

Dear Mr. President:

God has given into your hands the leadership of one of the greatest nations of no ern times. I know that in troubled times like thee yours is not an easy task but I bray that God will guide you in the way that is pleasing in his sight.

Your vision of a great society has appealed to many people. That dream could become a reality if we work together for it in the right way.

Your popularity has, much of the time, soured very high but of late there has been an over increasing area of dissension arong the people at the grass roots. This is the war in Viet Nam.

I realize this is a difficult situation but it seems to me there is a possible face saving way out. I think for you to find some way to end our part of the hostilities will do more to send your populrity up than any other one thing. The time for action has come. You have already had a period of time. Promises alone will not stop the rising tide of dissension.

I am sure, that if you do not find a way, the opposition will take advantage of the situation. Whether or not they can fulfill their promises, the people will be ready to listen to them if you have not aready found an accetible way to work out the problem.

In the beginning, although they were troubled that we were involved in the fighting they made the best of it because they believed in what they were fighting for. They listened hopefully to the pronises that we were making headway against the enemy and there was a

foreseeable end to the situation, or so they thought. But more and my mark more rumors are flying that this can go on for as much as twenty five years. Those families who have loved ones envolved in the fighting are becoming more and more anxious to find some one who can put a stop to the fighting. As more troops are sent over more families are becoming envolved which means an ever increasing army of dissension here at home, not only of wives and parents but all other relatives of the soldiers as well

It is true that a quick and complete victory over the enemy is the most desirable thing but, at the moment, that seems out of the own meach therefore we need to concentrate on something more possible of attainment. To get them to the conference table seems men to be the next best solution. It seems that you have been trying to do this, and for a little while I was hopeful you might succeeds but later my reports disqualify that hope.

However there may be another way to get us out of this mess a and also save face. If we cannot find the solution we want we must ke be willing to settle for the best of what we can get.

A few months ago the leader of Chiang Kai-shek's military forces was visiting here in Springfield and made some enteresting talks. Among other things he told us they had six million men frained and ready for combat and twelve more million men in reserve that max could soon be made ready if we would furnish the arms for them to do it with. He said, "We need your aid in sending supplies but we do not need your fighting men. These people are orientals like ourselves and we understand the working of their minds in a way the westerners never could, therefore we will understand much betten how to xin fight them." I think that is true.

Mr. President, these are people who are on our side. They come

out of China because they could not tolerate the communist regime.

What better way to help a people than to help themselves?

Why not make a deal with these people to furnish them with the milittary supplies they need so they can fight their own battles and withdraw our fighting men. I feel confident that finding a way to get our boys out of Viet Nam will reach the heart of the common citizen, the average person and get you more votes than any other one thing that you could do.

Think this over very carefully. Ix I hope it will reach your heart. I would like to know if you do get to read this letter.

My doctor's statement indicated my condition to be worse and that I had to go for another operation. At this time, he was given a "hardship case" discharge (copy enclosed herewith). The actual separation papers have been lost, but I am sure it is officially filed with the chief personnel office in Washington, D. C.

Last month, our Local Draft Board #10 called my son and I to appear. After explaining my financial and physical condition, they wondered how I was able to support my family.

On November 10, 1967, I received a card from our draft board, indicating that my son had been reclassified as 1-A. The change has me confused.

I also wish you to know, that, according to my wife, my step-son's father, had died when Louis was 5 months old. He had been in service during World War II and we believe that his death was caused by a service-connected illness. My step son, Louis was his only child.

I will greatly appreciate whatever you can do to assist in this matter. I do not want to lose my home and everything that I have strived for. I had been in service during World War II myself and I am appealing to you as a veteran for this much needed assistance.

If you need any additional information I will be glad to submit it to you as soon as possible.

I know, without a doubt, that you are most busy with all the problems of modern times and no doubt have been approached with situtations similar to mine previously, but I find that so far there is no one that will assist me in this situation and therefore I am turning to you.

This pertains to my step-son, Louis S. Fonzo, age 22, residing with me at 69 Dell Avenue, Mt. Vernon, NY.

To begin with, I am totally disabled with an injury to my spine. I have had two operations and my condition is worse. I cannot perform any type of work. I am presently receiving compensation payments in the amount of \$220.00 a month. I also receive for myself and family social security disability in the amount of \$303.00 a month.


I own my own home and presently have a \$17,000.00 mortgage. I pay a total of \$145.00 a month to cover this mortgage. My family consists of myself, my wife and 3 children, including my step-son, Louis. The expense to support my family under my present conditions is far greater than the amount of my income which I have previously explained in this letter.

My step son, Louis Fonzo, is also employed and takes home to assist the family his entire salary of \$69.00 a week. With this amount, I am just barely able to meet my expenses and cost to support my family.

In 1963, my son, Louis, had signed up with the Naval Reserve in New Rochelle, New York to serve 2 years in reserve, 2 years active duty and two years on stand-by. He completed 2 years of reserve duty. He was ready to go into active duty in 1965 but the U S Naval Reserve Unit in New Rochelle, NY gave him a 9 month
