APPOINTING A COMMISSION TO REPORT UPON THE Assassination of president John F. Kennedy

Pursuant to the authority vested in me as President of the United States, I hereby appoint a Commission to ascertain, evaluate and report upon the facts relating to the assassination of the late President John F. Kennedy and the subsequent violent death of the man charged with the assassination. The Commission shall consist of --

The Chief Justice of the United States, Chairman;

Senator Richard B. Russell;

Senator John Sherman Cooper;

Congressman Hale\_Boggs;

Congressman Gerald R. Ford;

The Honorable Allen W. Dulles;

The Honorable John J. McCloy.

The purposes of the Commission are to examine the evidence developed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and any additional evidence that may hereafter come to light or be uncovered by federal or state authorities; to make such further investigation as the Commission finds desirable; to evaluate all the facts and circumstances surrounding such assassination, including the subsequent violent death of the man charged with the assassination, and to report to me its findings and conclusions.

The Commission is empowered to prescribe its own procedures and to employ such assistants as it deems necessary.

Necessary expenses of the Commission may be paid from the "Emergency Fund for the President".

All Executive departments and agencies are directed to furnish the Commission with such facilities, services and cooperation as it may request from time to time.

## Dear Congressman:

I have been asked to respond to the letter which you, Senator Long, Senator Ellender and Congressman Hebert addressed to the President on November 26th.

The President is deeply grateful for the cordial invitation extended to him to be present on January 8th, 1968, at Chalmette National Historical Park near New Orleans for the Sesquicentennial Celebration of the Battle of New Orleans and for the dedication of the reconstruction of the battlefield area. However, it is impossible for him to make a commitment, even on a tentative basis, for a date so far in the future. He will give very careful consideration to this matter nearer the time, though, and it is suggested that the invitation be renewed in the fall of 1964.

As to the request for the issuance of a proclamation next month one year in advance of the celebration - inviting the people of the
United States to participate in and observe this anniversary, in the
absence of Congressional authorization, it is not customary, except
in extraordinary circumstances, for the President to issue proclamations such as this. There was no authorization for a proclamation
in the legislation creating the Battle of New Ordeans Commission.
Should the Congress see fit to pass such a resolution, it would, of
course, receive the President's careful consideration.



LONG: I need to see your boss some time soon about a couple of things in Louisiana. One is that Harold McSween would like to be considered for the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Of course, if I had my choice, it would be the Federal Power Commission, but there's no vacancy there.

**JENKINS:** 

That's right, it will be a Republican vacancy.

LONG:

Then the second thing is this fellow in St. Charles Parrish that Boggs was talking about to be the President's campaign manager. My own feeling is that it is premature. These fellows ought to get elected first. Then when the Convention is over and the Primaries are over, we can see who we have and kind of get them together and then make the decision. This fellow is a big contributor and a good man. But I think we ought to wait.

The third thing is that we have got a chance to do some real good in the Shreveport area, which has been very negative -- somewhat like Dallas. But now the business part/of that area look like they want to get together to do something constructive for Shreveport, and we want to find some way to work with them and they want to find some way to work with us. They want to bring a delegation up here to talk about working constructively. They need help with a Federal Building; it has been postponed and postponed and the old one is about to fall in. It will help me, and there is no reason why we shouldn't work it to where it is going to help the President.

We ought to cut the losses in that area as much as we can: This last time when we elected President Kennedy, he lost North Louisiana by 2 to 1. He would have been beat (if he had run during his last year) by 5 to 1. But there's no reason why President Johnson shouldn't win by a good margin in that section.





Summarizing developments with respect to Medical Care For The Aged as we approach the weekend, the following factors should be borne in mind:

- (1) The colloquy which took place on the Senate floor on Tuesday, September 15th, served notice on the conferees that Senator Russell Long, despite his opposition to the Gore-Anderson amendment, feels responsibility to uphold the Senate position and he will endeavor to work out something.
- (2) In conversations with Mike Manatos, Long gave assurance that this program would be under Social Security. He appeared to lean toward some sort of Ribicoff variation.
- (3) Long is confident he can come up with a plan which he can persuade Mills to accept.
- (4) Long, Anderson and Gore insist they will stay in conference as long as is necessary to achieve results.
- (5) Senator Long is very much interested in his G.I.
  Insurance bill which was reported by the Finance
  Committee on Thursday. He is also a most
  enthusiastic advocate of increased public assistance,
  etc.

Off the conversation this morning with Carl Albert and Hale Boggs, I called Clint Anderson and Albert Gore. You will recall Boggs' statement that he has no intention of signing any conference report which does not contain provision for Medicare. King feels the same. Carl Albert echood those sentiments with his statement that Wilbur Mills has a real problem because of the position he would be in of siding with the Republican conferees to kill Medical Care (assuming that is his wish), and the resulting effects "on his image in the House for the future."

Gore and Anderson both told me they have no intention of agreeing to a conference report which does not contain Medicare. Gore went a step further and indicated a hard decision had to be made by the Leadership and by the White House that the Senate would act as a last resort to kill the whole bill rather than to accept such a report. Gore said that the way things are going politically we will have more Democrats in Congress next year than we have this year. But rather than postpone action until next year let's fight now.



At the request of Mr. Rowan, I am replying to your letter of September 17, 1964, which enclosed correspondence from Mr. Karl B. Molloy, Post Office Box 61975, New Orleans, Louisiana.

I regret that the situation regarding the books obtained by USIA from the Post Office Dead Letter Centers has not changed since it was explained to Mr. Molloy by Mr. Levin in his letter dated December 6, 1963. A copy of this letter is attached for your information. As you know, the assigned mission of the United States Information Agency is directed to overseas audiences. Because of this, all books received from the Post Office must be either sent abroad, given to another Federal agency or returned to the Post Office; and, in fact, this is how they are handled.

The United States Information Agency is aware that it is important that all children in the United States be well educated. But to accomplish our national objective it is also important that children of foreign lands learn to understand our country. Anything we can do to help them learn English makes it easier to create that understanding. To accomplish our mission abroad, we use books for a variety of purposes and in many ways. To be useful in our work a book need not directly describe some aspect of America.



#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

Subject: United States Delegation to the Inauguration of the President of the United Mexican States
