

As the President knows, it will take a majority of the House conferees and a majority of the Senate conferees to bring back a conference committee report.

Manatos feels certain that Russell Long and George Smathers will support our package, and that Anderson will probably do so, although that is less clear.

I have asked Mike to try to obtain commitments tonight or first thing in the morning from all three.

On the House side, Boggs and King are with us. Mills remains the key; without him we cannot have a Democratic majority.

The President has the report of the conference meeting this afternoon. The conferees are to meet at 10: a.m. tomorrow.

We will, with Treasury, talk in the morning to each Democratic member on Ways and Means to see if we can find 13 (of the 15) Democrats on the committee who will support the package. Our canvassing the committee will stir Mills up but at this point I don't think that makes any difference.

I am considering asking George Mahon to give a back-grounder to one or two representatives of the press, saying in effect that he, George, understood that Mills was supporting this package and that it was on the basis of this understanding that he went ahead in his committee this morning. I don't know whether George would do this. Is there any interest in my asking him to do this?

I believe the President should consider giving a little extra attention to the <u>Speaker and Carl'Albert</u> in order to inspire them to greater efforts in behalf of our legislative program the next three months.

Carl Albert, in particular, is starved for attention. I know that Carl feels, with some justification, that he carries the brunt of the leadership load. I believe he is a little resentful that Hale appears to get more personal attention from the President than either Carl or the Speaker.

Carl's judgment of the floor situation is always on the optimistic side. This leads him to be reluctant to make the extra effort on controversial legislation which is often required. I do not mean that he has not worked for the Administration. He has worked hard.

But if we combine his optimistic assessment of the floor with the feeling that he is not appreciated, we lose a lot.

So I would recommend that the President have a phone visit with Carl in the near future. In this connection, his birthday is May 10 and the President might wish to consider doing something extra special for example, a gift personally presented with Mrs. Albert coming in also, or having them in for dinner for the occasion.

The Speaker has been somewhat down in the dumps since the President withdrew. He pitched in hard on the Civil Rights bill, But I am having increasing difficulty in persuading him to put the lash to the Rules Committee. The Speaker is a great whip; he understands the game and enjoys it and is effective. He is still very cooperative so far as head counts are concerned.


With regard to having a bi-partisan leadership meeting on the <u>Tax</u> bill conference report, Carl thinks it inadvisable and Hale sort of favors it but thinks that it should be delayed until after the President has met with the Democrats.

With respect to having all the Democrats down to the White House for a briefing session on the necessity of the Tax bill, both Carl and Hale are very much in favor of this. The Democrats would be brought down in three groups of about 80 each.

As to providing a vote on a recommittal motion for \$4 billion, Carl slightly favors and Hale wants to think about it but is inclined to favor. Both raised the question of whether this can properly be done in a rule. I think that it can be.

The advantage of such a motion would be that it would give labor something else to work on besides simply committing votes against the conference report and it would give us something to be for as an alternative to the conference report.

Carl mentioned that Mills had told him that he did not plan to bring up the report until after Memorial Day. No date has been set yet for Rules Committee consideration.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

The House conferces caved in this afternoon to Russell Long on his Antidumping rider on the Re-negotiation Bill.

Long and Hartke had sponsored this rider which, for all practical purposes, nullifies the Anti-dumping Code negotiated as part of the Kennedy Round. Technically, the rider simply provides that the Anti-dumping Act of 1921 is paramount and that the Code shall not be construed in a manner inconsistent with the Act. But the clear intent of the amendment is to signal the Tariff Commission that they are not to alter the previous standards for finding infury in dumping cases.

Wills and Hale Boggs held out against the rider until today. However, Mills was a weak singer on it from the start. Boggs fought hard to the bitter end and attempted a variety of compromises with no success. At one point, this merning, Long told them this was so important to him that he was willing to resign as Whip and take his case to the Sonate floor solely as Chairman of the Finance Committee!

It is probably that this bill will be "veto proof" because it also includes the implementing legislation for the International Coffee Agreement. However, I have asked the lawyers at Justice and State to check out the coffee situation very carefully to determine if the legislation is absolutely essential to the operation of the agreement.

As per your direction, I will now talk to Long to discuss the Newsom-Leonard parlay as a possible solution to the Tariff Commission vacancies.



John Robson called this morning and left the fol message for you:

The story on the Boggs road problem is this. We have not received all of the requests for extra mileage and the time for closing them off is not until November 15. The other states are coming in with requests. Frank Turner, Director of Public Roads, and Secretary Boyd went down to talk to Boggs a couple of weeks ago and explained that they could not make a decision on one segment of the road until everybody had their requests in and we have made no decisions at this point. It will probably be December before we will be able to make a decision on all the requests that are in.

The particular piece of highway that Boggs has in mind is a reasonable request. It seems to meet the general criteria that we have promulgated for all requests and there is a good possibility that it will be selected but it has to be measured against all the requests.

John Robson has asked the people at the bureau to see if there is any other wrinkle we could apply with relation to Boggs' request for an allocation of 42 miles from the 1500 miles of new mileage that was just authorized.



This letter is to request that before a decision is made in the application of the Maine Port Authority for a foreign trade zone at Portland and a sub-zone at Machiasport, that an immediate investigation of serious charges of impropriety made by Representative Hale Boggs, the Majority Whip in the 90th Congress, in a statement appearing in the Congressional Record of October 14, 1968, be made.

Mr. Boggs alleged in his statement that officials of Hooker Chemical Corporation and Occidental Petroleum Corporation attempted to make a "public bribe" to influence him not to appear at a Foreign-Trade Zone hearing at Portland, Mrine on October 10-12, 1968. He also stated that this action amounted to a violation of Title 18 of the U. S. Code, Section 201.

The hearing in question was held later in connection with the application by the Maine Port Authority to establish a Foreign-Trade Zone at Portland and a Sub-zone at Machiasport, the latter to meet the requirements of an oil refinery proposed for that location by Occidental. Correspondingly, Occidental has asked permission to import 300,000 b/d of crude oil into the Sub-zone, which requires a quota from the Department of the Interior.

I, of course, am not in a position to verify the accuracy of these charges. It is my understanding that denials have been made by representatives of Hooker and Occidental who are the applicants involved.

It is my opinion that in a matter of such importance involving such a large benefit for a single company, an immediate investigation of all matters involved is essential to good government. If the charges all proved to be true, and our government had already granted the special treatment which has been requested, we might well have a very serious scandal on our hands.

My dear Mr. President:

Congressman Aspinall's letter to you was published by him on the front page in the Oil Daily of October 30, 1968, where I read it.

Highly sensitive to the burdens which you bear, I would not address a reply to this letter were it not for two considerations:

- 1. That it might prejudice the relief which 11-1/2 million people in the New England area are seeking to reduce shortages and for lower costs of heating fuel, which this plan would guarantee them. Such a public interest cannot be ignored.
- 2. There are wholly untrue and unwarranted "bribe" insinuations against three executives of the Hooker Chemical Corporation, a subsidiary of Occidental Petroleum Corporation, which must be corrected, not only because of the integrity and high reputation of the three individuals, but because of the attempted reflection upon Occidental Petroleum Corporation.

The letter of Congressman Aspinall is part of an extensive diversionary attack by some of our competitors, who are charging the people of New England higher prices for fuel oil than any other region in the country pays, and who wish to hold on to their monopoly profits. It is important first to bring into focus the true issue. Briefly stated, it is as follows:


