Dear Mr. Miller:

Congratulations on your appointment by President Johnson to head the Commission on Crime in the District. I know that you will carry out your duties on this Commission as capably as you have fulfilled your other public tasks in the past.

As the Senior Senator from Maryland, I am naturally concerned about the growing disregard for law in the District of Columbia. Many Marylanders spend a large part of their time in the District, at work or at recreation. They, as well as Washington residents, have a right to expect protection from the hoodlums who seem to be growing bolder and bolder in their attacks on innocent citizens.

This trend, as the President has said, must be reversed. If anyone is capable of looking into the roots of the problem, it is you, with your background in the Criminal Division of the Attorney General's office. I am confident that your Commission will come up with recommendations, which, if properly implemented, will help correct this alarming situation.



I am sending you a brochure that presents, in summary form, the proceedings of the recent White House Conference on Natural Beauty. I thought that the recommendations would be of interest to you. The conference was planned, as you know, to discover and recommend ways to bring natural beauty into the daily lives of all Americans.

It has been a source of pleasure and inspiration to me to see the great public interest developing in natural beauty. Several of our Governors have already scheduled conferences on natural beauty as I suggested in my remarks to the conference delegates here in Washington. Some of our State Highway Departments have devoted a portion of their Federal aid construction funds to the preservation of scenic beauty along their highway systems. Municipalities, school systems, private organizations, and individuals have written to tell of their projects and to offer their assistance in this national effort to improve the quality of our lives.

Having already answered Mr. and Mrs. Edmonston's telegrams to Senator Brewster and Congressman Sickles, we are enclosing a copy of that response, for your information. No answer from the White House is necessary.

This is in response to your letter of July 9 concerning the arrest of the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmonston. David Edmonston was released on July 2 on \$100 bond. *

At present the demonstrations in Jackson, Mississippi are taking place without interference from local authorities and all persons previously arrested in connection with demonstration marches have been released. The following is a summary of the events in Jackson since June 14:





I predicted: You would win in a "Land Slide" in your last election, and further if it were possible, you could win for twenty years.



My dear Mr. President:

It has recently been called to my attention that the increased demand of the Armed Forces for quinine has caused a sharp price rise for such drugs as "quinidine."


Several of my constituents with heart trouble have been informed by their druggists that they cannot get a sufficient supply of quinine to fill prescriptions.

A survey of pharmacists in the Washington, D. C. area indicates that the price of "quinidine" and related drugs has increased between two and three fold during the past several months. Recent news reports indicate that a similar situation exists in other parts of the United States.

It seems to me that a Presidential fact-finding committee should be appointed to look into this apparently serious situation. From my inquiries to the Defense Supply Agency and the Food and Drug Administration the nature of this problem does not appear to lend itself to action by any one Federal Agency alone.
