MR. PRESIDENT:

Attached is a release by the ^XRepublican National Committee dated August 23, which reports that the Republican Coordinating Committee recommends a five-point program for revitalizing rural areas where high unemployment exists. This program would put special emphasis on educational aids, industry location, and the channeling of Government defense and other contracts into these areas.

The report adopted by the Coordinating Committee was prepared by a task force headed by Don^XPaarlberg, Professor of Agricultural Economics at Purdue University and Congressman George H. ^XBush (R-Texas). A detailed list of members of the task force is provided as well as a membership list of the Republican Coordinating Committee.

The report suggests that there are few jobs in the rural areas for several reasons. First, because of the agricultural revolution, and secondly, because of lack of imagination. Criticism is leveled at Federal farm programs in cutting crop allotments. Similarly, wage policies have discouraged industry, and industry itself has not sought to de-centralize. Further, it is charged that educational policies have discriminated against the poorer areas.

Farm programs designed by the Democratic party have continually sought parity of prices where they should have sought parity of opportunity, according to this report.







MEMORANDUM FOR BAREFOOT SANDERS:

FROM: George Christian *GC*

I had dinner last night with a group which included Congressmen George Bush of Texas, William O. Cowger of Kentucky, John Tunney of California, and Don Riegle of Michigan. Army Secretary Resor and Bill Macomber were also there. The dinner was by George Bush, a friend of mine, for a sister, Nancy Ellis of Massachusetts.

During the evening:

1. Bush discussed with me the Republican plans of Congressman Goodell to cut \$6 billion from the budget in order to save funds and at the same time get extra money for the cities. He said he thought it was constructive for the Republicans to come up with specific cuts, such as in the farm program and space.
2. Tunney said he was trying to get back to Vietnam shortly. He said he was disappointed in his first trip because he was briefed so much that he didn't have enough time to make judgments of his own. He said if the military was too tight about letting Congressmen back into Vietnam during this period, it was going to create a reaction in that the country was too insecure for members of Congress to visit. He said he hoped the military would work around this problem so that Congressmen can resume their trips as soon as possible. Tunney's comments about the President were friendly. He said he faced a very tough campaign against an attractive Republican from Riverside. He also commented that his district had more juvenile delinquency than any district in the country, because of the permissive society of California. My talks with the other Congressmen were mostly social. Governor Chaffee also came by the dinner and we visited for a few minutes.

Bush's sister, incidentally, is a Democrat. She said she was for the President and wished her brother George had become a Democrat when he moved to Texas. She was disappointed that the President did not get into the Massachusetts Primary.

This is in response to your recent letter to Secretary Brown regarding the criteria for establishing an Air Force ROTC Unit at Houston Baptist College, Houston, Texas. Dr. W. H. Hinton wrote to you concerning this matter.

The Air Force is presently conducting ROTC programs at 175 colleges and universities. This number of units is capable of producing the Air Force's annual requirement for new officers from that source. Although we do not plan to establish additional Air Force ROTC units in the near future, the application for a unit at Houston Baptist College, if submitted, will be placed on file and given every consideration at the appropriate time. We are attaching an application form for use by the College.

Institutions applying for participation in the Air Force ROTC program must be fully accredited by the appropriate regional or national accreditation agency and provide adequate facilities to support the program. Furthermore, they must be capable of producing 25 officers annually if they host a four or combination four/two year Air Force ROTC course.

We appreciate your interest in the Air Force ROTC program. Similar information has been sent to Senator Yarborough and Representatives Eckhardt and Casey who also inquired about this matter.




