Here are the alternatives to assist the victims of the Sicilian earthquakes to come to this country:

- 1. Direct legislation. Congressman Cellar, Senator Robert Kennedy, and others have recently introduced legislation to admit 5,000 Siciliar's in addition to Italy's annual quota of 20,000. The legislative route would take some time, but is probably the least troublesome method in the long run.
- 2. The procedure of section 203(a)(7) of the 1965 Immigration Act:
 - . The President issues a proclamation finding that these are "persons uprooted by a catastrophic natural calamity . . . who are unable to return to their usual place of abode."
 - . Then the Immigration and Naturalization Service can immediately admit them if they meet other basic requirements.
 - But, these refugees are subtracted from Italy's regular quota. This is a problem because Italy's quota is overcrowded. Three-fourths of the quota for fiscal year 1968 has already been filled, and successful applicants for the remaining places have already been notified. Nearly all of these are relatives of American citizens. Thus, admitting persons under this section will displease as many -- or more -- people as are benefited.





Actually the FAA proposed to test a conversion of the Watertown FSS to a new type, low cost Flight Service Facility (FSF) for six months.

The test at Watertown has been cancelled. The City of Watertown desired to reimburse the Government for the difference in cost between continuing the FSS without change and operating it for six months as a 12-hour test FSF. Although the FAA felt that, in view of the low volume of traffic at Watertown during the night hours, the City would incur costs out of proportion to the benefits received, there was no reason to refuse the offer. The contract between the City of Watertown and the FAA has been consummated.

Unfortunately, they have been the victims of poor scheduling, that is to say, they have been presented usually early Sunday afternoon, along with other educational and informative programs.

This year, the Westinghouse Broadcasting Co., in cooperation with my friend, Theodore Granik, has pioneered in making these two fine programs available to the American public during regularly scheduled evening hours on weekday nights, when the largest potential viewing and listening audience is available. The Feighan bill is totally inadequate. It would provide for the admission of 10,000 people now on the waiting list and for the creation of a board to look into the distribution of 100,000 unused quota numbers over the next two and one-half years. It could not, by any stretch of the imagination, be considered responsive to our request to him and to his promise that he report out a good immigration bill, for it contains none of the essential elements of our bill (elimination of national origins, Asia-Pacific triangle elimination, mandatory distribution of unused quota numbers).

What we have now is an immigration bill that makes a very minor concession to the problem involved with the huge backlogs of people trying to get into the United States. It does nothing about the discrimination against nations. However, we cannot oppose the bill.

I have talked to Phil Hart, and he has talked to Eastland. Eastland says that, in his judgment, even the Feighan bill is too much. But Eastland is willing to report to the Senate a modified Feighan bill.

It seems obvious to me that O'Connor has been talking to Eastland, because the report of his conversation to Hart sounds very much like your report of your conversation with O'Connor. Eastland even mentioned the possibility of a filibuster, but he said that the American Legion would induce people like Senator Johnston to make long speeches against the legislation.

Senator Hart feels, and I concur, that we should try to get some legislation on the Senate floor. Senator Hart will then try to amend it to the form of the Administration bill.

Of course, time is so short that I doubt that much can be done. But we might as well encourage Feighan to get some bill to the full committee, where Manny Celler teels me he will get a vote quickly and try to get a rule so that it can be passed in the House and sent to the Senate. I suspect there is not enough time for the Senate to act. But let's try.
