





Dear Mr. Chairman:

As you know, the President has expressed his very great satisfaction with the major accomplishments of the 89th Congress in its first session. At the same time, he has also stated his expectation that this outstanding job will be continued next year.

In the category of legislation for next year, there is a matter I should like to bring to your attention, although it is admittedly not of major importance.

Private relief legislation, of course, formed a substantial part of the legislation enacted during the first session of this Congress. Among the private bills, there was a substantial number which involved relieving government personnel, mostly servicemen, from liability to refund erroneous payments they had received. Thus, of the 214 private relief bills enacted during the first session, 34 (or 16%) were for this purpose.

The foregoing figures reflect the increasing number of overpayments of bills in recent years. While obviously of great importance to the individual concerned, they are certainly of comparatively minor interest from the standpoint of over-all Congressional and Presidential responsibilities.

I am told that there is pending before your Committee a bill, H. R. 449, which, if enacted with certain amendments, would provide general authority for the administrative settlement of overpayments cases, thereby virtually eliminating the need for

future individual bills. In my opinion, this would be a highly useful and appropriate step that would enable equity to be done while, at the same time, relieving both the President and the Congress of an unnecessary burden -- certainly a most desirable result, given the magnitude of the burdens they cannot escape. I know the President would be grateful for your help in securing the enactment of this legislation, and I should think his feelings would be fully shared by Members of the Congress.

Replying to your memo of February 14 - Congressman Celler, ^{+ Emanuel} as you know, is the senior ranking Democratic Member of Congress and ranks all Republicans as well. He is also the dean of the largest Congressional delegation in Congress and the leader of the largest Democratic state group. In recent years, Mr. Celler has chaired the committee that has handled such far reaching legislation as civil rights and immigration and currently is due to handle some of the key measures being sent to Congress by the President, including the four year term for House Members with which he disagrees with the President.

I would like to recommend that you consider suggesting a Presidential appearance at this dinner. First, of course, the affair and the sponsoring organization would have to be investigated and I would be glad to help you with this if you want to follow up.

This strikes me as possibly an ideal situation to pay tribute to a distinguished Member of Congress, a strong ally on most matters, and to use the occasion as a sounding board for enunciating the past and future accomplishments of Democratic leadership and in particular steps taken and planned by President Johnson in the areas dealing with the less fortunate people in the society.

FROM: Charles D. Roche

SUBJECT: Conversation with Congressman Geller, *Emanuel*

1. He anticipates a heavy work-load for the Committee but presently is lolling along. The Committee is ready to go to work on your major proposals. He hopes the messages will start flowing up to the Hill without delay. He will try to get them reported out quickly.
2. As you know, he opposes the 4-year term for House Members. He gives it no chance at all for passage, though he says it could be reported out of Committee. He feels an agreement should be reached with the Administration to dispose of this matter without embarrassment to you. In the event you want to push passage of this Constitutional amendment, he feels that a great deal of ground work will have to be done to build up favorable sentiment both in the Congress and among the people. Some sort of a study commission in depth therefore might be in order. This would give the appearance of moving forward with the legislation and of course it would avoid outright defeat.
3. He is holding back on the Celler bill to require a sixty-day notice of price changes by industries whose pricing actions have an impact on the national economy. In view of the up-coming elections, he thinks that a frontal assault of this nature on the business community would adversely affect the chances of a number of the new freshmen congressmen to gain reelection. It might be well to let him know the Administration agrees with this conclusion and to keep the bill submerged until the time might arise in the future when you might want to put some Congressional pressure on the business community.
4. He is with you one hundred percent on Vietnam.

THIS IS NO TIME FOR PANIC

Nobel Prize winner, Dr. Martin Luther King, able civil rights leader, asks President Johnson to abandon the military junta now ruling South Vietnam and consider complete withdrawal from that country.

It is hoped at this time that civil rights leaders, including Dr. King, will not meddle with our military operations in that unhappy country. Civil Rights and Vietnam do not mix.

It is going to be difficult enough to get a new civil rights bill passed. Those seeking its passage should not impede those of us who may have difficulty handling the bill because of the violent opposition that will be generated against these civil rights leaders who abet peace demonstrations and withdrawal from Vietnam. I hope that these civil rights leaders will reconsider and realize that peace movements, angry demonstrations, and opposition to the conduct of our actions in Vietnam can seriously jeopardize many of the provisions of the new Civil Rights Bill. It is hoped that Dr. King and his colleagues will stick to their own knitting -- at least at this time.

Furthermore, it is quite understandable that men in high places may differ concerning our policy in Vietnam, but there is no reason for them to panic with the slightest crisis that develops there. We have been through strains and stresses there before and overcome them. We will, with patience and courage, weather the present storm, the winds of which are already moderated.

It is so easy to be critical, especially when one is without responsibility or power. The complexity of the questions President Johnson faces brooks no simple answer. He gets pummelled by the critics because he cannot give immediate,

uncomplicated responses. When his policy is successful, the same critics fail to vindicate him. Then there is no conflict -- no news, no headlines of praise, replacing the abuse.

President Johnson knows the "obligations of power". At least, his judgment should be respected and not arbitrarily repudiated. At least, elected high officials, civil rights leaders, editorial writers, at this time might well be a bit restrained in their comments. Otherwise, our military position is severely hurt. This does not mean that dissent is not useful. It is. These critics should be concerned but not destructively censorious.

Some of the President's critics are so virulent that one is almost led to the belief that they at times seem to gloat over his difficulties.

This is the time for unity, not disunity -- the time for common sense, not panic.



No doubt you are aware of the controversy building over trading stamps. We have been following the situation closely and submit the following summary in case the subject is raised by the press.

1. The impetus behind the current activity has been provided by freshman Congressman Lester L. Wolff of New York. At the five informal hearings he has held, he has been joined by about 12 other Congressmen. Most of these have been new Congressmen, although Congressman Celler participated in the last hearing, held in New York.

2. Formal Congressional hearings on the subject seem likely next session. Congressman Matsunaga of Hawaii has said the Marketing and Consumer Relations Subcommittee of the Agriculture Committee would look into trading stamps. Congressman Celler has said that if nobody else investigated stamps, the Judiciary Committee would.

3. Wolff has approached the subject by "raising questions." He has not proposed any solutions. His chief question: Do stamps cause higher prices?

4. At his hearings, witnesses have given conflicting testimony. The stamp companies have refused to attend despite repeated invitations. Their response has been that sufficient investigation has been done by government agencies.

Attached for your signature are four enrolled Bills designed to correct several long-standing inequities in our court procedures and to broaden the Government's authority to settle cases out of court. You have until July 18 (Monday) to sign three of the measures and until July 23 to sign the fourth.

I recommend that they all be signed at the same time because of their close relationship.

Briefly, the legislation:

-- Requires the Government to file suits against private parties within specified periods of time. Up to now, suits against the Government had to be filed within a certain time, but the Government was free to sue at any time.

-- Requires the Government to pay court costs when it loses the lawsuit. Up to now, the Government could not pay costs when it lost, but always collected costs from private parties when it won.

-- Allows the Government to settle administratively personal injury, death or property claims out of court, rather than force a citizen to go to the expense of filing a lawsuit before a settlement could be effected.

-- Allows Government agencies to compromise and settle debt claims not exceeding \$20,000 rather than having to go into court to collect from the individual.

These bills are not flashy or dramatic, but they are significant. The Government, without prodding from the outside, took the initiative in making long overdue changes. The legislation takes us a step closer to "equal justice under the law," will help relieve court congestion, will speed settlements, and will inject a greater sense of fairness into our procedures.
