I have checked the signing statement on the Justice Department Appropriation Bill with Celler, McClellan and Rooney. Celler thought it was very good and recommended that you issue it as written.

McClellan and Rooney, however, were unhappy about the comments on the reduction in appropriations. McClellan said he thought you were being unfairly hard of them; Rooney said that Ramsey had the authority to put more money in the Criminal Division from some other division if he wanted to do it. Neither of them are happy about the Law Enforcement Assistance Act the way it's currently administered. I told them I thought we could rework that portion of the signing statement and avoid comment on the reductions, since the main point was to again urge the Congress to act this year on the Safe Streets bill.

I therefore recommend that we delete the material I have bracketed on the attached statement and insert in its place the following:

It provides the funds for our federal law enforcement activities and programs -- the FBI, the Criminal Division of the Justice Department, our U.S. Attorneys and Marshalls, and the Law Enforcement Assistance Act.

This bill underscores the importance of another urgent measure which I hope will be sent to my signing table before the current session ends -- the Safe Streets and Crime Control Act I recommended last February.

If you approve, we can issue the statement this way this afternoon.

This is in response to your inquiry as to the property law concerning the travel of American citizens to restricted areas such as North Viet Nam. This is in response to your inquiry as to the present state of the

The Secretary of State, under statutory authority delegated by the President, may exercise controls over the travel of American citizens to specific foreign countries or areas for reasons of foreign policy. Zemel v. Rusk, 381 U.S. 1 (1965). In practice, the present controls are exercised by the Secretary's refusal to validate passports for travel to a restricted area.

Under recent Supreme Court decisions, however, persons who travel to a restricted area without permission cannot be prosecuted criminally. United States v. Laub, 385 U.S. 475 (1967) and Travis v. United States, 385 U.S. 491 (1967). The Court held, not that it would be unconstitutional to provide for prosecution, but merely that Congress had not enacted a criminal sanction to deal with such persons.

As a result of these two decisions, the Departments of State and Justice have prepared a draft bill designed to fill this gap in enforcement power. It would provide criminal penalties for willful travel by United States citizens to countries or areas such as North Viet Nam and Cuba with respect to which the Secretary of State has imposed travel limitations.

The draft bill and a transmittal letter, copies of which are attached, have been cleared by the Bureau of the Budget and are being transmitted to the Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee.
