TRUTH IN LENDING

Mr. DOUGLAS. Mr. President, once again I rise to introduce my bill requiring full disclosure of the costs of per-sonal credit. This bill—the truth in lending bill—is being introduced for the fourth time. I introduced similar legislation in the 86th, 87th, and 88th Congresses. I must admit to some disappointment over the failure thus far of Congress to enact this much needed re-form legislation. However, I learned long ago that any essential reform opposed by powerful segments of American industry requires years of intensive effort before it results in a victory for the public interest. And so I console myself with the thought that the original Food and Drug Act of 1907 was passed only after it had met with the most intense opposition from many of the food and drug companies. It was only after public indignation had been fully aroused that the Congress was able to enact even the most modest requirements to insure that foods and drugs marketed were safe and sanitary.

Many years later the truth in securities legislation of the 1930's was passed over the vehement protest of the New York financial community. The president of the New York Stock Exchange, Mr. Whitney, opposed this reform in testimony before the Banking and Currency Committee—the same committee that has been considering the truth in lending bill. Mr. Whitney as I remember it, predicted that if brokerage houses were required to tell the truth, that is, if they made a full disclosure of the salient facts about the stocks which they offered for sale to the public, the stock market would collapse. Mr. Whitney pleaded, in effect, that the stock market could continue to operate only so long as the gullible could be duped into buying stocks on the basis of misinformation and fraud.

The truth in securities legislation did not wreck the stock market. Instead, it became the salvation of reputable stock brokers and brokerage houses.

These same arguments against the full disclosure of essential information have again come to the surface as we have considered the truth-in-lending bill. Lenders have solemnly and self-righteously warned the Banking and Currency Committee that if we were to pass legisletion to require the full disclosure of the

fore they can be signed into law. I am delighted to say that there are substantial segments of the personal credit industry that do support the truth-in-lending bill. I simply wish that more of the reputable members of the industry, such as the commercial bankers, would join in supporting this kind of reform legis-

It is unfortunate, however, that powerful segments of the consumer credit industry habitually oppose any legislation to establish ethical standards and protect the honest and efficient competitor in the industry. In spite of this opposition, the principle of truth in lending has been proposed in a number of States and foreign countries and I understand gradual progress is being made. For example, the Canadian Province of Nova Scotia has recently passed an act requiring the finance charge and simple annual rate of interest to be disclosed on all credit transactions. It is ironic that a reform measure first proposed in this country has now been copied and enacted into law in another country, while we here are struggling to gain a foothold

I. WHAT THE BILL DOES

Mr. President, the basic purpose of the truth-in-lending bill is to require that anyone who lends moncy or extends credit must supply the would-be borrower or credit user with two simple but vital facts:

First. A statement of the total finance charge in dollars and cents; and

Second. A statement of the finance charge expressed in terms of a true annual rate on the outstanding unpaid balance of the obligation.

The bill does not attempt to regulate or control the rate of interest or the cost

The bill would enable the typical consumer to compare the cost of credit from various sources and make an intelligent decision. It would also assist him in deciding whether or not to borrow, pay cash, or save toward the purchase in-

Suppose, for example, a man wants to borrow \$1,500 to finance the purcase of a car. Assume he goes to two lenders and the first states the payments will be \$53.40 a month over 36 months while the second quotes payments of \$60 over 30 months. Which credit plan is the cheapest? How can the buyer to at least state the quantity and the price on the package. We expect the butcher to list the price per pound for the meat he sells. We expect the gasoline dealer to disclose the price per gallon he charges for gasoline. We expect food stores to post the price for milk per quart at the retail level. Why should not we expect the lender or credit extender to post his price in a similar fashion?

The price of credit has traditionally been expressed as a true annual rate on the unpaid balance. Most loans on homes have always been expressed in this manner as have interest rates on business transactions. Interest rates on savings accounts in commercial banks are expressed in terms of true annual rates. So are short-term interest rates to businessmen to finance payrolls and the purchase of raw materials. It is only when we turn to the short-term consumer credit field, that we find a departure in the time-honored method of expressing the price of credit. Why should we permit the seller of credit to be less honest with the unwary public than he is with the experienced busi-nessman? Why should not these lenders state the amount of interest they are charging and its price in the form of an annual rate of interest or charge? Who could possibly object to such an ele-mentary prerequisite of fair dealing?

It was with this simple conviction that I introduced the original truth-in-lending bill over 5 years ago.

Since that time the Banking and Currency Committee has held extensive public hearings on truth in lending. In the last Congress alone, we heard from 135 witnesses and the record of their testimony runs to more than 1,600 pages. We heard from bankers and bus driversfrom mayors and crane operators. We have listened to numerous tales of interest gouging and shady practices, some of which were truly shocking, even to the most skeptical observers.

Throughout these long and detailed hearings, an endless series of technical objections were raised by those who opposed the bill. As these were disposed of, new ones arose to take their place. The opponents of truth in lending have an infinite capacity for conjuring up mythical situations where they claim the bill might be somewhat difficult to ap-

Sometime back you asked me to check on your pulling Senator Douglas' coat-tail when he wanted to make a speech on the minimum wage.

I talked with Frank McCulloch, who was Douglas' Administrative Assistant at that time, in an effort to recall this incident. Frank reported that he recalls that during this period of time there were two matters before the Senate, both of which were different from the Eisenhower program. One of these was the minimum wage which the Senate increased from 90¢ to \$1 and the other was ARA. His recollection was that these two bills were up on succeeding days and he does recall that you had to keep Senator Douglas from making a speech when you were ready to move on the minimum wage. His recollection was really that this could have happened because he well remembers your desire to keep the debate as short as possible.

M cCulloch also recalled that after both measures were acted upon, you and Senator Douglas were together and Douglas' comment was "with my program and your legislative skill, we could go a long way."





I have always considered that one of my main functions in the Senate was to press for needed and long overdue social legislation. It takes a long time often for them to gain public acceptance. And it is also true that when they are finally passed, those who have only recently come to recognize their merits try to claim the credit for their passage. Let me give you some examples.

ITEM: In 1958 I moved to repeal most of the retail and manufacturer's excise taxes. My amendment was defeated both in the Senate Finance Committee and on the Senate floor. This year, that proposal was passed with almost unanimous support.

ITEM: In 1960, five years to the day before the Voting Rights bill was introduced in 1965, my almost identical amendment to provide for Federal Registrars to register Negroes in the South was killed in the Senate. But in 1965, most of those who voted against the proposal in 1960 voted for it, and some of them even claimed credit for the idea.

ITEM: Twice before, Medicare was beaten. Senator Anderson and I in the Senate drafted many of the provisions of those defeated Medicare bills. This year, Medicare was passed overwhelmingly.

ITEM: In the past, we have found it almost impossible to put through Federal Aid to Education which I have always sponsored and supported. Now it is law.

ITEM: My Area Redevelopment Bill was killed three times, either in the House or by President Eisenhower's veto. But it became law in 1961 and this year, my bill to extend and broaden the program was enacted into law as the Economic Development Act with only a handful of votes against it.

I am therefore doubly delighted with the record of this Congress. These programs are needed to make ours a better society. In addition, I have a sense of personal achievement in having written or sponsored most of these measures during the lean years when we were fighting for their general acceptance by both the public and the Congress.

How It Was Done

How were we able to do this? There are three reasons. First, was the public concensus that developed over the years as a result of our educational program and advocacy of

these measures. There is no question but that public opinion overwhelmingly supported these bills.

Second, this concensus reflected itself in the election of 1964 when 38 progressive and forward-looking new Democrats replaced conservative Republicans. They were joined by about 30 more Democratic progressives from the cities and countryside who, together with a handful of progressive Republicans from the East, helped us to break through the bi-partisan coalition which had dominated Congress for years.

Finally, there was the great legislative skill on the part of President Johnson. He was successful not by "arm twisting", as his opponents try to make out, but by persuasion and by attention to the needs and desires of the public. For example, his profound speech on the Voting Rights Bill, not "arm twisting", lifted that issue above partisan considerations and developed public opinion behind it to such an extraordinary degree that we were able to break the filibuster.

Progressive Measures Passed During Prosperous Period

There was one unique accomplishment for the 89th Congress. We proved that we could pass a dynamic program of constructive legislation when the country as a whole is very prosperous. This disproves the views of many political observers that when people are contented they lack the incentive to change. Americans, I am glad to say, are more rational and mature than their critics have been willing to grant.

There is no doubt but that the fiscal and monetary policies carried out by the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations have helped to create this prosperity which has helped so many people and which, incidentally, has helped this program to be enacted. We are now in the 58th month of advancing prosperity. We are producing goods and services at the gigantic rate of \$677 billion per year, an increase of \$174 billion over 1960 and \$122 billion in constant purchasing power in 1958 dollars. This is a real growth rate of 25 percent in five years—almost the highest in history—and almost twice that of the previous eight years. On a per capita basis it was at least five times as great.

Unemployment has gone down from 5.6 percent to 4.4 percent. Weekly earnings in manufacturing have risen from \$90 to \$108. Corporate profits before taxes have risen from \$50 billion in 1960 to a \$74 billion annual rate. This is a 48 percent gain. If the cynics had been right, this tremendous prosperity would have lulled people to sleep and deadened any desire for improvement.

Much Left To Be Done

We should not be content for there is much left to be done. There is need for the further purification of our air and water, for recreational space for which saving the Indiana Dunes and the development of numerous recreational facilities inside Illinois are paramount, the passage of proposals to help consumers and to raise the ethical level of selling such as my Truth-in-Lending bill and Senator Hart's Truth-in-Packaging bill. Especially, we must not forget the 35 to 40 million poor people in our country. We must try to rescue as many of these people from poverty as we possible can.

I am delighted with our record this year and I hope very much that you approve of both the legislation we passed and the part I have played in bringing it about, both this year and in the years when a small band of us developed these issues and kept them alive.



After talking with you it occurred to me that a more orderly description of events might be helpful should your office get a call from Jim Ronan, Illinois Democratic Chairman.

On December 8, Senator Douglas' office said that the DNC had contacted a Chicago committeeman to determine if I voted in the '60 election.

Jim Ronan, State Democratic Chairman, apparently interpreted the DNC query as a request for political clearance and called Senator Douglas to see if he had sponsored me. Douglas knew nothing of the appointment and, at first, thought Commerce was trying to sneak through an appointment. Senator Douglas has since been informed that no one was claiming Illinois as a political base, that I had been a resident of Michigan and had merely lived in Illinois during law school, and that the contact was a routine DNC vote check, not a request for political clearance.

I am not certain, however, if or how Jim Ronan will respond to the DNC call, or to whom. Accordingly the following information may be helpful should your office get a call from Ronan:



Dear Mr. Johnson:

The Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence Seaway link the heartland of America with the ocean highways of the world, bringing low-cost water transportation to the front door of the nation's largest manufacturing and farming area. Products of factory and farm, valued at over \$1.3 billion dollars, move through the Lakes and the Seaway to overseas customers each year to earn foreign exchange for the nation. Over \$400 million of imports -- principally raw materials for the heartland factories -- come directly to the factories of the area via the ocean, Seaway and Lakes.

Practically all of these cargoes move on foreign flag ships. American ships do not serve the Lakes even though subsidized to operate at the same cost as their foreign competitors. They have a good, selfish reason for their lack of interest in the vast flow of commercial cargo moving competitively through this area: Government cargoes reserved for American ships and moving at higher, taxpayer-subsidized rates are available to them without competitive effort. These cargoes must come to them and it is more convenient for these shipping lines to wait for these cargoes on the Eastern Seaboard. It is, however, considerably more costly for the taxpayer, who pays for an expensive overland haul which would not be necessary if the cargo moved through Great Lakes ports.

We feel that this is an undesirable state of affairs. First, from the taxpayer's point of view, the government should be getting its shipping services at the lowest feasible rate. From our interest in the health of the nation's economy, we feel that subsidized American ships should be competing for a part of the commercial cargo moving out
