Dear Mr. President:

This is my first attempt to communicate with the President of the United States; but I feel that this is the only way to get action in this case. I feel that a grave injustice is being done and that something must be done about it if there is any concern for what is fair and equitable left in the citizens and politicians of this country.

The issue is regarding a neighbor of mine, M/Sgt. Carl W. Bergstedt, RA 39 706 243, who was stationed at Fort Ord, California and is now enroute to Veitnam. M/Sgt. Bergstedt was due to retire from the U. S. Army with 20 years service on November 31, 1963; but he was put on orders for Veitnam and essentially forced to re-enlist. He desires to retire and has requested to be released through the proper channels to no avail. When he suggested that he could retire anyway, he was informed that he would be reduced one pay grade and his retirement benefits cut.

This - to me - indicates that we, the United States Government and its citizens, are welching on an agreement which we made with this man when he enlisted. I feel that it is completely without regard for individual rights. Sgt. Bergstedt has lived up to his agreement completely. He has served in World War II and the Korean Conflict and has over 25 months of combat time. This is why he was picked to go. They want "experienced men". I feel, and so do other neighbors, that we made a contract with this man that we are not living up to, and that Sgt. Bergstedt should be allowed to retire and live the rest of his life in peace with his family. He has a wife and five small children. No man is indispensable. There are many others who might not be as "experienced" as Sgt. Bergstedt who still have most of their enlistment left to do who could and should be assigned in his place.

This is in further reply to your letter, addressed to the President, in behalf of Master Sergeant Carl W. Bergstedt.

There is no record in Headquarters, Department of the Army of the receipt of an application for retirement submitted by Sergeant Bergstedt.

Under current regulations, an enlisted member who is alerted for overseas movement may submit an application for retirement and be removed from the overseas levy, provided he has completed at least 19 years and 6 months of active military service. Sergeant Bergstedt was alerted for overseas movement in June 1963. Since he had not completed the required years of active service, he was not eligible to apply for retirement.

Current regulations further provide that an enlisted member serving in an overseas command may apply for retirement to be effective upon completion of at least 12 months in the oversea assignment, or in the case where dependents traveled overseas at Government expense, the member may be retired after he has served a minimum of 12 months from the date of arrival of the dependents.

That Killing Pace

HE OLD, old pro spoke the unspoken words that have become a tacit preamble to every discussion of Presidential politics in Washington:

"The only thing that can beat Lyndon is another heart

attack."

This caveat has been thrust into the forefront of the capital's collective intelligence, of course, by the frenetic—some days the suicidally frenetic—pace that is set by President Johnson. And adding to the growing mood of disquiet is the gaunt, spectral figure of 72-year-old John W. McCormack, Speaker of the House and the man next in line to succeed to the Presidency should Johnson not survive to com-

plete his term of office.

The White House insists that the President's health is excellent, that he has made a complete recovery from the heart attack he suffered on July 2, 1955, and that he comfortably tolerates the brutal regimen he has imposed upon himself. So far as the casual observer can tell, all this is true. But it is also true that younger men with no history of heart disease are experiencing a great deal of trouble in matching Johnsons' pace. Press associations, for example, have had to double-team the President in an attempt to keep the world informed of the dizzying round of his activities.

The undercurrent of concern regarding the prospective life span of the President is not a partisan monopoly. Thoughtful men in the world of government and finance are appalled at the convulsion that might take place if fate de-

creed a Johnson-McCormack transition,

Even though Johnson was well and favorably known to much of the nation's business community, panic selling struck the New York Stock Exchanges within minutes of President Kennedy's death. They were closed before great harm could be done. By Monday's reopening Johnson's deft touch had reassured the world, and industrial averages scored record gains. Few people believe the same virtuoso performance could be expected from Speaker McCormack, who outside of Washington and Boston is known only as a shadowy wraith who sits silently in the background when the President addresses Congress.

President Johnson's health is going to be a campaign Issue. (Indeed, is one already if one credits the carefully planted rumors that filter back and forth across Washington.) With his medical history, health would be an issue if he were as phlegmatic as a turtle. But the image he has created of a man moving in the frantic, jerky, uncoordinated manner of a cowboy in an ancient movie is certain to under-

score the health issue.

His medical record is well known. He has had two kidney stone attacks, as well as a heart seizure described as 'moderately severe." The first kidney stone occurred in 1948, and was removed at Mayo Clinic without surgery. A more serious attack took place in January, 1955, and required an operation. Kidney stones tend to recur and are frequently

accompanied by excruciating, disabling pain.

Heart attacks also tend to recur, but the chances of recurrence diminish with the passage of time. So far as tests can discern, Johnson's heart is normal. His weight, which dropped to 176 immediately after his heart attack, is over 200 now, although how far over the White House won't say. He has always been a poor sleeper, and insists that five or six hours are sufficient to meet his needs. He swims at least once a day, usually naps after lunch, and recently has taken to an occasional round of golf.

But otherwise, he is going at a dead run for upward of 18 to 20 hours a day—endlessly meeting people, telephoning, cajoling, head-knocking, soaking up information, presiding at sessions where grave and dangerous questions are weighed, and altogether being the most extraordinary political animal

the country has seen in generations.

But what's worrying Washington is the uneasy suspicion he may turn out to be the sort of animal the Tyrannosaurus Rex was—a fearsome critter that carried everything before it but which, regrettably, contained the built-in seeds of its own extinction.





My dear Mr. President:

I recently received a disturbing letter from my girlfriend who is living in Sauisiana. As both our father's are in the U.S. a.f., we have had a chance to travel around. We met each other while stationed in Jokyo, Japan, and since June, we both have been in the states.

The life of an Air Force kid, while living in a foreign country, is different; in respects to living with his fellow humans. Somehow we are capable of finding little fault with those whose skin happens to be black. To one finds it a sin if you wish to be good friends with a negro. What's most important, and what all this amounts to, is that we are able to commute with one another while at the same time find goodness too.

Since my girlfriend, Janet, and I have been back, the situation of the racial problem has, to a certain degree, exploded in our faces. A certain problem arose, and this is it as it

was told to me by Janet:

el wasn't going to ask you for advice, but things have gotten out of hand. I had forgotten about how people in the South feel about the matter. There is a negro fire that rides the same bus I do. I have talked with her several times. She is always so happy, no matter what some people call her. We had a test, and she came in and sat down beside me. There was no other seat. el answered some questions for her that she needed to know about the test. She is a very sweet and intelligent girl. Because I talked to her, some boys started calling her names. after the that, I could hear them calling to me; "That girl is a Nigger lover." you can SEE how much this has upset me. I tried to forget about them, but I couldn't; because they just kept pointing at me, repeating those horrible words along with others. ... Johnny, let's never live in the South; I hate this place.

Sir, what am I to tell her? Would it be wrong to advise her to do what she feels right? Sell her to ignore the boys? I realize they're only boys, but she had more to say.

many of the teachers here are just as bad.

my history teacher call them "Niggers' and

talks badly of them. A friend I met, told

me his teachers are the same way.

One may excuse the students, though I never will, but to have teachers to influence the bad to worse, is most unforpivable.

Janet is trying to hun from the problem, but by the time either of us should be ready to marry and at the rate the racial problem is multiplying, we would have to move to a foreign country.

I had a girlfriend that I met in Jokyo, and when she came back to the United States, all that she ever found good in it; all the good Christian love she had for people, soon left. All her letters spoke of hate. My particular feelings were much the same.

Sir, perhaps I'm just a frustrated person, trying to find some answers that can't be answered, however, I have trust that you will personally help me out. I felt you were the only person I could get correct answers from.

There is a AF housing regulation that says that dependents can stay in base housing 5 months after sponsor leaves on a PCS move, but this does not apply to this base. I am including a suggestion that I have forwarded to the Wing Commander of this base. They have buildings that they cannot use because they say that they ho supplies to fix them up. I offered to do it myself, I will do anything to get to give my son the education that he is entitled to and I think that if I am willing to sacrafice something as precious as my husband's company and guidance for 4 months that this Air Force after 19½ years of good service and dedication should make some allowance and I would appreachate any help that you can give me.

It seems to me that if we are forced to leave base quarters, that the hardship on our family would be much more than the 700 families as stated in the Base Commander's letter—they get an allowance to subsidise their housing allowance besides their overseas pay, because I want my son to finish his education I am penalised by loss of overseas pay and extra allowance as soon as my sponsor leaves this area.

One more thing before I conclude, I came from Toul-Rosierres AB and I know that you heard about that base and the surrounding area and the housing problems we had there. I lived 32 kilometers from the base in St. Mihiel, France. I spent 13 months on the French economy and I know that the personel here have a good assignment. According to every other base and fort that we have been assigned to, time in rank and in the area count towards getting into housing. I spent my time on the economy and I don't think that I should have to go back. Finally in conclusion I would like you to know that this is the first time in our service career that I have ever written a Letter to anyone to complain and I have met some fine people and worked under some good officers, but for a Commander of a base as large and as important as Wheelus AB is, to sign a letter with erroneous information such as the one he sent to me, something should be done to correct it.



We were unfortunate enough to lose our equity in apartment buildings thru foreclosure due to the overbuilding condition in southern California on which we had been taking depreciation—for nine years-this resulted in an income tax bill for 1965 of \$6630 (a staggering amount by our standards) for which we didn't have the money. Hovever, we have been in close contact with the IR office at 421 S Glendora Ave, West Covina (Collector C.R. Gray), being responsible citizens we have been paying regularly each month to reduce this debt.

Yesterday, we receive a call from collector Gray demanding the \$2200 outstanding right now, stating he didn't care where the money came from just so he got it-he furthur stated when told we were driving our old model cars without insurance so we could pay as much as possible as well as keeping our 1967 taxes current "he couldn't care less" as long as he got his money.

We have 2 children a girl 15 and a boy $8\frac{1}{2}$ both these children need health and dental care plus food and clothing and so do we in order that we can work to pay our income tax. I am working more hours than I feel is right for me to be away from my children but I felt by the end of 1967 we would have paid our obligation to the government then I will quit and again be home with my children who need me.

I am writing to you Mr. Johns On because I am angry as I feel injustices are being brought to bear on us in spite of our being responsible Collector Gray is trying to get us in deeper than we are by forcing us into getting a high interest loan to pay him and has threatened to sell our home in order to satisfy this debt which we are dilligently reducing every month. Is this the kind of treatment you think we should have if so, disregard this letter.

Subject: National Recognition for a Texas Rero

Sir:

A fan of yours claims this is just the kind of thing you might do, so after thinking about it a long time I would like to suggest that before you leave the White House you arrange some sort of national recognition for John Howard Criffin, formerly of Mansfield, Texas. Something like the Congressional Medal of Honor would not be too much.

It would have to be awarded posthumously. I understand he died from the effects of what he did-perhaps cancer.

To appreciate the bravery in what Griffin did, one has only to reflect upon it for awhile. The importance of what he did for — is having— his country and the impact he had/can be seen in his report— published under the title Black Like Me— and the fact that in the first four years of publication it had gone through two editions and the second edition through 16 printings.

Granting this recognition to Griffin might not win you any votes in Texas, judging from the treatment he received at home 8 years ago.

But he is bound to be judged by history more favorably, and there would be poetic justice in having it come from another great Texan of his RECEIVED own time.
