The son of a close personal friend of mine, Mr. Jay Arthur Cary, is competing for an appointment to the Air Force Academy.




On March 3, 1964, President Johnson signed Bill HR 7356 increasing the strength of the United States Military Academy and the United States Air Force Academy.



Dear General Warren:

He or she might be the president of the student body, of the senior class, or of the undergraduate council, or a person who holds no high student office. I want to leave to you the designation of the fine young man or woman whom you feel would well represent your student body.

Would you be good enough to select this student? I would also like to request that you consider this letter an invitation to the White House for the young man or woman and that you will so inform the student. He will receive a formal invitation a little later. I am assuming that the expenses of the trip to Washington will be borne by the student, his campus organization, or his college.


Please inform me by telegram at the earliest possible time the name and address of the student you designate.

The Veterans Affairs Committee recently approved an increase in pensions, income limitations and compensations to meet the needs of the increased cost of living.

It is understood that you reacted unfavorably to the recommendations of this Committee.

Mr. President, we respectfully submit that it would not be rhetorical to state that millions of World War 1 veterans and their dependents are, today, subsisting on or under the marginal \$3,000.00 per year income which you declared to be a Poverty Area of existence, being sorely in need of upward revision. These veterans are not young men but human beings, far beyond the biblical three score ten and far over the employable age and, because of these twilight years, guarantee that they will not be a monetary burden on the United States taxpayer for too many more days.

Mr. President, we earnestly beseech you to please, please reconsider your position relative to this worthy Legislative effort. You have never failed in the past to hear the plaint and come to the aid of the distressed worthy poor and needy; the Veterans of World War 1 of the USA, Inc; plead with you now to hear their voices, too, and they do further respectfully ask that you give additional consideration to the provisions as contained in the recommendations of the Veterans Affairs Committee, giving your Presidential blessing to this most worthwhile measure.
