organized groups to do anything about it. Several years ago I called together a group of Negro women from all over the country. We talked for two days, and then drew up a "Call to Action for the Negro Community." It was our idea that the Negro community itself should be concerned and take action.

We presented our suggestions to both the National Urban League and the NAACP. While their executives were in sympathy with our idea, their Boards felt that they could not, in effect, admit that there were social lags in the Negro community. Two years ago we again conferred with Whitney Young and Roy Wilkins but no plan such as we envisioned came forth. And so we have continued to meet and talk and carry on small projects, which are as "a drop in the bucket."

To know that our President has identified the problem and its causal factors, spoken out on them and plans action is beyond our greatest hopes and dreams.

Dr. L. M. Polon called and said as follows:

"I know how rushed you are, but wanted to get this message to Walter. You know that during the Kadauver campaign I was in touch with Roy Wilkins and in 1960 when they had their conference I talked to Wilkins and finally convinced him that he should be friendly towards hir. Johnson. Now the thing of it is—I convinced him that hir. Johnson was going to be in this position. So far the new Precident has had quite a few conference and apparently there have been no colored people in any of the conferences. I just don't think it is wise to put them on the tail and of the conferences. At least Wilkins or some of the others should be taid that they will be included in some of the conferences and that they will be called. This would establish a friendly relationship if they thought they were on the schedule to be called.

"I have direct information that they would valcome such a gesture and would like to be called in on some. You know they have a hig five who are very influential.--Wilkins, Randelph, King, Whitney Young (with Urban Longue) and Mr. Farmer of CORE. Randelph would be doubly advantageous because he is the recognized leader of organized labor."

As leaders of the principal organizations concerned with the grave problems of race relations facing the nation in this time of crisis, through the Council for United Civil Rights Leadership, we desire to offer our assistance in every way that you may find useful. We are aware of the huge burden that has suddenly been cast upon you, and seek to be of greatest possible assistance in this time of change.

Numerous questions in the area of our concern will be presented to you in the months to come, and we seek to serve the country in their resolution. Some of these issues, however, have a particular urgency calling for early decision.

For example, it may be useful in the very near future to discuss questions of pending civil rights legislation. Related to this legislation, and also of high interest to the country, is the position of the United States on the pending sit-in cases now before the Supreme Court, in which the Solicitor General has been ordered to file a brief setting forth the views of the United States within approximately the next three weeks. - Mississippi Kids disappearance -- This might be a good group to tell the impressive list of specifics undertaken: sending of FBI agents, making available of military equipment and facilities, contacts with Senators and Governor, 4 or 5 hours meeting yesterday on this, the dispatch of Allen Dulles, issuance of two statements yesterday, one at the press conference and one in the evening, meeting with the parents of the missing boys.
- 3. Civil Rights -- Now that the national consensus has been made clear, there will be a bill, and the Administration will do everything in its power to encourage the spirit of compliance and cooperation. The NAACP can help, by the type of statements that Roy Wilkins has made in the last few days.
- 4. Education and School Dropouts -- More doors are open to Negroes than ever before in our history, but the young people must understand that in order to pass through them they must be qualified. Sponsorship of programs to keep our young people in school and trained to the limit of their ability is an Administration goal and one in which the NAACP could be most helpful.

Dear President Johnson:

I understand that the term of office of Mr. Boyd Leedom of the National Labor Relations Board will expire in December 1964. During the time that Mr. Leedom has been a Board member, the Board has repudiated its earlier acceptance of "separate but equal" segregated unions. The Board has now made meaningful the duty of fair representation which accompanies the grant of statutory powers under the National Labor Relations Act, and has ruled that unions which enter into contracts that in effect discriminate against Negro workers in the terms and conditions of employment, commit an unfair labor practice which can be remedied by Board action.

We wish to commend Mr. Leedom for his dedicated service on the Board and transmit our hope that he will be reappointed. If, however, a new appointment is planned, we hope that it will not be someone whose past decisions and statements of policy would commit the Board to a reversal of the gains made in the field of race relations and trade unionism.

In this connection, we particularly oppose the candidacy of Mr. Ivar Peterson, who as an NLRB trial examiner wrote the Intermediate Report in the case of Local Union No. 12, United Rubber, Cork, Linoleum and Plastic Workers of America and Gadsden Business League. This union declared that it would "actively oppose" any move by the Goodyear Tire Company to integrate its plant facilities in Gadsden, Alabama. Mr. Peterson in his

SUBJECT: Meeting with Negro Leadership. Oct 1536 AM

After Jack Valenti told me of your desire to meet this Thursday with the Negro leadership, the attached letter from the Council for United Civil Rights Leadership came to my attention. My original intention was to invite the 6 leaders that we have generally regarded as the "big 6". In the face of this specific request, it seems to me desirable to extend the meeting to include the 2 extra members of this Leadership: Jack Greenberg of the NAACP Legal Education Fund and Miss Dorothy Height of the National Council of Negro Women. This will meet their request for a meeting with you, and I am advised that it will not in any way commit you in the future to include these extra people in your own consultations. In addition, it will permit you to refer to the meeting held at the request of the group or, in the alternative, to be one called at your own initiative. I have checked this out with Roy Wilkins, Louis Martin and Burke Marshall, and all agree that it would be desirable to have the entire group. I have not yet called Greenberg or Miss Height and will do so tomorrow if this meets with your approval.

Wiley Branton, the Executive Director of this Council, is a Negro lawyer from Arkansas who has spent the last 6 months or so on the voter registration program of the Southern Regional Council in Atlanta. He is exceedingly well regarded by all who know him, and Burke Marshall has suggested that you may wish to extend the invitation to him as well. I do not know Branton personally, but he is apparently first rate. If you wish to include him, I can call him tomorrow as well.

You may also wish to give some thought to having a brief session with Nick Katzenbach, Burke Marshall, Louis Martin and myself prior to the session with the outside people. If you do, I will ask Jack Valenti if he can set up a convenient time.

Although the name of A. Phillip Randolph does not appear on the letter, Roy Wilkins advises me that Randolph is now a member of the Council, and Mr. Randolph has already agreed to attend the Thursday meeting.

SUBJECT: Notes for Discussion with Martin Luther King.

I have not yet been able to reach Roy, Wilkins (although a call is still pending), but wanted to note the following points that may be worth considering in any discussion with Dr. King regarding Cabinet and other high Administration appointments.

- 1. Past Performance -- The appointment of Carl Rowan,
 Federal District Judge Leon Higginbotham of Philadelphia, Mrs.
 Frankie Freeman to the Civil Rights Commission, Mrs. Patricia
 Harris to the Puerto Rico Status Commission, Lisle Carter to a
 key post in the Poverty Program, Negro Ambassadors, Hobart
 Taylor to the White House staff -- all make it clear that qualified
 Negroes can look forward to sympathetic treatment from the President.
- 2. Cabinet Vacancies -- Any outside discussion that indicates that the Negro Leadership is pressuring for a Negro in the Cabinet harms the cause. If there is such an appointment, it is tainted by charges that the President is succumbing to pressure; if there is none at any particular point in time, Negro community is unfairly let down and believe they have been treated harshly. The request for a new Department of Housing and Urban Development is the only one contained in the State of the Union message, and there is an excellent chance that this will be approved by the Congress. Should that happen, Dr. Weaver who has demonstrated his capacity would certainly be one of the top contenders for the new Cabinet post.
- 3. Whitney Young -- Nobody in a position of authority has indicated to Whitney or to any one else for that matter that he is being considered for a Cabinet post. Obviously all who know him have a high regard for his ability and, in fact, he was offered the Deputy Director of the Poverty Program, but declined it. (I am

Mr. President:

Last month in a stirring message to the Congress you called for the enactment of legislation to deal with the nation's problems and future needs in the field of housing. The message reflected your concern not only for the growing needs of our rapidly expanding population, but also for the development of communities which would enhance the quality and dignity of men's lives.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People supports your determination to improve the quality and expand the supply of housing for American families. We are concerned, however, that the government is about to embark on a dramatic new national housing effort without having fulfilled its obligation to eliminate discrimination in all of its housing program activities.

Discrimination and segregation in housing lie at the very root of the wide range of problems which beset the Negro and form the basis for his struggle for full equality of opportunity. Segregated communities in the nation's metropolitan centers continue to expand with the growing urbanization of our society. These racially concentrated areas not only reinforce de facto segregation in schools and public facilities, but also seriously jeopardize progress in other areas of civil rights. It would be tragic, therefore, to undertake the renewal of our communities and to create new towns and cities on this decaying foundation of segregation and discrimination.

Two and one-half years ago--in November 1962--an action was taken by President John F. Kennedy which represented the first step toward achieving full equality of opportunity in the field of housing. The occasion was the issuance of Executive Order 11063, establishing a policy of nondiscrimination in certain federally-aided housing programs. That Order must now be expanded to cover the entire supply of housing affected by federal assistance or regulations. In the light of advances made by your administration in other areas of civil

MAY 1 O 1965 CENTRAL, ELL rights dependent on residential freedom and mobility, prompt expansion of the Executive Order would be timely and well received.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, therefore, strongly recommends that you expand Executive Order 11063. We are particularly concerned that the Order be extended to include the following:

- 1. Prohibit discrimination by federally-aided banks and lending institutions, including commercial and national banks and savings and loan associations which are chartered, regulated or insured by agencies of the federal government.
- 2. Extend the Order retroactively to include all federally-aided housing built prior to November 1962.
- 3. Rescind existing administrative regulations and procedures which have resulted in excluding certain types of housing such as FHA and VA one and two family owner-occupied homes.
- 4. Give the President's Committee on Equal Opportunity in Housing specific authority and broader responsibility to insure vigorous and effective implementation.

With this action, the major gap in the federal policy of nondiscrimination will have been closed by your administration, and responsible governmental and private leadership can proceed to build the kind of society that we all hope to achieve.

Dear Roy: Wilkins

The President has asked me to reply to your telegram to him of April 16, concerning the anti-poll tax provision of the pending Voting Rights Bill. At the outset, I assume that it is clear that there are no differences between you and the Administration concerning the necessity of effectively and quickly eliminating the poll tax with respect to local and state elections. The question is solely one of the best route to the objective.

You are, I am sure, familiar with the letter which Attorney General Katzenbach addressed to Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield on May 7, 1965 (111 Cong. Rec. 9587-9588, May 7, 1965). In that letter the Attorney General pointed out that the Mansfield-Dirksen substitute offers the best opportunity for prompt elimination of the poll tax. He described this proposal as "a surer and swifter path to the goal we all seek, eradication of the poll Tax." The Attorney General's letter was written in the context of comparison with the Kennedy Amendment which the letter characterized as containing practical and constitutional risks not presented by the Mansfield-Dirksen proposal.

Obviously, lawyers may and do differ with the Attorney General's conclusions as to which proposal is preferable. There can, however, be no doubt of the devotion of the President and his Administration to eradication of the poli tax as quickly and as effectively as possible. He has asked me to express to you the hope that, whatever differences there may exist concerning detailed means of achieving this end among those dedicated to ending racial and other types of discrimination at the polls, all who are devoted to these objectives will not be diverted from making every effort to secure early passage of a thoroughly effective voting rights bill.

MEMORANDUM TO

THE PRESIDENT

During the past two weeks I have had occasion to talk to three rather large and representative groups of business people and to engage in intimate conversation.

- 1. They continue to support our policy in Viet Nam but are worried about the "guns or butter" conflict. They need a little current reassurance that the economy can stand this effort.
- 2. I have had a long talk with Dr. John Holloman of New York, the newly elected President of the National Medical Association, the Negro group. They continue to support the Medicare Program and there is no trouble with them on any matters foreign and domestic.
- 3. The Conference on Equal Employment Opportunity came off very well and there was widespread and serious agreement with your speech.
- 4. I have talked with Roy Wilkins who tells me that a considerable amount of his time is taken up with keeping the "peace in Viet Nam movement" from becoming too big a factor in the civil rights movement. This brings up a conversation that I recently had with Simeon Booker of Jet who is just back from Viet Nam. He mought that if the Negro population was able to better identify itself with the struggle in Viet Nam, this movement would lose ground. He recommended that some publicity be given to Negro heroes in Viet Nam in order to counteract any feeling that they are not involved. This may be a worthwhile suggestion to consider.
- 5. I have talked with Victor Reisel who is just back from South America. He says that the best thing we have going for us there is the Poverty Program which creates a very favorable impression down there. He is a little worried about your image and feels that with the exception of El Salvador and Brazil the Embassies are not working on it hard enough. He feels that we have very broad support among the Latin Americans so far as Viet Nam is concerned and that at heart only Leone in Venezuela and Burnham in British Guinea are really opposed to our action in Santa Domingo.

September 1, 1965

Dear Roy:

Thank you for your warm message on the bill creating the Department of Housing and Urban Development. It can indeed be a very significant development in the long range growth and improve - ment of the Nation. Your support and encouragement has, of course, been of tremendous assistance.

I was most touched by the copy of the letter from Airman Wright and in the event you write to him I would appreciate your mentioning the fact that I have seen a copy of his letter and thought that it was an inspiring and patriotic statement.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

Late Saturday afternoon I met with some of the civil rights leaders to discuss primarily voter registration. Attending the meeting were Roy Wilkins, Bayard Rustin, Dorothy Height, Marion Berry (SNCC) and James Farmer.

In general, the meeting went well. They stated that the appointment of federal examiners was helpful in terms of encouraging Negro registration and assisting them in their registration activities; but, somewhat surprisingly, they agreed with me that this was not sufficient reason under the law for me to designate examiners. We had a frank and candid discussion which I thought helpful, and I concluded that these people, by and large, were less critical on the caminer point than people like Joe Rauh.

They acknowledged difficulties with an effective voter registration drive, pointing out that it was more difficult for them to get volunteer help in the fall and winter than in the summer and that they were short on finances and paid personnel. They also said it was extremely difficult for them to raise money for this purpose since contributors felt it might be used to pay other expenses of the national organization or to encourage demonstrations. They felt that the Democratic Party and the labor movement should be encouraged to contribute for this purpose.

I suggested that the Voter Education Project of the Southern Regional Council might be a more acceptable channel for funds from private foundations, and they generally agreed that this would be true. Between 1962 and 1964 about \$400,000 was spent on V.E.P., and the cost of registration was about 50¢ a head. I think we could do at least as well today.

I emphasized to the group the importance of an organization at the local level because the problem is not merely the number of Negroes registered but of continuing to get these people actively participating in

Last Saturday afternoon Harry McPherson, Clifford Alexander and I met with Morris Abram, Bill Coleman, Berl Bernhard and the leaders of the major civil rights organizations. Present were: Roy Wilkins. Whitney Young, James Farmer, Dorothy Height, Reverend Abernathy and Walter Fauntroy (representing King), Bayard Rustin (representing Phil Randolph) and Marion Berry representing SNCC.

The purpose of the meeting was to let this leadership group know where we stood and to insure that they did not either take away control of the conference from your designated co-chairmen or withdraw their support from it. The consensus of all who were present was that the discussion went well and that the conference co-chairmen and their small staff have done an effective job thus far in setting up the November 17-18 meeting.

As could be expected, Roy Wilkins was the most impressive and was of great assistance in establishing a total atmosphere of cooperation and understanding. We were a little apprehensive prior to the meeting that Rustin may have wanted to influence the emphasis and direction of the conference and that perhaps he had persuaded the organization leadership that Abram and Coleman were on the wrong track. This did not materialize and Rustin was quite cooperative, did not dominate the meeting in view of the strongleadership that was physically present, and did not evidence any dissatisfaction with our explanation of what had been done thus far.

Following our meeting, which ended at 5:30, the group had a session with the Attorney General in his office on the voter registration situation. Although I was not present, Nick Katzenbach reports that it was also a constructive meeting.

President Johnson has asked me to reply personally to your recent telegrom concerning the declaration of independence by Rhedesia.

The policy of the United States toward Southern Rhedesia was examelated by Ambassader Goldberg in his speech to the United Sations Security Council on Nevember 12, when he amounced that we would not recognize the present illegal regime and that we were taking action as follows:

- (1) We are immediately instituting a congrehensive subarge on shipment of all arms and military equipment to Southern Rhodosia.
- (2) The United States Government will suspend action on all applications for United States Government leans and credit guarantees to Southern Rhodosia and will make it clear to any potential American investors in Southern Rhodosia the risks which we perceive in any further investment of American capital.
- (3) The United States is immediately suspending, under authorization granted to the President in recent congressional legislation, the sugar quote for Southern Resides.
- (4) We will discourage all American private travel to Southern Rhodosia.

In addition,

Mr. Roy Wilkins, 20 West 40th Street, New York, New York. In addition, we have withdrawn our Consul General from Salisbury as a further sign of our refusal to recognize the illegal regime.

We are following developments in Southern Rhodesia with the element attention. In continuing our support of the British, we are considering and will continue to consider, all means of restoring a normal situation in this central African colony and go on from there in striving to help all the people of Southern Rhodesia to achieve a government acceptable to the unjority.

The front page of the New York Times today had a distressing story concerning a policy statement of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. SNCC urged all Americans to seek work in the civil rights movement as a "valid alternative to the draft".

Lee White, Louis Martin and I have discussed some of the actions which might be taken to negate the impact of this story. Louis talked with Roy Wilkins, who was distressed at the story and is to meet with Whitney Young this afternoon. There is some chance, Louis feels, that some members of the Big Six will publicly disassociate themselves from the SNCC policy statement. Louis also talked to the Negro Publishers Association and has the feeling that they will strongly denounce the SNCC statements in their editorial columns. Another possible externative might be to have the six Negro Congressmen issue a statement expressing the wholehearted support of the Negro people for our actions in Vietnam.

The elected officials would be in a far better position to call themselves representatives of the Negro people than John Lewis, the head of SNCC.

The most difficult part of the equation is what Martin Luther King will do next. Louis is going to try to talk with Andrew Young, who is part of King's organization, to impress upon him the seriousness of the Lewis statement and the over-all negative consequences of it for the civil rights movement.

I talked to Roy Wilkins and Whitney Young for quite some time in Roy's office. The problem discussed was the need for a more intensive voter and registration drive in the South. We then canvassed the question of additional money from foundations. The following facts are now obvious.

- 1. All are more than keenly aware of the need.
- 2. The programs are on paper and could be put into effect if the money showed up.
- 3. There is no more money available in either organization for this purpose. (The NAACP is just about broke.) Too many contributors feel that the job is now completed.
- 4. While the Urban League has always had a more direct line to foundations than the NAACP, the League can not get any foundation money for this purpose. Whitney explained in detail the very excellent presentations which had been prepared, submitted and turned down.
- 5. The NAACP has also been working on foundations from Ford on down. Attached hereto is a copy of a typical recent foundation presentation.

Dr. L. M. (Mickey) Polan called from Huntington, West Virginia and wanted to pass along a few ideas for the President. He said as follows:

"In order to have peace, we are all going to have to work together. If China will not be in the lead, they should be encouraged to follow. A program should be established where men like Dr. King and Professor Calbraith are asked to use their talents to help the President bring peace. Invitations can be issued to thousands of foreign ledears to visit the United States this summer using as hosts the leaders of labor, industry, the professors, intellectuals, educators, etc. Not many of those invited will turn down such an invitation because of their knowledge and appreciation of our advanced position in all of these fields.

"We issue invitations to our Military Academies.
We should also issue invitations to our "peace" academies,
of which we have so many. Men like King and Galbraith are
out setting up splinter political power bases and their intention
is to use this against the President. They will use it if they
have to against him in order to become involved in our national
and international affairs. The intelligent thing to do is to get
these men to help us and they will welcome the opportunity and
to enlist their help in these programs rather than to keep them
outside of these programs. People like the American Medical





No one can any longer doubt or ignore the depth of crisis which today confronts Negro Americans struggling to enjoy full and equal citizenship in their native land. The year's events have piled confusion and uncertainty on underlying racial prejudices in the major-

This trend can be disastrous to the nation's, as well as the Negro's, welfare if it is not checked, if our forces are not rallied and if the hard, demanding job of building lasting public support is not pressed forward now. It can be worse than disastrous for the generation of younger Americans, white as well as black, who would then indeed face a future without viable idealism. Thousands of them have been personally involved in the civil rights movement over the last few years, many in situations involving hazardous confrontations. They are needed now more than ever before, in work which, while seeming more routine and less adventurous, is in many ways harder and more vital. They can be effectively drawn to these new tasks only if they have assurance that the adult world is solidly engaged to the same purpose.

Ninety years ago, this nation permitted the democratic promise of Emancipation to wither and die before a rampant reaction which condemned the Negro to segregation, disfranchisement, peonage and death. Then, as now, the voices of temporary liberalism sounded discouragement and disillusionment with the capacity of the freedmen for full citizenship. Then, as now, the South capitalized on Northern weariness with the "race problem" and was enabled to shut off the hope of freedom. But the "race problem" remained, and today we are paying for yesterday's default.

We are determined that this history shall not repeat itself and we call upon all our countrymen, black and white, of all faiths and origins, to move with us.

Bayard Rustin called today to request that the Freedom Budget be presented to the President. He said that the Budget is going to the printer now and will be signed by over 200 economists and leaders of religious, civil rights and labor organizations.

Bayard proposed that a group composed of Bishop O'Boyle, Arnold Goldman (head of several Jewish organizations). Roy Wilkins, Whitney Young, A. Philip Randolph, Martin Luther King, Jack Greenberg, Walter Reuther, the head of the Buildings Trade, or George Meany, and businessmen such as David Sarnoff, Irwin Miller, or Joseph Block, come to the White House and present the first report personally to the President with the attendant press coverage.

Enyard said that he would like to know what thance there would be of this, hopefully before Congress adjourned. (If he coes not present it to the President, it would be his desire to present it to Senators Kennedy and Javits-he has no commitment of any kind from them at the present time.)

The time of presentation could be before or after the election, or anytime we set. He said that it would be most helpful if the President were to do this as it would serve to solidify "sensible" civil rights groups, labor organizations and religious organizations around a concrete proposal.

Also, he said that Randolph had always gone out of his way to support the President. In the presentation, as Bayard saw it, the group would indicate that this report emerged from the White House Conference.

I told him that we would need to have some copies of the Report, which he promised to send me. I told him also that we would at some point get back to him.

I think it would be a good idea when we have the reports to send them to Charles Schultze and Gardner Ackley for their comments. If we can defer giving Bayard an answer until after the Congress adjourns, I think we will be in a batter position to judge the pros and cons.

- (3) IN DOING SO, IT WILL NOT BE ENOUGH MERELY TO SEND UP A BILL AND WORK FOR ITS PASSAGE.
- (4) WHAT IS REQUIRED IS A CHANGE IN RULE 22. IF THE RULE IS NOT CHANGED, THERE IS NO CHANCE OF PASSING A MEANINGFUL CIVIL RIGHT'S BILL INCLUDING HOUSING. LOSING AGAIN WOULD DO CUR COMMON CAUSE TERRIBLE DAMAGE, BY DESTROYING FAITH IN THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS.
- (5) YOU ARE URGED TO THROW THE WEIGHT OF THE ADMINISTRATION SEHIND THE EFFORT TO AMEND THE RULE.
- (6) THE LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE STILL SUPPORTS THE LEGISLATIVE DEFENT AS DISTINCT FROM THE EXECUTIVE ORDER ROUTE. WILKINS SO TOLD JAVITS LAST YEAR DURING THE HEARINGS. HE SEEMS TO IMPLY THAT MODERATE LEADERSHIP IS ON THE LINE IN THIS MATTER. IF IT AGAIN PROVES UNABLE TO PRODUCE A LAW, IT IS IN TROUBLE.

On Tuesday morning I learned that the Mational Committee Against Discrimination in Housing (of which I was a founder and one time President) had a press conference scheduled for three o'clock on Wednesday. I was advised that the purpose of that press conference would be to criticize racial aspects of the Administration's housing programs.

On Tuesday I secured a copy of the material to be disseminated at the press conference. This was in the form of a 32 page pamphlet containing some 17 charges and a critical essay. Since much of the detailed criticism was aimed at the Department of Housing and Urban Development, I felt that it was my responsibility to take issue with the Committee. This I did in the form of the attached statement. We took steps to make sure that this statement was in the hands of the press representatives at the same time that the Committee was promulgating its charges.

Although the Committee had made guite elaborate plans for this occasion, hiring a public relations firm and going to the expense of printing the pamphlet to which I alluded above, the press coverage was not notable. In most instances references were made to our rebuttal.

In order to minimize the after effects of this week's developments I have sent to Roy Wilkins and Whitney Young a copy of my statement and a confidential copy of the orders that I have issued to strengthen the Civil Rights program of the Department. Concurrently, I sent a copy of the statement to Mr. Randolph and Reverend King. I have talked

It is our understanding that the question of including the Economic Opportunity Commission in the department that would be created as a result of a merger of the present Labor and Commerce departments is still open.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People feels strongly that the Economic Opportunity Commission, in order to become increasingly effective in the area of racial discrimination in employment should remain an independent unit.

For example, under Title Seven of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, the Commission is charged specifically with policing the elimination of racial discrimination in the state employment services. These are financed by the federal government and administered by the Department of Labor.

If the Economic Opportunity Commission were also in the new department we believe a conflict of interest and authority would develop which would diminish the effectiveness of the Commission's work.

A factor in addition to the possible conflicts and the consequent vitiation of the Commission's efforts is contained in the persistent and often vociferous propaganda that the Administration is not pressing the enforcement of civil rights legislation once it is on the books.

Some of the propaganda goes beyond this untruth and asserts that persons in strategic posts within the Administration seek to devise structural and administrative methods to nullify.

administratively, the intended effect of civil rights legislation.

In the present atmosphere on the Hill and in certain areas of the country, as well as in the skepticism to be found in some sections of the Negro community, the folding of a policing agency, set up originally to report directly to the President, into a department among those it is supposed to police will be hailed as "proof" of the internal sabotage of civil rights legislation.

The conflicts would be quickly and plainly pointed out, as well as the sifting of procedures and reports through the Secretary of an involved department instead of directly to the President.

We suggest that the risk in the contemplated inclusion is too great for whatever benefits may accrue from administrative streamlining.

MR. PRESIDENT:

Attached is material Bill Crook from OEO forwarded. The first is from the Citizens' Crusade Against Poverty, and it attacks the White House for budget cuts in the War on Poverty. Walter Reuther is listed as Chairman of this organization, and its' Vice Chairmen include I. W. Abel, Dr. Martin Luther, King, Jr., Bayard Rustin, Roy Wilkins, and Whitney M. Young, Jr.

This article says we should have more and better employment programs and move ahead with OEO's basic programs. Programs such as operation Head Start should not be cut. It suggests that the Administration may not really be serious about supporting basic anti-poverty programs, especially among poor children. It is suggested that budget cuts could be made in areas other than the War on Poverty, e.g.: public information programs, farm subsidies, space and technology, atomic energy research, the SST program, and finally, the tax structure is attacked.

The OEO needs help now and it is suggested that the earmarking of \$35,000,000 for the "Hot Summer" programs was unwise and that the money should be available for use now. Secondly, OEO must obtain a supplemental appropriation without further delay, to include funds for Head Start and other summer programs. At a minimum there should be \$287 million.

Also attached is a news release from the "Ad Hoc Committee to Save the Children of Mississippi". This is dated February 19, and reports that thousands of poor people from Mississippi were to rally in Jackson this past Saturday (February 24th) to protest cuts in Head Start funds.

The meeting was to be convened by Mississippi State Representative Robert G. Clark, a Negro.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

I suggest that in your conference with Roy Wilkins you stress-to him your awareness that in order to have the Civil Rights bill enacted we must have two or three Republicans on the Rules Committee, or, failing that, sixty to seventy House Republicans on the discharge petition, plus sixty to seventy House Republicans for the bill on the Floor, and the necessary number of Senate Republicans to invoke cloture.

The immediate signal is to push House Republicans generally to sign the discharge petition which will be available on Monday, December 9th.

The Negro groups as such don't have the broad spread strength to get this done, but Wilkins should be urged to press the religious leaders involved with the Leadership group.

You should know too, that given signature of the discharge petition by a majority of the members of the House even immediately, it still would not be technically possible to put the bill on the Floor before December 23rd. This is true because following acquisition of a majority of signatures, the petition must lie for seven legislative days and then can be called up only on a second or fourth Monday.

SUBJECT: Support Statements by Private Groups on the Rat Extermination Act

At the request of Jim Gaither on Thursday, July 20th, I contacted the League of Women Voters with a request that they publicly criticize the House vote against the Rat Extermination Act of 1967. I also took the liberty of contacting other urban oriented organizations, with the following results:

- 1. The League of Women Voters, although favoring this type of bill, said that it could not comment officially because the item was not listed in the League's approved legislative calendar. No statement.
- 2. I took the initiative in contacting various national civil rights organizations through the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission:
 - a. The Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, headed by Roy Wilkins, said that it was issuing a statement condemning the House action.
 - b. The Urban League said that it was strongly considering issuing such a statement.
 - c. The NACP said the same.
- 3. The National Association of Homebuilders was contacted. They support the Act, and indicated they would include comments on the House action in their testimony before the Senate on Monday or Tuesday of next week.
- 4. The AFL-CIO legislative office was contacted. They also indicated that comments on the defeat of the bill would be included in their testimony before the Senate on Monday or Tuesday of next week.

Thank you for your telegram in behalf of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights urging me to use my full influence to have the Majority Leader bring the Civil Rights Protection Bill to the floor of the Senate.

You know that I share the Conference's sense of urgency with respect to this legislation. I recommended its passage last year as part of the proposed Civil Rights Act of 1966. Again this year I submitted a special message to the Congress urging the need for this legislation.

I am firmly committed to work for passage of the Civil Rights Protection Bill as well as other measures which I recommended to the Congress on February 15, 1967. At my request, the Attorney General and other members of my staff have been working with members of the Senate Judiciary Committee who are seeking to bring this bill before the Senate at this session of the Congress. I have spoken myself with the Majority Leader to urge that the bill be placed on the calendar for floor action at the earliest practicable time.

I will continue my efforts to strengthen our laws protecting all persons in the exercise of their rights established by the Congress and the Constitution.

My dear Mr. President:

As you know, the Civil Rights Protection Act (H.R. 2516), is the Senate's pending business.

Important as this measure is, its passage alone, will do little to correct the enormous injustices millions of Americans face in their daily lives. Accordingly, the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, in a statement adopted at its last legislative meeting, is urging Senators to add two other crucial civil rights bills to H.R. 2516: the bill to establish a National Fair Housing Law (S. 1358), and the bill to strengthen the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (S. 1308). The addition of these amendments will produce a single piece of legislation very close to the omnibus bill you sent to Congress last February. I am enclosing a copy of the statement.

I am sure you will exert all your influence to persuade the Senate to combine these three bills into one.

Bayard Rustin and Philip Randolph are publicly asking for Nixon and Rockefeller to state their position and come out in support of the measure. I also have Louis Lomax, the Negro author and TV personality on the West Coast who will be holding a press conference on the subject this afternoon, to put the spotlight on Nixon and Rockeller.

John Murphy, president of the National Newspaper Publishers Association, is sending wires in the name of the Association to senators and to Nixon and Rockefeller.

Rev. Fauntroy in the name of the Southern Leadership Conference is doing it also.

Clarence Mitchell says that Dirksen has not been able to swing his cronies Hruska and Curtis of Nebraska, although he has picked up a few votes. We are going back around on all of the leaders including religious and fraternal types to keep the heat on.

The questioners tried first to put a price tag on the panel proposals. Governor Kerner was emphatic that the housing proposals, for example, could not be priced out independently because they were quite similar to the President's programs already before the Congress. Senator Harris stressed that the report was meant to help the President get action, rather than striking off in other directions, and Wilkins voiced a similar view.



Frank Rose called to report on Kennedy's trip to the University of Alabama. He was highly irate that Kennedy had ursurped his brother's place on a student symposium and had not even bothered to notify Rose that he was doing so. His advance men arrived two days ahead of time preparing signs and organizing student demonstrations. Rose ordered the signs around the university Field House removed.

Rose said the response Kennedy received was nothing like he got three years ago. The older students particularly were not very responsive. He got a standing ovation at the end, but so did every other speaker. Roy Wilkins spoke in the evening (B. K. spoke in the afternoon) and said some very good things about President Johnson (Wilkins avoided seeing Kennedy and almost canceled his speech because of Kennedy). Melvin Belli and Russell Kirk both praised the Johnson stand in Vietnam.

Rose said Kennedy's delivery was emotional and preacherish. He seemed to be in a highly nervous condition.

Rose urged the President to stay steady in his course in Vietnam -but always indicating a willingness to review every possible alternative. He thought it might be helpful to send more advisors over there to provide independent assessments. He thinks you will win big.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

From: Ernest Goldstein

Mr. President:

During your meeting with Governor Harriman and Roy Wilkins the question was raised of Ralph McGill's participation in the work of the Human Rights Commission.

Your Executive Order establishing the Commission called for a Chairman and 10 members. All positions are full and it hardly seems necessary to amend the Executive Order.

Therefore, with the agreement of Governor Harriman and John Macy I recommend that you appoint McGill an "Associate Member." It is Governor Harriman's view that "consultant" would be undignified for McGill.



The 59th annual convention of the NAACP opens in a time of challenge for social justice in America.

In the past six decades, enormous strides have been taken toward giving real meaning to the 13th Amendment to our Constitution. The past five years alone have seen the adoption of powerful new measures of economic, educational, and political reform. For millions of Negro Americans, this has been a period of liberation and new hope.

For millions of others, however, the blight of poverty, sickness, discrimination and joblessness remains. For them, the successes of their fellow Negroes are small comfort.

Some of our countrymen seem to believe that enough, perhaps too much, has been done to try to end poverty and discrimination among us. Others angrily denounce our democratic system, and call for violent attacks upon its institutions -- even if those attacks bring harm and

suffering chiefly to the urban poor. There is a bitter divisiveness between these groups. Between them, sometimes in doubt and uncertainty, stands the great majority of our people, black and white.

Hence the challenge of these times is a challenge to progressives, who believe that liberty and order are not enemies; that democracy offers the possibility of progress, if good men and women unite to seek justice; that we cannot be at peace with ourselves until justice is done in every city, in every town, in every county seat and hamlet in our land; that there is -- beyond racism and self-interest, beyond ignorant hostility and sullen apathy -- a reservoir of good-will, of decency, of compassion in this country, from which we can sensibly take hope and renewed determination.

For six decades, the NAACP has carried the fight for social justice down a thousand rough roads -- sometimes alone, sometimes with the support of an aroused public opinion. I hope I have, in my time of leadership, helped to bring us nearer to ultimate triumph in that fight. I know I am proud to have fought alongside men and women such as you. If we both bear scars from the left and right, we bear

them in honor, and in the name of human dignity.

HELP BLOCK A NEW THREAT TO SCHOOL DESEGREGATION

Chairman Roy Wilkins has issued the following statement on behalf of the Conference:

"The House and Senate conferees who wrote a provision blocking school desegregation into the Labor-HEW appropriations bill have committed a disgraceful deed. A handful seeks to thwart the will of the majority.

"By overwhelming majority, Congress, in Civil Rights Act of 1964, ordered the desegregation of all public schools and in Title VI of the law, authorized the Federal government to withhold funds from school districts that wilfully persist in segregation.

"The conferees, with the notable exception of Senator Jacob Javits (R., N. Y.), who has refused to sign their report, are trying to put new obstacles in the way of desegregation. They are seeking to intimidate agencies of government, to nullify Title VI and to nullify the court decisions upholding the present administration of it. . Their report provides a new standard for measuring Congressional performance. Anyone who votes for it must bear with these men the shame of undermining the law and contributing to racial discord. We call upon all House and Senate members to reject the conference report and to refuse to accept it until it is free of provisions meant to perpetuate segregation.

"A vote for the conference report is a vote for segregated schools."

The restrictive provisions are, of course, the old "Whitten amendments" added to the appropriations bill (H.R. 18037) by Rep. Jamie Whitten (D., Miss.).

He first went to Grants Pass, Oregon (carpentry and bricklaying), then to Parks Job Corps Center, near Oakland, California, where he learned electronics, and got his GED (General Educational Development) high school equivalent diploma.

One of the Park counsellors, Charles "Doc" Broadus, interested him in boxing, entered him in Golden Gloves and 23 fights later he was AAU Champion and had the Olympic Gold Medal around his neck in Mexico City. He is being urged strongly to turn professional, but he is wise enought to know he is not ready for that yet -- and he seems sincerely to want to enter a junior college in January or February, 1969, continuing both education and his ring polishing. If the President, in his talk with George, would want to get on the subject of continuing his education and emphasize that it is of great important meit would be crucial advice for him now. Those of us who have watched George go through all the overwhelming transition of the past few weeks have been highly pleased and gratified with his manner and conduct. Besides being the fastest ever to the AAU and Olympic Gold Medal, he is Job Corps' first in-house celebrity -- a program which has needed just this kind of product.
