It is not necessary to play the anthems at strictly social functions or at formal luncheons and dinners as frequently awkward situations and inconvenciences are created. It is not the custom in Washington to play national anthems at State dinners. When the anthems are played, it is customary to play the anthem of the United States second.

Flags

When the flags of the United States and the Republic of Korea are used, consider the area where the flags are to be placed as a stage or focal point, then place the flag of the United States on the left as viewed from the audience, and the flag of the Republic of Korea on the right.

At 11:35 a.m., the President and Mrs. Johnson will depart from the President's Office in the White House. The trumpets will play four ruffles and flourishes and "Hail to the Chief." During the playing of "Hail to the Chief" the President and Mrs. Johnson will walk to the vicinity of the platform to await the arrival of President and Mrs. Park.

At 11:40 a.m., the President of the Republic of Korea and Mrs. Park, accompanied by Ambassador and Mrs. Hand, and their party will enter the Southwest Gate of the White House. The trumpets will sound a fanfare as the cars approach (See Enclosures 2 and 3). President Park's and Mrs. Park's cars will stop at the Diplomatic Entrance where Ambassador Hand will present President and Mrs. Park to President and Mrs. Johnson. Then Secretary and Mrs. Rusk and General and Mrs. Wheeler will be introduced. While photographs are being taken of the greetings, protocol officers will assist the members of the Korean party to their places to the right of the platform.

Following the photographs, the President and Mrs. Johnson will escort the President of the Republic of Korea and Mrs. Park onto the platform. Others, as indicated below, will take their places on the platform.

When all are in position, the Commander of Troops will bring the Honor Guard to Present Arms.

As the Commander of Troops salutes, the trumpets will sound four ruffles and flourishes and the band will play the national anthem of the Republic of Korea, followed by the national anthem of the United States. A 21-gun salute will be fired simultaneously with the music.

Upon completion of honors, the troops will be given Order Arms, the Commander will salute and report, "Sir, the Honor Guard is formed."

President Johnson will escort President Park toward the band. The Commander of Troops will take a position to the right of President Park and guide him through the inspection. As the inspection party turns in front of the band, President Johnson will take a position to the right of the Commander of Troops.

The band will play appropriate music during the inspection. The inspection will begin at the right front of the band. The inspection party will pass along the front rank of troops. Members of the inspection party will render salutes when passing in front of the Colors. When the inspection party reaches the left flank of the Honor Guard, it will pass around the rear of the formation and around the band. When passing in rear of the Colors, salutes will not be rendered by members of the inspection party.

When the inspection party reaches the right front of the band, the Commander of Troops will halt, salute and report, "Sir, this completes the inspection." President Johnson will escort President Park back to the platform. The Commander of Troops will return to his post and bring the Honor Guard to Present Arms. He and his staff will salute President Park. After bringing the Honor Guard to Order Arms, the Commander will salute and report, "Sir, this concludes the ceremony."

The Presidents will move to the microphone at the left side of the platform. President Johnson will welcome the President of the Republic of Korea and Mrs. Park to the United States and President Park will respond. The remarks will be interpreted.

Upon conclusion of the remarks, the President and Mrs. Johnson will escort President and Mrs. Park into the Diplomatic Reception Room. Secretary and Mrs. Rusk and General and Mrs. Wheeler will join them and a receiving line will be formed on the east side of the room.

Members of President Park's party and the Welcoming Committee will be escorted into the Diplomatic Reception Room where they will be presented to the President and Mrs. Johnson, President and Mrs. Park, Secretary and Mrs. Rusk, and General and Mrs. Wheeler. After each person has been presented, he will return to the South Drive where the motorcade will be formed.

President Johnson will escort President Park to the President's car on the driveway at the Diplomatic Entrance. Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Park will enter the First Lady's car which will be behind the President's car.







Inclement Weather Arrival Ceremony of His Excellency Chung Hee PARK, President of the Republic of Korea, and Mrs. Park

Monday, May 17, 1965

Members of the Welcoming Committee are requested to arrive at the Southwest Gate of the White House by 11:20 a.m. They will be directed to the Diplomatic Entrance and upstairs to the foyer on the first floor. At 11:30 a.m., members of the Welcoming Committee will take their places on the North Portico.

At 11:35 a.m., President and Mrs. Johnson will arrive at the Diplomatic Reception Room to await the arrival of President and Mrs. Park. Mr. Carter will join them.

At 11:35 a.m., Helicopter No. 2 will land at the South Lawn. The passengers will be met by a protocol officer and escorted to the North Portico.

At 11:40 a.m., Helicopter No. 1 will land at the South Lawn near the Diplomatic Entrance. After the rotor blades have stopped revolving, the President and Mrs. Johnson will leave the Diplomatic Reception Room and walk to the helicopter. Ambassador Hand will be the first to descend, followed by the other passengers. Ambassador Hand will present President and Mrs. Park to the President and Mrs. Johnson. The parties will go immediately into the Diplomatic Reception Room where Ambassador Hand will present the other members of President and Mrs. Park's party to President and Mrs. Johnson.

The President and Mrs. Johnson will take President and Mrs. Park and their party to the first floor foyer by way of the elevator. A protocol officer will escort other members of the party to the North Portico by way of the stairs.

Upon reaching the foyer, Ambassador Hand will present Secretary and Mrs. Rusk and General and Mrs. Wheeler to President and Mrs. Park. After the greetings, all except the President and Mrs. Johnson and President and Mrs. Park will take their places on the North Portico.

As soon as everyone is in position on the North Portico, President and Mrs. Johnson and President and Mrs. Park will step out to the red carpet. The band will play four ruffles and flourishes, followed by the national anthems of the Republic of Korea and the United States.

At the completion of the anthems, President Johnson and President Park will move to the microphones, where President Johnson will welcome President and Mrs. Park to the United States. President Park will respond. (The remarks will be interpreted). Following the remarks, President and Mrs. Johnson and President and Mrs. Park, accompanied by Secretary and Mrs. Rusk and General and Mrs. Wheeler, will move inside where they will receive the members of the Korean party and the Welcoming Committee. All persons who were to participate in the parade are requested to leave by way of the North Portico and enter their assigned cars immediately.

The President and Mrs. Johnson will escort President and Mrs. Park to their cars at the North Portico. The motorcade will proceed to Blair House.

Background Notes

KOREA

Population: 27.5 million

Capital: Seoul

Korea is a mountainous peninsula about 600 miles long and 135 miles wide, located in north-eastern Asia and projecting southeast from Manchuria. Japan lies about 120 miles to the east on the other side of the Sea of Japan. To the west, and separated by the Yellow Sea, lies the coast of China.

Seoul, the capital of the Republic of Korea, is in the west central portion of the peninsula, less than 30 miles from the Demilitarized Zone separating Communist military forces from those of the U.N. Command. The city is inland on the Han River, which has its outlet into the Yellow Sea.

Rugged mountains and cliffs abound on the northern and eastern sides of the country, whereas the western and southern coasts have many good harbors. The climate in Seoul is hot and humid in summer. July and August are normally the warmest months, with temperatures reaching 95°F. Rainfall is concentrated in the summer months, the rainy season normally occurring in late June and July. Winters are cold and dry.

THE PEOPLE

The Korean population is racially one of the most homogeneous in the world. Its racial origins are obscure, but the primary stock is believed to be Tungusic, related to the Mongols with some Chinese mixture. According to the December 1960 official census, the Republic of Korea had a population of over 24.9 million. The present rate of population growth is about 2.9 percent per year. With approximately 700 persons per square mile, the Republic of Korea ranks with Japan and Taiwan in density of population.

The population is concentrated in the Seoul-Inchon area and in the fertile plains in the southern part of the country. The mountains and hill country are only sparsely inhabited. The largest city in the Republic of Korea is its capital, Seoul (commonly pronounced "sole") with an estimated 2.4 million inhabitants. The largest Korean minority abroad is in Japan, where there are almost 600,000 Korean residents. Other important Korean minorities are found in Manchuria and possibly the Soviet Union.

There are well over one million Christians—the largest percentage in any Far Eastern country except the Philippines—with about 242,000 Catholics, some 1,300,000 claimed Protestants (the majority of them Presbyterians and Methodists), and a few hundred Russian Orthodox adherents.


The traditional religions of Korea are Buddhism, Confucianism, and Shamanism. Meaningful figures on their adherents are not available. Buddhism has declined for some 550 years but is still a significant force. Its adherents are estimated at about 16 percent of the population. Shamanism, while little organized, is widely practiced. Confucianism is an important continuing cultural influence; but as a cult it is now weak, with adherents, by and large, only among the aged. There is a cult called Ch'ondokyo (Religion of the Heavenly Way), a native political religious group which gained prominence in the 19th century but is no longer an active religious force.

HISTORY

United in the 7th century A.D., Korea was a semi-independent state associated with China until annexed by Japan in 1910. After the capitulation of Japan in 1945, the Korean Peninsula was militarily divided between the United States and Soviet forces at the 38th parallel in order to accept the surrender of the Japanese forces stationed in Korea. A U.S. military government was established in the southern part, while the northern part was occupied by the U.S.S.R. Negotiations between the United States and the U.S.S.R. in 1946 and 1947 to unify Korea failed because the Soviet Government refused to permit free consultations with representatives of all groups of the Korean people in setting up a national government.

The Republic of Korea was established in the area south of the 38th parallel on August 15, 1948, under U.N. auspices, since the Communists refused to permit U.N.-supervised elections in North Korea. The Soviets, in turn, established the "Democratic People's Republic of Korea" in September of that year.

U.S. military forces were withdrawn from Korea in 1949 and on June 25, 1950, the North Korean Communists invaded the Republic of Korea. The United Nations engaged in the



first collective defense action under its charter when 16 of its members, including the United States, sent troops and assistance to Korea to resist the aggression. Chinese Communist forces entered the conflict on the side of the aggressors in late October 1950. Hostilities were terminated by an armistice agreement on July 27, 1953. Since the armistice the Republic of Korea has been devoting its primary efforts to rebuilding its economy and strengthening its defense forces.

POLITICAL DEVELOPMENTS

President Syngman RHEE dominated the Korean political scene until his resignation on April 27, 1960. Korean politics were strongly centralized, with the Executive dominating the national government and the government heavily influencing all aspects of Korean society. Two major political parties developed: the Liberal Party, organized and headed by President Rhee, and the opposition Democratic Party formed in 1955, which was headed in its later years by CHANG Myon, who was elected Vice President in 1956. Both parties were conservative and friendly to the United States.

From 1958 on, the Liberal Party administration under President Rhee resorted to increasingly coercive and unpopular measures to maintain its control. Blatant election rigging in 1960 led to nation-wide demonstrations and riots against the Rhee government in March and April, forcing the President to resign on April 27.

Interim Government

Under the interim government of HO Chung, the National Assembly revised the constitution to provide for a parliamentary form of government and conducted orderly and free elections in which the former opposition Democratic Party won an overwhelming victory. CHANG Myon became Prime Minister. Because of deep-rooted factionalism, however, the Democratic Party split in late 1960, when over 60 members formed the New Democratic Party under the leadership of President YUN Po-son.

Although a number of badly needed social and economic reforms were undertaken, lack of firm leadership and constant political turmoil in the legislature compounded the difficulties of the government, and by the end of 1960 there was increasing talk of the need for strong leadership to cope with these problems.

Military Junta

On May 16, 1961, a military coup d'etat was carried out by about 300 field-grade officers and a few general officers supported by approximately 4,000 troops. Key government installations were seized within hours, and a

few days later control of the entire country was assured, since the Chang administration gave no effective resistance.

The original small military junta expanded to a 31-man military committee-Supreme Council for National Reconstruction (SCNR)which became the supreme executive and legislative body. The legislature was dissolved. Military officers assumed the main executive and administrative offices throughout the central and local governments. Upon seizing power the military coupleaders pledged to oppose communism, adhere to the United Nations, respect all international treaties and agreements, eliminate corruption, and solve the basic economic problems of the country. Later in 1961 General PARK Chung Hee, chairman of the military junta, promised that representative civilian government would be restored in 2 years.

In preparation for the return to civilian government a new constitution was established by popular referendum in December 1962. It provided for a strong presidential system, with a prime minister, a cabinet responsible to the president, and a unicamerallegislature. The constitution also provided for an independent judiciary.

Presidential and National Assembly elections were held in October and November 1963 respectively. PARK Chung Hee was elected President with 43 percent of the popular vote, and his Democratic-Republican Party won an overwhelming majority of the 175 seats in the legislature with only 34 percent of the popular vote. Most observers, including the U.N. Commission for the Unification and Rehabilitation of Korea, acclaimed the elections as being orderly and fair. A suprapartisan cabinet was formed in late December and the new government was inaugurated on December 17, 1963.

Park Chung Hee Administration

The new administration announced it would continue the basic economic and social programs initiated by the military junta. It has laid particular stress on establishing normal relations with Japan and improving its foreign trade position. A series of student demonstrations in early 1964 eventually forced President Park to reshuffle his cabinet on May 11 and finally to declare emergency martial law in Seoul on June 3. Martial law in the capital city was lifted July 29 following a compromise agreement with the Opposition.

ECONOMY

Although its war-shattered economy has been largely restored, Korea still faces numerous grave economic problems. It is poor in natural resources; possesses a dense, poverty-ridden population; suffers from a low level of technical and managerial proficiency; and is burdened with the support of one of the world's largest

military establishments. The Republic of Korea desires to broaden its economic base and expand production to feed, clothe, and provide other necessities for its population. It has the great asset of an intelligent, industrious people with a high literacy rate and a strong sense of national identity.

The estimated per capita gross national product is still less than \$100 despite an advance of 5.8 percent in the GNP during 1963. The expected continuance of a gradual decline in U.S. aid will heighten the need for increased domestic savings and investment and controlled consumption, if any significant growth in GNP is to be sustained.

Agriculture, forestry, and fishing account for over one-third of the GNP, and manufacturing and construction contribute 22 percent. Only 21 percent of Korea's land is arable, and 80 percent of the cultivated area is in grain. Total agricultural production is inadequate to meet the country's needs and must be supplemented with U.S. surplus foods and fibers. Rice is the principal crop, barley ranking second.

Korea's mineral resources include coal (medium to low-grade anthracite), tungsten, graphite, and iron ore. There are no known resources of petroleum. Coal production has increased sharply in recent years and provides much of the nation's fuel requirements. Industrial output has been increasing steadily but not yet at a rate which appreciably improves employment opportunities for Korea's fast-growing labor force, one-third of which is

unemployed or underemployed.

Faced with economic, military, and political problems of such magnitude, the Republic of Korea has experienced a chronic and severe imbalance of internal and external payments. Commodity exports have more than doubled since 1959, amounting to \$87 million in 1963; and other receipts, largely from goods and services sold to the U.N. forces stationed in Korea, provide additional foreign exchange earnings of about \$100 million annually. Nevertheless, the trade gap is enormous-over \$300 million in 1963—and can be financed only partially by Korea's own resources. Substantial foreign aid is essential to sustain the populace, maintain the armed forces, and support the economic development effort.

The necessity of maintaining a large military force regularly drains upwards of one-third of the central government budget, even though about two-thirds of the defense budget is financed by counterpart funds generated by the sale of aid goods, including U.S. agricultural commodities under P.L. 480, Title I. The prospect of diminishing grant aid poses a serious problem for the Korean Government, especially when coupled with the strain upon sparse domestic resources represented in undertaking a program of long-range development, to which the government is committed. In these circumstances the most careful financial management is required to contain inflationary movements, which during 1963 constituted a serious threat to the nation's

economic stability. To deal with this problem the Korean Government has adopted a comprehensive economic stabilization program calling for a balanced budget, ceilings on monetary and credit expansion, and import controls.

In addition, the Korean Government has undertaken a series of other specific economic reforms which, if successfully implemented, will eliminate a number of distortions which have plagued the domestic economy and handicapped Korea's competitive position in the export market. These reforms include devaluation of the currency by nearly 50 percent-from 130 won per dollar to 255, effective May 3, 1964, upward revisions of public utility and transportation rates, administrative improvements in the electric power industry, more adequate pay and other improvements in the civil service, reform of the taxation system and tax collection procedures, and institution of public works programs.

During the first half of 1964 industrial production and exports achieved record high levels, the price spiral slowed down, the largest postwar barley crop was harvested, and prospects were good for a better than average fall rice crop. Despite formidable problems the outlook for Korea's continued progress is encouraging, particularly if sound fiscal and monetary policies are pursued and if the political situation is stable.

KOREAN NATIONAL POLICIES

A primary objective of the Republic of Korea has been the unification of the Korean Peninsula under the principles of freedom and democracy. This aim has been frustrated because of Communist intransigence, and Korea remains divided by the Demilitarized Zone established by the armistice agreement. Although the Republic of Korea has opposed, and did not sign, the armistice agreement between the Communists and the U.N. Command, it has abided by its provisions.

A second major objective of the Republic of Korea is national economic development, both to achieve a better living for its people and to gain a more secure position in the community of nations. A team of industrial engineers and financial experts, financed by the United States, is advising the Korean Government in formulating a program for long-range economic development. The Korean Government wants and needs foreign private investment and has enacted liberal legislation to induce private foreign capital.

Another important objective has been to achieve security from foreign aggression in the future. Because of the continued threat posed by large Communist military forces in North Korea as well as the proximity of powerful forces in Soviet Russia and Communist China, the Korean Government has consistently urged the continuance of the

presence of substantial U.S. military forces in Korea as well as large-scale economic and military aid. U.S. recognition of this need for military security is embodied in the U.S.—Korea mutual defense treaty which entered into force in November 1954. It provides that the parties will consult with each other if either is threatened by external attack and that an armed attack on the territories under the administrative control of either side in the Pacific area would be dangerous to the peace and safety of the other.

Foreign Relations

Foreign relations of the Republic of Korea are characterized by close ties with the United States and determined efforts to establish diplomatic relations with other nations of the free world. Korea now has diplomatic relations with over 60 free-world nations as compared to 16 during the Rhee administration. The Republic of Korea has sought membership in the United Nations—which the Soviet Union has repeatedly vetoed—and is a member of 12 U.N. specialized agencies and the International Atomic Energy Agency. The Republic of Korea and Japan are negotiating a settlement of outstanding issues such as Korean claims growing out of the Japanese occupation of Korea, fisheries, and the status of Korean residents of Japan. Much progress

has been made recently and the outlook for a settlement in 1964 is good.

U.S. POLICY

The United States seeks under the principles of self-determination a free, independent, and democratic Korea, peacefully unified through elections under U.N. supervision, with a National Assembly in which representation is proportionate to the indigenous population. Pending achievement of this objective, which has been obstructed by the Communists who reject the competence of the United Nations to deal with the problem, the United States seeks to strengthen and support the Republic of Korea so that it may achieve reasonable security against a renewal of Communist aggression and so that it may attain economic viability. The U.S. Government has noted with approval the pledges announced by the Korean Government which express support for freeworld principles and a determination to promote the welfare of the Korean people in accordance with these principles. The United States continues to cooperate with the Korean Government in the promotion of the wellbeing and strength of Korea and its people. The United States also desires to strengthen the ties binding the Republic of Korea to the nations of the free world.

His Excellency Chung Hee PARK President of the Republic of Korea Republic of Korea

President Park was born on September 30, 1917, the youngest son of a farming family in the village of Kumi, near Taegu in North Kyongsang province. He graduated from the Kumi Primary School in 1931 and from Taegu Normal School in 1937. In December 1964 the eldest of Park's four brothers, Tong-hui, at the age of 72 was still living in the parental home near Taegu.

He began his army career in 1940 in Manchuria and served as a lieutenant with the Japanese Army after graduating from the Japanese Military Academy in 1944. In 1946 he was commissioned in the Korean Constabulary, and thereafter rose through the ranks of the Republic of Korea Army. His service fell roughly into three phases: staff positions as executive officer, commander of artillery units, and division and corps commands.

As a result of the May 16, 1961 military revolution, then Major General Park became leader of the military government. After winning the October 15, 1963 Presidential election, President Park assumed his present office December 17, 1963 for a four year term.

President Park was married in 1951 and has three children, two girls and a boy aged 13, 10, and 6, respectively. His foreign travel includes three trips to the United States, in 1954, 1961, and 1963, and a state visit to West Germany in December 1964. President Park speaks limited English and is fluent in Japanese.

Mrs. Chung Hee PARK

Republic of Korea

President Chung Hee PARK married Miss Yuk Yong-su in 1951 during the Korean Conflict. President and Mrs. Park have three children: two daughters, Kun-hye, 13, and Kun-yong, 10, and a son, Chi-man, 6. Mrs. Park accompanied President Park on his state visit to West Germany in December 1964.

Mrs. Park's hobbies are gardening, flower arranging, and the study of foreign languages. She is particularly interested in social work and often visits orphanges and other social welfare institutions. She is fluent in Japanese but has a limited knowledge of English.

Republic of Korea

His Excellency Key Young CHANG Deputy Premier and Minister of Economic Planning Board

Minister Key Young CHANG, former bank official and ex-President-Publisher of the Hanguk Ilbo and the Korea Times, has been Deputy Premier since May 11, 1964. Minister Chang was born in Seoul on May 2, 1916, and graduated from the Sollim Commercial School in 1934. As a publisher Minister Chang developed the Hanguk Ilbo and three sister dailies into one of the largest newspaper operations in South Korea. Prior to becoming a newspaper publisher, Minister Chang was employed for 18 years by the Bank of Korea, resigning as Deputy Governor of the bank in 1952.

Minister Chang is a former president of the Korea Newspaper Publishers Association. Since 1958 he has been president of the Korean chapter of the United Nations Association. He is married and has six children, one daughter and five sons. He is active in athletics, plays golf and tennis well, and was once the Vice Chairman of the Korean Basketball Association and Tennis League. Minister Chang was named Vice President of the Korea Olympic Committee in 1964. Minister Chang speaks English and fluent Japanese and is a Presbyterian.

His Excellency Tong Won LEE Minister of Foreign Affairs

Foreign Minister Lee was born on August 2, 1925, in North Korea. He received his higher education in the United States and Great Britain, majoring in political science. Arriving in the United States in 1948, he earned a B.A. from Rio Grande College and a M.A. from Kent State University -- both in Ohio. He then went to Oxford, where he was the first Korean to receive a Ph.D. in political science. Dr. Lee Married Choe Yong-hui, a linguist and a student of the fine arts, in New York in 1956. After his return to Korea in 1958 he taught at Chungang University Law School in Seoul and that December became Director of Korea's International Research Center. The following autumn Dr. Lee began publishing an English-language quarterly, Koreana.

In September 1962, while serving as President Park's Chief Presidential Secretary, Dr. Lee was an alternate delegate to the 17th United Nations General Assembly. He was appointed Ambassador to Thailand in December 1963 and served in Bangkok until July 1964, when he was appointed Foreign Minister.

Foreign Minister Lee speaks fluent English and Japanese.

His Excellency Sung Eun KIM
Minister of National Defense

Lieutenant General (retired) Sung Eun Kim, former Marine Corps Commandant, was appointed Minister of National Defense on March 16, 1963. He has held this post through two successive cabinet changes.

General Kim was born in South Kyongsang Province on March 14, 1924. He graduated from Harbin Middle School in December, 1941 and entered Harbin Agricultural College, which he left in 1943 to enlist in the Harbin Defense Corps. He later served in the Manchurian Army as a second lieutenant.

General Kim began his Korean military career in the Coast Guard in 1946. He joined the newly-formed Marine Corps in March, 1949. His Korean War combat experience began in July, 1950 when he successfully defended a segment of the Walker Line, near Taegu. His unit, the Fifth Marine Battalion, participated in the Inchon landing operation and subsequent capture of Seoul. He also commanded the First Marine Regiment in the central and eastern front line areas. For his performance during the war, he was twice awarded the United States Silver Star in addition to his several Korean medals. Other major command positions held by General Kim include: Commandant of the Marine Corps School (1953); Deputy Commandant and Commandant of the Marine Corps (1959-1961); and Republic of Korea delegate to the Military Armistice Commission (1960).

General Kim is married and has four sons and a daughter. He is a Presbyterian. He speaks English, Chinese, and Japanese.

Republic of Korea

His Excellency Jong Chul HONG
Minister of Information

Minister Jong Chul Hong, a retired Brigadier General, was named Minister of Public Information on September 2, 1964 after serving briefly as Vice Minister of Education.

Minister Hong was born on September 20, 1924, in Ch'olsan, North P'yongan Province on the northwest coast of Korea. He attended Seoul National University but left to enter the Korean Military Academy in December 1948. Minister Hong served throughout the Korean War as an artillery officer. He holds several Korean Army decorations. Minister Hong, who retired from the army in December 1963, is an original member of the May 1961 military revolution group.

Minister Hong is married and is the father of four girls and two boys. He speaks Japanese very well and is considered fair in English. His hobbies are fishing and reading.

Protocol May 6, 1965 A United States-trained economist and political scientist who lived in the United States for 27 years (1926-53), Ambassador Kim arrived in Washington on November 20, 1964, to assume his duties as Ambassador to the United States. Previously he had served as Prime Minister from July 1962 until December 1963 and prior to his appointment as Ambassador, Ambassador Kim served as a presidential adviser and visited Washington, D. C., in early February 1964, completing a two-month goodwill mission to forty countries as a roving ambassador.

Ambassador Kim was born in Seoul on November 3, 1901. He graduated from Keijo Technical High School (1917) and Keijo Engineering College (1923) in Seoul. Coming to the United States in 1926 to continued his higher education, he studied at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (1929), Lynchburg University (A.B., 1930), Columbia University (M.A., 1932), and American University (Ph.D. in economics and political science, 1933).

Ambassador Kim is married. He likes to spend most of his leisure reading and gardening. He is a devout Methodist, who speaks fluent English and Japanese.

His Excellency Hu Rak LEE
Secretary-General to the President

A retired major general of the Republic of Korea Army and former military attache to the United States (1955-57), Mr. Lee has been Secretary-General to President Park since December, 1963.

After his retirement from the army in 1961, Mr. Lee was appointed Publisher-President of the English-language Korean Republic, and in December 1961 he was named Director of the Office of Public Information for the Supreme Council for National Reconstruction (SCNR).

He was born on May 10, 1924 in a village near Pusan. After attending primary and middle school in his native province, he studied in Japan. Commissioned a second lieutenant in a Japanese officer candidate school in January, 1945 Mr. Lee was discharged the following August. Upon his return to Korea in 1946, he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Republic of Korea Constabulary, the forerunner of the Korean Army. He was the Republic of Korea Quartermaster General from 1952 to 1954.

Mr. Lee accompanied President Park on his trip to the United States in November 1963 to attend the funeral of the late President Kennedy and also on his state visit to West Germany in December 1964.

Mr. Lee is married and has five children--four sons and a daughter. Mr. Lee enjoys growing Asian and Western flowers of the orchid family in his garden in Seoul. He is a Buddhist. He is fluent in English and Japanese.

Protocol May 6, 1965 His Excellency Chong Kap KIM
Chairman, Committee of National Defense,
National Assembly

A retired lieutenant-general of the Republic of Korea Army and a former Vice Minister of National Defense, Mr. Kim was elected to the National Assembly in November, 1963 on the Democratic Republican Party slate. He has held the chairmanship of the National Defense Committee in the Assembly since December, 1963.

Mr. Kim was born in a village near Suchon in South Ch'ungch'ong Province on October 1, 1922. He graduated from Choson Christian College with a major in Korean literature. He began his military career after graduation from a Japanese reserve military academy in 1942. After the 1945 liberation of Korea, he first served as a regimental commander in the newly-formed Korean Constabulary. One of his early assignments in the Republic of Korea Army was the position of Superintendent of Cadets in the Korean Military Academy. Other major assignments included the command of the Republic of Korea Army's Second Replacement Training Center and the position of Vice Superintendent of the Republic of Korea Command and General Staff College.

Mr. Kim is the father of four daughters and two sons. He speaks Japanese, Chinese, and English. He is a Christian.

Protocol May 6, 1965 Mrs. Hyun Chul KIM Wife of the Korean Ambassador

Mrs. Kim was born November 26, 1911 and in 1934 graduated from Kunkook University, Shingyung, Manchuria. Mrs. Kim has been active in social work, serving from 1961 as director of the Holy Light Orphanage, Pusan, Korea. She is also a member of the advisory committee of the Korean National Red Cross and the Korean YWCA.

Ambassador and Mrs. Kim have one daughter. Mrs. Kim speaks Japanese and limited English.

General Chang Kuk CHANG
Acting Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff

Republic of Korea

General Chang was named Acting Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on April 10, 1965. During the Korean Conflict General Chang at the age of 28 became the youngest brigadier general in the Korean Army.

General Chang served as a military attaché to the Korean Embassy in Washington from 1953 until 1955. He returned to Korea to become Superintendent of the Republic of Korea Military Academy. He became Deputy Chief of Staff in 1961 and assumed command of the Republic of Korea Second Army one year later. He also served concurrently in 1960 and 1961 as Korean adviser to the United Nations Command Military Armistice Commission. He became Commander of the Republic of Korea First Army in May 1963.

Born September 9, 1924 in Seoul, General Chang is married and has three sons. Among General Chang's nine medals are two United States Legions of Merit. He likes reading and playing golf. General Chang speaks English.

Mr. Hogan YOON
Director, Office of Protocol
Ministry of Foreign Affairs

Mr. Hogan Yoon was named Director, Office of Protocol of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on April 23, 1965.
Mr. Yoon was born on January 22, 1925 in South Hamkyong province, North Korea. He originally entered the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1950, but in 1954 resigned to become a correspondent for the New York Times until 1961 when he re-entered the Korean Foreign Service. His last post abroad before his present appointment was the position of Counselor of the Republic of Korea Embassy in Mexico City, Mexico.

Mr. Yoon is married and has two children, a daughter and a son. He is fluent in English and Japanese. He has studied at Morehead State College, Kentucky (1952-53), as well as at the Department of State's Foreign Service Institute (1950).
