In response to your memo of March 13 concerning the Expo visitors, following are some of my reactions:

1. The arrival for Prime Minister Holt should be scheduled at 12 noon, which will allow nearly an hour for a meeting with the President prior to the 1:00 p.m. working luncheon. I believe the President would want this much time to visit with the Prime Minister.

2. I memoed Walt Rostow to the effect that we are scheduling Prime Minister Wilson for a 12 noon meeting and 1:00 p.m. working luncheon.

3. I have marked 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 7 as the tentative time for a second meeting with President Bourguiba of Tunisia. Of course, this is subject to change, but I think we can make plans for this second meeting in lieu of a parade and a return appearance by the President at a Tunisian function.

4. I have planned the informal arrival ceremonies for those you mentioned which will be the same as the arrival for the presentation of credentials by newly arrived Ambassadors.

In my memorandum to you of September 6, I recommended that when you receive the Credentials of foreign Ambassadors in groups you also receive them privately for a few minutes.





UGANDA

George Kamba was born in the Bukedi District of Uganda in 1927. He received his Primary, Secondary, and High School education at the Nabumali School in his home district. He entered the Kampala, Uganda, Engineering School in 1948 and in 1953 received a degree as a Civil Engineer. For the next eight years he combined a career in working for the Government as a regional engineer with a rising interest and activity in politics. In 1958, he was elected Secretary General of the Bukedi District Administration, which office he held until he was appointed first Uganda High Commissioner to India in 1964. He is said to be a very active sportsman.

During his period in India, Mr. Kamba made friends with a number of members of the staff of the United States Embassy. Such information as we have concerning him is favorable in nature.

SUBJECT: Agreements on Ambassadorial Appointments

1. Czechoslovakia (Beam)

I have just been informed of a cable from our embassy in Prague indicating that it will not be possible to obtain agreement on Jacob Beam within three days as requested by State in response to our urgings.

Our embassy estimates that a week will be required to get agreement from the Presidential Palace. Czech procedure normally takes three weeks. Our request arrived at a very busy time for President Novotny. He is in the midst of a three-day celebration with many speeches, etc., and it is the eve of the Czech party's congress. Czech foreign office is displaying a very cooperative attitude. Foreign office staff state that they understand the need for speed under the U.S. constitution system and foreign office will do all that is possible to obtain agreement in the shortest possible time. Foreign office hopes that this can be done by May 13 and urges that no announcement be made of Beam's appointment until they can obtain approval of their president. On the substantive side, they are favorably impressed with Beam's qualifications.

2. Uganda (Stebbins)

Ambassador Deming has appointment with the Foreign Minister at 9:30 a.m., Saturday, May 7 (3:30 a.m. our time). He expects no difficulty and will advise tomorrow. I'll keep you posted.

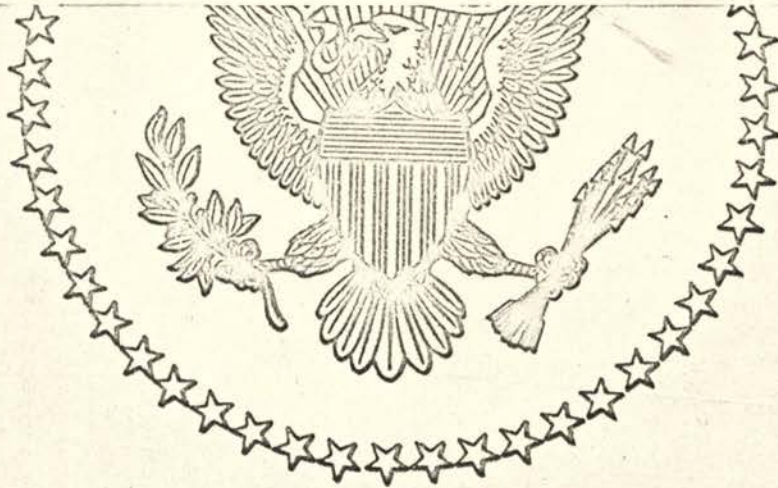

peacekeeping operations in our interests. This is important in order to reduce the need for direct U.S. participation in such activities and to provide an additional option for keeping small wars from growing into large ones.

2. We are now embarked on a round of informal consultations with Quaison-Sackey, U Thant and other members on how to deal with the current financial crisis. In these discussions and in the Committee of 33 we will seek an agreement that would solve the Article 19 problem and restore the UN's financial position. The emphasis would be on bringing the UN to "financial solvency" and deemphasizing the Article 19 aspect.

3. We think the most fruitful approach is to try to get substantial voluntary contributions (totaling perhaps \$110 million.) Of this, we would hope to get \$25-35 million from the Russians and \$5-10 million from the French. We would also be expected to make a voluntary contribution.

4. If agreement with the Soviets can be obtained on this basis -- and this admittedly questionable -- one Soviet condition would probably have to be satisfied that will require a major U. S. policy decision as the negotiations progress:
