His extemporaneous speeches and press conference remarks sparkled with an extraordinary amount of soft-spoken humor and candor. His formal toasts and ceremonial talks put all at ease with their informality. His knowledge of history and literature, combined with unusual empathy with his audiences, brightens many of the pages that follow.

What mattered most, of course, were not the words but the ideas they conveyed—and John F. Kennedy more than any other man of our time was willing to try out new ideas and challenge old entrenched ones. He looked to the future as well as the past, primarily to what was required and not merely to what was popular. His only commitment was to his country and conscience, and no petty partisan interest or other narrow dogma could detract or diminish his determination to do what was right.

The public papers of a President cannot capture the full flavor of the man and his philosophy—for there is much that is not said or written publicly, and much that is not said or written at all, only felt and observed. Nevertheless these papers constitute a basic and invaluable part of a record which all should know.

Then, in 1961, the country started to move again. And that movement began with the economy, the cornerstone of progress.

The "new economics" is more than a theory. It has helped to guide this nation to new heights of prosperity. John Kennedy understood it. Lyndon Johnson carried it forward.

SUBJECT: Candid impressions of the Truman and Eisenhower Libraries

Architecturally I liked both libraries --

Museum Aspect:

Truman Library: The reproduction of President Truman's White House Office and the entrance mural are, to my thinking, the outstanding exhibits. The curator had established some themes and therefore projected a message. However, the display cases in instances need refurbishing, case lighting is poor, some exhibits have obviously not been changed in years. I wonder if appropriated money is sufficient to create and maintain the dynamic exhibitry a presidential library requires.

Eisenhower Library: The museum is a separate building from the Library and for many years was administered by the Eisenhower Foundation. It is filled with interesting and valuable memorabilia but needs the touch of a professional exhibit man (who I understand is now on the staff) to relate objects and story. President Eisenhower's office in the Library becomes an exhibit when he is not in residence and I found this appealing.

Both libraries have impressive stack areas, attractive auditoriums, adequate security vaults, and pleasant reference rooms for the researchers' use. Audio-visual collections are practically non-existent in the Truman Library and minimal in the Eisenhower. Neither had an audio-visual room for the scholar to use.

Both libraries are handicapped by similar situations: President Truman has retained many of the files relating to the Presidency and all of the papers for the post-Presidential years. This has been a major issue of criticism among historians since the Library has been open for more than ten years. Important Eisenhower records are still at Gettysburg. However, only recently have the collections of the Library been opened for research and it is assumed that shortly the Gettysburg materials will be transferred to Abilene.

Side observation: I'm so glad the Johnson Library is to be located on a university campus, and proud because I feel our program will better meet the need of both public and the scholar.

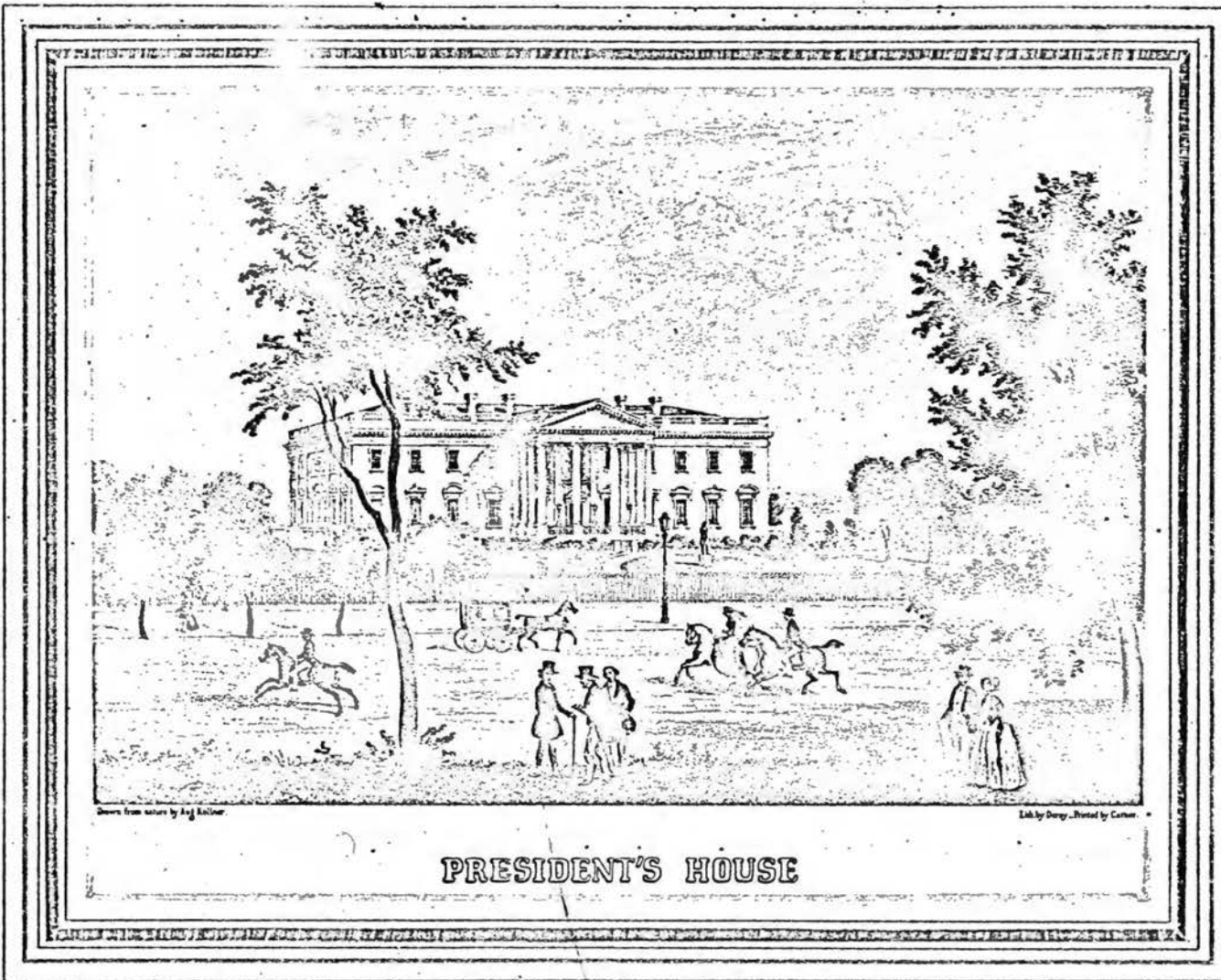

You will be interested to know that a definite decision has been made by the National Archives to publish two volumes of the Presidential papers for 1964 -- for the first time in publication history. However, for administrative and professional reasons, both volumes will be released at the same time, as soon as possible in 1965, and will be treated as a single volume. The Foreword, Preface and Presidential Photograph will appear in the first volume, the appendices in the second. Both will have a complete index to both volumes.

I think this has many advantages -- a more comprehensive index, a publishing date when the volumes cannot be used to raise campaign issues or be considered politically slanted.

This establishes the need for only one Foreword for this year, and it will not be needed until the end of the year.

As we discussed yesterday, I have been designated the staff member to work with the Office of the Federal Register, National Archives, on the publication of the Public Papers of the President. Mr. Goodwin, I fear, does not understand the modus operandi of this publication.

DICK

It is an historical book, reflecting the words of the President -- not words the way a writer would like to edit, change or interpret them. The scope is not broad; it is narrow to preserve integrity of text, style and personality of the President.

The format for the publication began with President Truman and has continued with acclaim by scholars and historians. By law, the authority for the preparation of the publication is vested in the Office of the Federal Register, and ancillary text, notes and tables shall be derived from official sources only. It is based on Presidential materials issued as White House releases and on transcripts of news conferences. Original source materials are used, where available, (and thanks to our program, we have original source material) to protect against errors in transcription. Addresses and speeches are printed as actually delivered (tapes are compared to printed text). In a few instances where the White House issued advance releases, based on prepared text of addresses or remarks, which differ from the text as actually delivered, such releases are appropriately noted. Annotation is used where necessary for clarification.

No one is more aware than I that this is not a routine job; it is indeed a professionally prepared, historical record of President Johnson's administration --- in his words.

Dr. Wayne Grover, Archivist of the United States, 'phoned to ask that I take up with the appropriate staff official the matter of the designation of someone to provide aid and counsel during this Administration in the selection and annotation of the materials to be included in the Public Papers of the Presidents.

This series was begun in 1957 in response to a recommendation of the National Historical Publications Commission and much of the work is done in the Office of the Federal Register. During the Kennedy Administration, Fred Holborn was the staff member designated for this purpose. Prior to that, one of the Assistant Staff Secretaries had been so designated during the Eisenhower Administration.

Dr. Grover is anxious that there be a designation as soon as possible so that work can begin on the first volume of the Johnson Papers.
