I believe that the attached memorandum does not contain enough imaginative people and enough young people in this very difficult area. This is an intricate and complicated field, burdened with years of obsolete laws and taxes, where we must have bold new ideas.

If you approve, I would like to work with Weaver, Wood and Macy to get a higher caliber (and somewhat younger) group of people on the Board.

#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

SUBJECT: National Commission on Codes, Zoning, Taxation and Development Standards

In your August 19th Syracuse, New York speech on American cities you reiterated your desire to appoint a commission of distinguished Americans to make the first comprehensive review of codes, zoning, taxation and development standards in more than 2 generations. This committee was originally proposed in your 1965 message on cities.

Public Law 89-117, section 301 (A), directed the Housing and Home Administrator (now the Secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development) to study and report on the structure of:

- (1) State and local urban and suburban housing and building laws, standards, codes, and regulations and their impact on housing and building costs, how they can be simplified, improved, and enforced, at the local level, and what methods might be adopted to promote more uniform building codes and the acceptance of technical innovations including new building practices and materials;
- (2) State and local zoning and land use laws, codes, and regulations, to find ways by which State and localities may improve and utilize them in order to obtain further growth and development; and
- (3) Federal, State and local tax policies with respect to their effect on land and property cost and on incentives to build housing and make improvements in existing structures.

The Commission's report, upon its completion, will be submitted to you and the Congress.

I join Bob Weaver in recommending for your consideration the attached list of nominees (Tab A). The establishing Act calls for the appointment of this Commission by the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development.

National Committee and FBI name checks have been completed on each nominee. Biographies are attached (Tab B). Availability of these nominees has not been ascertained.

SUBJECT:

Establishment of the Advisory Commission on Codes, Zoning, tax policy, and Development

Standards.

The establishment of the Advisory Committee you announced in your Syracuse speech can take place immediately following the signing of the Independent Offices Appropriations Act. The Commission was authorized in Section 301 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1965 following your Message on the Cities of that year. The legislative history makes funds available directly to the Department but leaves open the questions of the structure, specific missions and membership of the Commission.

In anticipation for its funding, I directed the preparation of a set of background papers (to be completed this month), and staff analyses as to the appropriate structure and operations of the body. On the basis of this work to date, it is recommended that:

- -- The Commission be an active, working advisory body chaired by a prominent individual capable of providing strong leadership and direction to the study.
- -- A general policy review board of 10 to 12 distinguished individuals be established to provide representation for the view points of state and local government, business, labor, civil rights, and the general public.

-- Special panels of experts or knowledgeable individuals be established for each of the subject areas of 6 members each. These panels should bear primary responsibility for the conduct of the study and final recommendations in their area, so as to avoid criticism that code policy is being made by tax experts and vice versa.

The Commission should play a key role in shaping a comprehensive strategy for coping with urban growth.

It should seek ways of modernizing present tools of codes, zoning, and taxation, and inventing new ones. It should also explore ways of harnessing the resources of private enterprise and individual homeowners to end city slums and providing a better quality of urban living throughout metropolitan areas.

It is recommended that you announce the establishment of the Advisory Commission and the principal members, but that the Department formally appoint the members of the Commission, which would also report its recommendations to the Department at the conclusion of the study.

This procedure would provide for maximum public impact and publicity and would satisfy the requirement that Congress expressly provided the \$1.5 million appropriation to the Department rather than an independent Commission to carry out the study.

Attached is a list of possible candidates for Commission chairmanship. Lists of suggested names for the review board and the expert panels are ready at your request.

Set out below is a memorandum from Secretary Fowler recommending your approval for the January market sale by the Renewal Projects Administration (RPA) of \$223 million in local agency short-term notes.

RPA -- an agency in HUD -- works with local slum clearance and urban renewal agencies.

The \$223 million breaks down as follows:

- -- \$137 million to refund a maturing issue
- -- \$86 million to make payments for construction under existing contracts.

If RPA does not sell these local agency issues on the market, it must borrow from the Treasury. This would create very serious problems for the already tight debt limit and would increase our fiscal year 1967 budget expenditures.

You approved the market sale of RPA notes for October,
November and December. All of these sales went well.

Treasury would like your approval for the sale before moon,

January 3, so that it can advertise the issue for sale on January 17.

Gardner Ackley and I recommend your approval for the sale by RPA of the \$223 million in local agency notes.
