

Dear Mr. Gutierrez:

I have been asked to reply to your recent letter to the President about your interest in presenting a world's championship chess match in Austin in 1966 and requesting assistance in solving several problems you foresee.

Admission of Soviet citizens to the United States requires special procedures under existing laws, but can be arranged for valid scientific, educational, and cultural purposes. A number of Soviet chess players have in the past visited the United States under the exchange program. The Department would give all possible consideration to the visa applications of participants in a world's championship chess match in the United States.

The United States Chess Federation, as the governing body for chess in this country, is the appropriate organization to approach both the Federation Internationale des Echecs, for permission to hold the match, and the Soviet chess governing body, to arrange for participation by Mr. Petrosian. We believe it likely, however, that Mr. Petrosian will prefer to meet any challengers on his home ground.

Although the Department wishes to give all possible encouragement to exchange activities, it unfortunately has no funds for the project you have in mind. The limited resources available for exchange activities are fully committed to educational exchanges under the binational agreements and other existing activities authorized by the Fulbright-Hays Act. Since the Department cannot begin to satisfy the urgent requests from our overseas posts for participation in these established programs, there is no prospect of its helping in this case.

Congratulations on your initiative in founding the Austin Chess Club and best wishes for its success.

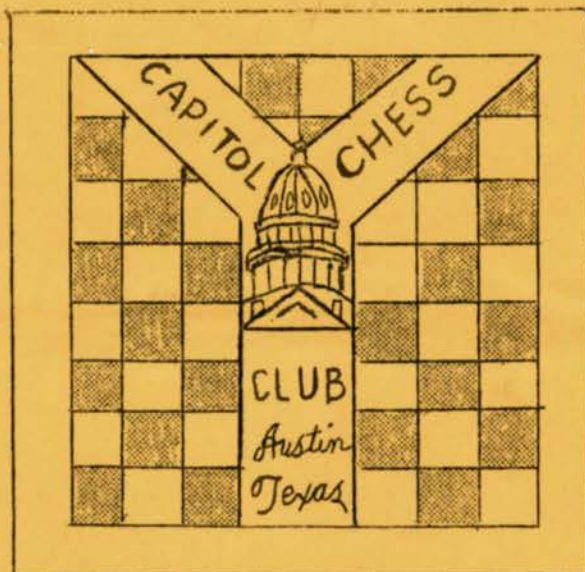

1).-The political restrictions on the travel of communists, must be given a safe conduct for the champion and his aides, if any.

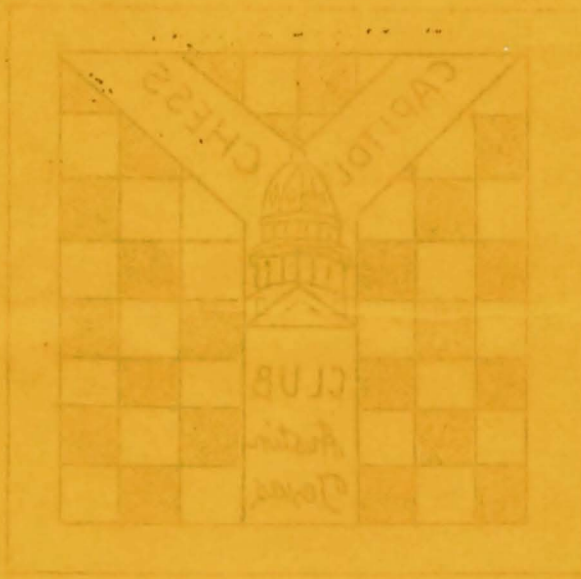
2).-The F.I.D.E. (Federation International des Echecs ; Stockholm Sweden) that might grant the permit, must be contacted and an arrangement reached.

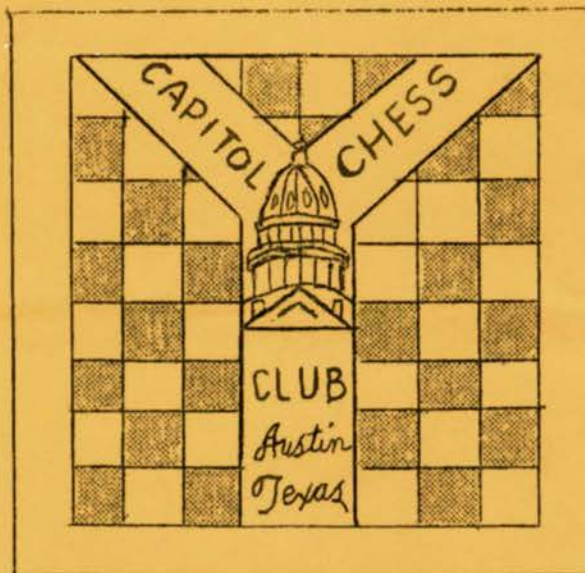

49 COMPETE IN DENTON OPEN

USCF Master and perennial Texas Champion, Kenneth Smith swept the first Denton Open over the Memorial Day weekend with a perfect 5-0 score. He led the rest of the field by a full point. He elected to take the Class A trophy for his exceptional performance, including a final round draw with 3rd place trophy winner Bills. Steele lost only to Ken Smith in the 1st round on his way to the Class B trophy. R. B. Vokey scored 3½ points to earn the Class C prize.

Don Garretson received the Unrated trophy. The Class D trophy went to Dr. A. J. Speece, a North Texas University professor.

DAVIS TOPS AT AUSTIN OPEN

The lively new Austin Chess Club attracted twenty-five players to their first open tournament May 1-2. Major George M. Davis won all five of his games to earn the first place trophy. Attractive trophies were awarded to the first six winners and consolation prizes for the next four places. LSU WINS SOUTHWEST INTERCOLLEGIATE

USCF Master, Jude Acers, drove his Louisiana State University team to the Southwestern Intercollegiate team championship in their first try at the title and became SW Intercollegiate Individual Champion in the process. The defending champions at the University of Texas stayed home and robbed the event of some of its drama. However, Rice University stayed an even ½ point behind LSU through four exciting rounds and only fell off the pace in the final round. LSU scored 13 points to Rice's 11.

In the individual competition Acers won all five of his games, but Steve Moffitt of Rice and Fred Crowdus of Texas A&M made him work for his points. Robert Rader distinguished himself at Rice's third board by scoring 4 points, losing only to Acers. Karl Cavanaugh played 4th board for LSU and the role of a wolf in sheep's clothing. Playing bottom board without a rating, Cavanaugh racked up 3½ points to finish third. LSU's remaining players, James West finished 10th and Carter Waid, 7th.

Morris Steen led the group finishing with 3 points and claimed 4th in individual honors for Texas A&M. Rice's Moffitt and Richard Gray were 5th and 6th. Texas A&M's Crowdus and David Willis were 8th and 9th, Chuck Young of Rice, 11th. Your President finally lost the dual battle of directing and playing by finishing with five straight losses. Mr. Acers suggested that I should give up playing and devote my efforts to organizing for which I was obviously better qualified.

Texas A&M hosted the event and everyone enjoyed the continuance of intercollegiate competition here in our great Southwest.

Wilbur, Jimmy Rumsey, Peter Rona, 2½; John Petesch and Mark Clark 2; Fred Hornsby and Leroy McCall, 1; and Rev. P.E. Brooks, E.E. Snider, Bill Decker, Bob Finch, Dr. Dale McLemore, and Dr. Conrad Henckly made up the field of entrants.

TEXAS CHAMPIONSHIP REVIEW

FIRST DENTON OPEN

Your President wrote David Lees, Texas Co-Champion with Kenneth Smith, for his impressions of the tournament. Here are some excerpts from his letter:

"I had an excellent time at the tournament and Mrs. Smith was an excellent hostess.

"The games themselves were of rather low quality and marred with numerous outright blunders. I guess it was the tension as everyone seemed to be trying his hardest as well as the fast time limit of 30 moves in 1½ hours that caused the bad mistakes. For example, Jurevics vs Lees: Jurevics with an inferior position simply overlooked his rook being attacked by my bishop and lost a full rook with no compensation. Lees vs Bone: Bone walked right into a pin in an even position costing him his queen for a rook. Jurevics vs Brieger: Jurevics won the exchange early in the game, but then played poorly to lose. Richardson vs Bone: Brieger mentioned their curious double blunder due to time pressure in the May Texas Knights. Smith vs Richardson: 1.P-K4,P-K4, 2.B-B4, B-K2?, 3.Q-R5! and white wins a pawn. Lees vs Smith: With only one move left to reach the time control and about two minutes to make it I froze up. Brieger vs Lees: 50. P-N7???, and there were others!

"My game against Ken Smith was the only game I have ever lost on a time forfeit. According to William Bills who was watching, my flag fell while I was making my 30th move. I then pushed my button and Ken brought it to my attention my flag was down. It was hard to believe, but it was! If I had moved three seconds faster I would have made it! Incidentally, Ken had offered a draw on about the 25th move which I, of course, declined!!

(There were no discussions of a play-off match between the co-champions)

"I had a very enjoyable leave during May and became Western Mass. Co-champion (3-way tie for first) with a 5-1 score. (Ed: a title Lees has won before). 49 players entered. I also played in the annual Mass. vs. Conn. match at Hartford, Conn. and drew former U.S. Junior Champion Robin Ault (2180) on board three.

My Dear Mr. President:

Please leave your name in history in one more subject: in the eternal and international game of chess. There is no Chess club in Austin, capital as it is of the largest state in the world. This is not because chess is not disconsidered in this city, as the University of Texas Chess club is the champion of all neighboring state Universities, and has its own chess club, but this meets only on fridays, after 8.00 P.M. in a room lent for that purpose in one of the many buildings of the university of Texas.

The cheapest club to set up in the world is a chess club, and there is no better known club internationally, than a Chess club. The best training for the minds of youngsters who would devote themselves to science and research is the game of Chess, because it trains in mental productiveness, resourcefulness and grit; also in patience and frugallity. I'm from the Univ. of Mexico, have a Doctor degree, and also an M. in Sc. in E.E. from CalTech, and several inventions to my name. A few years ago I was a chess master, now I am taking it up again.

There are several chess players in the city; nothing brings them together; a few drift once in a while to the friday U. of Tex. short meetings. Next April 3, an 8 high school tourney of chess will be held, probably at Lamar High or at Lanier high; I've been teaching them and their instructors a little. They meet in a classroom with great enthusiasm.

I pray to areuse your interest, so that you will furnish the Capital City of Texas, Austin, with a Permanent Chess Club.

I pretest all that is necessary and required.

Mr. Lewis Tubbs, President of the Washington Bridge League, called you early this morning and I was asked to talk to him.

He said the Washington Bridge League is to be host to a Regional Bridge Tournament at the Sheraton-Park Hotel here for 5 days beginning this Thursday (Sept. 3d) and that there will be over 2,000 participants from the States of Tenn., N. C., S. C., Virginia, Maryland, West Va. and the District of Columbia.

He wondered if the President, Mrs. Johnson or Senator ^{Humphrey} Humphrey might be interested in making an appearance at the Tournament-- either at one of the afternoon sessions which begin at 1 pm or one of the evening ones which begin at 8 pm -- that the participants are "fairly influential" people.

I told him I would tell you of his call and when he asked me what I thought the chances might be I told him that truthfully I would not want to be encouraging in view of the President's heavy schedule at this time -- that we did not handle Mrs. Johnson's schedule, of course, or that of Senator Humphrey but undoubtedly they too were very busy and also that with such short notice it would undoubtedly be difficult for them to undertake the appearance.

So, is it ok to call back and tell him it will not be possible for the President and Mrs. Johnson to drop by and that they should contact the Natl Committee about Sen. Humphrey??

We appreciate your congratulations to the President for having signed the Clean Air Act on December 17, 1963, and agree with you as to its vital importance to the population of the nation.

With regard to the research grant application referred to in your letter, I am advised that this grant application was received by the Public Health Service on March 12, 1964. The deadline for receipt of applications for consideration by the Public Health Service Advisory Councils which meet in June and July is March 1, 1964. Applications received after March 1, but before July 1, are considered by the Advisory Councils which meet in November. These deadlines are as noted in the publication, "Guide for Applicants - Public Health Service Research Grant Programs," and have been established to provide for orderly and uniform review of all applications received. You may be assured that the grant application to which you referred will be reviewed sympathetically and consistent with the rules uniformly applied to all applicants.

We appreciate your interest in air pollution control and your expression of continued support of work in this important field.
