Creator: U.S. Senate. Historical Office. (1975 -)

Organizational sketch:

The Historical Office was established in 1975 to serve as the U.S. Senate's institutional memory. The Historical Office collected and provided information on important events, precedents, dates, statistics, and historical comparisons of current and past Senate activities for use by members and staff, the media, scholars, and the general public. The Office advised senators and committees, assisted researchers seeking access to Senate records, and maintained automated information data bases detailing locations of former members' papers. The Office kept extensive biographical and bibliographical information on former senators as well as Senate related photographs and other illustrations. The Historical Office and its staff also produced numerous publications covering all aspects of Senate history.

Scope and content note:

This collection consists of reports collected by the Senate Historical Office that were written by a number of sources for the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice. The reports are on a range of law enforcement issues including correctional institutions, the use of firearms by law enforcement, discrimination in the justice system, offender rehabilitation, violent crime, and mental health.
