On this 20th day of February, 1949, I, Guadalupe Longoria, Sr., voluntarily make the following statement in order to clarify any confusion that may exist with respect to the part that I played in connection with the reburial of the body of my son, Felix Longoria:

My name is Guadalupe Longoria. I was born in San Diego, Texas. I have lived in Three Rivers, Texas, for approximately 25 years.

In the first place I wish to state that, contrary to reports published in some newspapers, my son's widow, Beatrice Longoria, and I have never had any personal differences. She, members of her family, and all members of my family including myself have always been on the best of terms. Any difficulties or clashes with any other person have been due to personal matters between such person and me or my sons, and not because of any friendship bix between such person and my son's widow or between such person and members of her family. To this day, my son's widow visits my home frquently and we still consider her, as we always will, as our own daughter.

During the early part of January, 1959, my son's widow, Beatrice Longoria, notified us that she had received a notice from the War Department that the remains of my son Felix would soon arrive in San Francisco. This was the second notice that she had received; she had also told us about the first notice some time before.

On Tuesday, January 11, 1949, my son Guadalupe, Jr., translated an article in the Corpus Christi Caller which referred to a refusal on the part of the Three Rivers funeral home, known as the Rice Funeral Home, to permit the use of its chapel for my son's funeral services.

My two sons Guadalupe, Jr., and Alberto, and I immediately went to Corpus Christi to see Beatrice, my son's widow. She informed us that through her sister Sarah, she had contacted a veteran's organization known as the American G.I. Forum, whose presidentwas Dr. Hector Garcia of Corpus Christi. We -- that is, my sons and I -went to see Dr. Garcia right away and he told us that he was trying to make arrangements to have the body buried in Corpus Christi. We told Dr. Garcia that we would approve this plan. We also authorized Dr. Garcia to make arrangements as he thought best and/that he would receive our full backing.

That night my two sons, my son's widow, Beatrice, and I attended a meeting of the G.I. Forum at which a telegram was read from Senator Lyndon Johnson in which he offered to make arrangements to bury my son's body in Arlington Cementery. Beatrice and I, who were sitting side by side, agreed that Senator Johnson's offer should be accepted. After the meeting my sons and I returned to Three Rivers.

On the following day, January 12, my son Guadalupe and I went back to Corpus Christi to see Dr. Garcia. We asked him if he could help us obtain financial assistance to send more than one member of the family to Washington to attend the funeral, since some Three Rivers organizations had volunteered to pay the expenses for one member of the family. He gave us two letters, one for Mr. R.A. Cortez of San Antonio, president of the League of United Latin

American Citizens, (LULAC), and another for Frank Chapa, president of the G.I. Forum in Beeville. We then returned to Three Rivers.

On the following day, my son Guadalupe informed me that Dr. Garcia had telephoned him and asked him to disregard the letters; that he (Dr. Garcia) xxxxxx would try to obtain the necessary funds to send at least three members of the family to Washington. I was thoroughly in accord that Dr. Garcia should do as he had told my son, since I wanted as many members of the family as possible to go to Washington for the funeral—or xxx go wherever the funeral might be held—and furthermore I had previously given him full authority to make whatever arrangements he saw fit, provided they met with the approval of the widow, whose after all, had the final sax in all these matters, and properly so.

On or about January 13, the following persons came to my home: J.K. Montgomery, mayor of Three Rivers, S.F. Ramsey, president of the Three Rivers Chamber of Commerce, Bryan Boyd, city secretary, First Mr. Boyd came to my home alone, in the morning. He and another man whose name is Radford, I think. INEX took me to the First State Bank of Three Rivers, where I was asked many questions (the above four men) in English, most of which I did not understand. I did tell them that I wish it were possible to bury my boy at home, but I also told them that I had consented to other arrangements being made and that, furthermore, the widow had the final say in the matter. Nothing by was said by anyone with reference to the Enlimiter collection of funds for traveling expenses for any member of the family. This subject was not discussed.

I believe it was that night (January 13) when the same gentlemen whom I had seen at the bank all came to my home with a statement that they wanted me to sign. I told them I could not sign anything because I had given complete authority to Dr. Hector Garcia and Beatrice, my son's widow. \_3-

My daughter Carolina, and my sons Alberto and Guadalupe were present when these four gentlemen asked me to sign the statement. Carolina kept a copy of the statement, which is attached to this statement. I repeat \*\*\* I did not signthis statement; the facts appearing in it are not true; and I did not authorize any one to publish it or anything similar to it. This statement brought to my home was translated to me by my children.

I want it clearly understood that I am very grateful to Br. Garcia and the American G.I. Forum for their efforts in our behalf. I am also grateful to other organizations and groups which have taken an interest in this case, and particularly to Senator Johnson, whose only interest, as I can see, was to find a peaceful resting place for a soldder who gave his life for his country. The Good Neighbor Commission has also been active in investigating this case, and I appreciate the efforts of Its Executive Secretary Mr. Tom Sutherland and its Chairman, Mr. Bob Smith.

If any embarrassment has been caused by this case to anyone, I am sorry, but after all I did not create a feeling of prejudice which seems to exist in many places in Texas against people of my national origin. Other people are responsible for that. I think that we would only be gooling ourselves to try to leave the impression that people of Mexican descent are treated the same as anyone else throughout the State of Texas.

I have made this statement in the presence of several persons, including members of my family. It has been translated to me by my daughter Carolina. I have not been offered anything by anyone for making it; I am doing it of my own free will. I had hoped that this matter would be ended, but if someone wishes to make an investigation, I would like for this ivestigation to bring out the true facts.

"Pelix' wife would not speak to me because I objected to the association she tembered was having with another man and with whom I had had trouble before they were told to leave town and she did not want us to know when the body mould arrive. He is my boy and I went his body brought back to his home in Three Rivers. My family and I hope that our Three Rivers friends will help us in getting his body brought here for burial. I am 66 years old, have lived in Three Rivers 25 years and I feel that everyone here is my friend. I expect to live here the rest of my life and would like for my boy to be as near us as possible. I do not know this Garcia from Corpus Christiand do not want any brouble from him."

My father was driven from home down to the bank by Mr. Ramsay and several other men, where they asked him to sign a letter which said he wanted Felix buried in Three Rivers. He didn't sign the letter, so they brought the letters to the house when they took Daddy home.

I looked at the letters and told them we would have to check. They told us that if Daddy didn't sign the letters they would not be printed. Then I asked them to leave.

Daddy didn't sign the letters then or anytime, because we tore them up, after we had studied them. A few days later, though, the letter was printed in the Three Rivers papers with my father's name on it.

Also, statements were printed saying that my father opposed the collection of money to pay for the family's trip up here. That is not so. He went to Dr. Garcia and offered to help get the money. If my father had opposed the trip, we wouldn't have taken the money and none of us would have come here.

The men in Three Rivers -- Mr. Ramsay, Mr. Kennedy, Mr. Montgomery, and several others -- kept trying to get him (my father) to say things and do things all during the time the stories were in the papers. Daddy got sick and on Dr. Garcia's instructions I made the men go away whenever they came to the house. It all got so bad finally, though, that Alberto had to take Daddy away to Laredo to get some rest.

### The Corpus Christi Caller-Times

The following is a full and correct statement as to my personal knowledge of the Longoria incident.

As a reporter for the Caller-Times, I have covered the activities of the American GI Forum. On the night of Jan. 10, Dr. Hector Garcia called me at my home. He said Rice Funeral Home of Three Rivers had refused chapel services for Felix Longoria, a soldier killed in action, and said the Forum would hold a protest meeting the following night.

I then called Mr. Kennedy, operator of the funeral home, to verify the story. Specifically warning him that he spoke for publication, I asked him if the funeral home had refused chapel services for Longoria. He said that was true.

I then asked if that refusal was based on Longoria's race. "We never made a pratice of letting Mexicans use the chapel," Kennedy said, "and we don't want to start now." He added that "most of them" (Latins) did not want chapel services.

I then asked if he had ever held a Latin service in the chapel, and he said that he had not.

John Anderson, a Caller-Times reporter who shares my duplex, was present during most of these phone conversations, and heard my end of the talk. I warned Kennedy at the time that he "had hold of a hot potato", but he seemed to believe that the whole thing amounted to very little.

The next day I called Mr. Kennedy again, and he told me that he would "discourage" the chapel service for Longoria, but would not refuse if the family insisted. He did not then deny his statements of the previous night. Later he did retract his original statements, and his denials were duly noted in our paper.

I am making this statement, at the request of Garcia, because an investigation has been ordered. I was not acquainted with any of the Longorias previous to the incident, and have no personal interest except in my own news stories, which were correct accounts of the incident as it developed.

My name is Hector P. Garcia M.D. I am a Physician Surgeon by profession and practice medicine regularly in the city of Corpus Christi. I am a Citizen of the U.S. and served as a Medical Officer during the Second World War. I am president of the American G.I. Forum, Independents Veterans Organization, established in Corpus Christi with the object of mutual help for Veterans and Veterans' families in the state of Texas.

On Jan. 10,1949, Tuesday, at approximately 7 PM Miss Sara Moreno talked to me on the telephone and informed me that her sister Mrs. Beatrice Longoria had been refused the use of the "chapel" of the Rice Funeral Home at Three Rivers . She wanted to use the "chapel" for the remains of her husband Felix Longoria who was being brought back to "Three Rivers". Miss Moreno stated that Mr. Kennedy the manager of the "Rice Funeral Home" had informed her that she could not use the chapel because he was afraid that "the whites would not like it." I talked to Mrs. Longoria and she told me that it was true. She stated that at that time she had been satisfied with the "suggestion" made by Mr. Kennedy to have the body at her home. However, now she would authorize me to contact Mr. Kennedy and ask for the use of the "chapel" and if it were denied then to help her arrange for the reburial to take place in Corpus Christi, Texas. I expressed my regrets to Mrs. Longoria and promised to call up the Rice Funeral Home immediately.

I made a long distance call to Three Rivers and asked to talk to the owner of the "Rice Funeral Home.". The person that answered the phone said "I am Mr. Kennedy.". I stated that I wanted to talk to the owner and he stated: "he would take care of any business.2.

I informed Mr. Kenedy that I was Dr. Hector Garcia from Corpus Christi and that I was talking by authority of Mrs. Beatrice Longoria and I proceeded:

" Mr Kennedy, Mrs. Longoria has authorized me to ask you to please let her use your funeral home to bring the remains of her husband Falix Longoria.".

"Mr. Kennedy replied: " It can't be done, and besides we reached an agreement with Mrs. Longoria whereby she would use her home instead and she seemed satisfied.".

"Mr Kennedy, Mrs. Longoria was not satisfied and she has authorized me to ask you to please let her use your funeral home." I said.

"That cannot be done" said Mr. Kennedy.

I answered by saying "But why, Mr Mennedy?".

Mr. Kennedy answered "Well, you see, the last time the Latin Americans used the home the had fights and got drunk and raised lots of noise and it didn't look so good. You understand how some of the are.

I said " But Mr. Kennedy this man is a veteran, I mean, Soldder who was killed in action and he is worthy of all our efforts and our greatest honors. Doesn't that make a difference,?" Can we use your funeral home. ?

He answered, "No, No, it can't be done and it doesn't make any difference. I don't dishike the Mexicanpeople but all have to run my business so I can't do that. You understand the whites here won't like it.

However, now she would authorize me to contact Mr. Kennedy and ask for the use of the "chapel" and if it were denied then to help her arrange for the reburial to take place in Corpus Christi, Texas. I expressed my regrets to Mrs. Longoria and promised to call up the Rice Funeral Home immediately.

I made a long distance call to Three Rivers and asked to talk to the owner of the Rice Funeral Home. The person that answered the phone said "I am Mr. Kennedy." I stated that I wanted to talk to the owner and he stated: "He would take care of any business."

I informed Mr. Kennedy that I was Dr. Hector Carcia from Corpus Christi and that I was talking by sutherity of Mrs. Beatrice Longoria and I proceeded:

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"Mr. Kennedy, Mrs. Longeria was not satisfied and she has authorized me to ask you to please let her use your funeral home." I said."

"That cannot be done." said Mr. Kennedy.



I answered by saying, "But why, Mr. Kennedy?".

Mr. Kennedy answered, "Well, you see, the last time the Latin Americans used the home they had fights and got drunk and raised lots of noise and it didn't look so good. You understand how some of them are."

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Then Mr. Kennedy proceeded: "And what's more, the "whites" here in town would not like it so much and I want to run my business in such a way as so not to hurt them. "There are some differences and I am sure that the "Whites" here wouldn't like them to use my funeral home. We have not let them use it and we don't intend to let them start now."

I said, "But Mr. Kennedy, this man is a veteran, I mean, Soldier who was killed in action and he is worthy of all our efforts and our greatest honors. Doesn't that make a difference?" (an we use your funeral home?"

He answered. "No, no, it can't be done and it doesn't make any difference.

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After this conversation I called Mrs. Beatrice Longoria and informed her that the mission had been a failure but that I would try to arrange the details so that the funeral would take place in Corpus Christi and that if necessary the American G. I. Forum would pay for the expenses. Mrs. Longoria authorized me to proceed with making those arrangements, I called the Caller-Times and asked Mr. George Broph to confirm the story which he did by calling Mr. Kennedy

After talking to Mrs. Longoria and Miss Sara Moreno and before calling Rice Funeral Home I decided that in view of the seriousness of the matter and the probability that later Mr. Kennedy would demy making such statements I asked my nurse Miss Glady Blucher to listen on the extension and she can verify all of my statements.

### CORPUS CHRISTI, TEXAS

Feb. 18, 1949

The following is a full and correct statement as to my personal knowledge of the Longoria incident.

As a reporter for the Caller-Times, I have covered the activities of the American GI Forum. On the night of Jan. 10, Dr. Hector Garcia called me at my home. He siad Rice Funeral Home of Three Rivers had refused chapel services for Felix Longoria, a soldier killed in action, and said the Forum would hold a protest meeting the following night.

I then called Mr. Kennedy, operator of the funeral home, to verify the story. Specifically warning him that he spoke for publication, I asked him if the funeral home had refused chapel services for Longoria. He said that was true.

I then asked if that refusal was based on Longoria's race. "We never made a practive of letting Mexicans use the chapel," Kennedy said, "and we don't want to start now." He added that "most of them" (Latins) did not want chapel services.

I then asked if he had ever held a Latin service in the chapel, and he said that he had not.

John Anderson, a Caller-Times reporter who shares my duplex, was present during most of these phone conversations, and heard my end of the talk. I warned Kennedy at the time that he "had hold of a hot potato", but he seemed to believe that the whole thing amounted to very little.

The next day I called Mr. Kennedy again, and he told me that he would "discourage" the chapel service for Longoria, but would not refuse if the family insisted. He did not then deny his statements of the previous night. Later he did retract his original statements, and his denials were duly noted in our paper.

I am making this statement, at the request of Garcia, because an investigation has been ordered. I was not acquainted with any of the Longorias previous to the incident, and have no personal interest except in my own news stories, which were correct accounts of the incident as it developed.
