Thank you for your letter of July 22nd regarding the departure from the United States of West Indian students.

As a general proposition, I want to assure you that we attempt to apply our existing immigration laws with real humanity. Only when a foreign student fails to comply with the liberal and flexible regulations governing his stay does our Immigration and Naturalization Service take corrective action. That Service always tries to do its job with understanding.

With respect to the specific recent cases involving West Indian students, I understand that detailed information has already been forwarded to you through our Embassy in Kingston. I hope that when your representatives have had an opportunity to examine these details, they will be able to report to you that the actions taken were reasonable and necessary, in the circumstances, and that our authorities have been careful to avoid any harsh or arbitrary action.

May I take this opportunity to extend best wishes for your continued good health.
