Dear Mr. President:


The State Department has banned all travel by American citizens to the 14 countries of the Near East, including Israel.

In Pennsylvania, and in other States, there are many doctors and nurses who are anxious to volunteer their services. They are clearly non-combatants and are motivated by purely humane considerations.

Because of the bloodshed and the destruction of hospitals and medical supplies, there is an urgent need for medical personnel and assistance in the area.

I respectfully request that you relax the current restrictions to allow volunteer medical personnel to travel to the Near East. Those who have volunteered are acting in the finest American tradition. A great humanitarian purpose would be served by facilitating their efforts.
