#### Biographical note:

Chester Cooper began working for the White House in the summer of 1964 and became a regular member of the NSC staff soon after the November 1964 election. He served as a senior staff member until April 1966 with responsibilities for Far East issues, Vietnam, and Canada.

#### Scope and content note:

This series consists mainly of letters to Cooper from representatives of various organizations and some private individuals commenting on US policy in Vietnam, with special sections for correspondence with HERO and SANE members. The documents in this series are a mixture of originals, carbon copies, and xerox copies.
