**Biographical note:**

Ulric Haynes was a NSC staff member from March 1965 to June 1966 concentrating on sub-Saharan African affairs.

**Scope and content note:**

This series consists of the working files of Ulric Haynes during his time as a staff member on the National Security Council in President Lyndon B. Johnson's Presidential administration. The files reflect the subject matter and geographical areas for which Haynes was responsible including sub-Saharan Africa.

This series includes correspondence, memorandums, speeches, and reports pertaining to Africa, including material on the Organization of African Unity, economic and military assistance, African visitors to the United States, the Rhodesian crisis, US-UK relations in regard to Africa, G. Mennen Williams' Vietnam Peace Mission to Africa and his African policy recommendations, measles and smallpox eradication efforts, Communist Chinese influence, and apartheid and race relations in the US and South Africa. The documents in this series mostly consist of carbon copies and a few photocopies.
