REMARKS BY MRS. LYNDON B. JOHNSON ASHLAND, VIRGINIA (Randolph-Macon College)

President J. Earl Moreland:

What a wonderful morning I have had! To start the day in George Washington's Alexandria, to have been welcomed in tradition rich Fredericksburg, and now to be at Randolph-Macon College whose roots go back to our historic beginnings.
