We will be driving around after lunch to see some of the golden-fringed forsythia, the red and pink tulips, and yellow daffodils bursting forth. And, ringing Hains Point, will be the old and the new cherry trees which will one day make that drive a latticework of pink and white blossoms.

Thomas Jefferson once wrote: "A community should be planned with an eye to the effect on the human spirit."

Wherever we live, I believe all of us have felt a new surge of interest in doing just that -- making our cities not only functional, but beautiful.

But somehow an eyesore in this great capital is all the more conspicuous because it is -- after all -- every American's hometown. It is, after all, the capital of the free world.

It was just a year ago that we set out to add our marks of beauty to this great city. We are deeply grateful to all who have helped.
